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Budget Goes Into Mail: School Election Slow Starting

Hicksville today appeared destined for one of the quietest school elections in recent years with no apparent official opposition to the re-election of three incumbent Board members whose terms expire this year, although it is known that Emil J. Szendy and Harry S. Goebel are trying to whip up an opposition slate.

The new formula on State Aid will benefit Hicksville taxpayers to the extent that \$300,000 in addition will be received during 1960-61, it was disclosed this week. As a result, some revisions in the amount to be raised by taxation as reported in the School District brochure now being mailed is indicated.

Total state aid for Hicksville will be over three and a half million dollars with \$4,373,827.00 to be raised by local taxes. If the assumed valuation next Aug. 1st is \$80 million, the tax rate will be \$4.91 per \$100. If the valuation reaches \$90 million, the rate will be \$4.56.

In addition, if the suit brought by Emil Szendy and Harry Goebel is settled in the District's favor by Aug. 1st, the sum of \$84,000 can be deleted from the budget for the moving of temporary-type classrooms. This would further reduce the tax rate by 9 cents per \$100.

Arrange Debate On Legal Gambling

A debate on whether gambling should be legalized will feature the meeting of the Ernest F. Francka Republican Club of Hicksville scheduled for this Friday (April 8) at 8:30 p.m. at the Masonic Temple, West Nicholas St., Hicksville.

William Duchman and George Katz will speak in favor of legalized betting. The opposition arguments will be stated by Thomas Hogan and Alexander Pankoff.

Petitions are now in circulation nominating Jerome G. Zettler, Herbert H. Johnson and Robert E. Goodrich for re-election. The terms of the three expire on June 30 and the seats will be filled at the annual election on May 4.

While some experienced observers of the local scene were inclined to regard the lack of campaign activity as "just the lull before the storm," it was admitted by many that this is the first time in about a decade that candidate activity has not already been in full swing since the end of March.

Candidates have about two weeks until the April 20th deadline for filing petitions to secure positions on the ballot.

There were unconfirmed reports that Szendy, who served six years on the Board, not seeking re-election two years ago when Walter Schuele was elected, may again run for the Board.

SEEKING CANDIDATES
 Szendy and Goebel, it was learned, have arranged two meetings at Goebel's home in an effort to "stop this Board." Szendy and nine other taxpayers, represented by Goebel as attorney, have brought a suit now pending in court which seeks to void the Nov. 19 referendum on school construction which won at the polls with a margin of more than 1,000 votes.
 "Replacement of members (of the School Board) coming up for election is essential," is the statement in a joint letter written by Szendy and Goebel in an effort to recruit opposition candidates.

BUDGET IN MAIL
 This week the School District was scheduled to start mailing to all residents copies of a 20-page brochure on the proposed budget for 1960-61. Besides giving a detailed breakdown on the budget, the brochure includes text and pictures on Hicksville educational programs "recognizing and meeting the needs of children."
 Residents not receiving a copy by mail, may obtain one at the School Administration Building on Newbridge Rd. or at the Downtown Annex, Broadway and Marie St., next week.

The Public Library is also planning to mail out copies of a booklet regarding the Library Budget which is subject to vote on May 4. The Hicksville School Board will hold a regular meeting tomorrow (Fri.) night at the Senior High School.

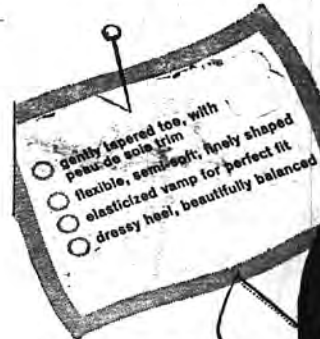

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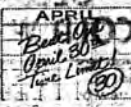

What's Cooking?

Passover (Pesach) is the spring festival, observed for 8 days, which recalls the Exodus from Egypt and the liberation of the Israelites from slavery. Here are three recipes which are almost traditional for the happy holiday. The first, Farfel Candy, was given to me by MRS. BESSIE BROADWYN of 30 Orange Drive, and is a delightful treat for children. The Sponge Cake recipe was given to me by MRS. ELIZABETH AXELROD of 44 Rockland Drive who is a grandmother herself, and said she learned this recipe from her mother when she was a young girl so it is a real collector's item! The third recipe I have added is a variation of the very popular Matzo Brie which is frequently served at this time.

FARFEL CANDY

½ C sugar
1 lb. honey
½ tsp. ginger
¼ tsp. cinnamon
¼ tsp. salt
¾ C farfel
¾ C coarsely chopped walnuts

Place the sugar, honey, cinnamon, ginger, and salt in a large saucepan, and bring to a slow boil over a low flame. Add the farfel slowly, and stir gently until the farfel has absorbed the liquid. Still stirring, add the nuts. Turn this mixture out on a wet board and pat out to about ¾" thickness with palm of hand when it is dipped in cold water. When cool cut into squares, strips or diamond shapes.

MRS. AXELROD'S SPONGE CAKE

14 T. sugar
12 T. cake meal
12 eggs (separated)
1 orange (juice and grated rind)

Separate eggs and beat whites until stiff. Beat the yolks, and slowly add the cake meal, sugar, orange juice and grated rind. Stir until blended. Fold in the beaten egg whites. Bake in a spring form in a slow oven (325 degrees) for about 1½ hours. If you wish, you can add 1 C finely chopped nuts to this recipe, decreasing the cake meal to 10 T.

BAKED MATZOS AND CHEESE

1 lb. dry cottage cheese
½ tsp. salt
6 eggs
6 matzos (whole)
½ tsp. cinnamon
Dash of nutmeg
1 tsp. sugar
2 T. butter

Combine cheese with salt and 3 eggs. Mix well. Dip the whole matzos in remaining 3 eggs which have been beaten lightly. In a well-buttered baking dish place a layer of matzos . . . and cover with a layer of cheese and sprinkle with mixture of cinnamon, nutmeg and sugar. Alternate layers of matzos and cheese until all is used. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes. Serve with cinnamon and sugar, syrup or sour cream.

Library Trustee Petitions Available

Petitions are now available to residents of Union Free School District 15 who are interested in running for the Board of Trustees of the proposed Jericho Library. The forms may be obtained from Mrs. Daniel Sirota, 20 Merry Lane; Daniel Lazare, 27 Craig St. or Seymour Berkman, 19 Yates Lane.

Criteria For Proposed Library

1. Ultimate acquisition of two books per capita or a minimum book collection of 8,000 volumes as soon as possible.

2. Collection should consist of 65% non-fiction and 35% fiction. The ratio of juvenile books to adult books depends upon the makeup of the district population.

3. For a population of up to 15,000 the library should have a minimum of one qualified professional librarian with a Master of Arts degree. He should have a certificate from the State Education department.

4. Staff requirement: after one year equivalent of one full time staff member for each 2500 of population. This includes clerical and professional but not janitorial.

5. Expenditures: Salaries to constitute 50-65% of budget; miscellaneous expenses consisting of supplies, utilities, rent, electric, telephone, insurance approximately 25%-35%. Books 10%-25%.

6. When the library budget is approved by taxpayers the library tax is levied as part of the district school tax. The school district treasurer turns over the pro-rata share of the collected taxes to the library. The treasurer of the school district by law is treasurer of the library and must sign checks authorized by the trustees.

7. The library trustees has regents authority to hire employees, set salary scales and determine policies. 8. Choice of books for the library is determined by librarian in accordance with policies determined by the trustees.

9. Clerical help scale is \$2200-\$2800 with salary increments.

10. For each clerical worked 100 square feet of work space is needed. The recognized standard for each person to seat is 30 square feet. For each square foot 11 volumes are needed. By rule of thumb 25% of all volumes should be in circulation.

All petitions must be signed by 25 qualified residents of Union Free School District 15 and returned to Mrs. Sirota, chairman of the Friends of the Jericho Library, in order that she may turn them in to the Clerk of the School District no later than Friday, April 16th. Voting for the trustees is scheduled for the annual school budget meeting on Tuesday evening, May 3rd, following the vote on the proposed library.

At a recent meeting held at the home of Mrs. Claire Wertheimer, 784 Carliste Rd., a representative of the New York State Library Extension Service discussed the problems and procedures involved in establishing a library. Based on the information presented by the extension service representative it was decided by the Friends of the Jericho Library to ask for a nominal budget figure of \$30,000 to organize the library and cover the cost of the first year's operation.

If the proposition is approved, the new trustees, operating as an independent body responsible only to the Regents, the Commissioner of Education and the District voters, will then proceed to seek a suitable site for the proposed library. They will also be required to recruit a library staff and put the library in operation.

I would not call our school system a success until we had a busy library.

The Volunteers

A Bi-monthly series written by William Ledner for the JERICHO FIRE DEPARTMENT
Your fire department requires that every volunteer fireman attend classes on fire fighting and rescue operations.

There are also many other courses which they usually take. These courses include such topics as fire inspection, heat and atomic radiation, aircraft rescue, pumps and engines, hydraulics, sprinkler systems, etc.

The courses are given by the Nassau County Vocational Education & Extension Board. Trained instructors are sent to give these courses either in the fire house, or another suitable location.

The Basic School
The Basic School lasts for a period of ten weeks during which time the firemen are given classroom and practical experience in different phases of fire-fighting.

Of any course given to firemen, this is the most important. From this course they learn discipline, types and uses of fire extinguishers, forcible entry into burning buildings and the tools to use, ventilation, fire fighting appliances (nozzles, axes, crow bars, electric wire cutters, pliers, etc.), types and uses of ladders, care and use of fire hoses, hydraulics, rescue operations, salvage, and general fire fighting.

THE RESCUE SCHOOL
This course consists of advanced first aid training, the care and the use of resuscitators and oxygen units, and mechanical rescue. The rescue course is a practical course and every thing is practiced. At the course given to the Jericho Fire Dept. recently, we practiced lowering people from high elevations, removing people from burning automobiles, resuscitation, and the use of oxygen.

RESOLVED, that the Ordinance regulating the Pumping, Speed and Operation of Boats in waters adjacent to the Town of Oyster Bay, adopted January 31, 1960; be and it hereby is amended as follows: Section 12.
