## Manaskie Friends Cite Fire Bd Achievements

Friends and neighbors urging the re-election of Harold Manaskie of 13 North Dr. as a commissioner of Hicksville Fire District next Tuesday evening, Dec. 6, noted today that during his first term of office the tax rate of the District has progressively declined. During 1960, with the rate at 16.5 cents per \$100, it was the third lowest fire rate in Nassau County.

Voting takes place Tuesday night at the E. Marie St. Firehouse from 7 to 10 PM. No advance voter registration is required. Manaskie, candidate for re-election, is currently chairman of the Fire Board. He is opposed by Cono Briganti of 12 Bay Ave., who has unsuccessfully run for office twice before.

The announcement from supporters of Manaskie pointed out that the tax rate was 22.3 cents in 1956, dropping down 5.8 cents to 16.5 cents in 1960. During this same period, two new branch fire stations were completed at Strong St and Briggs St. An addition to the Strong St. station was also built.

At the same time, two new pumper trucks were put into service, two more are on order plus a new light truck and a new aerial

ladder truck. With the delivery of this equipment, all obsolete fire-fighting equipment in the district is being replaced.

It was also pointed out that during the same interval, the volunteer fire fighting force was increased from five to seven companies.

## Give Notice of Appeal Intent

Hicksville Board of Education will get a report tomorrow (Fri.) night from Michael J. Sullivan, school attorney, on the latest development in the taxpayers' action brought by Emil J. Szendy, Harry Goebel and others seeking to void a school building program approved by the voters of the community over a year ago. The School Board meets in the high school teachers' lounge at 8:15 PM.

Goebel, as attorney for Mr. and Mrs. Szendy and four other couples, served "notice of appeal" on the School Attorney on Friday, Nov. 25, about five days short of the expiration of the appeal period. While it is anticipated that actual

prosecution of the appeal from the recent decision of Supreme Court Justice Mario Pittoni in favor of the School District could take about 12 months, it is reported that the School Board will seek to force prompt action in view of the urgent need for the facilities encompassed in the voter-authorized two-million-dollar building program.

Szendy this week in an "open letter" to the School Board made no mention of the appeal but challenged what he called "misleading information" released by Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, school superintendent, on projected student enrollment.

## Plan Public Inspection on Dec 17, List 17 Tentative Stopping Places

Hicksville Public Library will introduce Bookmobile service within the area of the School District effective Jan. 3. Voters of the district approved the expenditure of \$42,200 for the service, including \$20,000 for the vehicle, at the annual school meeting-election on May 4 of this year.

The cab-over International bookmobile (pictured above) is due to arrive in Hicksville within the next week or so, according to Library Director Kenneth Barnes and a tentative date for community inspection has been set for Saturday, Dec. 17, at the Public Lib-

rary, Jerusalem Ave. and Second St.

The Library is also planning a mailing to all homes in the district providing details as to proposed stops for the Bookmobile, schedule of days and hours of service. The appropriation in the budget provides for \$10,000 worth of books to stock the vehicle, a senior clerk, driver clerk and a part-time clerk.

A tentative list of bookmobile stops has been outlined and the library administration promises to give consideration to additions or changes requested by individuals or organizations. Listed stops in-

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## GOP Finance Drive Hits \$35,228 Troop 380 on Catskill Trip

The Republican Finance Campaign in the Town of Oyster Bay for 1960 is nearing its end with a total of \$35,228.75 collected in the Township for the county-wide Republican drive, it was disclosed today by Leifred Badler of Hicksville, town chairman.

"Most areas of the Township", he said, "have collected more money for the drive in this election year than ever before in the Town of Oyster Bay."

Fifteen Scouts and four adult leaders of Slide Troop 380, Hicksville, participated in the 4th Annual Three Day Troop Camporee and Mountain Climb during the three day weekend of Nov. 11, to 13. Upon arrival in the Catskills, six tents were erected and base camp established in the Woodland Valley Campsite.

Duties were performed according to a rotating duty roster which assured sufficient opportunity for Scoutcraft advancement. Friday night's schedule of events included a Council Fire and Court of Honor at which one First Class and five second Class badges of rank were awarded. Preparations were also made for the planned mountain climb on the following day. The weather was clear and cold; the temperature at the camp dropped to a low of 20 degrees.

The Saturday morning climb was begun in the clear weather at 8:35 AM at the junction of the Wittenberg Trail and macadam road at an elevation of 1200 feet. The trail crossed the Woodland Valley Creek by cable bridge and proceeded upward to an elevation of 3730 feet for a distance of 3.4 miles to the summit of Wittenberg Mt. The climb was very vigorous, but the view of Slide Mountain from Wittenberg was sufficiently rewarding. The trail descended 150 feet to the low point between Cornell Mountains and the top of Slide the trail ascended the top of Cornell Mountain, elevation of 3880 feet. In the last half mile to the top of Slide the trail ascended a rock face from an elevation of 3600 feet to 4204 feet.

The following climbers reached the summit of Slide Mt: Scouts M. Bakke, R. Pinesga, S. Dineen, D. Overzat, W. Scuzillo, W. Mc Geir, W. Harold, O. Mirus, M. Waldvogel, W. Grams, R. Schabdon, J. After eating a trail lunch, the troop began the return trip by climbing down the western slope of Slide Mt. to Wilmotook Lake via the yellow trail, a ski trail. The complete trip covered a distance of 14 miles, and required 10 hours. After a good night's rest the troop returned home.

## STATE BUILT FOOT PATHS TO OVERPASS

### BULLETINS

The School Board voted to accept the bid of the Double M Construction Co., Robbins Lane, Jericho, as general contractor for the new Cantigue Rock School. It was announced by Sam Hecht, Board president, following a meeting last Sunday.

Mr. Hecht stated that it was hoped that ground would be broken this month and that the school for completion would be Sept. 1961. The boundary line for homes in the Cantigue School area has not been determined.

Elliott Sheftman has tendered his resignation to the West Birchwood Civic Assoc. Board of Directors. Mr. Sheftman, who was one of the founders of the Assoc., had been a Board member since its inception. He stated that pressure of business activities made it impossible to give full time to his duties.

A Youth Group will be organized for West Birchwood on Thursday evening, Dec. 8, at 8:30 p.m. at Robert Seaman School, announced Irving Reinhardt, who will organize the committee. Mr. Reinhardt, pointing out that the need for supervised youth activity is growing rapidly, asks that volunteers seeking further information, call him at WE 8-0925.

Construction of the four foot wide asphalt walk to the overpass was done by the State of New York at the request of the Town of Oyster Bay, Richard Lloyd, Supervisor of Construction for Nassau and Suffolk in the State Highway Dept., told the WEST BIRCHWOOD NEWS this week. This was done because the Town agreed to extend the sidewalk on Express Place to meet the path, said Mr. Lloyd. Mr. Lloyd further stated that the responsibility for maintenance of the walk to the overpass, such as snow removal, lighting etc. was that of the Town. He clarified the confusion surrounding ownership of the land on which the walk is situated by explaining that the property is owned by the State but that the marginal road must be built by Semow and Schwartz. It was disclosed by Mr. Lloyd that the erection of the proposed traffic light at Rockland Drive and the LI Expressway exit is awaiting formal approval from Albany since this is in addition to the formal contract and expenditures for the poles, cables, lights and other items must be separately approved. However, approval is a formality and is expected momentarily.

The new signal light will function in the following manner: when the red light is on for exiting expressway traffic, incoming West Birchwood traffic will have a green arrow and outgoing West Birchwood traffic will have a green arrow. The light will probably be timed at one minute green for exiting Expressway traffic and 20 seconds green for exiting and entering West Birchwood traffic. The timings will be subject to change if conditions warrant and traffic surveys will be made periodically. The effect of this traffic pattern on Broadway will also be studied and changes made if necessary. Mr. Lloyd stated that the target date for opening the South Oyster Bay Road exit on the expressway is Dec. 15 but in any event, no later than Christmas. At present temporary signs are being made and the terrain is being graded and landscaped and top soiled.

## An Editorial File and Forget

We present pictures of the overpass and the access paths - evidence to justify the contentions of our Civic Assoc. that there is nothing safe about this passage to Robert Seaman School.

Regardless of the verbal jousting that enlivened the recent School Board meeting we cannot help but feel that members of the Board are cognizant of the atrocious approaches to the overpass and the potential danger to the four foot railings on the overpass.

The State has declared that the railings are standard height. This is a specious argument, for nowhere else on the Expressway is there an overpass built for the exclusive use of children; Furthermore, assuming a daily use by 400 children, we get a minimum of 1,000 passages every day with its attendant possibilities of incidents.

The fact is that the present setup of the overpass constitutes an attractive nuisance. The possibility of "drag" bicycle races cannot be ruled out; kids have been seen racing bikes over the overpass. Children have been caught throwing stones on the Expressway. A six foot guard railing would discourage such vandalism.

As for the so-called asphalt foot paths leading to the overpass, it is utterly ridiculous to expect young children to use the path in complete safety without some type of constant supervision. And with the State and Town seemingly unable to figure out their roles in this matter we are of the opinion that the School Board should pigeonhole this matter - for good.

## Endorse Carin For School Bd

Dr. Arthur Carin was unanimously endorsed for election to the Jericho School Board next spring by the West Birchwood Civic Assoc., Inc. Board of Directors at a meeting held Nov. 21st last in the R.A. Miller residence.

Meeting for the third time in three weeks, the Board:

1. Set up a committee of President Herb Simis, David Serko, and Samuel Gordon to prepare a comprehensive brief outlining the position of the Civic Assoc. as regards safety and use of the overpass for presentation to the School Board.

  3. Appointed Irving Reinhardt to organize a Youth Committee to plan a program for sub-teens and teenagers in the community.
  4. Discussed problems concerning the refuse situation in which residents of West Birchwood have been dumping refuse near unoccupied houses.

  6. Decided to merge the Welcoming Committee into the membership committee.

effect of communication, is the problem of the pedestrian overpass which extends over the LI Expressway and connects West Birchwood to the Robert Seaman School. This overpass, with its low, inadequate railing, and narrow, unlighted and unprotected approaches, constitutes a distinct hazard to the safety and welfare of our children, who will be the prime users.

For many months, the Civic Assoc. has attempted to learn from the School Board the answers to the many serious questions con-

cerning the physical condition of the overpass and its approaches, as well as the related question of the effect the completion of this overpass will have on bus service. Unfortunately, no definite answers were forthcoming. Apparently, the School Board was unable or unwilling to commit itself to a stand, one way or the other.

The new Board of Directors, at a recent meeting, decided "to take the bull by the horns" and attend, as a matter, an upcoming School Board meeting and seek the answers in person. It was then suggested that all the residents of West Birchwood, whether they were members of the Civic Assoc. or not, be contacted, have the situation explained to them and urged to attend to add moral support to our position.

However, with only two days between this latter decision and the meeting of the School Board, the success of the plan depended upon prompt and efficient communication. The officers, Directors, Block Captains and even many members themselves not only used their telephones but rang doorbells as well.

The results, as most of you will know, were gratifying. The attendance at the meeting was the biggest we've ever had (considering that there was no band and no refreshments served). I'm sure the School Board was impressed and as was stated in the daily press, "apparently stunned by the turnout".

The point, of course, is that what made the meeting a success was the participation of so many of our residents. And the extent of this participation was because the problem and the proposed means to affect a solution were communicated to the residents. Everyone connected with this effort is to be congratulated, with a particular vote of thanks to the Block Captains who really showed what teamwork can do.

The Board of Directors and officers will have presented to the School Board, by the time this issue of the newspaper is delivered, a complete list of corrective measures which are deemed necessary to make the overpass safe for the children. The School Board will then, as promised at the meeting, appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of these measures, and in conjunction with its attorney determine upon whom the responsibility rests to effectuate these measures, and finally, report its findings to the Civic Assoc. We

To maintain maximum communication with our members, the Board of Directors has indicated procedures to see to it that everyone gets the newspaper, that new residents are visited and that the Block Captains duties shall include frequent contact with membership within their jurisdiction to keep them informed of Civic Assoc. functions.

Finally, committee chairmen are contacting new members to inform them of the dates and places of their next meetings.

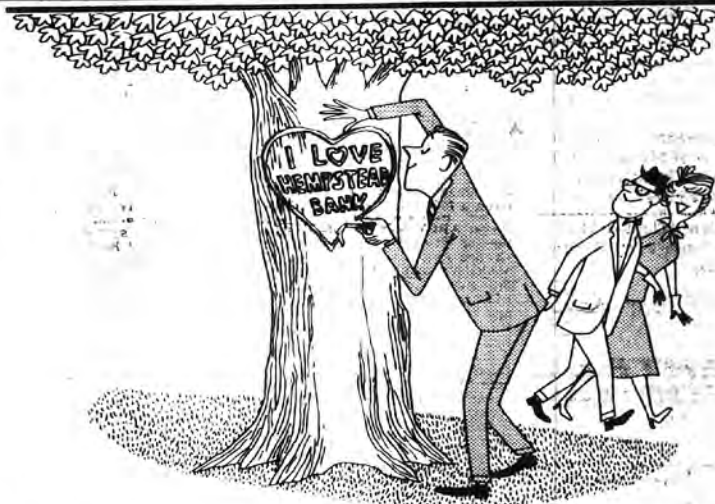
