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Msgr Bittermann Celebrates 50th Anniversary

Rt. Rev. Msgr George M. Bittermann, VF, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola RC Church in Hicksville, will commemorate the 50th Anniversary of his ordination by offering a Solemn Mass this Sunday, May 29, at noon. His golden anniversary of becoming a priest occurred on May 21. He has been pastor in Hicksville for 29 years, is dean of Central Nassau County and member of the board of consultants for the Rockville Centre Diocese.

Assisting Msgr. Bittermann in the offering of his Jubilee Mass will be his curates, Rev. Leo J. Goggin as deacon, Rev. Lawrence F. Ballweg, subdeacon, and Rev. John P. Vitsas, master of ceremonies. This Sunday evening, priests and parishioners will unite to honor the golden jubilarian at an informal reception in the St. Ignatius School hall. The following report on this anniversary is from the Brooklyn Tablet. A musical program will be provided by the St. Ignatius Glee Club, under the direction of Father Goggin, and by the parish choir, directed by Mrs. William Dooley. The assistant pastors will be joined in paying tribute to Msgr. Bittermann by Rev. John H. Wislar, who was stationed at St. Ignatius for 23 years before being appointed pastor of St. Mary of the Isle Church, Long Beach, in March, 1959. Dancing and refreshments will follow in the school basement.

Williamsburgh Native
Msgr. Bittermann was born July 11, 1885, in Williamsburgh, to Michael Bittermann and Mary Stahl, members of All Saints parish. He attended All Saints School, St. Vincent's High School and College at Latrobe, Pa. In 1904 he entered St. John's Seminary, Brooklyn, to study for the priesthood and was ordained May 21, 1910, by Most Rev. Charles E. McDonnell, second Bishop of Brooklyn. Msgr. Bittermann's first appointment was to St. Fidelis Church, College Point, where he is still remembered for the warmth and kindness that have been his most attractive priestly traits. He remained at College Point until 1926 when he was transferred to St. Benedict's where he stayed until 1928. At that time he received his first appointment as pastor to Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Church, Bridgehampton. On June 12, 1931, Msgr. Bittermann succeeded the late Msgr. Francis Wunsch as pastor of St. Ignatius parish. In 1951 the late Archbishop Molloy appointed him dean of

Central Nassau County. On May 7, 1954, he was elevated to the rank of domestic prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor.

When informing Msgr. Bittermann of his official designation by Pope Pius XII, Archbishop Molloy wrote: "This ecclesiastical honor is bestowed on you in recognition of your notably priestly zeal in promoting the sanctification of souls and your very faithful devotion to the advancement of works of religion, education and charity."

In late 1955 Msgr. Bittermann was appointed as one of 12 members of the board of consultants by the Archbishop. When the Diocese of Rockville Centre was created in 1957, the newly appointed Ordinary, Most Rev. Walter P. Kellenberg, recognized the experience and wisdom of the priest and named him to the board of consultants for the new Diocese and as dean of Central Nassau County. In these posts his advice is eagerly sought and highly respected.

Almost 5,000 Families
During his 29 years in Hicksville, Msgr. Bittermann has directed the growth of his parish to nearly 5,000 families with youthful enthusiasm and mature wisdom.

During the war the interior of the church was redecorated, the main entrance to the church modernized and the organ repaired and remodelled. After the

war the great influx of families to Plainview, Syosset, Jericho and Island Trees (now Levittown) caused new parishes to be established, first, St. Bernard's in Levittown in 1949, then Holy Family, St. Edward's in Syosset and finally our Lady of Mercy in 1953.

In the meantime the congregation at St. Ignatius continued to grow. In 1931 there were approximately 450 children attending St. Ignatius School and 100 attending Confraternity classes. Today there are over 1,300 children in the parochial school and over 3,000 attending Confraternity classes.

In his effort to provide adequate educational facilities for his rapidly expanding parish Msgr. Bittermann added a wing to St. Ignatius School in 1949 and in 1953 the building was again extended by three classrooms. At the present time a building is under construction on West Cherry St. It is expected that this school will accommodate over 500 pupils.

Those who cannot be accepted in St. Ignatius School have been adequately provided for in the large Confraternity program, complete with bus service, which has been inspired by Monsignor's desire to do all possible to provide for the religious education of all the members of the parish.

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Local Scouts Launch 16-ft Rocket on June 4

Long Island's scientific boy scouts, members of Explorer Post 595, will launch a 16-foot, three-stage rocket they have built Saturday, June 4, at the Army's Camp A. P. Hill, Va.

The scouts are high school students of the Plainville-Hicksville area. Their 16-foot, three-stage "bird" rocket, constructed since last fall, may be the biggest in a busy schedule of national launchings at Camp Hill, according to John Hicks, Post 595's institutional representative.

The June 4 program is one of a series under Army auspices to encourage safe and supervised interest in rocketry.

Hicks is personnel director of Instruments for Industry, Inc., Hicksville, a leading manufacturer of electronic components and sponsor of the Explorer post.

Although Post 595's rocket is designed to rise 16 miles, it will be held down to 4-1/2 miles because of the limitations of the range, he said. It weighs 300 pounds without propellant and uses solid fuel.

The rocket is fully instrumented for telemetering and two-way communication.

The scouts themselves put together the complex electronic instrument network, although they received help from others with mechanical parts and machining the body of the rocket.

Post 595 has two other adult leaders, Frank Lovvli, of Old Westbury, and Dante Cosoy, of Stamford Ave., Hicksville. Their positions as advisors and associate advisors, respectively, are comparable to scoutmaster and assistant scoutmaster of regular Boy Scout troops.

In addition, Eugene B. Moykoff, IFI's vice president for engineering, assigns members of his staff to advise the Explorers on electronic matters.

The post meets every second week at the IFI plant, 101 New South Road. At meetings, Richard Orlina, 17, of 9 Wellesley Lane, Hicksville, takes charge as president of the post. A senior in Hicksville High, he hopes to become a physicist.

Other officers of the post are: Robert Nadell, 17, of 1 South Gate, vice president; Alan Foster, 17, of 28 Brooks St., secretary; and Thomas Sak, 17, of 90 Haverford Rd., treasurer, all Hicksville.

Fifteen of the Explorers plan to make the trip to Camp A. P. Hill, which is near Bowling Green, Va., about half way between Richmond

and Washington, D.C. They'll spend Friday night, June 3, there, to be ready for the launch schedule to start early Saturday.

AN EDITORIAL: Critique on School Balloting

The recent Jericho School District vote showed little sound and healthy on the part of our voting public. In view of the exceedingly small percentage of those residents who actually bothered to vote, we should like to make some pertinent observations which we hope will find affirmative response not only from our readers but also by the members of our Board of Education.

One week prior to the actual May 3rd school budget vote, our Board of Education had scheduled a public information meeting pertaining to these matters. As has been pointed out in the past, a meeting such as this is helpful. The only time when our voters were able to propose any amendments, additions, deletions or changes on any of the proposals to be voted upon was the evening of the actual vote. Between the hour of 8 pm and 9 pm it was possible to make such proposals for inclusion on the ballot. The information meeting did not afford our citizens the opportunity to propose any such changes. Other school districts have recognized the need for a full scale annual meeting and they scheduled such a meeting one week prior to the vote. Jericho education is a multi-million dollar business. Our taxpayers, deserving full opportunity to practice their franchise as intelligent, well informed and enlightened voters need more than a maximum of 60 minutes to discuss, to add, delete or amend a multi-million dollar budget. We trust that the Jericho Board of Education will agree that it is not always the shortest means which justify the end. Let us set aside one full evening prior to the annual vote for the purpose of holding our annual meeting.

When it came to this year's actual vote, two voting machines coupled with the cumbersome registration-check procedure combined to cause delays of several hours.

Time and again we here at Jericho must call upon qualified voters to register prior to annual and special elections and referendums, only to have the public experience the sort of delay as was caused by inadequate facilities and cumbersome procedure May 3rd last. Other school districts such as neighboring Syosset, have long ago adopted the system of permanent registration. Each qualified voter registers one time and as long as he or she remains a resident of the district and votes annually they are qualified to vote without additional time consuming prior registration. New school, construction, acquisition of land, libraries and other matters may call for several special referendums per year. Permanent registration makes good sense and we can only wonder why Jericho must still suffer the practices of hours and buggy day voting procedure. We recommend to our school board that permanent registration be instituted without delay.

One last word on the school budget itself. Year after year the citizens of this community are presented with the proposed budget at the last possible moment. Barely two weeks seem all that our school board affords the voters before they are asked to approve a multi-million dollar budget. No individual and no group of individuals can, during this short time, actually study the line by line budget. The short and condensed version which has been mailed to all voters is, of course, valuable as a guide, but totally inadequate as a basis for analysis and evaluation. This year's excuse for late reporting included the statement that final assessment figures were not available until just about the night of the vote. The question of the actual amount of state aid was also thrown in as a reason for last minute publication of the budget. It seems to us that these factors are present each and every year and they have nothing whatsoever to do with the just demand by our taxpayers for the right to compare, study and evaluate budgetary proposals which are in preparation for almost one full year prior to the vote.

Just because state aid might be more, just because assessed valuation might be higher are no reasons for not presenting a budget which is pared to the minimum, assuring us of the maximum in good education and educational facilities. We are fortunate in having 5 exceptionally capable and qualified men to serve on our school board. Perhaps we ought to make their job easier by enlarging the board to 7 or 9 men. In any event, they are reasonable and dedicated individuals who will surely see the constructive aspects of our critique.

Letter from Editor

In the last issue of THE VILLAGER, we printed a letter from Edythe Eichter in which she criticized the Civic Assoc. for "doing nothing" about the fact that some of our residents resided in Jericho and others in Syosset. This is the follow-up of the reply written in response to her letter.

Dear Mrs. Edythe Eichter: Once again I wish to emphasize that this reply is being written not

in criticism, but rather in explanation of the separation of Syosset-Jericho. In your letter you stated, "If I live within the Jericho postal zone, I should live within the Town of Jericho". This is a question raised by many of our residents.

In reality Jericho is neither a Town nor a Village. We are a hamlet having no separate identity other than that of a village.
