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Four Banks Report:

Christmas Checks Total \$1,272,320

A record-breaking million and a quarter dollars plus was distributed in the past week by Mid Island banking institutions to about 15,000 Christmas Club members, the Mid Island HERALD learned today. The local total was \$1,272,320.32.

The Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, with three offices in Hicksville, three in Plainview and one in Bethpage, again topped the number of club memberships and amount distributed. The LI National mailed out checks to 10,218 club members for a total of \$953,030, according to President William E. Koutensky.

Walter E. Van der Waag, president of the Meadow Brook National Bank, revealed that the Hicksville and Jericho offices mailed out checks totalling \$234,265. He noted that the average check, considering the 41,960 sent to members of the Christmas Club at all offices, average \$122.50 per check or a gain or more than \$8 per check over those mailed by his bank last year.

The Hicksville office of the Central Federal Savings and Loan Assoc., according to Peter Amaroso, manager, mailed out \$164,025.32 to about 1200 members of the Christmas Club plan.

The newly-established Jericho office of the Franklin National Bank sent out \$21,000 this season.

Bankers agreed that the release of the Christmas Club checks would be an asset to the local economy. National statistics show that the majority of the money received on Christmas Clubs is used to pay outstanding obligations, real estate taxes and other obligations with a fraction of the total actually spent for Christmas shopping.

Lamb, superintendent of schools, met late yesterday (Wed) afternoon with the Board of Nassau County Community College on the plan for establishment of a college in Hicksville. About a half hour was spent in discussion with nine members and other officials of the Nassau Community College Board who promised to consider the Hicksville plan and to make a recommendation to Nassau County Executive A. Holly Patterson.

Dr. Lamb told the HERALD last night that the announced plans for a 20,000-student state university on LI would have no effect upon the need for additional community colleges on the island such as the one proposed and requested for Hicksville.

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BETWEEN DEADLINES



We would like to suggest that the traffic circle (or oval, if you like) recently created north of the RR station where Bway and Jerusalem Ave. come together be designated by name. We go further and propose that it be named the Curtis Circle in honor of Elwood A. Curtis, DDS, who labored long and untiringly in the community interest.

We were struck by the fact, over the weekend, during a trip in to Richmond Hill that a tiny traffic divider off Liberty Ave. which occupies less than 100 square feet was clearly marked as a triangle honoring someone (we suspect a local resident who fell in World War II).

For us the memory of Dr. Curtis is strong and vivid. He worked hard to make Hicksville the kind of community we would like to see it. He left the earthly scene a few years ago and today there are few to whom his name means a great deal, if anything. His next of kin no longer lives in the community. But we were always struck by the fact that in his civic efforts, he was always careful to give recognition to those who went before and built as they went. We think it would be only fitting and proper that his name and memory be preserved.

Expressions of opinion from readers on this would be appreciated and might assist in convincing the State of New York that such a designation of the area would be appropriate.

Graduates Hunt for Colleges

Each year our graduates have a more difficult time finding a college with enough classroom seats to accommodate them. This year the hunt has extended to all parts of the United States. Members of the Hicksville High School Class of 1960 were finally accepted in such far-away places as California, Colorado, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Florida, Georgia, Alabama and Wisconsin. About the only hope for many of our graduates to go to college is that the Nassau County Community College plans will proceed rapidly enough to accommodate them. A community college in Hicksville is needed urgently.

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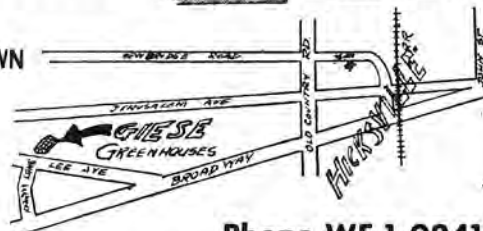

County Tax Rate To Climb

The proposed Nassau County budget for 1961, resulting in a tax levy of \$51,380,094., was filed at the close of the business day in Mineola, Monday, and calls for a county tax rate in 1961 of \$1.596 per each \$100. of assessed valuation. This is an increase of 16 cents over the current rate.

Total expenditures in the estimates filed with Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, Edward J. Rock, are \$78,824,610. This is an increase of \$5,990,671, detailed in the 31-page annual budget message of the County Executive. The hearing is set for Nov. 30 at 11 A.M.

"More public installations have been built in the past eight years than in any period of the County's history," Passmore writes in his message to the Board of Supervisors. "I believe that the past eight years of expansion... have taken us over the peak of our public building activity..."

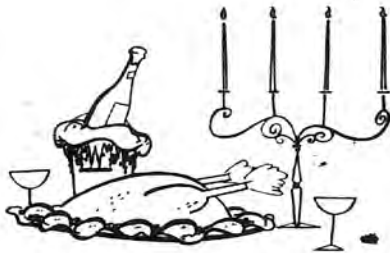

On the campus of Oswego Teachers College several years ago a cocky recently returned veteran approached a freshman and asked her for a cigarette. When she replied that she didn't smoke, he remarked disdainfully, "So what good are you?"

The young girl's reaction to this being exactly as you might think it would be, these two went through three years of college together exchanging nary a word. When they were both about to graduate he again approached her...this time for a date. She relented, and in five days she was pinned and engaged, and they were both preparing for their marriage which took place on their Christmas vacation of that same year. Thus started a team which has been working together for nine years now...most recently for the betterment of our new community: THE CARINS...Terry and Art (Dr. Arthur as he is known by some).

Those wondering what this "Togetherness Bit" is all about might well take a look at this young couple who have spent the past decade in the pursuit of education...of themselves, other teachers, and most important...the proper education of the young.

Art was born in Brooklyn and attended Brooklyn Tech for four years, and Terry, a Bronx girl, attended Evander Childs High School before their lives merged at the State University of New York in Oswego. A traffic light will be installed at the intersection of Rockland Dr. and the Expressway in the very near future, Austin J. Saar, local district engineer of the N. Y. State D. P. W., told the WEST BIRCHWOOD NEWS this week.

"We have reviewed the situation at the entrance to Broadway and decided that the installation of a three phased traffic light would be impractical and would cause traffic tie-ups", said Mr. Saar. "We have decided therefore to remove the median divider and install a traffic light at the intersection of Rockland Dr. and the Expressway exit."

Mr. Saar also said that no change in the pedestrian overpass would be made as this is a standard overpass used in the entire district. He pointed out that the four-foot height of the railings is the same height as the overpass at Broadway and that there has been no accidents concerning children at this overpass or any of the other overpasses along the Expressway. He said his department is not in a financial position to change specifications which have already been approved. All overpasses must conform to approved specifications.

Board Pushes Action on Area Problems

West Birchwood's new Civic Administration took up a variety of community problems at two recent meetings of the Board of Directors. At the Nov. 14th meeting, the Board discussed the overpass situation, the entrance problem and the membership campaign. President Herbert Simms conducted.

Irving Reinhardt stated that there were approximately 45 newly arrived residents who were not yet members and assigned names to the various Board members who were to contact these residents.

Arthur Carin moved that the Assoc. go on record with letters to all officials recommending safety changes at the overpass, Irving Reinhardt attempted to amend the motion to provide for a study of legal action to prepare an injunction against the school board to prohibit the discontinuance of bus service if the overpass was not considered safe. The amendment was not accepted and the motion was withdrawn.

Sam Gordon moved that the Board go to the next meeting of the School Board to voice our objections to the overpass, namely that curbs along the walk were necessary, fences along the walk, enclosure of overpass and adequate lighting and maintenance provisions. The block captains will contact residents and ask them to attend meeting. Motion was passed unanimously.

The Directors unanimously passed a motion to congratulate the Little Theatre group for their prize winning performance in the Jericho Scholarship Pund Show.

the fact that their joint endeavor was written up in the New York Times. Any marriage which can stay together under such circumstances is a strong one, indeed!

The Carus bought their first of many houses the next year, in Plainville. Terry taught in the Hicksville Elementary School, and Art was still in Great Neck. Right about this time Art was wooed into making the trek to Utah, where he was offered a job as instructor in the Dept. of Education. Altho Terry was initially against the move to Utah (after all, she had just about hung the curtains in their new home when it was time to move out) she made the important decision that "Where my husband goes...there I go!"...and before long they were living in another new home in Salt Lake City. Here Art taught full time during the day while working toward his doctorate. Terry distinguished herself at the age of 24 by becoming an instructor at the University of Utah Demonstration School, instructing teachers how to teach first grade students. She conducted a class, and other teachers came to observe and learn her teaching methods. When their first little girl Jill was born in 1956 Terry retired and Art continued teaching and working towards his doctorate, which he received in three years...and they made their plans to return home.

Terry and Art speak often of the good times they enjoyed in Salt Lake City, and of the many wonderful friends they made among the Mormons. They found them to be friendly, industrious, wholesome people who were completely devoted to their home and family. Altho they believed in large families (it was not surprising to see six or eight children in one family) the Mormon women baked their own bread, did their own housework, and still found time for communal entertainment.

Art sent Terry back home from Salt Lake City by plane with the instructions "Buy us a house!"...and in one week Terry bought two, their present home in West Birchwood, and a house in Levittown in

which they were to live until their Birchwood home was completed. Terry swears that they are not going to move to another house, and they are now in the midst of decorating their ranch home on Richmond Ave.

The reason Art wanted to break into college teaching (he is now an Assistant Professor in the Education Dept. at Queens College) was two-fold: it is more challenging to instruct teachers, and it allows for more freedom of time. For a quick run-down on what he does with his free time...he is:

Writing a book on science for the elementary school teacher dealing with methods used to teach science to elementary school children from kindergarten and up.

Curriculum Coordinator for the Portchester, N.Y. public schools where he goes one day each week and works with the school superintendents to improve the performance of the principals and the teachers. He is also working there on an over-all plan for coordinating a science program from kindergarten to high school.

Conducting a Science Workshop for nursery school teachers in Huntington to help them develop methods of science instruction for 3-5 year olds.

Teaching a Science Workshop in New Hyde Park for elementary school teachers.

...and lest he get lazy, he will conduct a Science Workshop for elementary school teachers at Adelphi College in February.

For many years Art has felt strongly about the importance of the teaching of science, and now that he is teaching at a college level he feels it is even more important... especially since the advent of the Sputnik. He firmly believes that all children from nursery school on are naturally interested in science. Whether it be in nature study, their own anatomy or take-apart toys... they are naturally inquisitive and can be taught about science at a very early age.

The Carim's second daughter, Amy, was born in 1958, three weeks after they had moved to their temporary quarters in Levittown. Perhaps because she was confined to the house so much at this time Terry never felt that she was a member

of that community. When she moved here last July she lost no time in getting out and becoming a very active member of West Birchwood. She joined the Social Committee the night after they moved in (she has been its chairman since last February), she is a member of ORT and she and Art joined the Education Committee before they moved into their home. Art has been chairman of the Education Committee for a year now. He was Chairman of the Lay Advisory Planning Committee for the Cantuague School, and is a member of the Joint Education Committee (made up of four Jericho Civic Association members coordinating all educational problems for the entire Jericho School district). He is also a member of the Library Committee and is presently running for the Board of Directors of the West Birchwood Civic Assoc.

It is not surprising that from time to time Art has been asked by many of the residents of West Birchwood to consider running for the Board of Education. He has not decided whether to seek this office, but recently a move has begun to urge him to enter his name for the May School Board election.

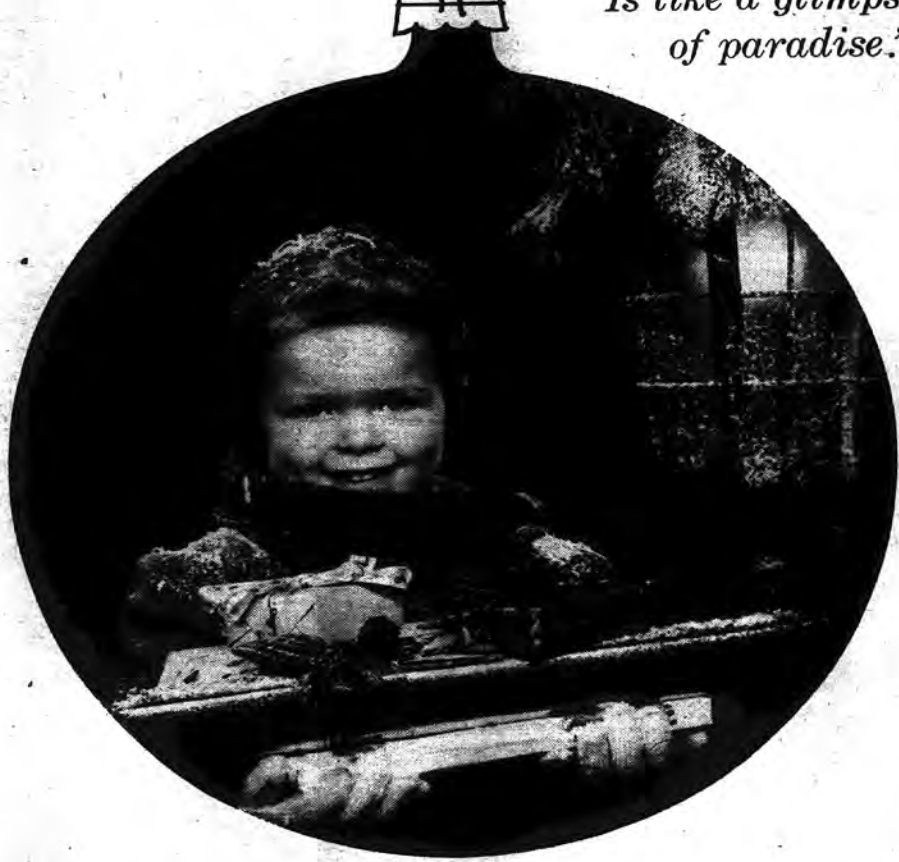

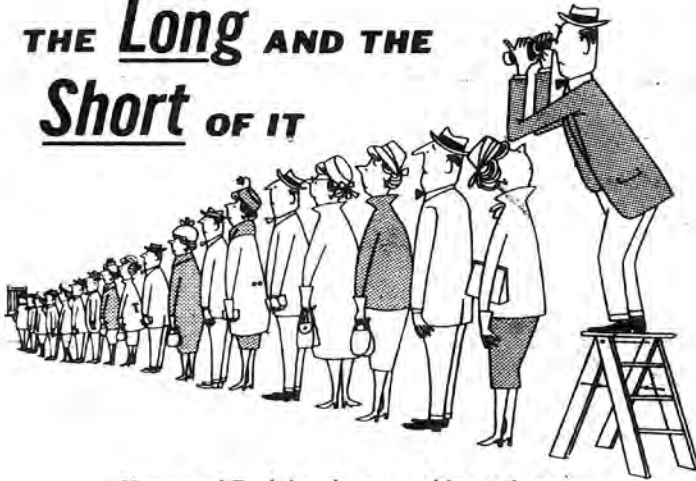
