Town May Appeal Higher:

The map for the development of the former Press Wireless property on the east side of Cantiague Road, Hicksville, under the name of "Wildfield" with 336 dwellings planned, may again be the subject of a public hearing before the Nassau County Planning Commission in Mineola on June 15, it was learned today. The State Appelate Division recently upheld the Supreme Court in ruling against the Town rezoning of the property for industrial use.

The Town of Oyster Bay is expected to take the question to the State Court of Appeals in another attempt to sustain the Town Board decision in rezoning the Press Wireless property for industrial purposes. Action by the Town in going to the higher court, it is anticipated, would further delay the "Widfield" project by Opgal, Inc., until a new decision is reached.

The matter of "Wildfield" residential project coafronts the school district with the prospect of several hundred more students to be fitted into the carefully planned and delicately balanced facilities program. If the area goes into homes, another elementary school will be required and all current long-range thinking on secondary school facilities will probably go out the window.

As a safetuard, the Hicksville Board of Education is on record with the County Planning Commission as requesting the designation of a 10-sere portion of the former Press Wireless property for an elemenary school, subject to approval of the voters, if the area is residential.
