



Hicksville will get a complete, packaged 200-bed emergency haspital sometime next month, according to Col. Louis M. Merrick, Nassau Civil Defense Director, The CD haspital "package" which weighs 24,000 lbs. will be stored without charge in the delivery tunnel under Mid Island Shopping Plaza, ready for use when needed.

The Federal CD unit is valued at \$23,000 and includes X-ray and operating equipment, gasoline-powered gen-erator, necessary medical supplies and 200 cots. Train-ing of local volunteer personnel for the CD hospital in continuing all the time.

height. This is a specious argument, for nowhere else on the Expressway is there an overpass built for the exclusive use of children; Furthermore, assuming a daily use by 400 children, we get a minimum of 1,000 passages every day with its attendant possibilities of incidents.

every day with its attendant possibilities of incidents. The fact is that the present setup of the overpass con-stitutes an attractive nuisance. The possibility of "drag" bicycle races cannot be ruled out; kids have been seen racing bikes over the overpass. Children have been caught throwing stones on the Expressway. A six foot guard railing would discourage such vandalism. As for the so-called asphalt foot paths leading to the overpass, it is utterly ridiculous to expect young children to use the path in complete safety without some type of constant supervision. And with the State and Town seemingly unable to figure out their roles in this matter
