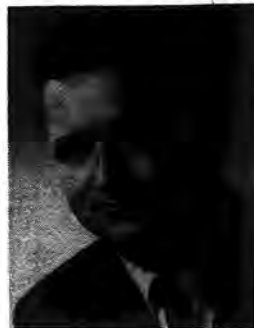

## Suburban Gardener By Ralph Pignataro

Top dressing lawns is the best way to up-grade a poor lawn or rejuvenate an old lawn. Preparations should be made in advance in top dressing lawns, such as, killing broadleaf weeds with 2-4-0 clover with 2-4-5-T and crabgrass with diiodim monomethyl arsenate. These materials can be obtained in either dry or liquid form. Be very careful in applying any weed killer. Follow the manufacturers recommendations very closely. After you have eliminated as many weeds as possible, the procedure is this:

1. Cut lawn short (1/2 inch)
2. Rake lawn thoroughly. There are two new machines out to aid you in this job. One is called the Henderson Thin Cut and the other is called the Moss Rake.

3. After the lawn is thoroughly raked out, aerate or spike the area to be seeded.

4. Apply a well balanced fertilizer (not an organic.) If your previous lawn was weak or your soil poor, apply fertilizer at a double rate.

5. Seed - your choice of seed should be determined by the amount of care you can allot to your lawn. Any combination of Merion, Kentucky or Delta blue, Pennlawn, Chewings, or Creeping Red Fescue, will give satisfactory results.

6. Cover seed lightly with Peat Humus, or Baccho Peat.
7. Water lightly but frequently.

# 40th Anniversary for League of Women Voters

In the Spring of 1959, a Pro League of Women Voters was organized in the Town of Oyster Bay. This was to be the first League organized in Nassau County to encompass town wide boundaries. With a growing population in the township, common problems exist between such separated areas as Massapequa and Syosset. For this reason, the League was organized to serve the people on a town-wide basis.

Forty years ago, on Aug. 26, Article XIX of the U.S. Constitution, the Woman's Suffrage Amendment, was proclaimed in effect. The National League of Women Voters is an outgrowth of this Amendment. The League of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization dedicated to promote active participation of citizens in government. The League's effort to help individuals become politically effective is a year-round function. It publishes factual information on issues to help insure informed voting.

One of its activities is a Speaker's Bureau, through which interested organizations may request the services of a League member as a guest speaker on

items of political interest. At election time, the League also issues factual information on candidates conducts candidates meetings, and works to get out the vote. Although associated with the LWV of the United States, a member works through her local League in

the field of government in her community, as well as on problems concerning state and national government. The League program at each level of government is limited to those items it can work on effectively, taking into consideration time, funds, manpower, and other program commitments.

Local Leagues discuss possibilities for new programs at the state and national level. The new recommendations for programs of study are sent to the appropriate Board, state or national. This Board considers all the proposals from its local Leagues, formulates a proposed program, and returns it to the local Leagues for con-

sideration, along with the non-recommended items. At another round of discussion, members may revise the proposed area of study, or replace it with a non-recommended item. At this point, a new proposal may not be included. The state or national Board once again reviews the suggested program, and recommends a final program to the delegates at the state or national convention. After a floor debate at the convention, the delegates vote on the program which then becomes the area for study. At the state and national

levels, this study continues for two years.

On matters of interest only at the local level, a proposed program is considered by the local Board, which then recommends a program to be debated at the annual local LWV meeting. The members then vote, and a local agenda item is adopted. The local agenda item is studied for one year.

economic policies which promote world development and maintain a sound U.S. economy.

**STATE**-The New York State Judicial System, Support of measures to obtain a unified, simplified court structure with centralized administration and fiscal control, popularly referred to as "Court Reform". Also,

The study and evaluation of methods for financing the public education system of New York State.

**LOCAL**-Whether it is economical or feasible to consolidate any of the special districts in the Town of Oyster Bay.

The League is non-partisan. It takes action in support of, or in opposition to, selected governmental issues; however, it does not support or oppose candidates or political parties. The League takes a stand on an issue only after careful investigation, study, and discussion.

League members study the various program items in workshop committees. Each committee is responsible for making the information available to the membership, and then, after intensive study, to the community.

As an example of the operation of a local League, the Foreign Policy Workshop of the League of Women Voters of the Town of Oyster Bay, headed by Mrs. Daniel Orloff of Plainview, held an open meeting in Feb., 1960, to inform its members and the community of the importance of the economic aid programs. The speakers included Mr. N. Kassarjian, First Secretary for League Affairs for the Ceylon Mission to the United Nations, and Mr. Peter Weins, member of the Executive Board of the American Committee on Africa. They expressed the economic needs and objectives of less developed countries from the point of view of the Asian and African countries.

Our Editor was in North and South Carolina last week from Thursday to Sunday, covering the joint Army-Air Force exercise Bright Star Pine Cone III. Unfortunately, back to school news and other prior commitments made this issue a little too tight to include the full coverage of this event, the largest peacetime drop of troops and material since World War II.

Otherwise, you have to call it "rebound-tumbling" and who knows what you're talking about?
