Water District Plans Million \$ Expansion

Oyster Bay and Hempstead Town Boards will hold a joint public hearing in the Oyster Bay Town Annex at 65 Broadway, Hicksville, on Dec. 27, starting at 9:30 AM, upon proposal to increase and improve the Hicksville Water District supply system.

The legal notice of the hearing appears in this issue of the Mid-Island HERALD.

It proposes additional storage and pumps on Kuhl Ave, purchase of property at Bethpage Rd to replace wells 1, 2 and 4; lime treatment plant at Plant 8; gas chlorinators at Plants 7 and 8 and at wells 6 and 10; several installations of transmission mains; construction of a new Administration Building at Dean St. and Brewster Pl.

The engineer's estimated total cost of the project is one million dollars.

Snow Storm Closes Schools

Rising temperatures were expected today to speed the removal of 14 inches of snow which fell Sunday and Monday, and coupled with freezing temperatures, closed schools for two days, disrupted LIRR time schedules and generally paralyzed the Mid Island area.

Town highway crews worked around the clock under the direction of Thomas R. Pynchon, Town Highway Superintendent, to open main highways and then tackled the side streets. Town park department employees also worked late into the night to open parking areas for commuters and shoppers.

Snow fighting in the Township was complicated by several factors. A major one was the extreme cold which made on the road repairs impossible and required the towing of damaged equipment to heated garages. In addition, the Town Highway Dept. inherited the responsibility for clearing the newly opened section of Long Island Expressway and marginal roads, addition to the total territory to be plowed.

The forecast of the intensity snow storm was found inadequate a point noted by New York City and other municipalities as well. Crews worked around the clock for two days and nights in a desperate attempt to clear streets and highways.

Hicksville Fire Dept ambulance was called out at 5:09 Monday afternoon to transport Alfonso Sainz of 340 Richard Ave., a custodian at Dutch Lane School, to Mid Island Hospital in Bethpage. He was apparently suffering a heart attack. The round-trip to the hos-

pital was made in an hour and 15 minutes, despite the fast driving conditions.

A variety of meetings and other special events scheduled for Monday were cancelled by the blizzard. While New York City newspapers reported the snow fall as 17 inches or more, the Nassau County Dept. of Public Works recorded approximately 11 inches at Mineola. There was considerable drifting to greater depths.

2 Big Fires

Hicksville volunteer firemen fought damaging fires on two successive evenings within blocks of each other, Thursday and Friday nights. Extensive damage was caused at the Rudolph Hardick residence at 84 Twilans Ave, Thursday evening. The alarm sounded at 10:18 PM.

The next night at 11:22 PM fire broke out in a 4-bay garage behind Fred's Inn at 120 Woodbury Road. Wind-fanned flames rode high into the sky until the fire was brought under control by 80 men who rolled eight trucks to the scene. The structure is owned by Martha Klimesko. Nearby Hicksville Farms, owned by Joseph Esatto, suffered some smoke and water damage.

The Nassau County Fire Marshall's office was asked to investigate the cause of both fires. The Hardick fire brought out 70 men and six fire trucks. The ramps were on the scene for more than an hour. They fought the garage fire the next night for an hour and a half.

O'Keefe Choice For Town Clerk

William "Bud" O'Keefe of Syosset is the unanimous recommendation of the Oyster Bay Town Republican Executive Committee to fill the office of Oyster Bay Town Clerk, effective Jan. 1, to succeed Henry M. Curran who is resigning to assume his new duties as State Senator. The recommendations are being forwarded to Oyster Bay Town Board for official action. The Town Committee, meeting

yesterday, also recommended the appointment of Joseph Macdonald of Oyster Bay for the office of Town Comptroller vacated by the recent death of LaRoy Matthews of Locust Valley. Macdonald has served as Deputy Comptroller since the department was created five years ago. Thomas R. Pynchon, town GOP leader, announced the unanimous action of the executive committee.

Fehrenbach Aids Union Districts

The Union Free School Districts of Nassau County with enrollment of 5,000 or more pupils would receive substantial increases in state aid under the terms of a measure drafted for introduction in the State Legislature by Assemblyman Edwin J. Fehrenbach of Bethpage.

Fehrenbach's bill would mandate the State to grant the same financial assistance to Union Free School Districts that it now gives to Central School Districts. If the bill becomes law, he estimated that the State's share of financial assistance would increase approximately \$200 thousand to \$300 thousand a year in each of the large Union Free Districts in Nassau. Among districts which would benefit handsomely by adoption of the Fehrenbach bill are Levittown, Massapequa, Hicksville, Plainville, Farmingdale and Bethpage.

Why should an adult bother with stories that aren't true?

What unique and important information can they possibly contain about the history of our time, or the quality of life being lived in our world?

A course on "Contemporary Literature," now being taken by some of our West Birchwood gals, tries to answer these questions. Given under the auspices of the New York University Extension Division, the course consists of questions, discussion, introduction of critical and background material, and a careful study of selected passages of the books being read.

The reading list for this course includes: The Idea of March, by Thornton Wilder; The Search by C.P. Snow; Siddharta by Herman Hesse; Lolita by Vladimir Nabokov; The Heart is a Lonely Hunter by Carson McCullers; South Wind by Norman Douglas; The Stranger by Albert Camus; The Night of the Hunter by Davis Grubb.

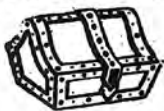

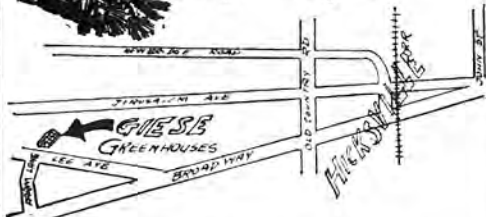
