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Heim to Tell Civics About Library

Joseph Heim, president of the Hicksville Public Library Board of Trustees, will explain the proposed \$175,000 bond issue for a library building at the regular meeting of the Hicksville Civic and Community Association on Thursday night, Mar. 24, in the firehouse auditorium. The question comes up for a vote on Mar. 29 at the high school.

All interested residents of the community are invited to the meeting, according to President Lawrence A. Roman, whether they are members of the HCCA or not. Heim is expected to display a sketch of the proposed building and outline the problems confronting the library.

A further discussion of the proposition is expected to take place on Monday night, Mar. 29, when the proposal comes up for a vote at a special meeting of the school district. The meeting in the high school takes place at 8 o'clock, followed by the voting.

Hear Chumsky Also

The Civics will also have as a guest

speaker on Mar. 24 Councilman Frank Chumsky, who will talk about town government. He is bringing with him maps of the special improvement districts of Hicksville and will answer the inquiries of newer residents, in particular, about extension of municipal services to new developments.

Little comment has been heard around the community since the library bond issue proposition was announced two weeks ago. The bond issue will cover the cost of acquiring

property at Cherry St. and Jerusalem Ave., erection of a one-story building of modern design which will also provide a community meeting room seating 75 persons, landscaping of the grounds, fees and other costs.

One criticism which has developed in local conversations has been regarding the price of \$13,500 asked for the site of the building, 151x107. One realtor told the Herald of a corner parcel on Old Country Rd., 175x (Continued on Page Four)

SCHOOL BOARD GIVES TEACHERS INCREASE

The teachers of Hicksville school system will get a "substantial increase in salaries" under the new budget of the district for the fiscal year starting July 1st it was disclosed this week by a spokesman for the Board of Education. He declined to state the amount of the increase provided under a new salary schedule.

The Board will hold a public hearing and meeting preliminary to the vote upon the budget, probably sometime in April, it was also disclosed. The tentative budget is now in the process of formation.

Albrecht Says School Board Made No Offer; Condemnation Begins

With condemnation proceedings by the Hicksville Board of Education scheduled to start in Nassau County Court next Monday morning, Frank Albrecht of Jericho this week asserted that he had never received any formal offer for his 10-acre parcel from the school authorities.

Purchase of the so-called Albrecht Parcel on Burns Ave., Hicksville, was approved by school district voters last November, along with the 21-acre Bergold property in the south section of the district. The Bergold purchase has been completed with \$3,000 an acre paid by the district.

Service of a notice of the condemnation action during the past week, Albrecht said, gave him his first official indication that the school district thinks his property is worth only \$1,500 an acre.

The acreage with 960-foot frontage on the east side of Burns Ave. runs back 480 feet to the St. John's Farm. The south side is bounded by Mangano Place, off Milton St. It is owned by the Jericho florist and his two sisters, one residing in Suffolk and the other in the City.

Developer Made Inquiry

About a year ago, David Steinert was authorized by the owners to offer the property for sale to the school district for \$35,000 or about \$3,500 an acre, according to the information gathered by the Herald in questioning Albrecht and Steinert. Nothing further was heard until late last summer when a \$30,000 offer, presented (Continued on Page Four)

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Levitt Houses Coming Closer to Hicksville

While Levitt & Sons has acquired farm lands within the Township of Oyster Bay, no permits for building houses in the township, south of Hicksville, have as yet been filed with the Town Building Dept.

Levitts have built 6,000 houses at Island Trees for rental and sale to

veterans, and have given the area the name of Levittown. Plans to build another 4,000 houses to be sold, not rented, in the same area have been revealed.

During the past few weeks, the sale of several large farm tracts north of Levittown, roughly bounded by Jerusalem Ave. on the east and New-

bridge Rd. on the west have been reported. This week the Hempstead Town Building department issued 750 permits to Levitt for homes in this section.

The newest section will apparently circle the Aviation Country Club property and bring Levitt houses even nearer to Hicksville.

Plastic Mfg. Plea Before Zone Board

Permission to continue manufacture of plastic compounds and protective surface coatings on Charlotte Ave., Hicksville, will be sought by Eronel Services Inc. at a meeting tomorrow (Thursday) night of the Zoning Board of Appeals in the Justice courtroom, Oyster Bay, at 7:30 p.m. The case had been held over since the last Board meeting.

New cases to be considered by the Board tomorrow night will include a request by John M. Coe of 83 Harrison Ave., Hicksville, who plans to erect a one-car garage with less setback than the ordinance allows on the southeast corner of Harrison and Herman Aves., Hicksville.

Joseph Graziano of 4807 192nd St., Flushing, is asking for a variance to erect a contractor's office, two houses and 4-car garage on the north side of Jericho Tpke., about 400 feet west of Brush Hollow Rd. or Union Ave., Jericho.

Garrett Waring of Glen Head plans to erect a dwelling with less width and area than the ordinance permits on the southwest corner of 13th St. and Meyers Ave., Hicksville.

Mid-Island Area 'Natural' For Industry

THE PROPOSED zone change on some seven acres along Cantiague Road, Hicksville, from residential to industrial has once again focused attention upon an important question before the mid-island community.

If you missed the start of the Cantiague Road business, there is an application before the Oyster Bay Town Board to create an industrial zone embracing property owned by the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Co. of North Carolina. The property in question has already been granted a variance of the zoning to permit light manufacturing (radio or electronic assembly). When the question came up for a public hearing last week, the hearing was adjourned at the request of the applicants until May 3rd.

Strong opposition to the zone change has been registered already and one of the major reasons for objection is the fact that under a variance only a specific, controlled type of activity is allowed. Under a zone change, what any kind of industrial operation would be permitted.

Say "industrial zone" to anyone and immediately there comes to mind a vision of heavy, noisy operation—Pittsburgh and its smoke. Speak of "light manufacturing" and a different picture comes to mind: small buildings, suitable landscaped and set back from the main highways.

The following comments are not to be taken as reasons for or against the Cantiague Road proposition. That one was mentioned only because it gives timeliness to this question of zoning for industry.

The location of Hicksville in the heart of the mid-island community with a reasonable amount of undeveloped land still available, makes it a "natural" site for proposed light manufacturing, planners assert.

George H. Hauser, vice-president of Liberty Aircraft Products Corp. in Farmingdale and a director of the Bank of Hicksville, sounded a logical note in this connection last January. In a letter wishing the Mid-Island Herald the utmost success, he added:

"Hicksville, I have long felt, will be the center of industrial activity in Nassau County if industry is brought to that area under proper planning and condition. I may be somewhat prejudiced in favor of Hicksville as I happened to have been born there; but Hicksville being served by the Long Island Rail Road as it is, I see no reason why the entire area between Westbury, Farmingdale and Syosset could not become the location for industries such as the type that now exist with a high-class, well-paid group of employees who will then be able to live close to their work and participate in the activities of Nassau County."

Hicksville has at this moment a number of local concerns which fall in the classification of "light manufacturing" and which are in no way offensive or detrimental. The homeowner has a vital interest, if he'll only take a moment, in the establishment of such regulated manufacturing. For one thing, a manufacturing plant pays taxes, helps support schools and provides municipal services while making little or no demands for those facilities. Thus the tax burden is

passed from the shoulders of the home owner. Further, a high-class manufacturing activity provides local employment and that can be a decided asset at a time when the \$20 monthly commutation fare to New York may be a detriment for the potential home purchaser.

The Herald hopes that the authorities now engaged in overhauling the zoning ordinance of the Township are giving serious thought to the establishment of a new kind of zone which will fit the so-called "light manufacturing" activity.

THIS ENTIRE MATTER of "Making Zoning Work for the Community" will be aired on Friday, Mar. 26, at a Planning and Zoning Forum in the Garden City Hotel. Sponsors are the Long Island Association and the Long Island Real Estate Board. Henry G. Eisenmann of Hicksville, chairman of the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Zone Revision for the Township, is a director of the Long Island Association.

The importance of adequate zoning for light industry in suitable areas in both Nassau and western Suffolk Counties is to be emphasized at the Forum. Grover O'Neill of Oyster Bay, who is serving on the Citizens' Committee with Eisenmann and is a member of the Board of Directors of the Regional Plan Association, will preside at the morning session.

We expect that this forum will at least indirectly, if not directly, determine the future of expanded light manufacturing activity in the mid-island area. While Hicksville may not be mentioned by name during the discussions, it is obvious that planners have their eyes upon it.

ALBRECHT SAYS SCHOOL BOARD MADE NO OFFER

(Continued from Page One)

to them as an offer by some out-of-town developer, was made.

Since the property in question was bought by the Albrechts for \$22,100 in 1928, the \$30,000 proposal was rejected by the owners.

"About a month ago," Albrecht says, "I was visited by Charles H. Stoll and asked several questions about the property but no offer was made." Stoll was attorney for the school district in the acquisition of the Bergold property, and is representing the district in the condemnation proceedings. The next thing he knew, Albrecht was served with a paper Saturday, Mar. 5, concerning the condemnation.

A spokesman for the School Board told the Herald on Friday that "the owners of the Albrecht property have been served in a condemnation action." No further comment was made.

"Public Misinformed"

Albrecht is disturbed to find Hicksville people seem to have the impression that he is attempting to "hold up the people" in the sale of the Burns Ave. acreage. Since his initial offer to the School Board a year ago, he asserts that he has "received no formal offer from the district—at any price—and had not been approached by any member of the board regarding the sale of the property."

Now he believes the condemnation litigation will prevent him from selling the property to a legitimate prospective purchaser; further, he does not feel free to rent the land to a grower who has rented it from him in previous years, because of the litigation.

He felt the \$35,000 price he quoted through his broker, Steinert, was a fair enough price since it originally cost \$32,100 and taxes have been paid on it for 20 years. There are 180 lots in the 10 acres.

Registration for Library Vote This Saturday

The qualifications for a voter at the special meeting of Hicksville School District set for Mar. 29 at the High School to consider the proposed \$175,000 bond issue for a new public library were reviewed today by Andrew H. Heberer, District Clerk. The qualifications are the same as for voting at an annual school meeting.

Personal registration of voters is required. Persons who registered to vote for school trustees last May or for the school land purchase in Nov. need not register again. There are about 900 qualified voters already registered. Those who have not registered, may do so this Saturday, Mar. 19, at Nicholas St. School building

between the hours of 4 and 9 P.M. All voters must be (1) citizens of the United States, (2) 21 years of age, and (3) reside within the district since Feb. 23; and in addition, possess one of the following three qualifications:

- (a) Owns, leases, hires or is in possession under contract of property liable to taxation (one only may vote unless in both names).
- (b) Is the parent of a child of school age, provided such child has attended the district (public) school for at least eight weeks during the year preceding the school meeting (both may vote).
- (c) Not being a parent, has a child of school age residing with him who

has attended district school eight weeks (only one may vote).

Contrary to reports published elsewhere, the registration of voters takes place Mar. 19 at Nicholas St. School building and the special meeting on the bond issue takes place Mar. 29 at the High School.

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




