## As Taxpayer Suit Starts

# BOARD TO ACT ON BIDS TO MOVE 12 CLASSROOMS

Hicksville Board of Education is expected to act upon the awarding of contracts for the moving of twelve temporary-type classrooms from East St. and Old Country Rd. School locations to the Junior High School at its regular meeting this Friday night. Bids for the project were opened at the office of School Superintendent Wallace E. Lamb, Tuesday afternoon.

The bids are now being analyzed by Knappe & Johnson, school architects, who will make their recommendations to the Board this Friday night.

In the meantime, examination of various school officials before trial were conducted earlier this week by Harry Goebel, attorney for Emil J. Szendy and nine other taxpayers seeking to have the Nov. 19 referendum on school construction declared void and illegal. The suit is scheduled to come to trial today (Thurs) in Mineola before Supreme Court Justice Howard Hogan.

The bids were taken on the basis of voter approval given to the 1960-61 School District budget which included \$84,000 to cover the estimated cost of moving four units from East St. and eight from the Old Country Rd. School during the summer and reconstruction of them on the Junior High School.

The temporaries will be arranged in a double row with a corridor between, running east from the rear of the Junior High. The

end of the string of rooms will be just at the outer rim of the baseball diamond and the school will lose the location of temporary bleachers on the north side of the running track.

The reconstruction includes the building a new heating room with capacity to eventually heat all 24 rooms when they are shifted to the Junior High.

The entire project is being watched with interest by school designers, the lumber industry and administrators since the plan to shift classrooms to meet the shifts in student population, as being pioneered in Hicksville, is a unique development. Eventually a total of 50 classrooms will be reconstructed, 24 at the Junior High and 26 at the Senior High.

## Report Bids Exceed Funds

School Board President Allen S. Carpenter disclosed yesterday that bids for the moving of classrooms and reconstruction of them at the Junior High, opened Tuesday, are apparently in excess of the amount approved by the voters, \$84,000. What can be done to accomplish the job will be a topic of consideration at the Board of Education meeting this Friday night.

The April issue of "School Management" features the use of school rooms called "Demoport"; i.e., demountable and portable, being used in Memphis, Tenn. The rooms measure 20 by 32. In Hicksville by common usage the units have been called "temporary-type".

## Central Federal to Salute Local Groups on Air

### Mailmen On Mercy Trip

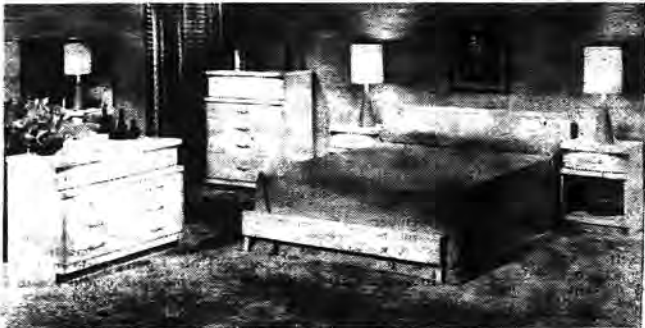

## JERICHO AFTER DARK

The school board of Union Free School District #15 (Jericho) met for its last regular meeting of the current fiscal year on Thursday, June 16th at 8:30 p.m. This reporter was one of four spectators who followed proceedings on the stage of the former Cedar Swamp School auditorium, now known as the speech and drama room of the new Jericho high school. This name seemed appropriate since between the hours of 8:30 p.m. and 1:30 a.m. when the meeting terminated, there were plenty of speeches and a fair sprinkling of drama.

School board Member Kochenauer was extended the congratulations of the board when it was made known that he had just earned his Doctorate in Education. The meeting was chaired by Sam Hecht, President of the Board, who impressed the writers by doing a fine job of moderating and keeping things moving. Mr. Hecht exhibits great deal of charm and confidence in dealing with many difficult problems, not to speak of the individual petitioners who during the course of the evening brought before the Board certain requests. The rest of the Board in attendance on June 16th were: Murray Penn, Mayhew and Ernest. Mr. Slatery took care of the minutes, and Dr. Kenneth Lant, Supt. of Schools was on hand to clarify many points, testify on all and sundry matters before the board and in many cases add his opinion during the discussion of issues. As the hour got close to midnight, several of the Board members removed their jackets and the entire atmosphere at the meeting was one of studied informality without being chummy. The Board was asked to pass on, and in some cases to ratify appropriations and expenditures covering such diverse objects as TOYS and BOOKS

for a school cafeteria, and an \$80000.00, 21 column bookkeeping machine. Authorization was passed for the purchase of two vehicles and a lengthy discussion took place on the subject of how to invest school district funds not immediately needed, while obtaining the maximum on interest.

The Cantigue School Site came up when it was voted to go ahead with the test boring at this property. One of the lighter moments of the evening arrived when a motion was passed, naming the new South Parkway School the ROBERT WILLIAMS School. Board members brought to light the fact that Robert Williams was the first white settler here at Jericho after having purchased land from the Indians. He was the third largest taxpayer in Hempstead town and supposedly a man of great moral character. The Board unanimously agreed on the name, especially in view of the fact that according to Mr. Penn this selection would be of a completely non-controversial nature. After a short discussion of the details pertaining to bleacher construction at the high school football field, the Board adjourned for several minutes to inspect the stage curtain at the speech and drama room. To this uninitiated spectator it looked like 8 men tumbling about the stage in pursuit of an issue.

The meeting continued and permission was given the Mid-Island Concert Association to use the high school auditorium on two dates this fall for a series of concerts at a rental of \$50.00 per night. This was done without prejudice to the school district and will not establish such a rental fee on a permanent basis until actual costs can be checked. The Board promised to adopt bylaws for the next meeting, setting definite policy and fees for the use of school facilities by the public and by non profit organizations.

Dr. Lant then presented to the Board various approvals for the hiring of new teachers, all consequently approved. A matter of lively discussion ensued when the "opening after school hours" of school playgrounds and ballfields was taken up. It was the consensus of opinion of the Board that it will be desirable to open up the ballfields after school hours and on weekends for the use of our youngsters. The school district will do so until dark on weekdays and all day Saturday and Sunday henceforth. It was brought out that some damage to school property might ensue; however, the Board in restricting the use of the fields for ball playing only, felt that in response to the wishes of the community and the need to get the kids off our traffic-heavy streets, the opening of the playgrounds is fully justified.

Two other points called for considerable discussion by the Board. The matter of making available on a rental basis, the high school gym for the intercollegiate sports during the coming season and the matter of the Board's position on the telephone tax issue. The sport matter was resolved when Dr. Lant agreed that the facilities would be made available first to our own teams and any open dated would be allocated to the conference.

By two a.m. in the morning, this writer left, pledged to have witnessed 5 dedicated members of our School Board concern themselves with the welfare of our community. We could not possibly report in so short a space all the issues and matters which the Board had to take up during its June meeting.

A more spectator at these meetings also suffers the almost insurmountable handicap of not being able to see the volumes of typed reports, details and written
