Town May Appeal Higher:

Wildfield Map Before Planners

The map for the development of the former Press Wireless property on the east side of Cantiague Road, Hicksville, under the name of "Wildfield" with 336 dwellings planned, may again be the subject of a public hearing before the Nassau County Planning Commission in Mineola on June 15, it was learned today. The State Appellate Division recently upheld the Supreme Court in ruling against the Town rezoning of the property for industrial use.

The Town of Oyster Bay is expected to take the question to the State Court of Appeals in another attempt to sustain the Town Board decision in rezoning the Press Wireless property for industrial purposes. Action by the Town in going to the higher court, it is anticipated, would further delay the "Wildfield" project by Oppel, Inc., until a new decision is reached.

The matter of "Wildfield" residential project confronts the school district with the prospect of several hundred more students to be fitted into the carefully planned and delicately balanced facilities program. If the area goes into homes, another elementary school will be required and all current long-range thinking on secondary school facilities will probably go out the window.

As a safeguard, the Hicksville Board of Education is on record with the County Planning Commission as requesting the designation of a 16-acre portion of the former Press Wireless property for an elementary school, subject to approval of the voters, if the area is residential.

Demos Reject Cassidy's Bid

Enrolled Democrats rejected Daniel P. Cassidy of Massapequa in his bid for election as a State Committeeman which carries with it leadership of the party for the Fourth Assembly District (Town of Oyster Bay and City of Glen Cove) on Primary Day. With returns for four election districts missing, Cassidy received 1,831 votes and Don M. Mankiewicz, 4,163.

Complete returns gave Irene Murphy of Hicksville 4,248 ballots for election as co-leader while Fannie Zolotorof of Plainview, running with Cassidy, got 1,659.

Mankiewicz and Murphy carried all Democratic zones except Farmingdale.

The vote for mid-Island communities was:

Hicksville-901 for Mankiewicz and 981 for Murphy with 191 for Cassidy and 152 for Zolotorof.

South Syosset, including Jericho-Mankiewicz got 414 to 30 for Cassidy; 380 for Murphy and 37 for Zolotorof.

Plainview-517 for Mankiewicz and 458 for Murphy while Cassidy got 234 and Zolotorof 270.

Bethpage - Mankiewicz 422 to 333 for Cassidy; Murphy 438 and Zolotorof 303.

Nobody Puts in Claim For Chest Full of \$\$

No claims have been made, as of yesterday afternoon, as to ownership of a box full of paper currency valued at between \$70,000 and \$100,000 which was turned up by the blade of Steve Fox's bulldozer next to Cantiague Road, Jericho, a week ago today. County Police are holding the money waiting for the owner to appear.

The bulldozer pushed the metal ammunition box up from its burial place about two feet under the ground and knocked off the cover. Out tumbled 31 brown paper and plastic wrapped bundles of bills. Fox, who lives at 98 Cedar Dr., Hicksville, promptly took his find to Second Police Precinct headquarters on North Broadway where the currency in \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills was counted.

Of the many theories kicking around, one holds to the possibility that the money represented

proceeds of World War II black market operations in the Pacific area. Many of the bills were part of a special issue in Hawaii and Central Pacific war areas between 1942 and 1944.

Who will eventually get the money is an open question. If the owner is not found - and he may not want to be - it is said the find goes to Fox after three years; or the owner of the property, Arthur Skodnick of Easton's Neck may have a claim. Uncle Sam will also have a hand out for a slice.

Since Thursday, local bulldozer operators are now running their rigs with their eyes peeled for metal boxes and other items turned up by their blades.

The school is located on Ann Drive near the proposed Oyster Bay-Wanago Expressway. The school, when completed, will have a capacity for 1,600 students.

The school will be a three-unit building having a two story wing with 36 classrooms, 3 double rooms, 11 science rooms, 4 art rooms, 3 industrial shops, 3 home-making rooms, 3 music rooms, a library, 2 gymnasiums, a cafeteria and an auditorium which can seat 750.

The school, when completed, will service all junior high schools students in Birchwood. Bus transportation will be provided.

Alas, Jericho

The time is the present; the subject is bomb shelters; and the decisions made concerning the subject may well mean the future!

When Ralph Diamond sparked this issue recently in THE VILLAGER, my first reactions, possibly yours, too, were apathetic. Why worry about bomb shelters? If a nuclear attack occurs, will "going out" really matter? Why not enjoy life day by day and hope the leaders of World Powers remain sane?

Then I picked up a copy of "Alas, Babylon" by Pat Frank, which has since been dramatized on "Playhouse 90". It is the story of what happens to a small Florida town called Fort Repose after the "bombs" have been pushed. I began to comprehend that should an emergency occur, the basic drive for survival remains, regardless of hardships. In this particular piece of fiction, chaos and unpreparedness were synonymous.

"Each hour the county Council had station repeated warnings--boil all drinking water; do not drink fresh milk, do not use the telephone, and, in the Sunday morning hours after the destruction of Orlando, warnings to take shelter and guard against fallout and radiation. There had been no milk deliveries and the telephones hadn't worked since the first mushroom sprouted in the south; nor were there any actual shelters in Fort Repose. All Sunday, Randy insisted that Helen and the children stay in the house. He knew that any shelter, even a stone roof, insulation, walls and roof, was better than none. There was no time to dig. THE TIME TO DIG HAD BEEN BEFORE 'THE DAY'."

Could you survive without food or water, light, power or transportation, while completely surrounded by deadly radiation? How would you react when most of mankind reverts to the laws of the jungle? Have you EVENTUALLY thought about the possibility of an H-bomb attack or do you prefer to defer your thinking until that "Day" may arrive?

No person can find an easy solution to the imminent threat of total or partial extermination. Maybe a community bomb shelter would be a complete farce in actual practice. Maybe the mechanics of constructing same would be completely unfeasible. We cannot arrive at the answer tomorrow. But we can begin to discuss and consider and accept suggestions from persons with technical knowledge of these problems.

Before we "Alas, Jericho", let's try a more positive approach to an exceedingly negative prospect.

The Fire Horn

Prepared by the publicity committee for the Fire Prevention Bureau of the Hicksville Fire Department.

The Annual Report of the Nassau County Fire Commission for 1959, contains many interesting items.

The County Fire Commission since its organization in 1938, has done an excellent job in Fire Prevention, interdepartmental cooperation, standardization, investigation and inspection.

With the tremendous population expansion in our County, many problems arose in the Fire Prevention and Inspection field. The increase in activity, for the Commission and the Fire Departments is reflected in the following figures; In 1940 with a population of 300,000 and a fire incident of 400 reported, it rose to 2000 with a population of 1,100,000.

A partial listing of causes and frequency reveals the necessity for continuing Fire Prevention programs and complete cooperation. There were 679 reported fire in 1959 that resulted in damage to life and property. Of these 48, were due to heating and cooking, 68 to misuse of electricity, 67 to smoking and matches, 114 to malicious mischief, 96 incendiary. These are the fires where the Commission is called upon to investigate. One result of these investigations is 15 adults arrested, 2 committed, 30 juveniles to children's Court and unofficial discipline, 95.

The great pressure built up by Hicksville's desire to repeat as North Shore champion and get another crack at the County title finally broke the Comets. Hicksville handed the winners five unearned runs and a number of errors of commission made a rally impossible.

It is of little solace to the Comets that the Trees club went on to annex the North Shore batting with an upset of Floral Park in the final. However, it was a splendid campaign for the Orange and Black as the record so indicates.

Paced by the fine play of Edward Quimby, Donald Rocca and Bob Redy, the Hicksville High Golf team concluded its season with a creditable 6 won and 3 lost record.

William Anderson, Thomas DeBrocco, James Brander and Richard Simpson were all varsity members this year and gained valuable experience for their expected '61 return.

Bob Casala finished fourth in both the 100-yard dash and 220-yard dash in the County Track and Field Championships, held Saturday on the expansive athletic plant of Great Neck South.

Bob proved to be the best sprint man for HHS in the past decade and fourth place in a field that represents 25,000 high school boys is highly respectable.

Hicksville had only four dual meets this season and after three defeats by Port Washington (90-38), Garden City (90-28) and Great Neck North (78-49) turned on Mineola in the final for a 76-42 victory.

Rebuilding a sport like Track and Field, which has had a low ebb at Hicksville for more than two decades, is not an easy proposition. The real upsurge in the sport will be realized when the present band of Junior High flashes wear the Orange and Black.
