Nov 19 School Bldg Vote Valid; Justice Pittoni Dismisses Action

Supreme Court Justice Mario Pittoni this week dismissed the complaint of Emil J. Szendy, Harry Goebel, et al who had sought to have the referendum of Nov. 19 declared "void and illegal". The taxpayers' action has delayed for almost a year progress on urgently needed and voter-approved school construction programs in Hicksville including an elementary school on Willets Ave.

Szendy and nine other taxpayers, represented by Goebel, had brought action on four counts initially. Two of the causes of action were swiftly dismissed by Supreme Court Justice Edward Robinson some months ago. Justice Pittoni ruled this week on the other two causes of action following a trial and the submission of briefs.

The court found the plaintiffs failed to give "any evidence to establish that the bonds sold for the proposed new projects would exceed the probable usefulness of the buildings involved. Therefore, they have failed to sustain their burden of proof on this issue."

As to the question of whether the temporary-type school units being moved from seven elementary school sites, over a four year period, to the junior and senior high schools "remain the same buildings or become new and different buildings," Justice Pittoni quoted right from the testimony given by Szendy at the trial.

"It is interesting to note," the Court declared, "that one of the plaintiffs, who testified as an expert architect, stated that a building is a structure consisting of enclosing walls and roof which serves a useful function and purpose." It cannot be said, with practicality and reasonableness, that each of these units, individually and without the prior described additions, connections, placements and labor (plumbing, heating, electrical and lighting facilities, corridors, etc.) could serve "the useful function and purpose" of a school."

Justice Pittoni stated: "the referendum did comply in this respect with the Local Finance Law."

Michael J. Sullivan, attorney for the school district, will discuss and report on the court's decision at a regular meeting of Hicksville Board of Education this Friday night in the High School.

Fed Grant for Language Study

Hicksville School District pioneering in the field of foreign language instruction has won a federal grant to finance experimentation in their field. Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools, disclosed this week. Between \$30,000 and \$45,000 will be allowed the first year and Dr. Lamb indicates "there is every indication that the grant may be extended to nine years". If so, the total program would exceed a quarter million dollars.

Assurance that Hicksville will get the grant of Federal assistance has been given to the school administration by the State Education Dept.

Open House At Fire Stations

Each year the students of the Hicksville Schools turn into the Bureau a large number of posters for judging by the Bureau Staff. An award is presented in the form of a trophy to a student in each grade level.

At the awards ceremony, Assistant Chief John Specht presented each student with their awards, commenting that the contest is but one method where Fire Prevention Education can be stressed for the

school children.

Present at the ceremony in addition to the students and parents were members of the Bureau, Board Chairman Harold Mananskie and Board Member Vince Braun. After the ceremony refreshments were served and an open house tour was conducted. In connection with Fire Prevention Week, open house will be held at each fire station from 6:30 PM to 9:30 PM each evening this week and on Saturday from 1:00 PM to 5:00 PM. The winning posters are on exhibit at the School Annex, Broadway and Marie St.

Boy Scout Budget Fund Appeal Here This Sunday

Scouting in Nassau County Council is financed through the gifts of parents and friends in the annual drive during the fall of each year. The 1916 Budget Campaign will kick-off this Sunday, Oct. 16, after the Cubs, Scouts, and Explorers have distributed a "Hi-Neighbor" report on Saturday, Oct. 15. The County Budget goal for the new year will be \$530,175.

County Clerk Francis J. Anderson, of Hicksville, is Campaign Chairman for the Arrowhead District. Working closely with him will be Allen Carpenter, also from Hicksville. Each Unit in the County will provide a team of workers and 3 key men with 2 of the men working on the Special Gifts part of the Campaign. Advanced City Chairman for the Arrowhead District is William Koutensky.

The General Solicitations Chairman is Jack Egan who will also act as an area chairman in Hicksville. Peter Colton is area chairman for Plainview and Ted Knighton for old Bethpage.

The goal in Arrowhead District is to report on Scouting to over 11,000 contributors. To do this will take over 1,100 Campaign Workers.

EXHIBIT AT FAIR

During the week of Oct. 8th thru 16th, Roosevelt Raceway host to the annual Long Island Industrial Fair which this year promises to be bigger and better than ever. Participating for the first time will be the 300 member Long Island Water Conference.

The breakdown of the Council Operating Budget is in the following percentages: Campsites and Activities; Operation and maintenance of 3 Camps, Cub Picnics and Day Hikes; Training experiences, Campfires, Rallies Cub and Day Week-ends, and Explorer Activities - 35%; Leadership Training - all junior and adult leaders; uniforms, supplies, equipment, and visual aids - 10%; Field Service; Direct leadership guidance to every community and sponsoring institution, program and educational help, civic relationships, Commissioner service - 32%; Awards and Recognition; Encouragement to Scouts and Leaders, Recognition for accomplishment and service - 5%; General Administration: Bulletin, Manuals, Postage, Printing, Telephone, Records Clerical, Office Supplies and services; Office maintenance and operation - 15%; Financing: Auditing and Campaign Expense - 3%.

Beside the camp at the Harkness Training Center in Roslyn, Nassau County Council also operates and maintains Camp Wauwexon and Ontonagon Scout Reservation, Wauwexon, located at Wading River, is one of the Country's finest Boy Scout Camps. This year it celebrates its 38th year of operation. Through all these years the physical facilities of the Camp have been constantly improved and expanded. The Camp now accommodates 1050 campers at a time. In 3 divisions of 350 Scouts and Leaders, Each Division has its own modern well-equipped Dining Hall as well as

swimming, Scout-craft and activity areas. Troops plan and execute their camp program with the assistance of a trained Camp Staff. The Camp also provides facilities and trained leadership in hiking, nature study, cooking, archery, riflery and small boat handling. The combination of this camp of these facilities, trained leadership and 690 acres of scenic and natural beauty, provide for every Scout a camping experience long to be remembered.

The Ontonagon Scout Reservation is located in the Catskills and offers 2400 acres of unspoiled natural beauty. Rolling hills, a beautiful lake, woodland streams and miles of trails winding through hardwood forests invite the Scout to participate in the ultimate in Scout Camping. Ontonagon also provides many physical features to aid and strengthen the program of the Troop and its Patrols. Food Service is provided by two "Food Service Buildings". Each of these buildings provide Dining Hall service, Heater Shack service to Unit Campfires, and a Country Store to supply food for meals prepared by the Unit. This year the Camp provided 35 Campfires comprised of lean-to, tents and platforms. Each site is equipped with: Patrol cooking and dining areas. In addition the Camp provides three Chaplains, canoeing and boating facilities, fishing dock and fly-tying shelter, three swimming areas and field-sports areas. Ontonagon also provides an Explorer Base Camp where Explorers have an opportunity for Merit Badge counseling, canoe trips on the Delaware River, mountain climbing, trips, hikes to the fish hatchery, Moccasin and other points of interest in the area. A highlight for the Explorer program this year was a 3 day horseback trip to Nassau County Council's newest camp, now under development, Alder Lake.

The Council Budget is used in building a better Nassau County.

No Increase In Town Tax

Homeowners and taxpayers of the Township today were assured there will be no increase in the general Town Tax for 1961, in the proposed Town budget that has been filed with Town Clerk Henry M. Curran at Town Hall in Oyster Bay.

The proposed gross budget of \$3,479,787.71 calls for a tax rate of only \$1.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation, the same as the present year. The 1960 budget, adopted Oct. 27, 1959, reduced the Town tax for that year by twenty-eight per cent.

Supervisor John J. Burns said, "We are holding the line on taxes without curtailing the needed services for our growing Town."

"The Town Board's planned programs covering all departments are a major factor in enabling us to present a fiscally sound budget without an increase in the Town Tax."

The total budget for the next year is \$220,875.08 more than the current gross budget. The amount to be raised by taxation is \$597,223.23 with estimated revenues for next year \$2,882,564.48 Supervisor Burns pointed out.

The tax for highway purposes, outside of the incorporated villages also remains unchanged at 50 cents under the Highway Department's permanent road improvement program, under which a number of miles of Town roads receive permanent construction treatment each year.

EDITORIAL Don't Curb Your Car

Two important reasons why most of us moved from the City to Birchwood were to live in a place that was safer for our children and a place having suburban atmosphere. However, we, the residents, by parking our cars on the streets, have made our area unsafe for children, and have ruined the appearance of the community. Insurance statistics dramatically emphasize the great number of accidents caused by children running between parked cars. Think, if you will for the moment, of the terrible tragedy that would result if your neighbor's child dashed from between your parked car and another and was struck by an oncoming vehicle. Bear in mind that the struck child could very well be your own.

There is no need for any car of our residents to be parked at the curb. If not parked in the garage, at the very least, cars should be parked in the driveway. When parking in the driveway it is absolutely essential that proper safe-guards are taken, so that the car can not possibly roll. Any car parked in the driveway should be locked, so that no child can possibly enter.

Driving into the garage is a habit. Once having obtained this habit you will find that you automatically drive into the garage, thereby protecting the lives of our children as well as preserving the car itself. We should never, except in unusual circumstances, park our cars at the curb. This is certainly a small inconvenience in order to protect our children.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

As far back as a year ago, the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho, through its Education Committee, started a study to determine what would be the ideal size of the Board of Education of the School District. The matter was discussed at many meetings, and many opinions were sought.

A comparative study was undertaken to see how many members the neighboring district boards have. From material sent by the State Education Dept. it was noted that the size of boards vary. Most boards have five members; some have seven and some have nine. Surprisingly, the number has little to do with the size of the school population. See Chart, with an enrollment of 2,958 students (as of 1959) has a nine member board, while Garden City, with 10,024 students has a five member board.

In addition to the statistical study, the opinion of the State Dept. of Education was sought. The State favors a five member board. Another phase of the study was a poll of the present members of the Jericho Board of Education. This was undertaken not so much to determine how many favored a change, but to collect arguments on both sides.

Some of the reasons in favor of a change to seven members were: (1) to get a greater pool of talent to draw from; (2) to have more people share the work load; (3) to get a wider representation and range of opinion.

Some of the reasons against a seven member board were: (1) the possibility of developing majority and minority cliques; (2) the less likelihood of unanimity; (3) greater difficulty in achieving perfect attendance; (4) the possibility that each member would feel less obligated; (5) the possibility of the board becoming more cumbersome, and the work becoming more time-consuming.

Many months have been spent interviewing, writing, discussing, thinking. It is therefore the result of no easy decision that the Jericho Education Committee has reported to the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. that it makes no recommendation to change the number of the members of the Jericho School Board.

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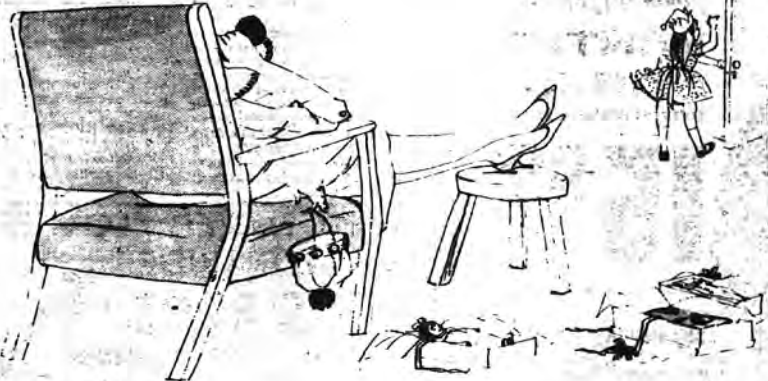
