Hicksville Board of Education is expected to complete final decisions on the proposed 1960-61 School District Budget at its regular meeting this Friday night in the Senior High School. While several factors will influence the final determination of the anticipated tax rate, it is known that the School Board has been aiming at keeping the rate within a \$5 per \$100 range.

Among the factors which will influence the final rate is the pending court action by 10 taxpayers seeking to have the Nov. 19 referendum on school construction declared "void and illegal." When the HERALD went to press this week, no decision had been received on the initial phase of the litigation. In oral argument, Michael Sullivan, as attorney for the school district, had asked last week that the suit be dismissed.

Sullivan is expected to report the current status of this action to the Board of Education, Friday night.

If a quick determination of the suit is not achieved, it has been pointed out, the School Board will include an extra \$84,000 in the proposed budget to cover the cost of moving temporaries to the Junior High in time for occupancy next September.

If the temporaries are not moved to accommodate increased enrollment in Junior High, the school will be forced into double sessions, resulting in additional expense for the District since more teachers will be required.

Other factors involved in determining the anticipated tax rate include the decision of the State Legislature upon increased state aid and the total assessed valuation of the District.

## Cantiague Rd. School Vote Set for March 5; 3 Civic Associations Okay All Propositions

### Joint Education Unit in Favor

Approval of the Cantiague School propositions was voted by the Joint Coordinating Committee on Education at a meeting on February 17th.

This committee is composed of representatives of the Education committees of Birchwood Park at Jericho, White Birch at Jericho and West Birchwood. This was in line with recent affirmative action of their various Boards of Directors.

A fact sheet was drafted and endorsed by the group to be distributed to all residents of the communities involved. The leaflet contains answers to pertinent questions concerning the Cantiague school. Posters will be placed in strategic spots bearing the sponsorship of the three Civic Association.

It was pointed out by well informed observers that the three Civic Associations represent well over 1000 Jericho homeowners. This is the first cooperative endeavor of the Joint Coordinating Committee.

### Proposition No. 1 For Adm. Building

First proposition before voters of Jericho School District #15 reads: "Shall this School District expend not to exceed \$125,000 to construct and equip a school administration building on the High School site and levy a tax in annual installments on the taxable real property of the District in not to exceed such amount?"

According to a report prepared by the Education Committee, the need for a District Administrative and Business office is imperative. The administrative personnel are presently performing duties in an old house adjacent to the new High School.

The report points out that the school district has over 2400 students and this number is estimated to double in three years. With yearly increases in the school population the expansion of administrative facilities is needed to keep pace with the student growth.

The cost of the new administrative building is estimated at \$1.50 a year per each resident (based on \$10,000 assessed valuation).

### Jericho School Board Explains Costs of Propositions

With the sale of our high school bonds, the Jackson addition and South Parkway bonds, future issues receive building aid under Section 3603-c (School Building Advance Law). As a result of this qualification only a small portion of the Cantiague School will be paid directly by the taxpayers of the District at this time. A substantial portion of the debt service will be loaned to the District under Section 3603-c and will not be repaid for 15 to 20 years. Included is an estimate of added cost which can be directly attributed to the Cantiague School including the extra staff, insurance, custodial salaries and the like. **THE TEACHERS REQUIRED TO MAN THE NEW FACILITIES WILL BE NEEDED IN ANY EVENT AND ARE NOT INCLUDED IN THE FOLLOWING:**

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION AND BUSINESS OFFICE

Your Board of Education is not only responsible for providing educational facilities for the boys and girls of the District, it is also charged with the responsibility of providing the necessary working space to carry on the administrative activities of the District. At this time the District administrative personnel have been located temporarily in a house that was on the high school property at the time it was purchased. These facilities are no longer adequate. In order to promote efficiency of operation, provide the necessary working space for the business affairs of the District, and provide space for the necessary personnel to supervise the educational program of the District, your Board of Education offers as Proposition No. 1 the authorization to expend \$125,000 to erect and equip a fireproof administration building with approximately 3,000 square feet usable space. It is planned to erect this building on the high school site adjacent to the parking field near the Oyster Bay Road entrance.

It is the responsibility of the District to provide space for the following:  
Superintendent, Coordination and Supervision of Elementary Instruction, Business Activities including bookkeeping, payroll and purchasing, Cafeteria, Transportation, Buildings and Grounds, Attendance, Census and Related State Aid, Directors of Special Education Services, Safe record storage for the following: Records of the District Clerk, Records of the District Treasurer, and other legal records of the District.

### Letters to News Editors:

DEAR EDITOR:

To many people it is "right" to be in favor of new school construction and "wrong" to oppose the idea, regardless of the soundness of the reasons for doubt and the weakness of the case in favor of educational expansion.

I don't necessarily mean to imply that this is the case, here, in relation to the proposed Cantiague School. However, there are certain doubts in my mind about the project that I would like to air at this time. For instance, I have reservations about the actual necessity of this new elementary school. Has the idea of expanding the existing facilities been explored? Could present double sessions be lengthened to make them comparable to two "full" sessions every day? What about putting the empty schools to use during the long, wasteful summer vacation period? Perhaps none of these substitute ideas are feasible, but they certainly deserve investigation.

I also have doubts about the priority of this school over other community needs. Would a public library, for instance, be more in the community interest at this time? The residents have never been given an opportunity to voice an opinion on the nature of public edifice they feel is most urgent. Maybe it is, as we're told, this elementary school. But maybe not. Were alternatives considered at all?

I wonder too, about certain history features specified in the plans

for the proposed school. When a public project is presented as a necessity, it seems to me that things like shower facilities for grade schoolers are an unnecessary extravagance. Now I'm in favor of cleanliness as much as the next fellow, but it seems to me that children go to school to learn, not to bathe.

I also have serious reservations about the validity of the cost-per-homeowner information revealed in the brochure prepared by the School Board and mailed to residents this week. The figures simply do not warrant belief. It's unrealistic to expect that the community can be the beneficiary of a glittering new school at an additional cost of only \$14 per month as the brochure claims. The absence of meaningful facts makes me suspicious of the accuracy of the entire report.

### All-Out Effort To Back School

Voting for the Cantiague Road School will take place March 5th from 12:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. at the new Jericho High School on Cedar Swamp Road.

The Education Committee, backed by the Board of Directors, is conducting an all-out effort to encourage people to register and vote. Registration days are Feb. 25 from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. and February 27 from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. at the Jericho High School.

Proposition #2 states: "Shall this School District expend not to exceed \$1810,000 to construct and equip a school building on the Cantiague site and levy a tax in annual installments on the taxable real property of the District in not to exceed such amount?"

In response to many inquiries, the Education Committee issued a statement to clarify several points. (1) There will be no saving on teacher's salaries if the school is voted down. Because of the increase of children in the Jericho School District, 37 additional classrooms will be needed by 1963. If a school is not provided, 37 classrooms will still be needed and these 37 classes will share classrooms with 87 other classes on a double session basis. The same number of additional teachers will be needed whether or not the school is approved. (2) If you are concerned with attracting the best teachers available, good teaching conditions are vital. Teachers do not function at maximum efficiency in crowded classrooms.

The Board of Education, consisting of Samuel Hecht, William Mayhew, Martin Penn, Irving Brand and William Kohnowicz, urges each of you to register on Feb. 25th or 27th, and vote YES on March 5th to give the children of our District adequate educational facilities.

It is also worth mentioning that the children of the present residents will never attend the proposed school. For the most part, these children will be assigned to the Robert Seaman School. To get there, they will be obliged to cross the Long Island Expressway via a crosswalk that will be constructed. However, it is still not certain whether this crosswalk will also bridge the equally dangerous marginal roads on either side of the Expressway. Why didn't the proponents of the Cantiaque School ask this question of school authorities long ago? If the plans for the crosswalk were found to be inadequate, could they not have made improvement a condition for Birchwood's support of the Cantiaque School?

It appears to me, that many, many questions about the school have not yet been resolved. Perhaps none of them is serious enough to cause you to reject the proposition when it comes time to vote. Perhaps we should support the measure and hope for the best, because I am sure that those who urge the necessity for this school, do so sincerely.

However, I do think that these facts deserved presentation so that every resident should be aware that there isn't only one answer to the question, "Is this school necessary?"

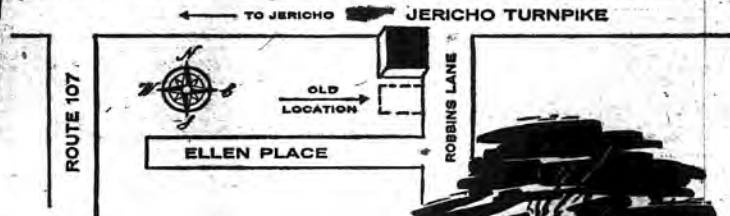

The amount you received because of accident or sickness where your employer paid the premiums to the insurance company, or where your employer himself paid your wages while you were off sick, is not taxable income up to the first \$100 per week you received after the first seven days you were off. If you were in a hospital for any day while you were off sick or if you were off because of accidents, then the seven day waiting period does not apply.

If you received over \$100 per week, the excess over \$100 per week is taxable income to you.

Be sure to attach a detailed statement to your tax return showing how you figured this. When you were off - what happened, if you were in the hospital, etc.

Better still, get a form 2440 from the Internal Revenue Service and use it.
