Senator John F. Kennedy Democratic candidate for president, will appear at a rally this Saturday, Nov. 5, at 2:15 p.m. at Roosevelt Field Shopping Centre. Ed Morris, Hicksville Democratic leader, announced that any residents wishing to participate in Hicksville's motorcade to the shopping field can meet in front of Democratic Headquarters at West Nicholas St., Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

### Pynchon Predicts GOP Victory; 50,000 Greet Ike and Nixon

Thomas R. Pynchon, Town of Oyster Bay Republican Leader, today predicted the township will remain solidly in the Republican ranks on Nov. 8th, following a check with his executive leaders in the communities of the Township, but warned victory will require the total effort of all volunteers, committeemen and enrolled party members to get the 140,000 qualified voters to the polls.

Active campaigning in local communities and the county by President Eisenhower, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller has "tremendously stimulated" the interest of voters and provided a "vast encouragement" to the hard working Republican organization of the Township, Pynchon said.

A police-estimated cheering crowd of 50,000 was present early yesterday (Wed.) morning at Roosevelt Field Shopping Centre to greet the President and his party as they made a spectacular arrival in a fleet of six helicopters and after a major address by Eisenhower and Nixon, flew over to Westchester and thence to New York City for a ticker-tape parade.

"The people of our township know about good, responsible Republican government as practiced day in and day out by our Town and County officials and by our most excellent representatives in the State Legislature and the halls of Congress," Pynchon added. "Experience, progress and leadership are not empty campaign slogans, in our town they are living doctrines which cannot be smothered by scabulous, hollow promises by the opposition. Performance and experience count heavily and, in my opinion, is the decisive factor in this important election."

In the 1956 Presidential Election, when there were 118 Election Districts in the Town of Oyster Bay (compared with 155 this election), President Eisenhower received 71,223 ballots while the Democrats polled 27,820 and the Liberals 1,775.

The 1960 party enrollments, prior to the addition of 32,257 new registrants, showed 65,239 Republicans and 32,040 Democrats.

### Morris Sees Demo Victory

Edward J. Morris, Hicksville Democratic leader, predicted that Hicksville would go solidly Democratic in this year's election.

Speaking at a final "Get Out The Vote" meeting, Morris said: "all committeemen and block captains have done a magnificent job in their districts this year collecting campaign funds; registering 4,500 potential democrats, distributing literature and talking to the voters. They have reported back to me that the people are responding to the vigorous and forward moving philosophy of our party and the outstanding qualifications of its candidates. I am confident that intelligent republicans and independents will see the need to end one party rule in this county by voting row B on Nov. 8."

### Baseball Assoc Organizes

The establishment of the Hicksville Baseball Assoc. Inc., generally been accepted as a major step toward the continued growth of the Baseball programs in Hicksville.

The Hicksville Baseball Assoc. will be the parent coordinating organization designed to support the Hicksville National Little League, The Hicksville Babe Ruth League and Hicksville Conale Mack League.

Beginning this year, the boys and their parents will register with the HBA, and the boys shall have an opportunity to play baseball from the time they are 8-years old through their 18th birthday.

Parents shall be urged to join the association and expend their efforts toward all the leagues involved.

The need for the Assoc. became evident as it was noticed that as boys graduated from Little League, they and their parents lose interest in Baseball; so that

boys from the age of 13 to 18 are all but neglected. Also there are so few adults and interested spectators in the older boys activities, it was felt that an organization was needed that would maintain continued interest in all the baseball programs for boys of all ages.

Following examples set by Garden City, Oceanside and other nearby communities who have formed similar alliances, the Hicksville Baseball Assoc. hopes to achieve the same success in retaining the interest of the boys their parents, and sponsors for a full baseball program.

A strong right arm of the Assoc. is the women's auxiliary whose membership is now comprised of interested Mothers with boys playing in all the leagues. They are engaged in fund raising and generally assisting in the support of the Association and leagues. The Women's Auxiliary meetings are

Nothing could be further from the truth. As the Party has grown in voting strength, so has the integrity and intelligence of its leadership, a not uncommon phenomenon in the annals of American democracy.

### 'SHOVEL BRIGADE'

TO THE EDITOR  
 According to figures just released by School Superintendent Lamb Hicksville elementary school enrollment is down substantially below last year and below the projected "McCormick" figures utilized last year by the School Board in promoting the referendum for an additional elementary school.

The decrease in enrollment is due obviously to the occupancy this year of two new parochial school buildings, as predicted by those opposed to the referendum.

The figures now available can be interpreted as a factual indictment of the School Board and Superintendent. The projected enrollment figures given to the public at the time of the referendum did not allow for the expected decrease due to parochial school construction in the District although the School Board and the Superintendent had that information. These figures also prove conclusively once and for all that Hicksville now has available at least 475 seats in new parochial schools. These will be available from now on in, and will correspondingly reduce the public school enrollments in years to come. To that number will be added in the near future about 300 seats

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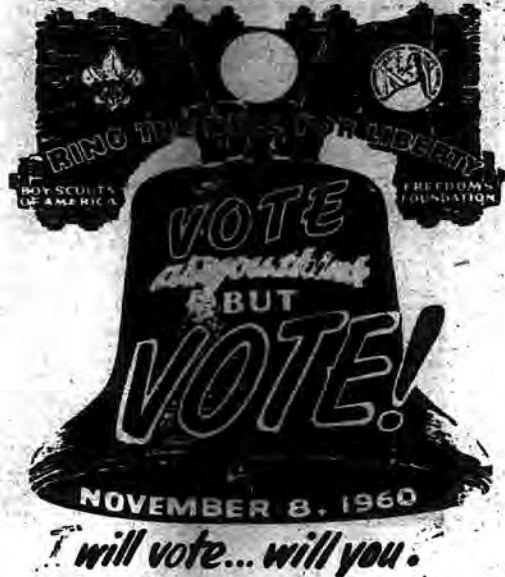

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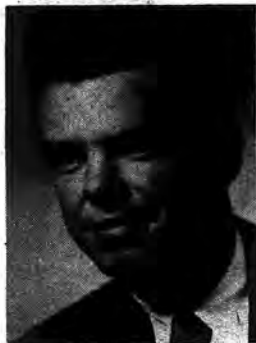

## EDITORIAL: A Program for the Future

We are delighted to felicitate the new officers and directors of our Civic Assoc. and wish them well. We applaud their awareness of the problems still besetting our fast growing community, as evidenced by their willingness to serve.

These problems are twofold. The primary ones are community-wide. The secondary ones, while important to those concerned, are certain to be resolved within a relatively short time. The number one community problem, to coin a phrase from our accounting friends, is whether we are to remain with a single entry or can we get a double entry from Broadway to West Birchwood? A singular feature of Messrs. Sosnow and Schwartz' community planning is the Rockland Drive access to the outside world. Such insularity, while desirable in some respects, could prove to be an Achilles heel in the event of a mishap which resulted in blocking us off from Broadway for a protracted length of time.

The urgency of the situation demands the immediate attention of the new Board of Directors with a view towards obtaining from the Town of Oyster Bay a pledge of cooperation to the end that we may obtain another entry to Broadway, with adequate traffic control. We believe this project ought to have top priority on the schedule for community improvements next year.

Problem number two is the question of the overpass to Robert Seaman School. We realize that the State is taking measures to provide a safe overpass with protective railings and adequate lighting. But is this sufficient? In our opinion a completely enclosed overpass would be the only true safe passageway for use by our children.

Both State and Town have disclaimed responsibility for construction of an access road and Messrs. Sosnow and Schwartz have been reluctant to confide their plans to the Town or the School Board or our Civic Assoc.

The construction of a sidewalk to connect the overpass with Sullivan Drive at Essex Place has been promised, according to the School Board. But who will be responsible for maintenance, lighting, safety precautions? These questions should be answered to the satisfaction of the Civic Assoc. before we permit our children to use the overpass.

Street lighting and stop signs for the newer sections will be the concern of the new Board of Directors and members from the newer sections will undoubtedly press for quick dedication of their streets. It would be admirable on their part to stimulate their civic minded constituents to work thru the Community Welfare Committee towards such a rewarding objective.

A sampling of future projects for the attention of the new Board reveals the need for a concerted effort to obtain new members for the Civic Assoc. A wary eye must be kept on any proposals to downzone vacant land in West Birchwood and as our children grow older there is a definite need for planned community activities for our youngsters and teenagers.

We wish to extend the appreciation of the Editors and the entire Civic Assoc. to David Serko who has given much time and effort to further the cause and growth of this organization. This appreciation is also extended to all other outgoing members of the Board.

The new officers and Board deserve the wholehearted support of all members.

## Gardener Suburban

By the time this column reaches your home it will be November. Many of you may think that it is time to give up your gardening but November could be a very important month on your gardening calendar. The following are chores that should be attended to before you hibernate for the winter.

1. Fertilize your lawn, especially if you have reseeded it and have young seedling up, or if you have an established lawn and have not fed it in the past eight weeks. You will find that by doing so, your lawn will remain green long into the winter, besides the fact that late fall fertilizing encourages a strong root system.
2. Grub proof your lawn with chlordane or dieldrin. 3. Cut your lawn as long as there is something to cut. Never leave your lawn long in the winter as this encourages fungus growths. 4. If you have any intentions of planting spring flowering bulbs such as tulips, hyacinths, daffodils, etc., you may still do so. It's not too late.
5. If you own any type of spruce and it looks brown on the inside you may have spruce gall aphids. As a precaution, spray the entire plant with malathion to check infestation. 6. Any plants that have been planted less than a year or any shrub beds that have not been mulched as yet, should be done. Preferably with peat moss. Many homeowners like to pile grass clippings in their shrub beds. Personally I don't, as this can sometimes produce an undesirable odor. 7. Last and most important. Many of you who have had plants planted recently or many of you have gone through the winter have noticed considerable damage to your shrubs caused primarily by strong winter winds. This damage is done mostly to Hex, holly, hemlock, azaleas, and rhododendrons. This damage can be cut down tremendously by the use of a product called Wilt Proof which can be bought at most garden

centers. This product extensively by nurserymen but is now being promoted for use by the homeowner. When sprayed on your shrubs, Wilt Proof puts a transparent coating on them, thus protecting them from winter winds. You will find a small investment in this product may save an expensive shrub that could otherwise perish.
