Voters Approved Year Ago:

School Dist Waits Out Appeal Period

The Hicksville School District construction program may be able to get started, after a full year of delay due to litigation, unless notice of an appeal is served upon the District within the next seven days. The voters of Hicksville a year ago Nov. 19 approved a \$2 million program which has been delayed thru court action brought by a former Board member and others.

Supreme Court Justice Mario Pitoni recently ruled on the final phase of the case and dismissed the complaint of Emil J. Szendy, Harry Goebel and others. The period in which notice of a proposed appeal can be filed will expire on Nov. 30. In the meantime, the Board of Education has been powerless to act upon the authority given by the voters to undertake a five-part inter-related program.

Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, Superintendent of schools, in a bulletin to parents of the District, last week noted "a year has passed since the voters approved the construction of much-needed permanent school facilities and the moving and reconstruction of the temporaries. Both the Board of Education and the Administration have done all in their power to carry out the wishes of the voters as expressed in the Nov. 19 referendum. We are all aware of the urgency of the situation. Nothing that has happened in the past year has made the additional construction any less urgent."

"In fact," he wrote, "the pupil congestion that presently exists is bringing home to us more and more the educational loss which results from crowded classrooms and shortened sessions."

Dr. Lamb pointed out that Dr.

Felix J. McCormick's long-range forecasts of needed facilities in Hicksville District "have been amazingly accurate." His projection for the current year was a little off, Lamb reported, because the expert had anticipated elementary parochial school expansion would not be felt until 1963. Actually, parochial schools were ready to absorb students this year almost three years earlier than Dr. McCormick had estimated back in 1958. However, the net effect is still the same. By 1963 the District will have all the 14,315 pupils Dr. McCormick forecast for the public school system.

Dr. Lamb also pointed out that the requirements for additional permanent construction is just as urgent as was forecast in the past. He also warned that an "extremely serious situation will be evidenced at the senior high school unless additional temporaries are moved and reconstructed there."

"We have done all that can be done to maintain an excellent secondary school program under adverse building conditions. We shall continue to strive to maintain these standards. But it is our hope that a way will be found soon for us to proceed with the building program which the taxpayers approved so overwhelmingly a year ago."

Harold Manaske, currently chairman of the Board of Commissioners, is concluding his first 5-year term as a commissioner. Cono Brigandi, better known as "Nick", is making his third attempt to win election. He first ran in 1957 and tried again in 1958. Last year he stayed out of the race but is back for his third attempt this year.

Manaske, a LI Lighting Co. manager in accounting, has been a Hicksville resident for 30 years. He has been a volunteer fireman for 17 years and is former captain of Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1. He has been active in civic, athletic and youth affairs in the community.

Brigandi, in the trucking business in New York for 30 years, has been a member of the fire dept. for 17 years and a Hicksville resident for 25 years.

Fire District Elects on Dec 6

Each year we are called upon to vote for any number of people to fill various public offices. The recent presidential contest is so fresh in our minds that its prelude and its aftermath overshadow a local election. However, within a period of two weeks, you will be called upon to choose the men who will handle the affairs of the Jericho Fire District. On Dec. 6, three seats on the Board of Fire Commissioners must be filled. The first, that of the incumbent, Roy Van Nostrand, is for a five year term. The second, that of Mr. Dalton, for an unexpired term of three years, and the third, that of Mr. Stewart, for an unexpired term of two years.

Harold Smith, Chairman of the Board, explained that Mr. Dalton and Mr. Stewart resigned approximately a year ago because one was moving out of the District and the other did not have the time to devote to the job. They were replaced, by appointment, Felix Franco, a man with ten years of Fire Dept. experience, and Samuel Tuscano, who helped to organize the Fire Dept., and has had about 20 years of fire fighting experience were appointed to fill the vacancies.

On Monday night, when the VILLAGER was "put to bed", these were the only three men who had filed petitions, but four days still remain before the deadline for filing. Indications are that there may be more petitions. Obviously, it would be foolish to urge you to vote if there were only three jobs with three applicants. I bring this election to your attention because the possibility of a contest does exist. If there is one we must all be aware of the importance of the Board of Fire Commissioners to our community, and we must all exercise an intelligent vote.

It is the Board of Fire Commissioners which determines the performance standards of the officers and men of the Fire Company. The senior officer, at any fire, determines the manner in which the fire will be fought. This places the safety of ourselves, your family and your property directly in his hands. Your safety becomes dependent upon his capability. The Board of Fire Commissioners determine whether or not to have qualifying examinations for each level of responsibility and are the ones who actually supervise and see to the maintenance of high standards.

The Board of Fire Commissioners hold the purse strings of the Fire District. They prepare the budget and are responsible for the purchase of adequate equipment for the district. Some members of the Fire Dept. vehemently oppose the use of the firehouse by any organization other than the firemen. Most of you are members of one or more organizations (a safe statement in Birchwood) and have made use of the beautiful meeting room and kitchen. It is up to the Board of Fire Commissioners who vote on whether or not an organization may use the Firehouse facilities.

The past record of our Fire Dept. has been good. Most of the men are conscientious and hard working. They deserve the beautiful clubhouse and the support of the community. There are those, however, who make use of the comforts and conveniences of the Firehouse, but who do not maintain

Backstage Review

We must confess, proudly if you please, that this reviewer is unashamedly biased and partial — with a predisposition to do little else than laud the Jericho Player's production of "THE TENDER TRAP". We concede that some faults may have been apparent to critical eyes and ears. There may have been a lack of professional gloss and glitter. We concede this and nothing more, for we call "THE TENDER TRAP" as the finest production the Jericho Players of the Birchwood Civic Association have ever put on the boards.

For two months, we have had the opportunity to take a small part in the exhaustive preparation and rehearsal that preceded two smash performances. From casting call to curtain call, we watched director Sully Michaels work with a deft hand — adding his own "bits of business" — to create a believable illusion on the stage. His fast, working no less hard than the players to bring their characters a convincing and irrefutable believability their amateur standing. Howie Thomas' "Charlie Reader" and Adolph Lovler's "Joe McCall" complemented each other perfectly. Betty Goldstein's "Sylvia Crews" was "class A, script distilled...". Carolyn Harpelle's "Julie" (or is it the other way around?). When "red-blooded American male" wouldn't have evaded Howie as he was pursued by Blanche Karpel and Beverly Bogen in their parts as "Poppy Matson" and "Jessica Collins". We'll never smooch again without thinking of grumpy, pill-testing "Earl Lockpilot" as played by Marvin Shapiro. And Jerry Neuhauer "Sol Schwartz" has permanently replaced Tommy Dorsey as our all time favorite trombone; Jerry will never blow a sweeter note than he played in "THE TENDER TRAP" third act.

The play demands a bright and glittering pace maintained by the dialogue alone, since it is not a play of action. The cast was latter perfect and each character established an immediate rapport as he or she entered the stage. The players could have easily become trapped in their long conversation (Continued on Page 6)

In brief, the Jericho Education Committee feels that, although the present schedule of starting salaries is adequate, the schedule of maximum salaries is not. The result of this situation is that experienced teachers are not attracted to the Jericho School District, and its present teachers tend to leave as the gain experience. (The report with all details is printed elsewhere in this issue of THE VILLAGER)

The Town Planning Committee is busy at work planning entrance gates for our community. Milton Bagley, Chairman, gave a detailed illustrated report on the unique problem of placing gates at the Broadway-Birchwood Park Drive entrance. He expects to bring specific recommendations to the Board of Directors at its next meeting in December, at which time concrete action can be taken.

Recommend Teacher Salary Boost

By JOE GENUA

At the October meeting of the Jericho Education Committee, the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho the motion was passed that a study be made of the teacher salary schedule with a view to making suggestions for revising the schedule for the school year 1961-1962. The following is a brief summary presented at the November meeting.

(The information in this report is based on "Teacher Salary Schedules for 1961-1962, New York City Metropolitan Area," a booklet printed by the New York State Teachers Assoc., Albany. The object of this report is to compare the salary schedules of Jericho's teachers with those of teachers of the rest of Nassau County.)

MINIMUM SALARY WITH BACHELOR DEGREE. In this category Jericho pays \$4800.00. There are only eleven schools with a

higher salary and 41 schools with a lower salary. The highest starting salary is \$5,000. (Long Beach and Roslyn). The lowest starting salary is \$4,400 (Plainedge and Levittown). In this category Jericho is close to the highest.

MAXIMUM SALARY WITH BACHELOR'S DEGREE. From a starting salary of \$4800 Jericho's teachers in this category reach a maximum salary of \$7950. There are 44 schools with higher maximum salaries and only nine with lower maximums. The highest salary in this category is \$9050 (Hicksville) and the lowest is \$7400 (Port Washington). With respect to Bachelor's maximum salary Jericho is close to the lowest.

MINIMUM SALARY WITH MASTER'S DEGREE. In Jericho the minimum salary with M.A. is \$5200. There are 13 schools with higher starting pay in this category, and 41 with lower. The highest is \$5400 (Long Beach) and the lowest is \$4700 (Levittown Plainedge). In this category Jericho is close to the highest.

MAXIMUM SALARY WITH MASTER'S DEGREE. From a starting salary of \$5200, Jericho's teachers with master's degrees reach a maximum of \$8850. There are 46 schools which reach a higher maximum in this category while only five reach a lower maximum. The highest is \$9900 (Lawrence) and the lowest is \$8500 (Island Trees). In this category Jericho is close to the lowest.

After a long discussion of the above report, the following recommendations were made:

1. To increase the maximum salary for teachers with a Master's or Bachelor's degree.

2. To add new salary schedules for teachers who have earned ten credits above the Master's or Bachelor's degree.

3. To add a new salary schedule for teachers with fifteen credits above the Bachelor's degree.

a) That subdivision 21 (a) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law applies to the acquisition of said real property, and that the period of probable usefulness thereof is thirty years;

b) That subdivision 19 of said paragraph and Section applies to the original improvement and embellishment of said real property for park and recreation purposes, and that the period of probable usefulness thereof is ten years;

c) That the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years; and

d) That pursuant to item (i) of subdivision 3 of paragraph d of Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, no down payment is required in connection with the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation thereof.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable. There shall annually be assessed upon all the taxable real property in said Hicksville Park District at the same time and in the same manner as other town charges an amount sufficient to pay said principal and interest as the same become due and payable, but if not paid from such source, all the taxable real property within said Town shall be subject to the levy of ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds and the same shall become due.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law,
