Ten Months After Voters Approved:

Szendy Case Underway Before Judge Pittoni

The suit brought by Emil J. Szendy and Harry Goebel seeking to have the referendum of Nov. 19, last year, declared void and illegal, got underway in Nassau County Supreme Court before Justice Mario Pittoni, yesterday (Wed.). A preliminary session was held last Friday morning with the real action expected to start this week. School Architect Henry Johnson of Knappe & Johnson was expected to be the first witness for the District. Michael J. Sullivan is representing the School District.

Ten months ago the voters of the district cast 2,877 votes in favor of the two-million dollar school construction program while 1,828 voted against it. Szendy, a former Board member who fought against

the proposal, and nine other residents represented by Goebel, former attorney for the school district, brought action in court on four grounds. Two points of issue were subsequently dismissed and the case is now proceeding on the two other points.

Among the projects involved in the referendum last Nov 19 was an elementary school for Willet Ave., a gymnasium addition to East St., a classroom addition for Senior High, additional property for the Senior High area and the movement of 50 temporary-type classrooms from various elementary schools to the Junior and Senior High Schools over a four-year period.

First Program for ACT Next Tuesday

Alexander P. Penkoff, Chairman of 3 Windsor St., Hicksville announces the formation of an organization known as the American Committee for Truth (ACT). The purposes of ACT, he says, will be multifold:

1. To educate America in the principles of Marxism and communism, so they may more clearly understand the dangers inherent in these doctrines.
2. To awaken America to the serious implications of those proposals which would have the United States cease military tests or dis-

arm without similar action by the Russians and without careful inspections to determine that disarmament agreements are being entered.

In announcing the formation of ACT, Penkoff said: "...you and millions like yourself have the power to control your destinies—not the power of fear, wielded irresponsibly by brute force, but the pure and simple power of clear and normal thinking..."

"Apathy and resignation cross just...what our...appearance... want us to have. After that it is easy.

It is a direct give-away of yourself and your country and all its ideals of freedom."

On Tuesday, Sept. 20, at 8 P.M. at the Hicksville Library, ACT will present Edward Penkoff, Town Councilman from Syosset, Nassau, a captain in the Air Force Reserve, will discuss Marxist doctrines and theory and the relative military strengths of Russia and the United States. He will present information which has only recently been revealed to him by Pentagon Officials. ACT members a warm invitation to the public.

Music Teacher Back from Norway

Miss Florence Bowmar, teacher of vocal music at the Hicksville Junior High School has just recently returned from Norway after attending the 1960 International Summer School held at Oslo University, Oslo, Norway. She was selected among 275 other students and teachers from the United States to attend this special session.

The International Summer School is founded on two main ideas. First, that Norway's cultural and political contributions have a genuine quality which makes studying them a valuable experience; and second, that since Norway is representative of Europe, such studies can also serve as an introduction to European life and problems in general, according to Miss Bowmar.

The essential purpose of the Oslo School is academic. It offers a varied program of courses in education, music, art, industry, and medical care and health programs. In addition to these, special excursions are planned for students to historical and significant scenic places in Norway, thus supplementing book knowledge.

Once or twice a week International Evenings were held where students from approximately thirty countries discussed various world problems.

King Olaf of Norway entertained the International Summer School at a special garden party in his summer palace. Each student was presented to him individually.

In addition to being entertained by the King and his family, the city of Oslo gave an elaborate dance at the Town Hall in honor of students.

This peaceful international co-existence certainly helped to increase understanding and goodwill among the participants at the 1960 International Summer School.

Reduction in Mortgage Payments?

school tax for 1960-61 indicates that many of our residents may be paying less to the mortgage bank than they are at the present time. In the Syosset School District the school tax has been slightly reduced and therefore all of our residents who have been paying the bank an additional amount to compensate for the previous year's shortage, will as a net result, be paying less.

The Jericho school tax has increased approximately \$4.00 per \$1,000, and therefore a person having an assessment of \$10,000, will be taxed an additional \$40 per year. The odds are, that most of our Jericho residents, will be paying less next year to the bank

because in most cases they are currently making up a greater shortage from the previous year than the school tax increase.

The mortgage bank normally compares their anticipated escrow payments in October or November of the preceding year. They usually mail out their escrow analysis sometime in December. It is strongly suggested that our residents become familiar with this escrow analysis statement from the mortgage bank. A review of last year's mortgage analysis statement will clearly illustrate whether or not you are making up a shortage from the previous year. It will further enable you to then anticipate future escrow payments.

House Not For Sale

As all the local builders, realtors and most of us homeowners agree, beautiful Birchwood Park at Jericho, adjoining Westbury... represents the finest in suburban living. Of course, were we ever to take a serious inventory of all the money, the problems, the inconveniences and the annoyances which residence here means to us, we would call the moving van tomorrow, pack up, and flee to that better garden apartment in Forest Meadows, the Terrace Apartment in Forest Hills, or the real radicals among us might even venture to the fringes of Greenwch Village. Well, the assessment on our homes has gone up and so have the school taxes. I hate to contribute to the city, especially during rail strikes. I even dislike commuting to the city when there are no strikes. I abhor the speeding traffic along Birchwood Park Drive and other local streets. Our telephone bills are unbelievably high. The water bills during the summer and the heating bills during the winter assume an ominous proportion. LILCO just about takes what is left over. And oh, the cost of belonging to all those chapters, groups, associations and organizations, who have but one

thing in common: the need for your money. I object to fallen and cantine fertilizing my lawn, to unsightly garbage piles parked all day in the streets, to more unsightly automobiles blocking the streets all night. Finally, when we take the little women to the city for an evening entertainment, we arrive back home with the million.

Yes, suburbia is paradise. The kids love it. The local merchants love it. The repairmen and gas stations love it. The Long Island Railroad, LILCO and the Power Company love it. There is an animal farm and a Jolly Rogers. There are lots of restaurants and movies. They all love it. The question is: do I love it? I refuse to answer. Class dismissed!

President's Corner

The school bell rang this week for Birchwood children, and with the tolling of the bell, the two Education Committees of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho are back at work. The functions of a Civic Assoc. Education Committee is to provide a check on the schools which our children attend. They see to it that matters of importance in teaching, and school administration are brought to the attention of the school board, the school administrators, and where necessary, to the attention of the public.

During budget preparation and approval time, the Civic Association Education Committee will study pertinent budget documents, previous expenditures, resources and needs of the districts, and make suitable recommendations to the School Board for inclusion in, or removal from, the budget. Any group which is concerned with both our children and our pocket books assumes the utmost significance in the eyes of the community.

I was privileged to attend the first meeting of the Jericho Education Committee one evening last week. This committee, chaired by Joe Genna, had under consideration an item of interest to the entire area. The suggestion had been made that the Jericho School Board be increased from five to seven members. The committee had met previously and agreed that before so serious a subject could be intelligently discussed, more information would be needed. Letters were sent to the five present members of the Board, soliciting their opinions. With this information on hand the committee met to discuss the issue. Four of the five school board members contacted had sent in letters containing their opinions. Sam Hecht, Chairman of the Jericho School Board, attended the meeting personally. A full discussion of both sides of the argument was heard. It was ultimately

resolved that a recommendation be made to the Civic Assoc. Board of Directors in favor of maintaining the five-man board.

This is only one part of the work done by an education committee, but it is an example of the time, the thought, and the care that go into the work of these groups. This was a story of the Jericho Education Committee, but it is also a picture of the type of problems that will be taken up by the Syosset Education Committee, chaired by Leon Newman.

One of the things most of us thought about before we moved to Birchwood, was the type of education that would be afforded to our children. We are proud of the advantages of our education system, but we are not blind to the problems. Our education committee work to see that the high standards are maintained and improved.

ENACTMENT OF "TAXICAB ORDINANCE" OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY TAKE NOTICE that resolution of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, duly adopted by said Board and entered in full upon its minutes on the 29th day of December, 1959, following a public hearing held thereon after advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE OPERATION OF TAXICABS IN THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

ARTICLE I

Legislative Findings

Sec. 1.0. It is hereby declared and found that the taxicab industry in the Town of Oyster Bay is vested with a public interest as a vital and integral part of the transportation facilities of the Town, and that its regulation is necessary to secure adequate and safe transportation for the inhabitants of the Town and to prevent undue aggravation of the traffic and parking problems of the Town.

ARTICLE II

Definitions

Sec. 2.0. Unless otherwise expressly provided the following words, for the purpose of this Ordinance, shall have the following meaning herein indicated:

(a) **Town:** the unincorporated area of the Town of Oyster Bay, outside the city of Glen Cove and the incorporated villages located within the Town of Oyster Bay.

(b) **Taxicab:** a vehicle engaged in the business of carrying passengers for hire, having a seating capacity of less than eight persons and not operated on a fixed route.

(c) **Limousine:** shall include a chauffeur vehicle seating not less than five nor more than seven persons, used solely for hire in connection with funerals, weddings, amusements, sports and similar functions.

(d) **Person:** includes an individual, a partnership, any unincorporated association, a corporation and any other legal entity.

(e) **Owner:** a person owning or controlling one or more taxicabs or limousines and driving or causing any such vehicle to be driven upon the public highways for hire.

(f) **Driver:** any person driving a taxicab or limousine upon the public highways for hire.

(g) **Taxi Stand:** a public place alongside the curb of a street or elsewhere which has been so designated as reserved exclusively for the use of all taxicabs licensed hereunder.

(h) **Zones:** means an area within the Town established by the Town Board for the purpose of determining the rates to be charged for the hiring of taxicabs and within which an operator may be licensed to establish depots or terminals and pick up passengers.

(i) **Passenger:** shall include a person other than the driver who is an occupant of a taxicab or limousine and for the purpose of this ordinance, such person or persons shall be presumed to be a passenger for hire.

(j) **Operator:** shall include the pickup of a passenger for hire within the Town of Oyster Bay, and shall be synonymous with the word "drive."

(k) **Business:** shall include a single act of transporting a passenger or passengers for hire.

(l) **Terminal:** shall include a fixed base of operation of the owner of the taxicab or limousine.

ARTICLE III

Zones

Sec. 3.1. The Town Board may, from time to time, after public notice and a public hearing, establish zones or abolish zones so established or enlarge or diminish

the boundaries of any zone.

ARTICLE IV

Owner's License

Sec. 4.0 It shall be unlawful for any owner of any taxicab or limousine to permit the same to be operated upon the public highways of the Town of Oyster Bay without having first obtained, and having then in force an owner's license therefor, as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 4.1 Every owner's license issued hereunder shall be issued as of the first day of January or subsequent date of issue and shall expire on the thirty-first day of December next succeeding such date, unless sooner revoked by the Town Board.

Sec. 4.2 Every person who desires to operate a taxicab or taxicabs, limousine or limousines, owned or controlled by him upon the public highways within the Town, shall file with the Town Clerk a written application upon forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk, verified under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant, specifying in the case of any unincorporated association the names and addresses of each member thereof, and in the case of any corporation the names and addresses of each officer, director and stockholder thereof.

(b) A complete statement by the applicant, specifying the amounts of all unpaid judgments against the applicant and the nature of the transaction or act giving rise to said judgments and the names and location of the court in which and the date on which each was entered.

(c) All offenses, misdemeanors or felonies of which the applicant and any member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and any officer, director and stockholder thereof, if a corporation, has been convicted, stating the name and location of the court in which and the date on which such convictions were held and the penalties imposed thereon.

(d) The experience of the applicant and each member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and each officer, director and stockholder thereof, if a corporation, in the transportation of passengers.

(e) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the public convenience and necessity require the granting of a license.

(f) The number of vehicles to be operated by the applicant and a description of each such vehicle, including the make, model, passenger seating capacity, year of manufacture, New York State registration number, and plate number thereof, and, if it has ever been in any accident, the date and nature of the accident and a description of the damage done to such

vehicle.

(g) The age and citizenship of the applicant and each member thereof, if an unincorporated association, and each officer, director and stockholder thereof, if a corporation.

(h) The location of any and all depots and terminals proposed to be used by the applicant.

(i) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. 4.3 (a) If the Town Clerk shall find that further taxicab service in the Town and particularly in the area in which the applicant proposes to operate is required by public convenience and necessity and, from the statements contained in the application for a taxicab owner's license, that the applicant is qualified and able to perform such public transportation and to conform with the provisions of this ordinance and the rules and regulations adopted under this ordinance, then the Town Clerk upon the certification of each taxicab proposed to be operated by the applicant pursuant to Article IX hereof, and the furnishing by the applicant of proof of insurance as hereinafter provided, shall issue a license stating the name and address of the applicant, the date of the issuance thereof, the number of vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate, the number of the license medallions assigned to such vehicles, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue for each vehicle licensed hereunder, a license card bearing the words "Licensed Taxicab," an assigned number and the date of expiration of such license, together with a license medallion bearing a like number and the words "Licensed Taxicab"; otherwise such application shall be denied.

(b) Before making any findings as to whether public convenience and necessity justify the issuance of a taxicab owner's license or the licensing of additional taxicabs, the Town Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Oyster Bay a notice stating that application has been made for the licensing of a vehicle or vehicles as taxicabs, the number of vehicles for which such application has been made and containing a statement that written arguments as to whether public convenience and necessity require the licensing of such vehicles must be filed with the Town Clerk on or before the date fixed therein, which date must be not less than eight days after the date of such publication. Any arguments so filed must be considered by the Town Clerk in making his findings as to public convenience and necessity.

(c) If the Town Clerk shall find from the statements contained in the application that an applicant for an Owner's License for a limousine or limousines is qualified and able to conduct the business of operating the limousine or limousines and to conform to the provisions of this Ordinance and the rules and regulations adopted under this Ordinance, then the Town Clerk, upon the certification of each limousine proposed to be operated by the applicant pursuant to

Article IX hereof, and the furnishing by the applicant of proof of insurance, as hereinafter provided, shall issue a license stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate and the date of the issuance thereof; otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 4.4 In making the findings required by Sec. 4.3a hereof, the Town Clerk shall take into consideration the number of taxicabs already in operation in the Town, particularly in the area in which the applicant proposes to locate his depots and terminals, whether existing transportation is adequate to meet the public need, the probable effect of additional taxicabs on local traffic conditions and the character, experience and responsibility of the applicant and the adequacy of the service which the applicant proposes to give.

Sec. 4.5 The Town Clerk may in his discretion, before the issuance of a license under this Article, require the applicant and any others having knowledge of the facts to submit to an examination under oath and to produce evidence relating thereto, or hold a hearing upon such application as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 4.6 Every owner licensed under this Article who shall desire to add to the number of taxicabs he is then operating shall file with the Town Clerk a written application under oath stating:

(a) The name and address of the applicant.

(b) The applicant's owner's license number.

(c) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that the public convenience and necessity require such addition.

(d) A description of each such additional taxicab including the make, model, passenger seating capacity, year of manufacture, State registration number and motor number.

(e) If the Town Clerk shall find that the addition of such taxicab or taxicabs is required by the public convenience and necessity, then he shall issue a supplementary owner's license stating the name and address of the applicant, the numbers of the license medallions assigned to such vehicles and the date of issuance thereof; otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 4.7 In making the findings required by Sec. 4.6 hereof, the Town Clerk shall take into consideration the matters specified in Sec. 4.4 hereof.

Sec. 4.8 Any license issued under this Article may be renewed annually for additional periods of one year each from the date of expiration upon the filing of an application containing all the information required by Sec. 4.2 hereof, except the facts with respect to public convenience and necessity which are required by subdivision (e) thereof, and upon the approval of the Town Clerk pursuant to Section 4.3 and 4.4 except as to the finding of public convenience and necessity.

Sec. 4.9 No license shall be issued or renewed under this Article which shall permit the use of

any vehicle as a taxicab or limousine unless and until it has been inspected pursuant to Article IX hereof and certified to the Town Clerk as conforming to the provisions of the Article.

Sec. 4.10 Each applicant shall, before the issuance to him of a license under this Article, file with the Town Clerk evidence that he is insured against public liability in the limits of \$10,000 for personal injuries to each person, and \$20,000 for personal injuries for each accident and \$5,000 for property damage which insurance shall be maintained in force during the period covered by the license.

Sec. 4.11 The owner's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE V.

Sec. 5.0 (a) No person shall operate any taxicab or limousine upon the public highways of the Town without having first obtained and having then in force a New York State chauffeur's license and a driver's license, issued as hereinafter provided.

(b) No person shall operate a taxicab or limousine on the public highways of the Town of Oyster Bay unless such taxicab or limousine shall be duly licensed as herein provided.

Sec. 5.1 Every driver's license issued under this Article shall be issued as of the date of the granting thereof and shall expire on the 31st day of December next succeeding, unless sooner revoked by the Town Board.

Sec. 5.2 Every person desiring to drive a taxicab or limousine for hire upon the streets of the Town shall file an application for a license so to drive with the Town Clerk, which application shall be in writing upon forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk and verified under oath and shall state:

- (a) The name and address, and age of the applicant.
- (b) A full description of the applicant including his color, height, weight, color of eyes and hair, any scars or marks and the nature of any physical infirmity from which he may suffer.
- (c) Recommendation by two residents of Nassau County, not related to the applicant, who have known the applicant for a period of one year or more and who will vouch for the applicant's sobriety, honesty and general good character.
- (d) Whether or not he is a citizen of the United States.
- (e) The names and addresses of the applicant's employers during the last ten years prior to his application.
- (f) All violations of any traffic law, ordinance or regulation for which the applicant has been arrested or convicted within 18 months prior to the date of the application and all crimes of which the applicant has ever been arrested or convicted, stating the date and place of each such arrest and the name and location of the Court in which such conviction was had and the penalty imposed therefor.
- (g) The number and date of issuance of the applicant's New York State chauffeur's license.
- (h) Whether or not any operator's or chauffeur's license held by the applicant has ever been revoked or suspended by the State of New York or any other State, and if so, by what court or other authority, on what date, for what cause, and if suspended the period of such suspension.
- (i) Any other relevant information which the Town Clerk may require.

Sec. 5.3 Every applicant for a driver's license shall, at the time of submitting his application, also:

- (a) Submit two individual photographs of the applicant in white background, 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be a true likeness of the applicant and must show only neck, shoulders and unobscured head.
- (b) Submit a certificate from a physician, duly licensed to practice in the State of New York,

certifying that, in his opinion, the applicant is not afflicted with any physical or mental disease or infirmity which might make him an unsafe or unsatisfactory driver.

(c) Exhibit his current New York State chauffeur's license for inspection.

(d) Be fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk.

Sec. 5.4 Upon the receipt of any application, the Town Clerk shall refer the same to the Nassau County Police Department for such investigation as it shall deem necessary or desirable and report thereon.

Sec. 5.5 Upon the receipt of the report provided for in this Article, the Town Clerk shall issue a taxicab or limousine driver's license to the applicant if he shall find that the applicant holds a New York State chauffeur's license and is a fit and proper person to drive such vehicle considering his age, experience, police and accident records, character and driving ability, otherwise such application shall be denied.

Sec. 5.6 At the time of issuance of such license the Town Clerk shall also furnish to the applicant a numbered badge, which must be conspicuously displayed on the outer clothing in the hollow of the left shoulder of each licensed driver. Such badge shall be returned to the Town Clerk upon suspension or revocation of the taxicab or limousine driver's license.

Sec. 5.7 The driver's license issued hereunder shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE VI.

Applications to Town Board

Sec. 6.0 Any applicant who shall have been denied a license under this ordinance may apply to the Town Board for a review of the action of the Town Clerk as hereinafter provided:

(a) Such application to the Town Board shall be in writing, signed and acknowledged by the applicant and shall state the ground or grounds on which the applicant claims that the determination of the Town Clerk was erroneous.

(b) Such application shall be filed with the Town Clerk by the applicant within twenty days after notice of denial of his application by the Town Clerk has been mailed to him or delivered to him in person.

(c) Upon the filing of such application, the Town Board shall hold a hearing thereon pursuant to the provisions of Article VII hereof.

(d) At such hearing the Town Board shall consider the applicant's application upon the record before the Town Clerk in connection with the Town Clerk's consideration thereof and in its discretion may receive such or additional evidence in support thereof or in opposition thereto.

Sec. 6.1 The Town Board after such hearing, may affirm the action of the Town Clerk or direct the Town Clerk to issue a proper license, pursuant to this ordinance.

ARTICLE VII.

Hearings

Sec. 7.0 Whenever it shall be provided herein that a hearing shall or may be held by the Town Board with respect to any matter:

- (a) Such hearing shall be held on a date and at a place and hour designated by the Town Board.
- (b) The Town Clerk shall give notice, showing the locality and address of the applicant or license holder concerned, the subject matter of the hearing and the date, place and hour thereof designated therefor by mailing a copy thereof to the applicant or license holder concerned at the address shown upon the most recent application of such applicant or license, at least ten (10) days before such hearing.
- (c) In the case of a public hearing, the notice required in paragraph (b) of this Section shall also be published at least once a week for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Oyster Bay, the first publication to be at least ten days before the date fixed for such public hearing.
- (d) The applicant or license holder involved shall be entitled

to be represented by legal counsel and to present such competent and material testimony and other evidence in his own behalf as may be relevant to the subject matter of the hearing.

(e) All witnesses shall be sworn and examined under oath.

ARTICLE VIII.

Issuance of License

Sec. 8.0 The fees for filing applications hereunder which shall be paid to the Town Clerk at the time the application is filed, shall be:

- (a) For each taxicab or limousine owner's license \$20.
- (b) For each taxicab or limousine owner's supplementary license, \$10.
- (c) For each vehicle licensed as a taxicab or limousine, \$10.
- (d) For each taxicab or limousine driver's license, \$2.
- (e) The relocation of any vehicle, within the Town of Oyster Bay, \$10.
- (f) For each taxicab or limousine substituted \$4.
- (g) For replacement of a license, \$10.
- (h) For the replacement of each driver's license or badge, \$2.
- (i) For replacement of each taxicab or limousine license card, \$2.
- (j) Every license issued hereunder shall be signed at the discretion of the Town Clerk and sealed with the seal of the Town of Oyster Bay.
- (k) The Town Clerk shall keep a record of the name and address of each person to whom a taxicab or limousine owner's license has been issued under this ordinance, showing the date and number of such license and all renewals, suspensions and revocations thereof, and a record of each taxicab or limousine licensed hereunder, stating the make, model, passenger seating capacity, year of manufacture, New York State registration number, and motor number thereof, (and the name and address of the person owning such taxicab or limousine and a record of each driver's license issued hereunder showing the name and address of such driver, his New York chauffeur's license number, his driver's license issued hereunder, and the date of issuance of such driver's license.

ARTICLE IX.

Condition and Inspection of Taxicabs

Sec. 9.0 Every vehicle operated upon the street of the Town as a taxicab or limousine shall be kept clean, sanitary, fit and of good appearance, and in a safe condition for the transportation of passengers.

Sec. 9.1 The Town Board shall establish reasonable rules and regulations for the inspection of taxicabs and limousines operated upon the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE X.

Suspension and Revocation of License

Sec. 10.0 Any license issued hereunder may be suspended for a period of not more than three months or revoked by the Town Board if the holder thereof shall be convicted of a violation of any provision of this ordinance or any rule or regulation adopted hereunder, or of any violation of any ordinance of the Town or of any traffic law, statute, ordinance or regulation of the State of New York or the municipality of the State of New York, or of any crime, or be guilty of making a false statement or misrepresentation in his application. Any license issued hereunder may be suspended by the Town Board if the holder thereof shall be indicted or charged upon information duly filed with the public prosecutor with or without indictment of any crime or offense as above mentioned until such holder shall be convicted or acquitted of such crime or offense.

No license shall be either suspended or revoked hereunder without a hearing thereon, held not less than twenty days after written notice thereof shall have been given to the license holder in person or by registered mail.

Sec. 10.1 The Town Clerk upon receiving information giving him

reasonable cause to believe that the holder of any license issued hereunder has violated any provision of this ordinance or been convicted of any violation referred to in Article X hereof or indicted or charged with or for any crime or offense, or his guilty of having made a false statement or misrepresentation in his application, may forthwith temporarily suspend such license until a hearing can be held by the Town Board as provided in Sec. 10.0.

ARTICLE XI.

Taxi Stands

Sec. 11.0 The Town Board may from time to time by resolution establish stands at such locations upon the streets or other public places of the Town as it deems necessary for the use of taxicabs operated and driven by persons licensed hereunder and prescribe the number of taxicabs that may occupy each such stand, provided that it shall find that such stands are required by the public convenience and necessity and will not tend to create a traffic hazard.

Sec. 11.1 All taxi stands may be used by any taxicab licensed hereunder and driven by any driver licensed hereunder, provided there is a vacant space available therefor.

Sec. 11.2 No vehicle other than a taxicab, duly licensed hereunder and driven by a person duly licensed hereunder, shall at any time occupy any space established as a taxi stand.

ARTICLE XII.

Regulations

Sec. 12.0 The following regulations shall be observed in the operation and driving of every taxicab upon the public highways of the Town.

- (a) Each taxicab operated hereunder shall have a permanently affixed roof light with the word "Taxicab" impressed thereon in such manner that it shall be visible at all times and shall bear on the copes of each of the four sides the word "Taxicab" and the name and address of the owner in letters not less than two inches in height, either painted thereon or otherwise securely affixed thereto. There shall also be affixed to the left front door in a conspicuous place, the license number provided.
- (b) No person shall drive any taxicab upon the streets of the Town unless there are displayed in such taxicab, in a manner in which they are clearly visible and can be readily observed by all passengers therein, the license number of the taxicab and a schedule of the maximum fares applicable within the Town.
- (c) The driver of every taxicab shall at all times remain in the driver's compartment or immediately adjacent to his taxicab when such vehicle is in any public place, except that when such a driver may be absent from his cab for not more than twenty consecutive minutes.
- (d) No taxicab driver shall solicit passengers sitting or standing at a taxi stand and except when sitting in the driver's compartment of such taxicab or while standing immediately adjacent thereto, nor in a hotel or any other building, or in any other place, shall the driver of such taxicab solicit the movement of, or follow any person for the purpose of soliciting passengers.
- (e) No taxicab driver shall cruise in search of passengers.
- (f) No taxicab driver shall stop to pick up any additional passengers while proceeding to the destination of any passenger then occupying the taxicab without the consent of all such passengers.
- (g) No taxicab driver shall permit more persons to be carried in his taxicab than the number for which he has seating facilities.
- (h) Except as provided to subdivisions (f) hereof, no taxicab driver shall refuse or neglect to convey any orderly person upon request, unless previously notified by full capacity or unless the transportation of such person shall substantially delay or inconvenience passengers who have already engaged his taxicab.
- (i) If a taxicab is carrying two or more persons to different destinations, the driver shall be the sole judge of the order in which such persons shall be delivered to their destination and the route which shall be followed in so delivering them.
- (j) No taxicab shall park or stand on any public street or place other than at a taxi stand designated or established and so marked pursuant to a resolution of the Town Board.
- (k) No passenger in a taxicab shall be kept waiting longer than five minutes before proceeding to his announced destination.
- (l) All accidents in which any taxicab or limousine shall be involved, shall be reported to the Nassau County Police Department within 24 hours after the happening thereof.
- (m) Every taxicab or limousine driver, as soon as practicable after his taxicab or limousine is emptied of passengers, shall carefully search his vehicle for any property left there by any passenger and, if he shall find any such property he shall immediately deliver it to the Police Department having jurisdiction.
- (n) Every taxicab or limousine driver shall obey all laws and ordinances, rules and regulations, while driving such vehicle and upon conviction for any offense, misdemeanor or felony, shall report the same within five days to the Town Clerk advising him of the nature of the offense, and the name and location of the Court and on which such conviction was held.
- (o) No person other than the driver or a passenger shall enter any taxicab while it is in operation as such.
- (p) Every taxicab driver licensed as such pursuant to this ordinance shall within forty-eight hours notify the Town Clerk of any change of his address or leave of absence of his taxicab driver's license or his chauffeur's license, or his driver's badge.
- (q) No taxicab owner or driver shall demand or suggest that any passenger or prospective passenger pay a fare larger than that prescribed herein.
- (r) Every person licensed as a taxicab owner under this ordinance shall maintain continuous service seven days each week, twenty-four hours each day from at least one depot or terminal, except that individual owner drivers shall maintain continuous service at least eight hours per day and at least five days each week.
- (s) Every driver shall keep a written record of all trips showing the time and place each passenger engaged his taxicab and the time and place he left such taxicab on a form approved by the Town Clerk. Such record shall be retained by the owner of such taxicab for at least one year.
- (t) It shall be unlawful for a passenger to refuse to pay the agreed or established fare.
- (u) No owner shall change his place of terminal without the written permission granted by the Town Clerk.
- (v) Every owner upon the sale or other disposition of a licensed taxicab or limousine shall, within 24 hours notify the Town Clerk of such sale or other disposition and surrender the license and/or modifications.
- (w) It shall be unlawful for any person to refuse the surrender of a license and/or modification to the Town Clerk upon demand, when such license has been suspended, revoked or expired.
- (x) No trailer or semi-trailer shall be attached or secured to a taxicab or limousine while it is being used to transport passengers.

ARTICLE XIII.

Fines

Sec. 13.0 The violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be an offense against the ordinance, which shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$100.00 or imprisonment for a period of not exceeding 30 days for each offense, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

In addition the license shall be liable to suspension or revocation

Severability and Effective Date
Sec. 14.0 If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, section, paragraph or provision directly involved in the controversy in which said judgment shall have been rendered.

Sec. 14.1 This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by law.
Sec. 14.2 This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Taxicab and Limousine Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay."
