106 New Teachers Await Students Next Wednesday

When classes resume next Wednesday, Sept. 7, for about 13,000 Hicksville Public School students, there will be 106 new teachers while seven will be returning to their duties from maternity leave or other absences. A three-day period of orientation for new members of the faculty was held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

Expecting 25,000 to Witness Labor Day Parade and Drill

More than 25,000 persons are expected to be on hand, Monday, for the 32nd annual Parade and Volunteer Firemen's Drill of Hicksville Fire Dept. The parade in the morning which starts at 9:30 AM with the sounding of the fire sirens will include several features and innovations, including the appearance of a famous string-band brought over from New Jersey. Leading the march will be John Larkin, parade marshal and general chairman.

The fast and exciting competition during the afternoon will be taken place on the parking field of Mid Island Plaza where the parade breaks up. The firemen have high hopes that Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller will be among the distinguished guests during some part of the big day.

The parade route is the same as recent years. Units will form on streets of Jerusalem Ave. About 3,000 volunteer firemen, ladies auxiliary members and musicians will march down Jerusalem Ave. to Old Country Road, go east to Carl St., continue on Carl to Broadway, and then head north of Mid Island Plaza.

Seating for thousands of spectators is provided at the Plaza.

Honored guests will include all the oldest living volunteer firemen of Hicksville chief in the State. He was chief Fire Dept including 92-year-old George Neder Sr. who is said to

State Assoc Backs Resolution

A resolution of Hicksville Board of Education, seeking changes in the state law regarding Adult Education programs, will be recommended for adoption by the resolutions committee at the New York State School Boards Assoc. session at Syracuse in October.

The Election Matters resolution, covering grouping of candidates by states, withdrawal of nominations and voter registration procedures, is being referred to the Law Revision Committee of the State School Boards Assoc. for review and clarification, according to Allen S. Carpenter, president of the Hicksville Board.

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Launch Effort On Registration

Hicksville Democratic Committeemen and Club members made plans at a meeting held last Wednesday evening at party headquarters for a door-to-door canvass of this area to secure the registration of an estimated 30% of the population which is not enrolled at present. Committeemen will supervise surveys of their neighborhoods with the help of 500 volunteers who will be enlisted in the coming week. Heading the drive will be Mrs. Wileen Donatello of 2 Magellan Road. Don Mankiewicz, Fourth Assembly District Democratic leader, outlined plans to raise funds for the campaign and for a get-out-the-vote drive. Predicting a victory for Presidential candidate John F. Temple Dedicates Cornerstone

On Sunday, Aug. 28th, Temple Or Elohim, Reform Congregation of Jericho, dedicated the corner stone of the first wing of its Temple here at Jericho. The Proceedings took place at the Temple's Jericho Turnpike site under a fair sky amid 90 plus humid and broiling temperature.

The program was most inspiring and interesting. Much of the credit must go to Master of Ceremonies, Gilbert B. Stein, who had skillfully arranged highlights of spiritual and civic importance, broken up time and again by interesting commentary, speeches, and the acknowledging of messages as well as the introduction of the many guests of honor. For 1 1/2 hours over 200 individuals sat in the broiling sun actually enjoying the drama which reflected the great spiritual strength of Jericho's youngest religious congregation.

President Irving Weiner of Temple Or Elohim set the theme of these proceedings with a stirring address, portraying the individual and combined efforts of a group of Temple leaders who by their varied contributions made this day possible. Mrs. Ruth Burns, the nightingale of Temple Or Elohim rendered the national anthem in excellent voice and with great poise. Judge Otis Pike of Riverhead delivered a short and well received speech lauding the efforts of a congregation which had only purchased this land in March of 1960 and

which will actually worship in their first building during September of this year. He stressed the need for strong religious affiliation and compared Temple's efforts with the flighty pursuit of so-called happiness by so many of our brethren who spend millions of dollars at race tracks daily.

President Sam Hecht of the Jericho School Board also delivered a fine address stating that youngsters who pray and have a religious education and background, are less apt to get into trouble in later years. Of special interest were the remarks by the Rev. Zachary Carey of the Wesley Methodist Church in East Norwich, who again stressed the strong bonds of friendship between his own congregation and the congregation of Temple Or Elohim which at one time worshipped at his church due to lack of other meeting facilities.

Letter to Editor

Several weeks ago, an editorial was written in another newspaper criticizing the aims and accomplishments of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. and its independent publication, THE VILLAGER. This letter was written by someone unfamiliar with both the facts and our community.

The issue appears to be whether or not it is appropriate, or possible, to retain the integrity of an organization when it is published or assessed within the confines of a partisan Republican weekly. The issue is further intensified when we recognize that the costs of our newspaper are absorbed by our benefactor. Could the people of our community become obligated or indebted by reason of this gift? Could also our thoughts and news be diverted so as to conform to the ideology of the Republican party? I think not!

It was a simple for most of us to recognize the motives of Mr. Noeth when he so generously donated his newspaper for our needs. He first desired to increase his circulation for pecuniary gain. And secondly, as a fervent and loyal Republican, he probably hoped to impregnate a vast Democratic community with a feeling of dissatisfaction toward their own party

and an interest in the Republican party.

The important side of the issue, however, is integrity. In the three years our VILLAGER has been in existence, not once have its Editors been swayed toward partisan politics.

Of course, it would be preferable to be able to print our newspaper independently. However, this preference must be weighed together with the other important projects our Civic Assoc. requires funds to continue. But, in my opinion, we require more youth programs, more Senior Citizens activities and more cultural advantages for our general populace. What our Civic Association has done in the past is remarkable and record breaking! What it can do in the future is even more promising.

I suggest that partisan politics in our Civic Assoc. would tend to destroy its purpose and weaken its walls. The opportunist is ever ready to inject it for his own purposes, but, to date, it has been kept out of our newspaper and Civic Association. THE VILLAGER, by its past record, has indicated its agreement with these views. I hope it never changes.

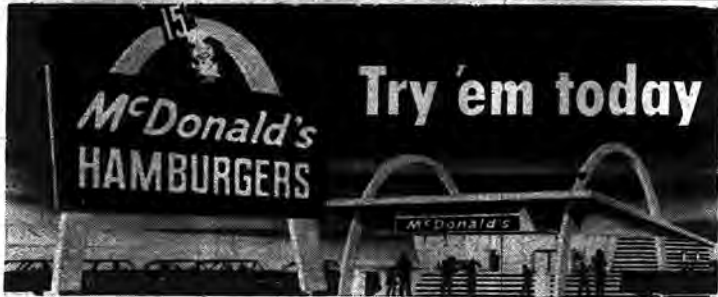
