Lions Club Seeks Supervised Play Program for Kids

A supervised summer recreation program for Hicksville youngsters at school playgrounds is being sought by the Hicksville Lions Club. The Club has forwarded its request to the Board of Education, and is enlisting the support of other community groups behind the plea, according to Lions President Fred C. Birk.

Hicksville Airpark Resumes Operation

The Hicksville Airpark, apparently taking advantage of its rezoning to industrial property from residential D, is today open and operating again. The 35-acre flying field has twice closed down since it was established under a zone variance granted by the Board of Appeals of the township in 1945. Notice that the Airpark has reopened was given this week by Kenneth H. Garofalo, director. The field is located on Robbins Lane, adjacent to the LIRR and town incinerator at Locust Grove, about a half mile south of Jericho Turnpike. New students are being enrolled there for private pilot training and hanger space at the field is again being rented to plane owners. Garofalo disclosed that Harry C. Dannhardt of Hicksville is among those recently issued a pilot's license at the Airpark.

Cantiague Rd Hearing Adjournd to May 3

The hearing before Oyster Bay Town Board on the proposed rezoning of 7 acres of Cantiague Rd., Hicksville, property from residential to industrial has been adjourned for two months. The request for adjournment was made Tuesday by Howard T. Hogan, attorney for the applicant, who plans to meet with residents of the area. The hearing will continue on May 3.

Seventeen persons registered their opposition at Oyster Bay Town Hall on Tuesday morning. Albert Foreman, who said he represented Isaac Penner "and others," recommended that Hogan's request for adjournment be granted.

Arrest 2 Youths, Charge Burglary

Two 16-year-old Hicksville youths are out on \$1,000 bail each awaiting action of the Nassau Grand Jury and accused by police as the pair who entered Sausmer's Hardware via a skylight two weeks ago. Second Precinct detectives arrested Charles W. White of 11 Herzog Pl. and James Zoubantes of 158 Duffy Ave., last Friday. Arraigned in District Court before Judge Samuel Grossman, the pair was released on bail, Saturday.

The arrest came four days after the A. & P. Super Market on Broadway, Hicksville, had been entered through a cellar door. The loss of \$60 in cash and some cigarettes was discovered last Wednesday morning. Only White is believed to have been involved in this break; however, police brought a specific third degree burglary charge against the pair for the hardware store entry, where some small change and two rifles were stolen.

The arrests were made by Detectives William Garrett and Al Young of the second squad.

Renting Library Space Costly Alternative

Rental of adequate quarters for the Hicksville Free Public Library would cost taxpayers of the school district \$2400 a year, or more, and still not provide the community with a permanent institution, according to Joseph Heim, president of the Library Board of Trustees.

Qualified voters of the district will decide on a proposed \$175,000 bond issue at a special meeting set for Mar. 29 at the high school auditorium. The bond issue will cover the cost of purchasing land, erecting a

library building, landscaping the grounds.

The library is confronted with the necessity of moving from its temporary location in Nicholas St. School building, Helm states. The space is needed by the Board of Education for classrooms. A study of rented quarters has indicated that adequate floor space would run \$200 a month or more.

Civics Hail 46-Trip Ticket; See Gain Despite Fare Rise

The Public Service Commission order directing the LIRR to create a monthly commutation ticket for the 5-day-a-week commuter was hailed today by the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. as the successful conclusion in its two-year campaign.

Lawrence A. Roman, chairman of the Rail Road Relations Committee of the HCCA, said he is elated with the results achieved. "It is unfortunate," he said, "that this 46-trip ticket carries with it a rate 20 per cent higher than the old 60-trip ticket. However, each 5-day-a-week commuter now has a saving of 18.33 per cent, for that is the additional increase on a 6-day-a-week ticket.

"What is more important is the fact that a five-day ticket is now established. Current high rates will not remain forever . . . they must recede as all economic factors settle and then the full savings to five-day commuters will be realized."

He urges five-day commuters to buy this new type monthly ticket rather than the weekly ticket as has been the practice of many commuters. It will result in an annual saving of \$30.20, he said.

During the past two years, the HCCA Rail Road committee mailed and received more than 2,000 letters and made numerous speeches in its campaign for a 46-trip ticket.

"We want to express our thanks to the more than 200 civic and service organizations as well as incorporated villages, US Senator Ives, Assemblywoman Genesta M. Strong, Assemblyman Frank Becker and Oyster Bay Township officials who gave the plan their unlimited support."

The PSC issued its directive on Feb. 28. Effective Monday of this week, Hicksville commuters have a choice of three tickets at the following rates to Penn station:

46-trip Monthly Ticket . . . \$17.85
60-trip Monthly Ticket . . . \$19.80
12-trip Weekly Ticket . . . \$ 4.70
The monthly commutation ticket was formerly \$14.85.

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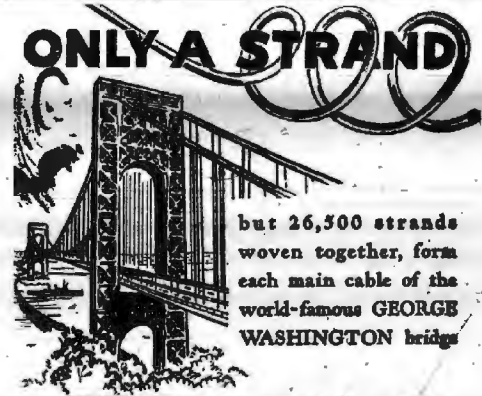
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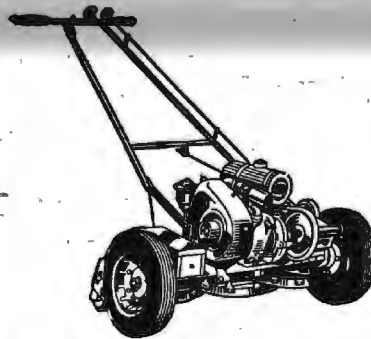

Fine Buildings May Not Be Enough

IT IS ALWAYS dangerous to make generalizations about patient attitude. Doctors at Nassau County Sanatorium point out that no two patients are exactly alike. This applies not only to the patient's physical condition, but also, because the two cannot be separated, to his mental attitudes as well.

To begin with, patients who have been at Nassau Sanatorium a longer period of time generally agree that morale, if not always uniformly good, has at least shown a gradual improvement since the low point reached shortly after the war. They point out that reasons for this are numerous: the food, because it is now possible to employ more competent kitchen workers, has shown a steady improvement; nurses, male orderlies, porters, painters, laboratory workers, and others needed to keep the sanatorium operating efficiently are now somewhat similar to locals and employ; television has developed into the TB patient's best friend—many patients pass away the hours looking at personal video cuts at their bedside; and with materials more readily available many more patients are taking part in the sanatorium's occupational therapy program.

This generally good and gradually improving picture does not mean that there is still not a great deal to be done. Talking with any patient will bring forth an avalanche of ideas for improvement, and occasionally some very bitter comments about the operation of the institution as well. Some of this can of course be dismissed as griping, searching for a scapegoat to allay the patient's frustration at his inability to get an immediate discharge—but a great deal more is directly traceable to conditions that can be improved, soundly based gripes deserving of a great deal more attention than mere dismissal. Griping does not develop in a vacuum, and once developed it becomes contagious and just as much in need of treatment as the patient's other ailments. Nothing aggravates a patient more than to be told his complaints are groundless—and there probably aren't a great many things which do him as much harm, particularly in a long-term proposition like tuberculosis.

Leading the patient's very legitimate gripes parade is the technique in distributing food. Patients usually agree quite readily that the food served at Nassau Sanatorium is probably high in vitamin content, that it is usually well prepared and carefully calculated to aid in the patient's recovery. But, they reason, to derive benefit from food it is first necessary to eat it—and eating a meal which is cold, no matter how appetizing it may appear, is difficult enough for a healthy individual, often impossible for the tubercular patient, no matter how vital it is to his recovery. And most of the patients are at a loss to explain why something is not done about this situation—certainly wealthy Nassau County, they reason, can afford movable steam tables to replace the antiquated tray wagons now used to carry the food to the rooms.

Bitter comments are also usually reserved for the institution's rooming arrangement, particularly when a patient well on the way to recovery is roomed with a

patient about to succumb to the disease. It is generally agreed that attitude is basic to recovery from tuberculosis—why then, it is asked, is a patient forced to undergo the anxiety, depression, and even terror that comes with watching a roommate die from the disease? Officials of the sanatorium point to a future building program, or an influx of more nurses to permit use of single rooms in other buildings for advanced cases, but such solutions are not immediately practical enough for the sanatorium patient to endorse with any show of enthusiasm. His problem is in the present, recovering within the next few months—future building programs mean little or nothing to him.

And there are other complaints: many feel the present program of patient education for recovery is totally inadequate, that it should be a constant process, not merely a handful of leaflets when the patient is first admitted. And they point to patients who wander around the sanatorium when they should be resting, who exercise by chaining themselves on doors, and who have drinking alcohol smuggled in because "... it's good for my morale," as living examples of this need. One patient complained that he had not seen his doctor in over a month, and another that he had not seen a doctor for three days during a crisis period—both instances other patients agreed, being exceptions, but exceptions which should by no means be tolerated.

This article has hit upon the low spots in Nassau County Sanatorium's story. The good side of the story can be found in the hard work and devotion of many of the staff, in the institution's modern layout and equipment, and, most important of all, in the large percentage of patients who go there, recover, and return to society. It is not necessary to point out that this favorable picture is also the more typical part of Nassau Sanatorium.

Educators are fond of talking of the child-centered school, where the child, not the subject taught, is the dominant interest of the teacher. The idea has been described by some as no less than revolutionary—and it would be just as revolutionary and just as practicable in the tax-supported tuberculosis sanatorium. The patient, not the buildings or the fine shrubbery and green lawns—which, unfortunately, the taxpayer is more likely to react favorably to—must be made the center and prime interest of the sanatorium. With such an approach many of the gripes of the patient at Nassau County Sanatorium would soon cease.

"Watch Out for Children" is the slogan this month of the Citizens' Advisory Parking and Traffic Committee of Hicksville, which represents the Civic Association, Business Men's Association, Kiwanis and Lions. The Committee stresses that it is the responsibility of adults to protect children from harm in traffic.

Most child traffic accidents could be avoided if motorists automatically regarded the sign of playing children as a danger sign and slowed to a speed which permits instant stopping.

dents, has gone on record with the Town Board as opposed to the change requested.

Moses, in a letter to the town fathers urging that the application be denied, wrote: "An industrial zone at this location will cause a break down of the residential zoning in this entire neighborhood and adversely affect the investment of the people of the State of New York and the nearby Northern State Parkway. Experience has clearly shown," he added, "that once a start is made on changes of this kind it has a bad effect on zoning throughout a large surrounding area and will lead to demands for further changes."

"We have had several communications from residents in this area," Moses continued, "who are strongly opposed to the establishment of an industrial area at this location. This Commission agrees with their contention that this area should be protected for residential purposes."

Howard T. The zone change is sought on seven acres on the east side of the road. Factories and warehouses built under variances granted by the Appeals Board between 1941 and 1945 are situated on this property and electronic assembly work is now being carried on there.

Young Pianist Delights Concert Audience

The first concert of the newly formed Hicksville Community Concert Association was presented in the high school auditorium last Thursday evening. The artist chosen to inaugurate the series was Sigi Weissenberg, Bulgarian-born pianist.

Although but 20 years old, Mr. Weissenberg has played many recitals in the Middle East, has toured Mexico, Central and South America and has won two coveted awards in America, the Philadelphia Orchestra Youth Contest and the Leventritt Award.

Mr. Weissenberg has a prodigious technique and his playing was most successful in the brilliant pieces. His playing of the slower movements requiring depth of feeling was not so convincing. After a not too auspicious start in a piano transcription of the well-known chorale "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" by Bach, Mr. Weissenberg settled down to some fine playing. He showed fine restraint and clarity of style in three sonatas of Scarlatti although we think the one in C Major was taken too fast and opportunities for fine echo effects completely missed.

The Chopin schubta was well done except for the lack of deep feeling in the Largo, and a brilliant reading of the Finale, completely won the audience.

Again in the second half of the program we enjoyed some fine bravura playing in pieces by Liszt and Prokofieff after which Mr. Weissenberg very graciously added three encores "Clair de Lune" by Debussy; the "Revolutionary Etude" by Chopin and the "Music Box" by Liadoff. A near capacity audience applauded Mr. Weissenberg enthusiastically throughout the concert.

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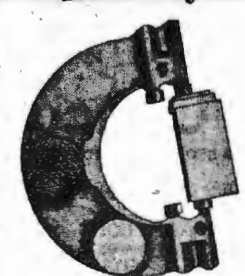
