Residents Petition for Traffic Light

Conn Firm, Low Bidder, Gets Bus Contract

Hicksville Schools will have a new bus contractor with the start of the fall term next month. County School Service of Danbury, Conn., came in with the lowest bid to win the basic contract for 1960-61 term away from two other prime bidders.

Semke Bus Line Inc. of Hempstead, which had held the contract for the highest successive years, was the highest bidder.

The new bus contract was awarded by the Board of Education at its last regular meeting. Bid opening took place on July 16. County School Service bid \$585 per bus per year, Brothers Coach Corp. of Hewlett bid \$6350 and Semke \$6734 on the basic requirements.

Anthony Gortczyk business administrator, reported to the Board that "on the basic contract, the total estimated cost for usage of 40 buses based on the low bid would be \$235,000" which made the total \$42,670 below the budget provision or estimate of \$278,000.

He noted that the "winning of the transportation bid opening was very appropriate since there has been a shifting of established operations held by bus contractors."

TO SET TAX RATE

The Board of Education at a regular meeting this Friday night, Aug. 12, in the air-conditioned teachers' lounge of the Senior High School, among other business, will officially establish the tax rate for 1960-61, based upon the newly completed assessment of the School District as of August 1.

Among the factors which may have a bearing on the final rate may be a decision by the Board whether or not to leave the \$84,000 in the approved budget for the

movement of temporary-type classrooms from Old Country Rd. and East St. Schools to the Junior High School.

The \$84,000 was tacked on the budget when it was found that the two-million dollar building program, approved by the voters last Nov. 19, was being marred in court action brought by Emil Szeszy and Harry Goebel in a taxpayers' action.

The Board has since found that the \$84,000 is inadequate for the job, based upon bids received and since rejected. Meanwhile the Junior High School will probably be on split sessions for most of the 1960-61 term instead of a month or so which had been anticipated if 12 class rooms could have been moved during the summer recess. The litigation brought by Szeszy and Goebel is now stalled until court resumes in September.

The Board of Education at its July 29 meeting approved the Adult Education program for the fall of 1960. Registration dates are set for Sept. 12 and 13 at Hicksville Senior High Cafeteria. Due to the loss of state aid for this program and declining enrollments the fee for District residents has been advanced to \$7 and to \$9 for non-residents.

The School Board has received the 1959-60 annual report on the operation of School Cafeterias for the year with total annual receipts of \$405,278.92 and disbursements of \$380,508.61.

Plaza Assessment Cut Jacks Tax Bills

A boost in taxes of from \$10 to \$20 for the average homeowner in Hicksville was seen today as the immediate effect of a Supreme Court decision, Tuesday, reducing the assessment on Mid Island Shipping Plaza by more than a million dollars. Since more than 50 per cent of the business at the Plaza comes from Hicksville residents, a civic leader today called upon local taxpayers to withhold business from the Plaza for two weeks by way of protest.

First effect of the court decision was expected to be felt in the establishment of the School Tax rate for 1960-61 by Hicksville Board of Education, tomorrow night. With the School District assessment for 1960-61 set at \$89,798,667, the tax rate for school and library purposes was expected to be \$5.09 per hundred of assessment.

Supreme Court Justice Howard Hogan on Tuesday reduced the Plaza assessment by \$1,184,780, which would make the school-library tax rate \$5.15 or six cents more than anticipated.

Since School-Library taxes are about half of the total real estate tax bill, the full impact would amount to 12 cents per \$100 added to the tax charges to account for all other county, town and special district charges.

In addition, Justice Hogan in his verdict granted refunds for the past three years amounting to \$310,016, an item which experts have not calculated as yet.

A taxpayer assessed at \$10,000 would find the Plaza decision adding \$6 to his bill for school-library purposes, plus the same amount for county, town, etc., a total addition of \$12 for the year, not counting the refunding.

The 1959-60 school tax rate was \$4.756 with \$165 for the library or a total of \$4.921 per \$100. Depending upon the Board of Education action tomorrow night, the school tax rate could be \$4.93 plus the library or a total of \$5.15 per hundred, against an anticipated \$5.09.

William L. Geyer, president of Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc., today suggested that since 50 per cent or more of the business at the Plaza comes from Hicksville residents they refrain from dealing there for the next two weeks as a mark of protest against the new and unexpected tax burden provided by the landlords of the Plaza.

Church Building Ceremony Set

Ground was broken for the new Ernest F. Francke Memorial Educational Building at ceremonies held on Sunday afternoon, March 20. Mr. Francke, in whose memory the building will be dedicated, was a former church council president and a member of the church for many years. At the time of his death in July 1958, he was County Clerk of Nassau County. Pastor Richard K. Mack and Mrs. Francke was assisted in the groundbreaking ceremonies by the lay leaders of the auxiliary groups of the church. Pastor Gibney of Hempstead was the speaker at the service preceding the outdoor ceremony.

The building which will cost approximately \$185,000 will contain eight class rooms, office for the Supt. of the Church School, parlors and a kitchen on one floor.

Pastor Mack has announced the laying of the corner-stone will take place at 12:30 P.M., this Sunday, Aug. 14, following the 11:15 a.m. service. Dedication of the new building will be held in early October, when a congregational dinner will be held to climax the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the church.

Firemen Thank Public For Aid at Big Blaze

Hicksville Fire Chief Charles Saurer today expressed the thanks of himself and the volunteers of the department to all who cooperated with and assisted the firemen in their battle with flames which gutted the Kantor Bros tire store, warehouse and two neighboring stores last Wednesday evening.



Residents of the area provided the weary firemen with soft drinks and coffee. The Fire Dept. has also expressed its formal thanks to the Nassau County Police for excellent traffic control and to neighboring fire units which assisted with manpower and equipment. The Nassau County Fire Marshal's office has not announced the results of its study into the cause of the fire which caused an estimated \$380,000 damage. The Hicksville Chief and men have been complimented by county authorities and neighboring chiefs for the effective and efficient manner in which the roaring blaze was brought under control in short order.

The smoke rose into the sky for hundreds of feet, attracting attention for miles around. It was removed at first that Nicholas St. School, which is a few hundred feet from the scene of the fire, was burning.

The numerous spectators, restrained by fire lines, were heard to marvel at the efficiency and bravery of the firemen in tackling the inferno. A typical comment was "and to think those men are unpaid volunteers."

The fire resulted in the apparent loss of a fire pumper. The Co. 5 pumper, a vehicle which had been scheduled for eventual replacement, was taken out of service when it broke down as the result of high pressure pumping.

To Continue Commuter Buses

Commuter bus service, via express coaches, will continue indefinitely to all points now being serviced, Schenck transportation Co. announced. The recently established express coach route from Hicksville to Flushing, via the LI Expressway, will continue to offer weekly commutation rates, Monday through Saturday. Schenck officials expect to apply for permanent

approval of the Expressway route soon.

"In a survey of some 1500 express coach riders, the people voted 7 to 1 in favor of continuing our service into subway points," says Lester E. Weidner, Schenck Vice President. "So, we'll continue the express service, as long as the people want it. In fact we're

planning on building up our Expressway Route, from Hicksville to Flushing, during the non-commuting hours." On this route, coaches leave every half hour during rush hours, and every hour during the day.

TOB ACCEPTS 3 SECTIONS OF WEST BIRCHWOOD

Suggest Community Pool To Civic Board of Directors

Suggestion for the possible construction of a community swimming pool was among the highlights of a West Birchwood Civic Assoc. Board of Directors open meeting held at the home of President David Serko, last Friday night.

Dr. Ed Greenberg of the Community Welfare Committee stated that preliminary investigation showed that the expense entailed in organizing a community pool together with other facilities would result in a possible cost of about \$600 per family. He said that the committee felt that at the present time the preliminary estimates were rather prohibitive.

Plans for an intensified membership drive were discussed and a committee headed by Leon Schaffer was set up to organize a campaign. Members of the Board

of Directors responded with great enthusiasm to a suggestion that they work in teams and personally canvass the newer neighborhoods in West Birchwood explaining to residents the aims and purposes of the Civic Assoc.

Community purchases committee for purchases of curb trees was reactivated with Irv Reinhardt and Bob Miller instructed to obtain estimates from various nurseries. Incorporation papers were signed by the members of the Board and it was noted that the name of the organization was changed to West Birchwood Civic Association Inc.

A discussion was also held of the formulation of plans for the forthcoming Civic Association elections.



Strict traffic controls and stepped up police patrols were seen as immediate benefits accruing to West Birchwood residents as a result of street acceptance by the Town of Oyster Bay Board, Tuesday.

With Supervisor John J. Burns presiding, the Board, meeting in Oyster Bay Town Hall, received the dedication papers from Highway Superintendent Thomas R. Pynchon who had made a final inspection of the streets on Monday. Both Mr. Hughes of the Nassau County Planning Commission and Mr. Pynchon recommended that the builder, Goszow and Schwartz, remain on hand until Sept 5th so that minor street repairs would be made.

Streets which were dedicated lie within sections 10, 11 and 12 of the West Birchwood community. See map for exact locations. Included are all or part of the following streets: Rockland, Orange, Fulton, Saratoga, Yates, Sullivan, Craig, Warren, Clifton, Ulster, Schuyler and Tompkins.

An immediate traffic survey by the Nassau County Police Dept. was foreseen with resulting stop signs being ordered at dangerous intersections. In addition, traffic violators will be apprehended by the police who will be patrolling the streets in radio cars.

Plans for street lighting will now get under way with a survey by Long Island Lighting Co. scheduled for the very near future. If recommendations by LILOCO and the Town of Oyster Bay Street Lighting Dept. are approved by the Town Board, West Birchwood may get street lights in the dedicated sections by Thanksgiving.

would be of benefit both to the membership and to the vigor of the organization. This is particularly so since we have numerous newcomers to the community since last year.

What I have in mind is a scheme whereby people in the various sections of the community would choose someone from their own area, whom they presumably know as a neighbor, to act as their representative in a central group or board. We might have one representative for every twenty families or any other appropriate number we select. This group would then choose among themselves an executive committee of officers to handle the formal affairs of the Association as representatives of the people.

The benefits I see in such an arrangement are these. The people in the community would have an opportunity to be more directly represented by a person responsive to their thoughts than is now the case and they would therefore have a greater feeling of participation. We would also have a much broader base from which committee workers could be encouraged to volunteer, as each regional representative would have closer personal contact with those in his own area than is now feasible. In short, I am proposing a grass-roots based organization rather than the one we now have in which election to the board is in some cases a question of popularity and where the officials are serving in an at-large capacity and are therefore not responsive, in any close sense, to the individuals in the community.

The thoughts I have expressed are subject to modification and improvement. Ultimately, if there is sentiment for such a change, the Civic Association Constitution would have to be amended to put it into effect. I, therefore, invite all persons with an interest in the community and the Association to submit their thoughts to the Editor of the West Birchwood News so that we may hear a cross section of opinion.

This is an opportunity for those who are critical and skeptical where Civic Association matters are concerned to speak up and make concrete constructive proposals instead of continually complaining. Silence on this question at this time will be a true indication of disinterest and apathy. Readers, don't put it off. It will take only a few minutes to put your thoughts down on paper.

over. If I didn't have the Rail Road I'd have sold the house. Do you know how much energy driving in every day saps out of a businessman like myself. As for the fare increase it's a hold up... we face now increases and increases. The only out for the commuters is to get together otherwise they will have more increases dumped on them for political reasons as the Governor did this time. Our elected representatives have failed us."

IRVING CONSTANT, 9 Otsego Place, "I went in the first day (Friday) and the train was two-thirds empty and forty minutes late. At night it was half empty and on time. As far as I'm concerned the Rail Road is a good way to travel. If the workers are entitled to more then we'll have to pay for it along with everything else that keeps going up. Personally I think they're entitled to a five day week... everybody else has it so why shouldn't they have it too."

his formative years. Like so many Europeans, David's parents continually stressed education in their home, and they did everything in their power to provide him with the best education possible.

He attended a Catholic Parochial Elementary School in Panama until the 6th grade, and when at this point his parents returned to Cuba for one year, he there attended a private American School. His junior and high school years were spent in a public school for the children of Canal Zone employees. Of the many years spent in Panama, Dave remembers most vividly the meanness of his parents living where revolutions were sometimes a yearly event, and because the people were many times not represented, the economic system led to poverty for many of the Panamanians. From this may stem his great interest in political science, and his cognizance of the sometimes extreme neglect by United States citizens in not voting for their officials. Politics may yet loom ahead for this young man!

Syracuse University is where many changes were made in Dave's life. He there made many close

friends, some of whom now live in our community. After completing a pre-medical course with a psychology major, he realized that his interests and aptitudes were definitely inclined towards law and not medicine. It was at a Syracuse football game he spied (through an alcoholic haze) a frat brother of his with a girl... a young Home Ec student named Joan. Alcho Dave dated her at first to spite his fraternity brother, his soon had her securely "planned", and they were married right after her graduation from Syracuse in 1953... the year in which he proudly became a citizen of our country.

Joan and Dave Serbo look back at their first few years of marriage as a great struggle that they would gladly go through again. They both feel it has been the very best basis for their extremely happy marriage. Dave spent those years working during the days, studying law at night... The most important goal that the group can work towards, he said, is to make sure that we have enough educational and recreational opportunities for our children.

As Dave's children grow he hopes to be able to participate in many activities for the children of West Birchwood, as he feels this an important factor in keeping this a happy and healthy community.
