## Nassau Needs 4 to 6 Community Colleges by 1970, Lamb Predicts

Four to six community colleges will be needed in Nassau County by 1970, it was forecast this week by Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of Hicksville schools, emphasizing the need for a community college in Hicksville.

Hicksville Board of Education is on record with an application for establishment of a community college in Hicksville, starting by using the facilities of the high school daily after 4 P.M. until a permanent building is erected. "The one community college which is scheduled to be moved from Mineola to Westbury might well become eventually a central four-year county college into which pupils might be fed from other two-year community colleges", Dr. Lamb noted this week. "One community college in Nassau is far from enough, whether it is located in Mineola or Westbury and whether it serves 600 students or 1200, it is hopelessly inadequate to provide for the 8,000 to 10,000 potential college students (by 1970) for which no provision has yet been made by anyone."



He warned: "If additional community colleges are not built there will be 8,000 to 10,000 boys and girls from Nassau by 1970 who should go to college but who probably will find college doors closed to them."

## CIVIC ASSOCIATION TO VOTE ON CLOSING EXIT GAP; COMMUNITY DANCE FOLLOWS ELECTION ON NOV. 5

An evening of dancing to the tunes of Herb Rosen and his orchestra will follow elections for West Birchwood Civic Assoc., Inc. officers and directors on Saturday night, Nov. 5th at the Robert Seaman School. Festivities will begin at 8:30 p.m. and the Social Committee will serve a midnight supper. Admission is free to all Civic Association members and non-members may join at the door. Interest in the elections centers on the Board of Directors with twelve candidates running for eleven positions so that the burning question to be answered is who will be the even man out? There is no contest for president, recording secretary and financial secretary, no candidates having filed. Irving Reinhardt for Vice-President and Robert Miller for Treasurer are unopposed.

Directly the new Board of Directors takes office it will be confronted with the problem of choosing a president. Ordinarily, according to the constitution, the vice-president becomes president. However, indications are that the vice president wishes to be vice president so that the new president will have to be chosen by secret ballot from the Board of Directors.

A proposal to close the entrance from the Expressway exit to Rockland Drive will be voted on by members of West Birchwood Civic Assoc. on Saturday night Nov. 5th at the Robert Seaman School. The result of this referendum will be forwarded to Austin M. Saar, N. Y. S. D. P. W. District Engineer for immediate action. Mr. Saar has indicated to the West Birchwood News that he will abide by the decision of the community.

Although the entrance problem to West Birchwood has been mitigated by the hasty construction of a median divider the situation is still dangerous. Existing traffic frequently uses the West Birchwood exit to reach Broadway thus running the risk of collision with vehicles headed for Rockland Drive.

Since the entrance problem became acute on Oct. 8th when the expressway was opened to Broadway, Councilman Edward Poulos has been working to alleviate the dangerous situation. Following his investigation of the traffic pattern here, the Chief of police of Nassau County inspected the chaotic condition at Broadway and forthwith stationed two policemen on 24 hour duty to direct traffic at Broadway and at the entrance to Rockland Drive from the Expressway exit.

Acting on a recommendation by a West Birchwood Civic Association committee Mr. Poulos had no parking signs placed opposite the real estate office and the model house on Rockland Drive thus minimizing danger of accidents at that turn.

Both Mr. Poulos and TOB Engineer Horace McAllister have been in touch with State Department of Public Works officials as has Assemblyman Edwin J. Feenbach. A survey by the Nassau Police Traffic Division was underway to determine the feasibility of installing another traffic light at Broadway for the West Birchwood traffic. In addition, the State Traffic Commission is also making a survey.

In the event the median divider is extended to close off the entrance to Rockland Drive, West Birchwood traffic will exit from the expressway, turn right on Broadway, head south to the next turn, head back north and make a left turn onto the West Birchwood entering lane off Broadway.

## The Electoral College

By RALPH DIAMOND

On Nov. 8th we will be voting for a new President of the United States. Many of us have forgotten that technically we do not actually vote for the candidate himself but rather for a group of State Representatives. This fact has escaped many of us since studying American history in school. When we vote in the Presidential election we are, in effect, voting for State Representatives called Electors, who are pledged to vote for a particular Candidate. For this reason, a President elected a winner by popular vote, is not "officially elected" until the Electors meet and cast their ballots. Each State has as many Electors as it has U. S. Senators and Members of the House of Representatives, including 3 Electoral votes each for Alaska and Hawaii, there are a total of 537 Electoral votes, 269 of which are needed to win the election. On the first Monday after the 2nd Wednesday in December, the Electors vote in their respective

State Capital. Although the Electors generally follow the will of the people, there have been times when the Electoral vote differed from the popular vote. The votes of the Electors, certified by the States, are sent to Congress where the President of the Senate opens the certificates and has them counted in the presence of both Houses on January 8th.

If no candidate has a majority, the President is elected by the House of Representatives from the three highest candidates. In the event that no Vice-Presidential candidate receives a majority of the votes, the election goes to the Senate. The President's term of office ends and the President-elect's term begins at noon January 20th.

It is the intention of this writer, additional articles concerning little-known or forgotten facts about Presidential elections. This will be continued up to the time of election.
