Post Office Extends Hours for Yule Rush

Hicksville Main Post Office on North Broadway, as well as the Plainview office, Station A in Gertz basement and four contract stations will be open until 6 PM this Saturday and again on Dec. 17, according to Postmaster Harry Cotler, as the postal service prepares for the annual flood of holiday mailing. Offices will be open for stamp sales and acceptance of parcel post.

The main office will be open every evening, Monday thru Friday, starting Dec. 12 from 7 AM to 7 PM.

Plainview branch is open these same days from 8 AM to 6 PM, Station A in Gertz from 10 AM to 7 PM, and contract stations from 9 AM to 6 PM.

This schedule continues, Cotler said, until Dec. 23. The office windows will resume regular Saturday schedules on Dec. 24. There will be no service at windows on Dec. 25 or Dec. 26. There will not be service at any offices or stations on Sundays this year.

The contract stations are as follows: No. 1 - West Village Green on Newbridge Rd.; No. 2 - Rexall Drug, Centre Shops; No. 3 - Thrift City, South Oyster Bay Rd. and Woodbury; and No. 4 - Whelan Drug, Broadway and Marie St.

Postmaster Cotler and Stanley Klevanosky, superintendent of mails, reported that Christmas greeting cards are now in the mails and joined in urging all to mail without delay, address carefully and affix sufficient postage to insure all of receiving their mail, without delay, locally and elsewhere.

Manaskie In By 679 - 255

Harold Manaskie of 13 North Drive, re-elected to his second five-year term as a commissioner of Hicksville Fire District, Tuesday night, today expressed publicly his thanks and appreciation to the voters for their confidence in him. He received 679 ballots and Cono Briganti, running for the third time in four years, received 255. It was reported that Briganti announced, after the results were declared, that he plans to try again next December.

In Jericho Fire District where three seats on the Board of Fire Commissioners were up for election, William Simpson defeated LaRoy Van Nostrand who has been on the Board for more than 20 years. Simpson got 264 ballots and Van Nostrand 190.

Norman Neubert, running with Simpson in Jericho, received 259 votes to defeat Sam Toscano who got 164, to fill out a two-year unexpired term. Felix Franco, running unopposed for a three-year term, got 277 votes.

In the Jericho Water District voting, Edward P. Bracken was re-elected for a three-year term, receiving 837 votes against 205 for David Kassen of Birchwood Park, Jericho.

A three-way race for Plainview Water Commissioner resulted in the re-election of Nathan W. Bennett as a record-breaking 1,952 votes were cast. Bennett got 896, Walter H. Byler, trying for a second

and time to win election, received 666 votes and Herman M. Gordon, 478.

The term of office for re-elected or newly elected Fire Commissioners starts on the first day of the new year.

LAND BANK STIRS INTEREST IN PARK

Local interest in the development of a community park — or at least the acquisition of land for such purpose — has been revitalized in recent weeks as the result of periodic announcements from Oyster Bay Town Hall concerning park land purchases in other parts of the township.

Stories in the daily press that the Town Board is planning a big park project in Massapequa and another acquisition on the north shore at Oyster Bay Harbor has stimulated local discussion concerning the projected purchase of 50 acres, more or less, for future development out of the former Press Wireless property in the north west section of the community of Hicksville.

The 100-odd acre Press Wireless tract represents the largest undeveloped open area within Hicksville School District (roughly the boundaries of the Hicksville Park District).

The total Press Wireless section has been zoned for industrial use, a fact which has been challenged in court by the present owners who want to develop it as a housing area. Initial action in Supreme Court of Nassau County found against the town zoning and the case is now before the Appellate Division.

Supervisor John J. Burns, a known advocate of conservation programs, has recently come out for the allocation of "land banks" or areas set aside for future development before all vacant areas are gobbled up by housing developers. This has led to revived hope by the advocates of a park "land bank" on the Press Wireless site in Hicksville.

Jericho Red Cross Needs Workers

There is an American Red Cross organization in Jericho. It was originally chartered in 1917 and some of its honorary members are members of families whose names have been familiar to Jericho for generations.

For the past several years it has been operating as part of the Syosset area Red Cross only because Jericho's population had remained dormant for many years (551 in 1940 and around 600 in 1953). It was not until 1953 that there was a slight increase in population. However, due to the tremendous increase in population

in the past six years (about 2000) the Jericho Red Cross was re-activated as of June 1960 and will function as a working group in all branches of its service entirely separate from Syosset.

A working unit is as good as its worker and of course workers are volunteers. Many many jobs are desperately needed. Jobs diverse enough to suit almost any talent or interest are open, especially in the Fund Raising unit, as well as Junior Red Cross and Disaster. A caution unit is required as it works closely with

the Disaster unit and at Blood Donor stations.

In the Disaster unit the greatest need for volunteers was keenly felt when a building collapsed on Brush Hollow Road and not one volunteer could be called upon to respond to this emergency. There have also been four home service calls in Jericho which demanded immediate attention. Also, there are requests for driver service for operations of hospitals.

It was gratifying to see the response of the people who ran for office. All of them showed a desire and willingness to cooperate with the Civic Assoc. They showed their interest in bringing the issues to the attention of the public. The time people are asked to devote to this job is insignificant, but the job they are asked to do is of the utmost importance. They will not be asked to collect dues or solicit funds, but they will be asked to provide a liaison between the general membership and the Board of Directors. They will be asked to be available in cases of community emergency, to receive complaints and to forward them to the appropriate committees and finally to be the local source of information so that you will be kept aware of actions taken by the Board of Directors. Our Block Captains are the people who keep the Civic Association alive and play an important part in community living. If you are asked to help reactivate this group please join "those who serve".

A conversationalist who speaks easily, his opinions are expressed with wit and humor, and his points are made with a clarity that leaves no doubt about the meaning of his words. This facility must have contributed, in no small measure, to the success of a man who at a comparatively young age has become a partner in the Pace Advertising Agency.

It is certainly one of the reasons for which Milton has been held in such high regard by his fellow members of the Civics Board of Directors, with whom he has served the community for the past year. His duties as chairman of the Town Planning committee are said to be handled with dispatch and efficiency, his efforts have earned the gratitude of many residents whose complaints have found their way to his doorstep.

Milton attended Queen's College, from where he was graduated with honors as a psychology major... subject with apparent advantage... an advertising man. After a period of time as an advertising salesman on the Herald Tribune, he entered service in the Army and was stationed in Aberdeen, Md. While there, he met his future bride, Joan, and they were married two days after Milton's discharge from service. publication yet!" "We had a fight at our last meeting and we're not talking to each other!"

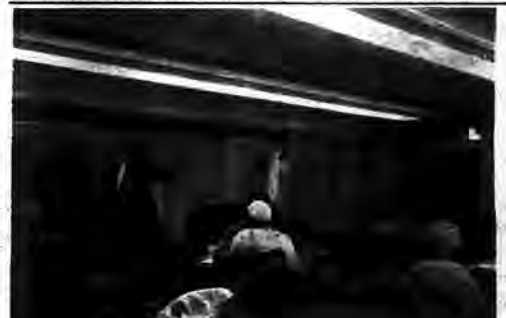

On Friday Evening, Nov. 25th, Temple Or Elohim, Reform Congregation of Jericho, held special Building Consecration Services at its newly erected First Wing of a Temple Structure located off Jericho Turnpike in Jericho on 3 1/2 Acres of land.

Rabbi Schenckman officiated, but the Sermon was given by Guest Rabbi Grossberg of Scarsdale. Building Chairman and 1st Vice-President, Adolf Lovler, officially handed the keys to the Building to President Irving Weiser, who in turn expressed the feeling of pride, thanks, gratitude and achievement felt by all those present.

To judge by the turnout for these services and consequent Friday evening and Saturday services, Temple Or Elohim best concern itself soon with plans for further expansion. Although the present structure has 6 classrooms, a large combination sanctuary and Social Hall which can be further enlarged by removing classroom partitions, membership is growing at a fast rate which will bring further expansion plans up for discussion soon.

Amend Article IV, Section 4.1 by amending the license period as follows:

Section 4.1 Every owner's license issued hereunder shall be as of the first day of October or subsequent date of issue and shall expire on the thirtieth day of September next succeeding such date, unless sooner revoked by the Town Board.

Amend Article IV, Section 4.2 to provide that said applications are to be submitted in duplicate and to read as follows:

Section 4.2 Every person who desires to operate a taxicab or taxicabs, limousine or limousines, owned or controlled by him upon the public highway within the Town, shall file with the Town Clerk a written application in duplicate upon forms to be furnished by the Town Clerk, verified under oath stating:

Amend Article IV, by adding thereto a new section which will be known as Section 4.2.1 to read as follows:

Section 4.2.1 Every applicant for an owner's license, and every member thereof if any unincorporated association, and any officer, director, and stock holder, if a corporation, shall at the time of submitting his application also (a) submit two individual photographs of the applicant taken within thirty days prior to the date of the application, 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" in size and such pictures must be in a true likeness of the applicant and must show neck, shoulders and uncovered head; (b) by fingerprinted under the direction and supervision of the Town Clerk; unless said photographs and fingerprinting are specifically waived by the Town Clerk upon showing facts which in his discretion warrant the waiving of these requirements.

Amend Article IV, Section 4.3 subdivision (a) by amending the fifth line thereof by adding a new phrase following the words "owner's license", by adding thereto the words "and upon completion of any investigation deemed necessary".

Amend Article IV, Section 4.3 subdivision (c) by changing the procedure for the issuance of a limousine owner's license as follows:

Section 4.3 (c) If the Town Clerk shall find from the statements contained in the application, and upon the completion of any investigation, that an applicant for an owner's license or for a supplementary Owner's license for a limousine or limousines is qualified and able to conduct the business of operating the limousine or limousines and to conform to

the provisions of this ordinance and the rules and regulations adopted under this Ordinance, then the Town Clerk, upon a certification of each limousine proposed to be operated by the applicant pursuant to Article IX hereof, and the furnishing by the applicant of proof of insurance, as hereinafter provided, shall issue a license stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of vehicles the applicant is authorized to operate and the date of the issuance thereof, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue for each vehicle licensed hereunder, a license card bearing the words "Licensed Limousine", an assigned number and the date of expiration of such license, otherwise such application shall be denied.

Amend Article IV, Section 4.6 subdivision (e) to read as follows:

Article IV, Section 4.6 (e) If the Town Clerk shall find that the addition of such taxicab or taxicabs is required by the public convenience and necessary, and that the applicant has complied with the requirements of Article IV, Section 4.3 (a) hereof, then he shall issue a supplementary Owner's license stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of the license medallion assigned to such vehicle and the date of issuance thereof, and at the same time the Town Clerk shall issue for each vehicle licensed hereunder a license card bearing the words "Licensed Taxicab", an assigned number and the date of expiration of such license, otherwise such application shall be denied.

Amend Article IV, Section 4.7 to read as follows in making the finding required by Section 4.6 hereof, the Town Clerk shall take into consideration the matter specified in Section 4.3 and Section 4.4 hereof including the subdivisions thereof.

Amend Article V, Section 5.1 to read as follows:

Section 5.1 Every driver's license issued under this article shall be issued as of the date of the granting thereof and shall expire on the 30th day of September next succeeding unless sooner revoked.

Amend Article V, Section 5.2 thereof by amending the second line thereof following the word "file" by adding thereto the words "in duplicate".

Amend Article V, Section 5.2 subdivision (g) to read as follows:

Section 5.2 (g) The number and date of expiration of the applicant's New York chauffeur's license.

Amend Article VIII, Section 8.0 by adding a new paragraph thereto as follows:

Section 8.0 Upon the filing of any application under this article, and payment of the required fee, the Town Clerk shall issue the same if he shall determine from his investigation and from the statements contained in the application that the applicant is a proper and qualified person, and that the said application in all respects conforms to the provisions of this Ordinance and the rules and regulations adopted under said ordinance.

Amend Article XII, Section 12.0 subdivision (a) by amending the second line thereof following the

word "Taxicab" by adding thereto the words "Taxi or Cab."

Amend Article XII, Section 12.0 subdivision (g) to read as follows:

Section 12.0 (g) No driver shall permit more persons to be carried in his taxicab or limousine than the number for which it has seating facilities.

Amend Article XII, Section 12.0 subdivision (p) by amending the first line thereof following the word "driver" by adding thereto the words "or limousine driver".

Amend Article XII, Section 12.0 by adding thereto a new subdivision "y" as follows:

Section 12.0 (y) No taxicab or limousine shall park or stand on any private street or place without the written permission of the owner thereof, and then, only subject to the provisions of the Building Zone Ordinance and all other ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay.

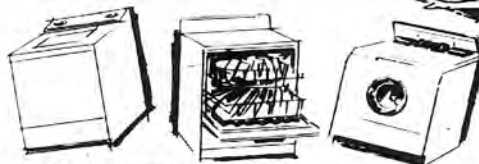
