Offer Adults 36 Topics; Register on Jan 12, 16

HICKSVILLE—Registration dates were announced today for 36 subjects to be offered by the Adult Education Program in the Spring term starting Jan. 23. The fall term proved highly successful, with 386 persons taking one or more subjects offered evenings at the high school.

Elery H. Bean, director of the program sponsored by the Board of Education, said the aim is to "present a balanced program including academic, commercial, vocational, recreational and other fields of interest that the community may desire."

The following program is offered:

REGISTRATION: Courses are open to persons not attending grade school or high school. Priority is given residents of Union Free School District No. 17 in courses where the demand is great and the facilities limited.

A registration fee of \$3.00 per course is required. The courses run for a period of 10 weeks. The auto driving course registration fee is \$3.00 and runs for a period of 4 weeks.

REGISTRATION DATES: Thursday, January 12th, and Monday, January 16th, 7:30-9:30 p. m., at Hicksville High School.

CLASSES BEGIN: Week of January 25, 1950.

THE FOLLOWING COURSES ARE BEING OFFERED:

AMERICANIZATION: Miss Anne Merrill, Mon. - Wed., 7:30-9:30. This course is for beginners. Elementary English and preparation for citizenship is taught. (No registration fee).

AUTO MECHANICS: Ernest Buck. This course will be under the supervision of Mr. Buck, who is a Master Mechanic and Master Machinist and at the present time is Shop Manager for Nassau Motors on East Barclay St., where this course will be conducted.

DRIVER TRAINING: William Law. Each group of four pupils will spend two 2-hour lessons per week in a dual-control car and each pupil has an opportunity of operating this car for one half-hour during each lesson. In our fall term we had two courses under the direction of Mr. Law and many of those who took the course are now licensed drivers.

BAND INSTRUMENTS: Norman Seip, Tues. 7:30 - 9:30. All who have played or play a musical instrument are welcome. Here is a chance for organization of a community band which might be sponsored by the Fire Department or Service Organization under the able guidance of Mr. Seip, who is our instructor in the High School.

BOOKKEEPING: Leon Galloway, Mon. 7:30 - 9:30. A basic course in the fundamentals of bookkeeping and accounting. Trains for personal records and budgeting as well as for business.

CARE & TRAINING OF CHILDREN: J. W. Milhauser MD., Wed. 7:30 - 9:30.

This is a fine opportunity for the young parents of our community to get professional guidance in the care and training of their children. Dr. Milhauser will talk on general health, feeding and discipline, and any other problem you may have.

CERAMICS: Here is your opportunity to develop a new skill working with clay that offers a field of new creative art.

CHORAL & MUSIC APPRECIATION: Mrs. Leroy Wells, Wed. 7:30 - 9:30.

Mrs. Wells is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music and at present is Supervisor of Music at several school in Nassau County, is well qualified to present this course in music appreciation and choral work. There will be group singing in four parts and mixed voices.

COOKING & MEAL PLANNING: An important subject at this time when food prices are high and nutrition is of such importance.

Court Dismisses Town Complaint Against Airpark

JAMAICA—Oyster Bay Township has suffered another setback in its efforts to close down and oust Hicksville Airpark, it was learned here this week. Justice Sweeney in Queens County Supreme Court rendered a decision which dismissed the latest move by the Town to force closing of the airfield on the grounds of "legal infirmity."

The decision, made last Wednesday, also denied the Town's motion to dismiss the Airpark's counter claim for damages in the amount of \$400,000.

The Town started action last April to force demolition of the buildings upon the 35-acre tract on Robbins Lane off Jericho Turnpike, Locust Grove.

George V. Spahrer, owner of the Airpark which has been through a series of legal skirmishes—at one time with neighbors as the town stood on his side—said he was "delighted" with the latest decision.

New Year's Blaze Does Big Damage

HICKSVILLE—Fast action by volunteer firemen prevented the spread of a fire of undetermined origin which did "considerable damage" to the home of Carmen Millevoite, 51 McKinley Ave., on the first day of the New Year. The alarm was sounded at 5:52 Sunday night.

An investigation into the possible cause of the blaze which gutted a portion of the home was made by the county fire marshal's office. While vamps hesitated to place a figure on the amount of damage, it was unofficially estimated at more than \$5,000.

Board Lists Morning Schedule at 40 Stops for Children Half Mile Away

HICKSVILLE—The complete schedule of stops for transportation of local public and parochial students from the kindergarten through the 6th grade effective next Monday morning Jan. 9 was made public today by the Board of Education.

Forty stops are listed in the schedule with approximate bus departure times as worked out by the board by test over the holidays.

Releasing the schedule, a spokesman for the Board stated: "School buses will follow this schedule for the first day. Changes may have to be made later to meet the needs of the students. Parents and students are urged to cooperate in putting the schedule into effect."

"Only students living more than one-half mile from the school which they attend will be transported," it is warned.

Kindergarten pupils, who attend only half a day, will be taken home at noon and the afternoon classes brought to classes. All others will be brought to classes in the morning and home in the afternoon when school closes.

LETTER TO COMMUTERS: Roman Continues Blast At Town on RR Parking

HICKSVILLE—An open letter to all commuters who park their cars near the local station was addressed this week by Lawrence A. Roman of the Civic and Community Assoc., urging them to write the Town Board and demand prompt action to "arrange for parking needs without expenditure of fabulous sums of money."

Roman, who is chairman of the Rail Road Relations Committee of the Civic group, continued his attack upon the town fathers and blamed them for "losing a commuter parking area." Recently the town learned, the LIRE is interested in selling property near the station known as the RR Plaza rather than turn it over to the township for improvement as a parking field.

His open letter follows:
"Rather than obtain additional parking facilities, you have been placed in the unfortunate position of losing a commuter parking area. This, because of the lack of prompt, decisive and efficient action on the part of your Town Board."

"Acting upon the requests of the Civic Assoc. the LIRE in July, 1948, agreed to the rearrangement of the Railroad Plaza in order to obtain maximum parking space through efficient utilization. The railroad, however, asked for assistance by having us take over the policing of this area, further advising that similar arrangements were made in other communities."

"Since we are governed by a Town Board, this matter was promptly and properly turned over to it. Because of the Town Board's inaction during these past 18 months, rather than obtain more use out of this area, we are faced with the loss of the entire area. This, because the Rail Road now wants to sell this land for a reported sum of \$100,000."

"If you want commuter parking facilities, I urge you to write your Town Board at Oyster Bay requesting that they, through the use of the office which you gave them, promptly arrange for your commuter parking needs without expenditure of fabulous sums of money," Roman concluded.

HERALD HOMEMAKER: Room Lighting Tips for Television

So you have a new television set. Fine! Then you'll welcome these tips from the Cornell Housing and Design Newsletter on the proper room lighting to prevent eyestrain:

First rule is to keep the room evenly and softly lighted. Turn all table and floor lamps to 100 units or as near it as possible. Make sure, however that the room light is not reflected back into your eyes from the front of the television receiver. To check this, place a purse-size mirror against the safety glass of the receiver and move it up and down and left to right to discover reflections. If you find them, change the position of lamps or set. Then, if reflections still persist, you may have to use heavier silk or opaque shades on floor and table lamps. Some television set owners have found it helpful to place a 1- to 2-inch band of dark material around the lower edge of lamp shades to eliminate the bright rim of light on the lining.

Remember . . . it's the contrast of darkness and bright light that

causes eye fatigue. So keep the area around and in back of your set sufficiently lighted at all times.

WINTER CARE OF WOOLENS

There's a long stretch of winter ahead and plenty of use for your woolens. So take regular care of them, says the Oswego Extension Service, offering these reminders:

Brush woolens frequently with a soft, but firm-bristled clothes-brush. Hang up wet or snowy garments in a warm place, but not over direct heat. Use wide-shouldered hangers for suits and coats. Use hangers with trouser bars for men's trousers, and for women's skirts use hangers that hold the garment by the band. Air woolens outdoors every few weeks, particularly on bright, sunny days. Keep woolens, when not worn, in a closet that has good air circulation and plenty of space for the clothing to hang uncrowded.

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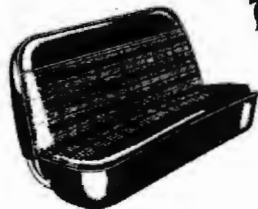

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LUCK OF THE IRISH?

Golden Nematode in Shamrock

WASHINGTON—A shamrock plant from Ireland might have brought with it bad luck instead of good, says the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, but for the vigilance of an inspector in the foreign plant quarantine service. In the soil around the roots of the shamrock, the inspector found a golden

nematode, a serious pest of potatoes. Failure to detect the pest might have had effects as serious as from an earlier entry of this pest, which has spread to more than 8,000 acres of potato farm land on Long Island, the Agency reports. State and Federal agencies are

now cooperating in a vigorous campaign of suppression plus a rigid quarantine to prevent the spread of the pest to other potato growing districts.

The Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine has a special laboratory at Hicksville, in the golden nematode area, including a special machine for washing and screening soil samples to sort out cysts or capsules such as this potato pest forms about itself for protection.

27 Interceptions

Its close check on incoming soil, the quarantine service reports, has resulted in 27 interceptions of the golden nematode—15 in soil from England, 8 from Ireland, 3 from Germany, and 6 interceptions from other areas. The washing and screening equipment catches other similar organisms, and 16 other interceptions have been of the same genus but of other species.

A cheering contrast in the Bureau's report on results from thousands of samples of soil from all the important potato growing areas of this country. These soil samples were collected during the past few years from potato grading or storage units usually shortly after harvest. These samples were ideal for detection of nematodes. No tract of the pest was found in any sample outside Long Island. This indicates that quarantine enforcement procedures have been successful in preventing spread of the pest, the Government adds.

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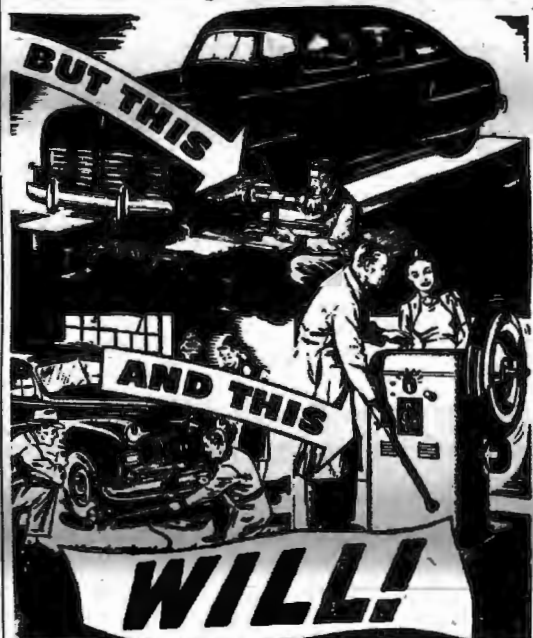

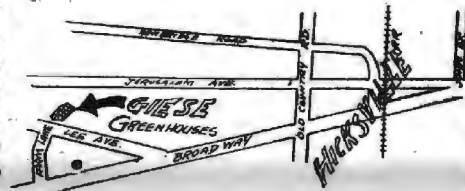

Library Board Appeals For Support on Jan. 18

HICKSVILLE—The trustees of the Public Library this week reminded voters of the school district to register next Saturday, Jan. 7, between 3 and 8 pm, if they plan to vote upon the Library purchase question on Jan. 18.

In a letter going to voters of the district, the trustees pointed out "The Library now faces its greatest problem, that of acquiring a suitable home. Through no fault of all parties concerned, the library must find new quarters. We have to give up our children's room on Jan. 1. This leaves us with only a small room for adult work. This is wholly inadequate for our needs."

The children's room in Nicholas School was vacated before Jan. 1 in order that the school board could set up an additional classroom.

The trustees continued: "Your Board has tried to obtain a suitable place to house your library. We have checked all possibilities and we have found that the Duerk property will satisfy our requirements. We feel that the price of \$35,000 for the property and \$5,000 extra for setting up the property for use is reasonable. The cost to the taxpayer on a home assessed at \$5,000 will be approximately \$1.35 per year for a ten-year period.

"Your library has a permanent charter and has built up a fine record of which the community can be proud.

"To maintain these services," the statement concludes, "we need your help. Register on Jan. 7 and

vote on Jan. 18 for the library project."

All members of the Board of Trustees signed the statement.

They are: Joseph Helm, Jessie Ulmer, Roland Heberer, Leon Galoway and Louise Augustin.
