Redeemer Lutheran Church is not yet two years old, but its growth both in the Sunday School and Church has necessitated a larger building.

## Red Cross Branch Gave 4,138 Hours

The Annual meeting of the Hicksville Branch of the American National Red Cross was held at the Hicksville Public Library on Monday, April 25th. The following were re-elected to the Executive Board: Miss Grace T. Stoll, Chairman; Miss Mildred E. Clark, Vice-Chairman; Mrs. Joseph Bean, Vice-Chairman; Mrs. Wilbur E. Morch, Secretary; Miss Louise Augustin, Treasurer.

The Board was honored by having the following representatives from the Nassau County Chapter present: William A. Miller, Jr., Chairman, Nassau County Chapter; Mrs. Kenneth E. Gerard, Director of Fund Raising; Mrs. Olaf Olsen, 2nd Division Co-Chairman of the Fund Drive; and Mrs. Norman Hoeler, Field Representative.

Paul Drake rendered several vocal selections which was enjoyed by everyone.

During the evening Miss Stoll, Branch Chairman, gave a report on the activities of the Branch during the past year. The Blood program committee worked at two blood sessions. The Canteen Committee also served the staff and blood donors at these sessions. Coffee hours were held during June 1959 and March 1960 at the Niki Base at Brookville. Home made cakes were made and served.

The Branch also participated in five dances in 1959 and two in 1960. Thirteen women attended the "Mother and Baby Care" classes at Chapter and received certificates and one woman attended the class for the "Home care of the Sick & Injured." This came under the Health & Safety service. Hicksville was credited with 2477 volunteer hours at Chapter and 1661 1/2 hours in the community, making a total of 4138 1/2 hours by volunteer workers. The Junior Red Cross in the various local schools have done a tremendous job of making favors and place mats, as well as gift boxes. The Production Group made and turned in 12 Beanie's for the hospitalized Veterans. The Home Service Committee was called upon by 126 families in Hicksville for help.

This year the Fund Drive was on

a Contributor Basis rather than a dollar basis. The Hicksville quota was for 2200 contributors. This quota was met and the latest figure is a total of 2350 contributors and there is on deposit in the Long Island National Bank of \$2,625.71.

It was also pointed out the great need for a local Disaster Unit. "Should a disaster occur in Hicksville, either by a 'gal' named Hurricane or through some of the Explosive pants, we certainly would be in a very sad way, and the Red Cross surely would be greatly criticized for not being prepared. But how can one be prepared if no one is in-

McCormack carried a decisive win over incumbent Robert E. Goodrich, running for re-election, 1850 to 1400. Emil J. Szendy, former Board member, failed to poll a thousand votes with almost 4,000 casting ballots out of 7,000 registered.

Johnsen and Zettler were re-elected for their second three-year terms, each receiving more than 2000 votes. Elery H. Bean was re-elected to a five-year term on the Library Board, defeating William A. Bruno Jr., 1914 to 890. About 1,000 persons who cast their ballots for school trustees failed to vote on library trustee vacancy.

The Hicksville School Budget was approved, 2256 to 1090. The record-breaking school budget, more than eight million six hundred thousand dollars, was accrued in all voting districts.

The Public Library Budget creaked thru 1763 to 1539 and was rejected in the East St., Lee Ave., and Old Country districts; however, the Dutch Lane district vote of 422 to 158 carried the budget for the library and the controversial bookmobile.

More than 200 people were gathered in the student cafeteria of Hicksville Senior High School to hear the tabulation and official tally by the Board of Education after the polls closed. All Board members were present except Robert D. P. Eakin.

Re-elected incumbents will start their new terms of office on July 1. McCormack, elected to succeed Goodrich, will start his first term on the same day.

Overpass—Pursuant to the position taken by your civic assoc. to oppose the proposed overpass to the Seaman School as presently planned and to attempt to persuade the state and local authorities that the overpass must extend over the marginal roads. ## Suburban Gardener

By Ralph Pignataro

LAWNS  
Well, in just two short weeks the whole countryside has awakened to take on its spring colors. Lawns look their best at this time and with reasonable amount of care can remain that way. Mowing grass is the most time consuming operation in maintaining any lawn. At this time of year it may be cut lower than during the warm season. The average lawn should be maintained at 1 1/2 inches all season. In West

Birchwood, however, for the most part the biggest problem is getting something up to cut—no less cutting.

Remember, all of you who have just seeded, sprinkle seeded area often; twice a day if the ground absorbs water. Do not cut until young grass attains height of 2 1/2 inches at which time cut down to 1 1/2 inches. If grass is yellow after first cutting fertilize.

## TREES

Tent caterpillars have shown up quite a bit lately but primarily in crab-apples and most other ornamental trees. A combination spray containing cupra, malathion and methoxychlor. On fruit trees, periodic applications of these materials will insure fruit free of insect and worms. To check the tent caterpillars, spray late in the afternoon or early in the morning when the larvae are largely confined to their tents.

## FOUNDATION PLANTINGS

Many in West Birchwood are in the process of putting in foundation shrubs. There is plenty of time left for planting shrubs but make sure they are planted in a reasonable amount of topsoil; at least 8 to 10 inches of same. Due to recent infestations of the taxus weevil, it is highly advisable to make an application of either chlordane or dieldrin to the base of all shrubs to protect against any eggs that may be in the earth. Your shrubs are planted in.

Remember that for every effort made in the right direction on your lawn and shrubs, Mother Nature will reward you a thousandfold.

## Civics Object To Overpass Plan

Strong opposition to the L. I. Expressway overpass as presently planned was voiced by President David Serko of the West Birchwood Civic Assoc. at a School Board Meeting in Jericho High School, April 21st.

Accompanied by seven members of the Board of Directors, chairman of the Education Committee and Editor of the WEST BIRCHWOOD NEWS, Serko told the School Board that "the residents of our community are very much disturbed about the present plans for the overpass to the Robert Seaman School."

Serko added, "the school board should study alternatives which we feel are available. They are (1) extension of the overpass over the service road (2) transportation by bus and (3) rezoning so that West Birchwood children should use the Cantigue school."

He stated, "we feel that the use of traffic controls, such as traffic lights or police guards is not an adequate safeguard for the hazardous situation which would exist if the overpass is erected as presently planned."

Speaking for the School Board, Sam Hecht, president, promised to look into the situation and stated that steps would be taken to remedy the problem in so far as it was in the power of the board to do so.

If you are getting weary of serving chicken the same old way, here is a recipe that will give the "old bird" a real gourmet touch, with very little extra effort on your part. I serve this somewhat sweet and spicy dish with rice and a tossed salad. To add an extra special effect... try offering it with one of the exotic Indian teas.

## CHICKEN IN ORANGE SAUCE

- 1 1/2 lb. chicken, disjointed
- salt and cayenne pepper
- 1/2 C fat
- 1/4 C blanched almonds
- 1/2 C seedless raisins
- 3/4 C pineapple chunks
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. ground cloves
- 1 1/2 C orange juice
- 2 T flour
- 1/4 C water
- 1 Avocado
- 2 Oranges

I bunch watercress  
Season chicken well by rubbing with salt and cayenne pepper. Brown on all sides in fat. Add almonds, raisins, pineapple, cinnamon, cloves and orange juice. Cover and simmer over low heat for 1 hour, or till tender. Remove chicken, fruit and nuts to a large platter. Make a paste of the flour and water and add it to the liquid in the pan. Cook till thickened, stirring constantly. Pour over the chicken. Garnish the platter with avocado wedges, orange sections and watercress. Serves 8.
