8,500 Youngsters To Get Bus Passes; School Starts Sept 7

Most public and parochial schools in the Mid-sland area will resume sestions for the fail term on Wednesdey, Sept. 7. Bethpage Schools are an ex-ception with the opening day on Sept. 6. Hicksville, Jericho Public Schools have set Sept. 7 for the start of the new term, Schools in the Cath-olic Diocese of Ackville Centra are due to open on Sept. 7 also. This is the day for the start of a new term for Trinity Lutheran-School in Hicksville and Mid Island Hebrew Day School in Bethpage. The new ly constructed Holy Family Parochial School off Newbridge Rd., Hicksville, is scheduled to start this term with clauses for the first five grades this year. The school will add a grade seach year until the 8th grade is reached in 1963. Bus passes for all Hicksville students entitled to such service — numbering about 8,500 — should be received thru the mails at the student's homes by Sept. 1. Late registration of students newly arrived in the District is also taking place Manday thru Fri-days, 8:30 AM to 3:45 PM at the Downtown Admin-istration Annex at the carner of Broadway and Marie St., Hicksville, Parents need not bring their chil-dren, but must produce a birth or baptismal certificate as proof of age for their youngsters.
