## 1000 Homes to Rise On Plainview Farms Along Oyster Bay Rd.

A one-thousand home community will soon rise in Plainview, just across So. Oyster Bay Rd. from Hicksville, it was learned yesterday. Reports of the project have been circulating for several months. Several facts during the week appeared to give substance to the stories.

### Signs of Activity

A small house was moved to a point on the east side of So. Oyster Bay Rd. about equi-distance from Woodbury and Old Country Rds. apparently to serve as a developer's headquarters.

Surveyors were on the scene Wednesday morning while an auction of farm equipment was in progress on the John Pelowski farm at the corner of Old Country and So. Oyster Bay Rds. The farm had previously been sold.

Oyster Bay Town Building Dept. admitted that it knows one developer plans to erect 400 houses and another, George Rosen, is planning 550 houses along So. Oyster Bay Rd., which is the boundary between Hicksville and Plainview school and special districts. No permits to build have been filed on the tract as yet.

The area lies one to two miles from the Hicksville shopping district.

A 1000-home development in Plainview would more than double the present population of the community, which is largely open farms and wooded areas.

No new permits for dwellings in Hicksville were filed with the Township Building Department during the month of January, although there were six building permits of other types issued. The town department issued 31 permits for dwellings, 19 of them in Massapequa. Other dwellings permits were: Glen Head 2, Bethpage 2, Plainview 2, Farmingdale 2, Greenvale 2, Jericho 1, and East Norwich 1. Construction value in the township covered by the January permits is estimated at \$584,205, according to Building and Zoning Inspector John Tilford.

### CIVICS TO HEAR ABOUT ASSESSMENTS THURSDAY

E. M. Podyen, chairman of the Nassau County Board of Assessors, will be guest speaker at the Hicksville Civic and Community Association meeting tomorrow (Thursday) night in the firehouse auditorium on E. Marie St. The meeting starts at 8:30 p. m. and is open to all interested residents of the community.

Stephen F. Smatlak, program chairman, states that Gen. Podyen was asked to speak at the meeting because of the interest among some residents, particularly new home owners, in the subject of real estate assessing.

Endorsement by the association of the proposed establishment of a community blood bank for Hicksville will be solicited at the session. The plan has been tentatively approved by the executive committee, according to President Lawrence A. Roman.

### PLAINVIEW PLANS SIGNS FOR ENTRANCES

Signs designating the community of Plainview will be erected on the entrance roads by the Plainview Civic Assoc. The plan was discussed at a meeting Tuesday night, Feb. 15, at the Manetto Hills School. ### Farmers to Meet On Market Hours

A mass meeting of Nassau and Suffolk farmers is scheduled for tonight (Wednesday) at 8 o'clock in Hicksville High School Auditorium, Jerusalem Ave., according to County Agricultural Agent Howard H. Campbell.

"A movement is underway by dealers," he reports to Farm Bureau members, "to prohibit selling by farmers during the evening hours in the farmers' square of the Brooklyn Terminal Market."

"The purpose of this joint Suffolk-Nassau meeting is to find out what farmers think about having the farmers' square closed to sales during the evening, up until midnight, and what action should be taken by farmers on this problem. All farmers who sell in New York City markets are invited and urged to attend this meeting."

The litigation was the result of an accident on Dec. 19, 1946, at Main St. and Franklin Ave., Garden City, in which Mrs. Beatty, a pedestrian, was severely injured. ## FIRST COMMUNITY CONCERT STAR BEGAN STUDY AT AGE OF SIX

Sigi Weissenberg, 19-year-old Bulgarian-born pianist, who will appear in Hicksville Mar. 3 under the auspices of Hicksville Community Concerts, is the winner of the Philadelphia Orchestra Youth Contest. He made his American debut in 1947 playing the Rachmaninoff Third Concerto with Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra. After winning the Leventritt Award, he made his New York debut last year as soloist in the Chopin E. Minor Concerto with George Szell and the New York Philharmonic Symphony.

He started his piano study at the age of six with his mother, Lillian Pina, a professional pianist. When

he was 10 years old, he began a period of study with the Bulgarian composer-pianist, Panteo Wladigeroff.

In Concentration Camps  
In 1942 when the Nazis occupied Bulgaria, they began to evacuate large segments of Sofia's population. Sigi and his mother were sent to a border concentration camp for deportation to Poland. For an entire year the young pianist never even saw a piano; in addition to suffering and rough treatment at the hands of the Nazi, the boy was robbed of his compositions because of a groundless suspicion on the part of the Germans that the manuscript contained some sort of official code.

Sigi and his mother finally escaped through Turkey to Palestine, where the 15-year-old musician was first guided back to concert pitch by his mother and then taken on as a pupil of Leo Kestenberg.

Weissenberg toured the Middle East, Egypt and Syria in 1945. The following year he appeared in the major cities of South America.

Despite the wonder of travel and distant lands, Sigi always enjoys coming back to New York. "There's something about American frankness and competition that I prefer. It certainly makes one work!"

## BETHPAGE SOLDIER WAS OKINAWA CASUALTY

The remains of Pfc. Raymond E. Caffery of Bethpage arrived in the United States from the Pacific Monday, it was announced by the Department of the Army this week.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Caffery of Concord Ave., Bethpage, he was killed in action on May 15, 1945, on Okinawa. He was 19 years old. He entered the Marine Corps in April, 1944, and embarked for overseas in September of that year. He attended Farmingdale High School and was employed at Grumman's, Bethpage.

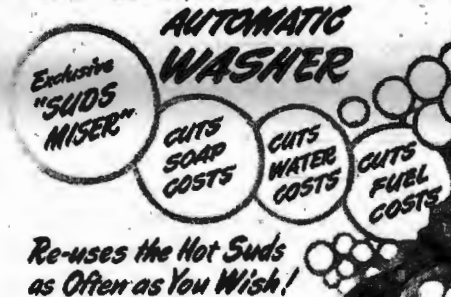

## Bottleneck at the Firehouse

A Plainview resident calls attention to a situation which develops frequently in the vicinity of the Hicksville Firehouse on East Marie St. whenever the alarm sounds. A few individuals apparently are causing a bottleneck which might easily defeat the efficiency of our fine volunteer fire-fighting organization.

The problem is the one caused by the helter-skelter parking of cars, operated by some vamps, when the horn blasts. They race up to the firehouse, jam on the brakes and leave their autos (and sometimes trucks) scattered all over the block. They disregard the simplest rules of courtesy and highway safety. Some of them have blocked the entrance to the public parking field, thus effectively barricading the driveway against those who want to enter or leave the field. Some have been observed parking in such a manner as to prevent fire equipment from returning to the building.

Where the vamps should leave their cars when they answer an alarm and race for the apparatus, we are not prepared to say. It does seem that the private cars could be halted in places which would not knot up all traffic movement in the vicinity, pin shopper cars against the curb, and hamper the travel of their own brother volunteers.

The problem seems to be especially acute in the case of alarms sounded around supper time or early evening. As a matter of fact, the space in which these few individuals now leave their cars and run is right in the heart of the very area marked out for no parking because it is a firehouse entrance zone.

## To Meter Parking Or Not?

There is at present serious consideration being given by various local groups, including the businessmen and civic, to the topic of parking meters for Hicksville. The BMA is conducting a poll of all business and professional people but the results are still too light to determine the over-all opinion.

For the record, the Hicksville Civic & Community Association and the Hicksville Lions Club, are in favor of meters. The directors of the BMA are in favor of meters. The Kiwanis is believed to be in favor, but have not as yet given an official opinion.

One fact is painfully obvious: The interest in meters stems from the fact that Hicksville has a terrific parking and traffic problem. Advocates of meters believe these devices which "rent curb space" to parkers at the rate of 12 minutes for a penny, will help solve the local problem by keeping curb space more fluid. Actually what is apparently desired in this respect is strict enforcement of parking limits, whether they be one hour on Broadway or two hours on Marie Streets and Jerusalem Avenue. The meters mechanically tick off the time a parked car takes up curb space and at the expiration of the time purchased shows a red tag of violator. There is little doubt that a meter simplifies the enforcement officer's job by accurately measuring the time consumed at the curb by an individual car.

Meters are also attractive, in some quarters, because they provide revenue over and above the cost of the machine, installation, maintenance, etc. Such revenues can be applied to purchasing more parking fields.

There are opposing views on the question of meters. These will be considered in a subsequent issue.

## Local Version

By NICK ECONOPOULY  
(First in a Series)

IN HICKSVILLE'S BACK YARD, four miles east of Old Country Road, the local version of one of medical science's most spectacular battles is being waged. It is surprising how few residents are aware of this battle, or of the institution spearheading it in this area.

The institution, of course, is Nassau County Sanatorium. The battle it is waging is part of the nation-wide campaign by doctors, nurses, social workers, hospitals, clinics, schools, and a wide number of related agencies, to wipe out tuberculosis. Evidence that this battle is meeting with marked success can be found in the declining death rate in TB as compared to other major diseases. The fact that it is still the seventh major killer in the United States, however, points to the tremendous—almost appalling—job that remains to be done.

Tuberculosis is no longer the dreaded killer, the white plague of a few generations ago, but recovery from the disease is still a costly and sometimes lengthy process, often prompting patients to facetiously dub it "a millionaire's disease." The fact that many others besides millionaires recover from the disease is due only to the establishment of public tax-supported sanatoriums. This, then, is the primary function of Nassau County Sanatorium: to assume all the costs of recovery—curing there doesn't cost the patient a cent—and, as far as possible, to cut down the length of time it takes to recover by treating the disease quickly and expertly. It is a form of government medicine with which even the most hardened cynics of the American Medical Association could hardly find fault.

Nassau County Sanatorium, with its approximately 350 patients, is situated in a sparsely settled farm and woodland area on Farmingdale-Bethpage Road. Built, owned, operated, and maintained by Nassau County, the institution has been receiving \$9.50 per patient per day from New York State since April, 1947—otherwise it is an exclusive county project under the County Executive and the Board of Supervisors. A Board of Managers consisting of five individuals, two of whom must be doctors, and under the chairmanship of George L. Hubbell of Garden City, is the group responsible for policy and operation. Dr. James C. Walsh is Superintendent and Medical Director of the Sanatorium.

In discussing public institutions of this nature there has been a tendency of late to turn toward the sensational, develop an idea derived from such famous episodes as THE SNAKE PIT, the fine book and Oscar-nominated movie. But there are many dangers in resorting to such a technique, and Nassau County Sanatorium is far too complex, has too many features both good and bad to simply stamp with a label and set on display for public consumption. Many there have spent years working to make it a top-notch tuberculosis sanatorium; it would be greatly unfair to them to fail to recognize their work, the progress that has been made, and their plans for the future.

Either, it would be far better to plan and recognize this series as an evaluation, to weigh both the good and bad features of the institution, and in the process perhaps gather and develop ideas which might help improve it. The whole tone and temper, in other words, should be of a positive and constructive nature.

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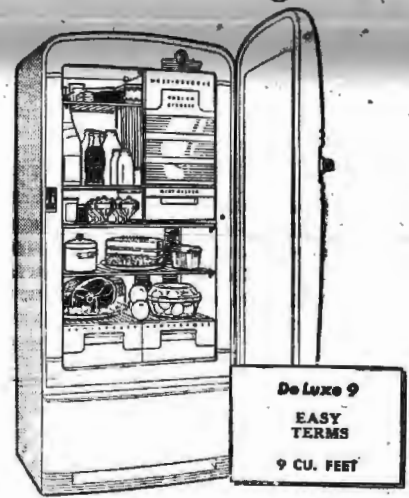
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## HIGH COST OF GOV'T HEALTH PLAN TOPIC OF DR. WILLIAM G. BURKE

personal touch, abridgment of Bureau and red tape.

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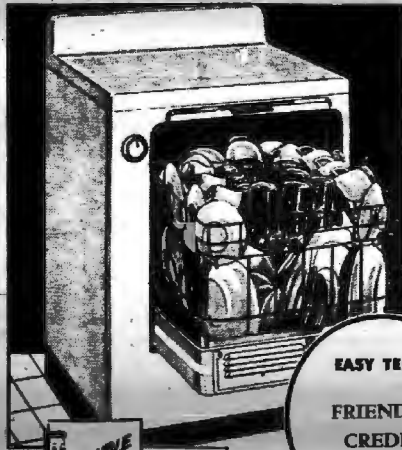

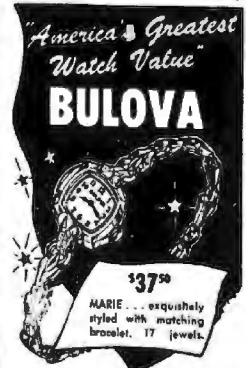

## Vacant Lot Owners Face Cleanup Charge

Owners of vacant lots will be forced to keep their property clear of debris and brush under a proposed amendment to the Town Law which has been proposed for the current session of N. Y. State Legislature. The measure was vetoed by Governor

Thomas E. Dewey last year.

The redrafted bill, introduced by Assemblyman Frank Becker and Senator John Bennett, both of Nassau, provides that if owners of vacant lots fail, on notice, to clear their property, then the town board may do so and assess costs on their taxbills.

Section 2—Meetings, Exhibitions, Parades, Racing, etc. No person shall erect any structure, stand or platform, hold any meeting, perform any ceremony, make a speech, address or harangue; exhibit or distribute any sign, placard, notice declaration or appeal of any kind or description; exhibit any dramatic performance, or the performance in whole or in part of any interlude, tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, play, farce, minstrelsy, dancing, entertainment, motion picture, public fair, circus, juggling, rope-walking, or any other acrobatics, or show of any kind or nature; or run or race any horse, or other animal, or being in or on a vehicle, race with another vehicle or horse, whether such race be founded on any stake, bet or otherwise; in any park except by permit. No parade, drill or maneuver of any kind shall be conducted, nor shall any procession form for parade or proceed in any park without a permit, and be it further:

**RESOLVED**, That this amendment to Section 8 of Ordinance 5 of the Long Island State Park Ordinances shall, upon first being posted and published and filed with the Secretary of State as required by law, be and become effective on the 15th day of March, 1949.

**RESOLVED**, That Section 10 of Ordinance 5 of the Long Island State Park Ordinances be amended to read as follows:

Section 10—Motor Vehicles. All motor vehicles, designated as omnibuses, ambulances, hearses, trucks, or trailers of any type, including self-propelled and non-self-propelled vehicles, designed, constructed, or adapted for use as dwelling or sleeping quarters, are forbidden to operate over a park or parkway except as follows: (a) Omnibuses known as taxis will be permitted to operate over a parkway to discharge or pick up passengers at a park or bathing establishment; but in no case will cruising or soliciting of passengers enroute be permitted; (b) Omnibuses known as outing buses will be permitted to operate by the shortest possible route from outside a park to discharge or pick up its passengers from a picnic or bathing area only if a permit to enter the park has been issued by the Long Island State Park Commission to the organization sponsoring the outing, picnic, etc. Buses must proceed over the route and to the parking field designated in the permit. (c) Public omnibuses will be permitted to operate only under special franchise. (d) Trucks or trailers will be permitted to operate over the Jones Beach Causeway and the Ocean Parkway where it is necessary for them to do so to properly police and supply such areas or contiguous areas not otherwise approachable, except on Sundays and holidays after 10 a. m. and on Saturdays after 12 noon during the period from May 1st to November 1st of each year. (e) Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall apply to the wagons, trucks and apparatus of a fire department, insurance patrol, police department, or ambulance, or to emergency repair wagons, when responding for emergency work in case of fire, accident, public disaster, impending danger or emergency on the parkways or in the parks. (f) Vehicles having any name insignia, or sign painted or displayed thereon for business or advertising purposes are prohibited in parks except as provided in this section. For purposes of identification, name and address only of the owner of a vehicle, on the sides thereof, in letters not more than two inches in height, shall not be construed as being displayed for business or advertising purposes. Omnibuses and vehicles owned and operated by governmental agencies, of types normally permitted to operate on the parkways are excepted from this rule. (g) Licensed

ambulances for sick or injured persons shall be permitted to operate over parkways when on emergency service, but subject to all the provisions of these Ordinances regulating traffic including limitations on the rate of speed, and be it further:

In order to provide for the maximum safe use of parkways, and to preserve life and limb the following are forbidden to use such parkways: pedestrians; riders and drivers of horses; bicycles; motorized bicycles including safety-cycles, whizzerbikes and similar types of vehicles; scooters, motor-cycles and other similar small power propelled vehicles of two or three wheels and any vehicle having two or three wheels any of which has an over-all diameter of less than fifteen (15) inches, excluding the tire, and be it further:

No fishing shall be permitted in any brook, lake, pond, or other body of fresh water, except during such times and in such areas as may be plainly designated therefor; in the ocean, sound or salt water bays, fishing shall be permitted by angling and trolling only, or in the case of shell fish, by devices or instruments operated solely by hand power, except that no fishing shall be permitted in boat channels or bathing areas. No device operated by machinery, or by power, or with the aid of power other than hand power, shall be used in taking fish of any kind from waters under the jurisdiction of the Commission, and be it further:

"Toughy," the story of the Stoll-McCracken expedition to the Arctic, written by Harold McCracken, was published recently by J. Lippincott. Charles H. The trip was made in conjunction with the American Museum of Natural History of New York on the famous schooner, The Morrissey, with Bob Bartlett as captain. The trip was made to the Aleutian Islands in search of brown bears and Eskimo mummies of the pre-historic period. One incident of the book relates the shooting of two brown bears by Stoll.

"Toughy" is the story of the expedition's bulldog mascot, Toughy. Many examples of the stone age crafts, such as oil lamps and harpoons which were buried with the mummified body of a chieftain, were discovered. A copy of the book may be borrowed from the Hicksville High School library.
