Hicksville Board of Education has rejected all bids for the moving of 12 temporary-type classrooms to the Junior High School, thus increasing the prospects for prolonged double sessions at the Junior High this fall. Action on rejection of bids was taken by the Board, Friday night, following two lengthy executive sessions with the school architects.

No immediate action was taken to call for new bids. It was learned that the bids received ran into thousands of dollars above the budgeted appropriation of \$44,000 for this project.

It has been hoped that the first 12 classroom units could be moved and reconstructed at the Junior High School not later than October of this year. The School Administration was prepared to put into motion a double-session program at Junior High to accommodate the swollen enrollment until the temporaries from East St. and Old Country Rd. Elementary Schools were on the site and available.

The action of the Board of Education in rejecting bids and not immediately setting a new date for bidding, indicated that Junior High may be on double session for most of the term this fall.

Conversation between the Board of Education and School Attorney Michael T. Sullivan, Friday night, following the meeting to reject all bids which followed the second executive session of the evening indicated the Board is thinking about calling budget notes, with voter approval, to finance the project. Sullivan noted that the earliest time that the Board could call budget notes would be October.

Meanwhile all Board members were asked to hold themselves in readiness for a special meeting, although the purpose of such special sessions was not disclosed in public sessions.

All seven Board members were present Friday night and all voted in favor of the motion to reject all bids on the moving of temporaries.

# No Plans for Connecting Service Road to Expressway Overpass

## AN EDITORIAL:

### Questions In Need of Answers

#### TO OYSTER BAY:

What is the complete plan as regards the Seaman School overpass and marginal road access? When will the streets be dedicated? When will we have street lights, adequate street cleaning service, etc.?

#### TO THE JERICHO SCHOOL BOARD:

What is the School Board's position on bus transportation for our children, especially those up to the second grade?

#### TO THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS:

What will the entrance to West Birchwood be like? Have plans been made to insure the safety of this area?

These questions are in need of complete and factual answers. It has been the policy of this paper to report on all items of major interest. However, we have been unable to obtain any reliable information on the above subjects and thus have been unable to report fully on them.

Dear Mr. Serko:

This will acknowledge receipt of your telegram of June 23, 1960, requesting that the pedestrian overpass being constructed over the Long Island Expressway in the vicinity of the Robert Seaman School be extended to embrace both marginal roads.

The marginal service road north of the Expressway is being built from Broadway to Leahy St., opposite the pedestrian crossing, simply to connect existing local streets. The south service road in this vicinity is not being constructed.

The ultimate construction of these marginal service roads will be incumbent upon the local unit of government under whose jurisdiction they fall and at such time as future development requires their need. The danger to children crossing this marginal road will be no greater than it will be for them to cross any other local street facility.

We, therefore, cannot extend this overpass over one local street and over one that is to be built at some future date by the local unit of government.

The overpass situation is more confused than ever as a result of a Department of Public Works letter to the West Birchwood Jericho Civic Assoc. stating that "the south service road in this vicinity is not being constructed."

According to available information it would appear that the overpass will terminate more than 700 feet from the nearest paved road in West Birchwood. This means that unless a sidewalk is built, West Birchwood school children attending the Seaman school will walk through the fields to reach the overpass.

Writing to David Serko, West Birchwood Civic Association president, in response to a telegram, J. Burch McMorran, New York State Superintendent of Public Works, stated that "the ultimate construction of these marginal roads will be incumbent upon the local unit of government under whose jurisdiction they fall and at such time as future development requires their need."

At the present time the West Birchwood News has been unable to determine the exact status of the approach to the overpass. The fact that the state was not building the south service road was stated in the News last winter when it was pointed out that the contract for the construction of the road had not been given out.

## Suburban Gardener

by Ralph Pignitaro

The month of July and the first two weeks of August are the most grueling period of time for lawns, trees, and shrubs. Anyone who has bare-root trees planted last fall or early this spring should watch them very carefully at this time. Although, water in these will not do any good if nothing is done to them. The most important thing is supplying them with enough water. These trees are to be watered by putting the hose near the base of the tree and let the water trickle slowly for at least one hour. By doing this, you allow the water to seep down into the earth where the roots can quickly absorb it. This should be done at least twice a week. Root feeders sold at most garden centers have been doing a fine job, also. But before investing in one consult your gardener or nurseryman as to which is the best.

Many homeowners in the Birchwood area (east and west) have been blessed with large trees along their property. This is the best time of year to feed these trees. For best results, bore holes in the ground around the base of the tree. Each hole should be about 18 inches deep, one inch in diameter, and two feet apart. Pour a well-balanced fertilizer into these holes and fill each hole with water. A close watch at this time should be kept on all trees for borer damage as they have been very active lately.

Taxus weevil are now beginning their above the ground cycle. These pests chew notches into the needles and leaves of taxus, rhododendrons, and azaleas. They do the most damage by girdling the roots of these plants causing them to weaken and suddenly die. Spray the plants and the ground around them with dieldrin or chlordane or a combination of both.

Lawns have been plagued by fungus and many types of surface insects. This, of course, is the season for it. Rarely will I recommend a product name but, Actidione and Ortho's new lawn fungicide have been working wonders as far as controlling fungus in your lawn. They will not eradicate it but will stop it dead. As far as surface insects are concerned 72% chlordane will do a good job unless your lawn has been infected with cinch bugs in which case Diazinon would be the best insecticide to use. Consult your gardener on how to detect cinch bugs.

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## Day School Appoints Director

Dr. Frankel, who received his doctorate from the University of Vienna, also studied at the Theological Seminary and the Teacher's Seminary in that city. Prior to his arrival in 1949, Dr. Frankel was a teacher in the Chajez-Real Gymnasium in Vienna and assistant to Professor A. Aptowitzer in Talmud at the Hebrew Pedagogium.

Dr. Frankel was also active in Jewish community life. He was in the Zionist leadership and Vice-President of the Jewish National Fund in Austria.
