School Board Racing Calendar To Move First Group of Temps

Stalled dead in its tracks since January when legal action was launched seeking to upset the Nov. 19 referendum on school building, the Hicksville Board of Education will press forward on an essential preliminary portion of the program — racing against the calendar — at its meeting this Friday night. The voters approved the School District budget last week and among the items in the budget was \$84,000 allowed for the movement of the first group of 12 temporary classrooms to the Junior High School. The court action by Emil J. Szendy, former Board president whose bid for re-election to the Board was spurned by the voters last Wednesday, and nine other residents had frozen all work on the various elements of the \$2 million building program until the issue is thrashed out in court, probably next month. Since the shifting of 12 temporaries to the Junior High is urgent if the Junior High is to remain on single sessions in the fall, the Board of Education placed funds in the budget to accomplish this phase of the program, pending the outcome of the court case. Tomorrow (Friday) night the Board of Education will meet with School Architects Knapp & Johnson to proceed with preparation of final plans and specifications, prior to bid taking on moving the first 12 units.
The call for public bids will follow and upon awarding of contracts, the movement of the first 12 units of classrooms from elementary to secondary use will start. The program is unique for this part of the nation and is being watched with interest by education and school planners everywhere.
School authorities hope the work will be well underway during the month of July to have the 12 classes hooked to the Jr. High School on Jerusalem Ave. in time to accommodate the all-time record enrollment in Sept.

Probably among the first units to be shifted will be the classes now attached to East St. School, since the site occupied by these rooms will become the location for a permanent gym to be built on the same location under the Nov. 19 referendum.

Samuel Hecht was reelected as School Board Trustee with 419 votes. Harold Spielman defeated Irving Brand by a vote of 304 to 187.

Mr. Hecht and Mr. Spielman were elected for a term of three years and will take office July 1.

The proposals for a Library and Adult Education Program were defeated.

Letters To and From Editor

Dear Editor:
In your request for the 1966 Civic Drive, you state that we plan new for a school district. This is really what I would like to see. It is most exciting to have the majority of a development fall under the category of Jericho, and the tall and under Syosset. In the West Birchwood development, the Hicksville borderline was moved so that they could be united. Why can't the same thing happen here? If I live within the Jericho Postal Zone, I should live within the town of Jericho. Who decides on where a school district ends?

My older son has to travel five miles to a High School, even though there is another one within half that distance. He has very few friends in Birchwood Park, though I am sure there are plenty his age. But he feels they have nothing in common, because they go to different schools. Many of his friends and classmates live in Plainview, for they, too, seem to be within the school district of Syosset. My only reason for bringing this up is to call your attention to the fact that instead of having the opportunity to make friends who live within walking distance of our home, he is isolated to a group that lives miles away.

This has been bad enough, but when I read Mr. Diamond's statement that the Jericho Library will be confined only to residents of the Jericho school district, that was the last straw. How about the rest of us on the other side of the dividing line? Have we no voice in a matter of this importance? Is it more important to satisfy the Board of Education, or the people being served? Truthfully, I feel like a step-child of Syosset. Our school taxes go there, and my children attend school there, but it is much too far to ever attempt to walk there, while the village of Jericho is only a mile away. My children can at least get there by bike. When Syosset does build a library, it most certainly would not be so conveniently located.

To quote Joseph Eisner, president of the Nassau County Library Association, "It is a well known fact that per capita cost of library service is proportionately higher the smaller the number of people being served." If this is the case, you should be glad to increase membership. I can see where a joint Jericho-Syosset library would cover too much territory, but how about just including the Locust Grove section, or at least going as far as Robbins Lane?

If we are to be one community, we should come under one jurisdiction. In that way, we can do away with favoritism. I make a motion that we fight for a United Birchwood in the true sense, and abolish our dividing line.

This letter is being written in criticism but rather in explanation of the separation of Syosset from Jericho. I could not possibly criticize your sentiments because I wholeheartedly agree with you that it would be ideal if the entire community belonged to the same school district.

This unfortunate situation arose many years before our builders ever dreamed of Birchwood. The school lines were drawn when Birchwood was all farms with no streets and entrances as we know it today. The same situation took place in lighting water and other special districts. This situation is not unique with Birchwood but rather quite common in other surrounding areas.

The possibility of ever changing this situation is remote. It is true that in Jericho a few homes located in West Birchwood were taken into the Jericho School District from Hicksville. This arrangement was made possible by the exchange of some industrial property to offset the cost of the transfer of these homes. If we attempted to do the same in Syosset, it would cause an upheaval in both school districts. Bear in mind that we have over 400 families from our community going to the Syosset Schools. The Syosset tax rate is substantially different from that in the Jericho School District. It would be an almost impossible task to ever work out an arrangement where it would be equitable from a tax standpoint to make the change. Furthermore, it would need the approval of both school districts, and, frankly I doubt, very much if any of the residents residing out of Birchwood would be in favor of the consolidation.

It is my intention to write the answer to your letter in two parts, the second of which shall be printed in the next issue of THE VILLAGER. Your letter is typical of the feelings of many of our residents in Birchwood. I feel it is of paramount importance to explain the background, history and future of this problem, and therefore in my next letter, I will attempt to further answer your letter.
