# **Christmas Checks** Total \$1,272,320

A record-breaking million and a quarter dollars plus was distributed in the past week by Mid Island banking institutions to about 15,000 Christmas Club members, the Mid Island HERALD learned today. The local total

The Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, with three offices in Hicksville, three in Plainview and one in Bethpage, again topped the number of club memberships and amount distributed. The LI National mailed out checks to 10,218 club members for a total of \$953,-

our checks to 10,218 club members for a total of \$953,030, according to President William E. Koutensky.
Walter E. Van der Waag, president of the Meadow
Brook National Bank, revealed that the Hicksville and
Jericho offices mailed out checks totalling \$234,265.
He noted that the average check, considering the 41,960
hant to members of the Christmas Club at all offices,
average \$122.50 per check or a gain or more than \$8
per check over those mailed by his bank last year.

The Hicksville office of the Central Federal Savings
and Lorn Assoc. according to Peter American

and Loan Assoc., according to Peter Amaroso, manager, mailed out \$164,025.32 to about 1200 members of the Christmas Club plan.

Bankers agreed that the release of the Christmas Club checks would be an asset to the local economy. National statistics show that the majority of the money received on Christmas Clubs is used to pay outstanding obligations, real estate taxes and other obligations with a fraction of the total actually spent for Christmas shopping.




