

**CALLING FOR BIDS:**

**See 4-Month Project Moving Temporaries**

The movement of temporary-type classrooms from East St. and OldCountry Elementary school sites for reconstruction and attachment to the Junior High on Jerusalem Ave. may take as long as four months to accomplish, the Hicksville Board of Education learned Friday night during a conference with Knappe & Johnson, architects. The architects declined to estimate the time factor at anything less than three months for the job, providing all conditions are ideal.

The official word from Knappe and Johnson is posing some serious problems for the School Administration since the additional 12 rooms at the Junior High will thus not be ready until some time after the fall term begins.

**DELAYED BY SUIT**

Last Nov 19 the community voted approval of a two million dollar school construction program, including the movement of the temporary classroom structure. However a group of ten taxpayers including Emil J. Szendy, former Board president, represented by Harry Goebel, former School attorney, has started a suit seeking to declare the referendum illegal and void.

This court action halted all repartitions by the architects on the various phases of the building program and the go ahead signal could not be given until the district voted \$84,000 in the 1960-61 District Budget to finance the movement of the classrooms. With the Budget approved, the architects have resumed work on final plans

**and specifications.**

During a two-hour conference with the architect on Friday night at the regular Board meeting, it was disclosed that working drawings for the movement of 14 classrooms are 95 per cent complete and about ready for submission to the State Education Dept. Division of Buildings and Grounds.

It was brought out during the conference that it is expected to take a day and a half to move each class unit along the public streets and highways of Hicksville.

The Board will open bids on the project on June 21st.

The Board also authorized the administration to call for bids for the purchase of 385 tablet arm chairs for seating in the 12-room addition to the Junior High.

**RESOLUTION ADOPTING MAP ENTITLED "MAP" SHOWING REAL PROPERTY TO BE ACQUIRED FOR THE ALTERATION OF ALIGNMENT OF CANTIAGUE ROCK ROAD, HICKSVILLE, LONG ISLAND, NEW YORK FROM WEST JOHN STREET TO JERICHO TURNPIKE" DATED JUNE, 1959 REVISED JANUARY 12, 1960, AND DIRECTING THE TOWN ATTORNEY TO ACQUIRE SAID LAND IN FEE.**

WHEREAS, a resolution was heretofore adopted by this Board on February 16, 1960 approving the action of Sidney B. Bowne & Son in preparing the map entitled "Map Showing Real Property to

be Acquired for the Alteration of Alignment of Cantiague Rock Road, Hicksville, from West John Street to Jericho Turnpike" and said map is now on file in the office of the Town Clerk; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to law, notice was duly published that a hearing would be held by the Town Board in respect to said map on March 15, 1960 at 10 o'clock A.M., at which time a reasonable opportunity would be afforded to all interested persons to make objections thereto or suggest changes therein; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was duly held on said map pursuant to the public notice as aforesaid and William Yokum, Phyllis Barberie, Carolyn Berning, H.W. Berning, Jr. and Henry Von Den Hoorn appeared to make objections thereto and to suggest changes therein and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has reviewed, with the office of the Town Superintendent of Highways and with the Consulting Engineer, the plans for the alteration of alignment of Cantiague Rock Road and has given careful consideration to the objections voiced at the public hearing, and after lengthy study has determined that the acquisition map as prepared by Sidney B. Bowne and Son represents the best manner of altering the alignment of Cantiague Rock Road,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that said map entitled

"MAP SHOWING REAL PROPERTY TO BE ACQUIRED FOR THE ALTERATION OF ALIGNMENT OF CANTIAGUE ROCK ROAD, HICKSVILLE, FROM WEST JOHN STREET TO JERICHO TURNPIKE" is hereby adopted without change; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Attorney is hereby authorized and directed to acquire said lands by dedication, purchase, condemnation proceedings or otherwise; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the compensation to be paid to the owners of such real property as may be acquired hereunder by condemnation proceedings shall be determined by the Supreme Court without a jury; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Oyster Bay shall become vested with the title to the lands shown on said map upon the date of the entry of the order of the Supreme Court granting the application to condemn said lands; and be it

## AN EDITORIAL:

### Apathy vs Enthusiasm

An appalling cloak of apathy has descended upon the once-vigorous residents of West Birchwood. The unbounded enthusiasm manifested by our new residents of last year apparently didn't survive the winter's frosts.

In order to flourish, an organization must stimulate the interests of its members. Attempts have been made to do this through the open Board of Directors meetings on the school board election and the overpass issue. The attendance, at these meetings was pitifully small. For example, a recent appeal for people interested in working on this newspaper evoked not one response.

Why aren't newer residents joining the various committees and activities of our Association? We must point out that the West Birchwood Civic Association is not a closed group consisting only of the original residents, but is open to everyone. We need new workers and want them to participate to the fullest extent. The common reason advanced by non-participants is "lack of time" and "other organizational interests". We cannot overemphasize that your Civic Association, more than any other group, directly affects your community welfare. Participating actively on committees will not only promote this welfare, but also give you an opportunity to meet neighbors other than those living on your block.

## Letters to the Editor

It has been brought to the attention of the Education Committee that persons have verbally attacked this committee for its lack of action concerning the Library proposal on the May 5 ballot. This letter will:

- 1) attempt to explain the committee's action and 2) publicly register the indignation at the Board of Directors' lack of support for the committee's recommendation to endorse the Library Proposal.

Four of our residents, meeting with the Friends of the Jericho Library, put in countless hours of work in their efforts to acquaint themselves with the procedure for securing a library for our community; these men, Seymour Berkman, Murray Kelme, Larry Keavey and Dan Lazare interviewed library personnel, read much material on libraries and in many other ways became very informed about library matters. After talking with these people, the Education Committee framed a motion to the Ed. of Directors to positively support the library proposal, for \$30,000 (a modest sum in comparison to comparable communities) for an organizational, and exploratory first year. This motion for endorsement was defeated by our Board of Directors, with this reasoning, "We don't have enough information." Hence, by the inherent organization of our civic association, the Education Committee was forbidden to actively campaign for the library as it so strenuously had done for the Cantigue School.

It is the feeling of this committee, that a bid of directors has the duty to be well informed on urgent community matters, by the very nature of responsibility undertaken when assuming office;

recognizing the impracticability and almost impossibility for each member of the Board of Directors to become expertly conversant with ALL aspects of ALL problems in the community, committees generally conduct much of the research and actual work, so that the board is freed somewhat to perform its policy-making function. The Board of Directors generally use the committees' information and recommendations for decision making. By not taking any action at all on the Library proposal, the board functionally disapproved of the library, even though they gave lip service to supporting a library for Jericho. This, in effect, is also a tacit reproach of the committee's hard work.

We feel strongly that a committee's recommendation should be followed unless the Board of Directors has evidence that the committee has made blatant mistakes in their report; in the case of the library, the request for endorsement of the library was defeated not on additional evidence on the part of the board - but BECAUSE OF LACK OF INFORMATION!!!

One good thing has come out of the defeat of the proposal for the establishment of a library - the committee recognizes that the lack of support for the library on the part of the board (and some other people) is due not to apathy but to a lack of information. An effort (such as that performed by this committee in getting out the information and vote for the Cantigue School) will result in a positive vote for the library next time.

It is the hope of the Education Committee

  - 2 T. minced parsley
- Cook onion in fat until tender. Add shrimp (broken into pieces) and brown. Stir in flour, salt and chili powder. Add milk gradually, and cook five minutes stirring constantly. Add catsup and parsley. Cover and heat thoroughly. Serves 6.

## Suburban Gardener

### TREES

By now the flowers have fallen from most crab apples, flowering cherries and flowering peach trees. The next trees to flower are Golden Chain, Bechtal Crab and tree Wisteria. Anyone wishing to buy any trees should remember that as long as the tree is already out of the ground and in leaf it may be planted. Consult your nurseryman.

Now is the time to use your first all purpose insect spray. A simple all purpose spray containing a combination of DDT, Malathion, Lindane and DDD will give the best results. Do not spray any shrub or tree in full bloom. Follow manufacturer's instructions on package.

### PERENNIALS

Perennials are now being featured at garden centers and nurseries. These are the most versatile plants in the horticultural family and can be used in rock gardens, as an edging, to hold back dirt on a slope or just to spot color throughout your landscape. Most popular perennials are Pink, Candytuft, Sweet William, Dianthus, Foxglove, Sedum, Forget-Me-Not, Basket of Gold, Siberian Wall Flower, Bleeding Hearts and Peonies.

### ANNUALS

Like perennials, annuals are at the peak of availability. Annuals pick up where perennials leave off. While perennials flower a short time during the growing season, annuals flower continuously until frost. Use them also as edgings or color spots in the evergreen plantings. Be it loved annuals are: Salvia, Penstemon, Petunias, Zinnia, Coleus, Ageratum and Alyssum. They are purchased as seed or seedlings.

### BULBS

Though the average person associates bulbs with fall planting, spring planting bulbs are rapidly gaining popularity. Gladiolus, Caladium, Tuberous Begonias and Dahlias are bulbs that can be planted now. Here again consult your nurseryman as to where, when and how to plant bulbs.

Safety Rules and Regulations are necessary in our daily life. When observed, they work to our mutual advantage.

Whether the rules are concerned with Fire safety, our daily work or the operation of motor vehicles it is mandatory for all of us to observe these regulations. In the case of motor vehicles, with which this column is particularly concerned, the Motor Vehicle Bureau has a section for emergency vehicles.

The operator of an emergency vehicle on a public highway, must operate under a definite set of laws. He is not permitted to drive in a reckless manner and must at all times keep in mind public safety. Considering the urgency of his business and the haste with which he must respond, the safety record of emergency vehicles is an excellent one.

Red lights, warning devices, protect the emergency vehicles. There are certain rules involved as well. One of these, that we urge complete cooperation on, is the 500 foot rule. Clearly displayed on the rear of our equipment is a sign that reads: "KEEP BACK 500 FEET." The purpose is to protect not only the men standing on the rear, but you as well. It allows a safe stopping distance, reaction time for turns, stops, etc.

Give an emergency vehicle complete right of way. Put to the curb or to the right. Obey the 500 foot rule. As a reminder, the Chairman of the Tournament Committee, requests that you, until your contribution to the Welfare Fund Drive, if you have not already done so and extend his deep appreciation for the generosity Our Town has shown the Fund Drive.
