Civic Speaker Office Seeker

"A brazen attempt" by a Democrat candidate to take over the platform of the Northwest Civic Assoc meeting in a Hicksville Public School to promote his candidacy was rebuffed this week by Thomas R. Pynchon, Town Republican leader.

Pynchon asserted that he sympathized with the members of the civic association who apparently were "duped" into a situation which could possibly be a violation of the state education law. (Section 414 "...no political meetings shall be permitted...") The Civic Assoc apparently had been offered a speaker to discuss the matter of tax assessment upon Mid Island Plaza. They were for the most part astounded when the speaker turned out to be Charles Anderson who introduced himself as a Democratic candidate for state office and proceeded to tear into Republicans on both local and county levels.

Several Civic Assoc members in the audience at the Burns Ave School in Hicksville on Tuesday night, Sept. 13, protested the appearance of an avowed political candidate. Anderson admitted he is not an attorney and not in a position to pass judgment upon the recent court decision granting the Mid Island Shopping Plaza a reduction in assessment. This decision is currently being appealed to a higher court by the County of Nassau. The Democrat candidate proposed to formation of a "citizens committee" headed by himself which would hire a lawyer and "look into" homeowner assessments.

Town Leader Pynchon said the Northwest Civic Assoc., one of the most active in the community of Hicksville, enjoyed an enviable record of civic activity and he was distressed to see its membership "victimized" by a political candidate for high state office.

Form Second Unit of Cadet Corps

St. Ignatius Girls Cadet Corps is forming a second corps and all girls 10 to 14 are eligible. No previous musical experience is necessary and the unit will be limited to the first 120 girls applying. Vice President Richard M. Nixon may pause in Hicksville at about 3:30 PM next Wednesday, Sept. 28, and speak to those gathered at the corner of Old Country Road and Broadway, during his visit to Nassau. The Republican candidate for President of the United States is scheduled to come east along Old Country Road from Roosevelt Field shopping centre.

Phillip F. Robinson, Hicksville Republican leader, and Leland Badler, co-executive committeeman, announced "with pride and pleasure" that Mr. Nixon will stop at Hicksville to address an anticipated crowd. They said the pause of the GOP presidential candidate in his busy schedule was arranged thru the efforts of A. Holly Patterson, Nassau GOP leader; and William Meisser, Nassau GOP Committee chairman.

Mr. Nixon is due to arrive in Nassau by motorcade on Sept. 28, crossing the New York City line on Jericho Tpke. He will be welcomed by County Executive Patterson at the Old Country Court house in Mineola at 1 PM.

From the courthouse the motorcade will come along Old Country Rd. to Roosevelt Field to meet his Navy buddy, Eugene McGovern, chairman of the Nassau Citizens for Nixon Committee, and speak at the shopping centre at 2:15 PM. After that appearance, Mr. Nixon and his motorcade is scheduled to pass thru Westbury and Hicksville along Old Country Rd., and may stop at Mid Island Shopping Plaza while enroute to Suffolk.

Residents this week recalled the appearance of President Eisenhower motorcade in Hicksville four years ago. On that occasion, the motorcade came up Jerusalem Ave from Levittown and turned west on Old Country Road. Thousands were gathered at that intersection

2-Day Trial On Referendum

The decision of Supreme Court Justice Mario Pittoni on the taxpayers' suit seeking to invalidate the Nov. 19, 1959 Hicksville School District referendum on a two-million dollar bond issue is anticipated sometime after Sept. 28.

The trial before Justice Pittoni in Mineola took place last week on Wednesday and Thursday. Only witnesses were Henry Johnson of the firm of architects, Knapp & Johnson, and Emil J. Szendy, former School Board member and one of the principals in the action.

Attorneys for both sides were given until Sept. 26 to submit first briefs and until Sept. 28 for final briefs.

Post Article Features Local Product

Members of the Mid-Island Chapter of the Nassau Center for Emotionally Disturbed Children, Inc. are anxiously awaiting the release of Tom Congdon's feature article in the "Saturday Evening Post" on children attending the Nassau Center school. After almost a year of research and work on the subject of Emotionally Disturbed Children, the story of the Center is finally to be released in the Oct. 1st issue of the "Post," available on the newsstands on Sept. 27th.

While obtaining material for the article, writer Congdon shuttled back and forth between communities in Nassau County and spent several days interviewing children and their parents in Hicksville,

Bedpage and Plainville, observing the home environment of the children and obtaining local color.

The title of the "Post" article is "Aric Children Go To School" but equally with the children, this is a story of parents and their successful struggle to obtain support from professionals and the community in the education of their children. It is more—it is the story of the self-sacrifice of the original 15 sets of parents forming the Center who, faced with the selection of five of their number to attend the newly formed classes, pitched in wholeheartedly to obtain for their neighbor's child what they hoped eventually it would be possible to obtain for their own. As then set up, the classes were a trial balloon for five children

to see if emotionally disturbed children were "educable", as the parents believed. A few months struggle proved the parents were right and by the end of the first school year almost ten more educable children had been added to the original five.

At the beginning of the second school year, the Center absorbed all the children of the original founding families and widened its program to include training and preventive care.

The Center is now embarking on its third year of operation with 25 children in the school and hundreds on the waiting list and the reconstructed old farmhouse at 3123 No. Jerusalem Rd. in Levittown which houses the Center school, is bursting at the seams with activity and holds no further hope of expansion of classes. A new larger building must be found or a Center built before any more

Burns' Remarks Tops Civic General Meeting

Welfare Sets Busy Season

A well-received speech by TOB Supervisor John J. Burns and approval of eight constitutional amendments highlighted the General membership meeting of the West Birchwood Civic Association last Saturday night in the Robert Seaman School.

The 137 people attending the meeting heard President David Serko give a report on the Civic Assoc. activities in which he stressed the accomplishments of the various major committees.

Supervisor Burns gave a short course in civics and explained a course in civics and explained the function of his office, the Town of Oyster Bay Board and the relationship of the Town of Oyster Bay to Nassau County. He pointed out that the population of our Township had jumped from 60,000 people in 1950 to 300,000 in 1960 and stressed the fact that everything possible was being done to adjust to the fantastic increase in population.

Following his speech, Supervisor Burns answered questions from the audience which dealt with problems pertinent to our community. In discussing the overpass and entrance to West Birchwood problems he pointed out that these were essentially New York State's responsibility.

Before Supervisor Burns spoke, the meeting was enlivened by a brief speech by Morton Washrop in which he criticized the Civic Assoc. and the Community Welfare committee for failing to alert the proper authorities on the appearance of the sump and the mosquitoes which had a field day there this summer. Answering Mr. Washrop's complaint, President Serko pointed out that a phone call to the proper committee would have brought results in the same manner that Mr. Washrop claimed a certain individual's phone call to Nassau County Officials did.

The discussion of the amendments resulted in amendments #14 and #15 being defeated. These amendments covered changes in election procedure. (See last issue of West Birchwood News). A proposed amendment which was offered from the floor by Al Friedman stating that the Board of Directors should consist of 10 members and the president and officers (except the president) from the Board was defeated by a 53-21 vote.

A new amendment providing that the President should act as Chairman of the Board was passed unanimously. Following the meeting the Social committee served coffee and doughnuts.

A flurry of activity was generated at the last meeting of the Community Welfare Committee. The group, which recently absorbed the Taxation-Zoning Committee, initiated a wide range of projects from swimming pools to Stop signs in what promises to be another busy year.

Here's a sample of the diversified activities the committee is now engaged in:
 The possibility of establishing a community swimming pool will be explored thoroughly by Dorothy Rindler.

A number of homes west of Yates Lane are in the Hicksville Fire District, a situation that dates back to the time before Northern State Parkway existed. The danger involved here is obvious, since it is not responsible for the safety of these homes. Sam Gordon is investigating the problem thoroughly before the Committee takes every possible action to remedy this unhappy situation.

Every year a certain date is set aside by the County at which time individual property owners can air their grievances about the assessed valuation put upon their homes. Leon Schaffer will find out when this day is scheduled for 1961 and the information will be transmitted to the entire Association.

The problem of the sump, which is brought up at many meetings, was discussed and was referred to the Builder's Committee for action. However, in the hopes that a two-pronged broadside would get faster results, a lengthy letter was sent to several County and Town officials, describing the generally disgraceful condition of this basin and pressing for improvement.

A group headed by Elliott Sherman will seek to obtain exact maps of the various districts—fire, water, school, etc. — which include West Birchwood. The several boundaries will then be collated on a single "master map". Recommended locations for Stop signs, which the Committee drew up several months ago, will be turned over to Town Councilman Poulos, Police and Highway Dept. officials already have received copies.

Is it possible for the Jericho Fire Dept. to get an Emergency Rescue Truck? The advantages of having such a facility are obvious. Dorothy Rindler will check and report whether the idea is feasible for Jericho.
