

Town Prepares Beaches For Big Yr.

The eight public bathing beaches and parts of Oyster Bay Township on the Long Island Sound and Atlantic Ocean where upwards of 80,000 persons enjoy bathing and recreation in summer on a single day, are being prepared for a record season, Supervisor Harry Tappen revealed this week.

Graders, bulldozers and men are busy getting auto parking fields in shape for the season, correcting

the beaches, preparing for winter storms. Public improvements are being installed and modernization is taking place at several of the beaches.

Improved facilities for yachts and boating are also being undertaken in preparation for the season at Theodore Roosevelt Memorial Park on Oyster Bay Harbor.

Oyster Bay Township boasts of

more public beaches for its residents than any other township in the county. Town beaches on the north shore include Roosevelt Memorial Park and Beekman on Oyster Bay Harbor, Oak Neck, Stuehl's and Centre Island on the Sound, Glenwood on Hempstead Harbor and Tobay, which is a two-mile stretch of oceanfront next to Jones Beach State Park. There is also a small beach in Massapequa on the Great South Bay.

The town beaches officially open on Saturday, May 29, in time for the Decoration Day weekend.

Development And Planning

Planning is a pretty unpopular word nowadays. It sometimes carries with it a stigma, a blot, a disreputable thing which forces polite people to avoid it in their parlor conversations. Planning brings to mind a huge mass of encroaching bureaucracy, Washington, Square radicals with their soap-boxes, and innocent little pigs bravely marching to the gallows.

The picture is an unfortunate one. It indicates that we have been so impressed by the more flagrant failures of planning that we have overlooked many of its successes. We have been so cowed by its blunders that we are often unable to see the planning that goes on around us all the time, that it is usually not only a good thing, but a real necessity. We plan our homes. We plan the way streets should be laid out. At this moment we are developing all sorts of plans to meet community educational, parking and zoning needs—and if we aren't, we should be. A "community plan" to govern all functions and activities of the community would certainly be undesirable, to put it mildly, but community planning to eliminate wasteful practices, to search for and outline community potentialities, and then to develop techniques for putting them into effect is nothing more than common sense. Common sense of a wise sort, it might be added.

An integral part of this planning is the process of gathering information to base plans on—idealism is a fine thing if it is based solidly on facts, which it so often is not. For example, before flying off and drawing up grandiose plans for an expanded school system, it is wise to determine what the educational needs will be when the plans are completed and in effect. The technique more and more employed is to call in survey experts, people trained in just such work, to get at the facts and turn them over to the community to put into effect. And, like planning as a whole, it is a technique which has resulted in spectacular successes and spectacular blunders as well.

If not used with care, survey experts can be an expensive nuisance. For one thing, local attitudes play an important part in any community development program—outsiders who come in for a three-month or more study attempt to measure these attitudes. For another, only a very small part of a community survey is of the type that can be put down in the form of statistics and charts—the remainder and perhaps the most important part leaves with the survey expert. And finally, a dependence on experts to come in, look the situation over, then present the community with a sure-fire cure in the way of formulas and charts, is hardly in keeping with any concept of small-community democracy. It would seem, at least, that members of the community could play a more important role than awed spectators.

A plan developed in a small Nevada town is based on a compromise between complete dependence on "experts" on one hand and surveys by untrained local residents on the other. The idea is to organize a survey committee of three or four local residents, serving directly under a community council, and hire a survey expert to work with it part-time and advise on techniques and procedures. The advantages of such a plan should be immediately obvious: for one, no one knows the community as well as those living in it—the best results can thus be obtained by such a group working with an expert in survey techniques. For another, the entire process has an educational value as well for the people within the community—it teaches them to work together, to help themselves in solving local problems. And finally, it saves money—a number of surveys by outside experts alone can develop into a fairly expensive proposition.

Under any condition, development of a community is no small-time job. It is a task that involves both time and patience and no little skill. The problem, then, is not one of whether or not there should be planning, but rather of what kind of planning it shall be. And the wise approach would seem to be to look for an answer to this preliminary and basic question first—then go about planning for some of Hicksville's long and short-time needs.

Vacation Reading Club Again

The Hicksville Free Public Library will sponsor a Vacation Reading Club for the seventh consecutive year this summer. It was announced this week by Mrs. Marion Cecil, librarian. The Library will also sponsor, for its second year, art and nature classes with the same excellent teachers as last year.

Madame Emmy Lichtwitz-Krasso, who has been teaching at Parsons School of Design in New York this winter, will again conduct the art classes. There will be two classes for children from 6 to 2 years and 9 to 12 years.

The nature study class will also be divided into two age groups.

Registration will start in June. The dates will be announced next month.

Hundreds of Hicksville boys and girls have enjoyed the summer programs sponsored by the library. The programs increase in popularity each year.

Concert Group Plans Fall Renewal

With a fine program by the City Service baritone, Mac Morgan, the Hicksville Community Concert Association came to a triumphant close Monday evening, April 25.

Those who have attended the series have been more than delighted, expressing regret that the concerts are over for this year. Those who have not been so fortunate have been made envious by the glowing reports circulated about the series. There should be no trouble at all to sell out the auditorium completely next year, when the concerts again get under way.

This year's offerings seem to have been particularly felicitously chosen, opening with the brilliant young Bulgarian pianist, Sigi Weissenberg, followed by Mata and Hari, the hilarious dance sat-

irists, and closing with Mac Morgan, whose program made an excellent closing for an already excellent and varied series.

Enjoyable Program

Mr. Morgan gave an appreciative audience a highly enjoyable program, which included a French aria from Gounod's Faust and German lieder, as well as classical Italian and English songs. He displayed a resonant baritone voice of pleasing quality and adequate power and range. It seemed to this observer that he was most successful in the purely lyric, less dramatic numbers that did not tend to force either his range or his volume.

Perhaps Mr. Morgan's southern and western background partly explain his apparent understanding and enjoyment of the ballads and Negro songs, in which he seemed especially at home. Particularly in the ballad "My Hoaxes Ain't Honky," the audience enjoyed his skillful and humorous characterizations of both the man and the woman in the dialogue. In fact, throughout the entire program, Mr. Morgan showed himself to be a very personable young man with a fine, though somewhat limited voice, and a good interpretive sense. He presented a program which he himself seemed to enjoy, and generously rewarded his enthusiastic audience with seven encores.

Excellent Accompanist

Mr. La Montaigne, his accompanist, gave excellent support to the singer and added greatly to

the pleasure of the evening by his sympathetic and artistic teamwork. In many cases, the contribution of an accompanist to the success of a soloist is overlooked, yet a good accompanist must be first a good pianist—and then something more in his instinct for the team.

Mr. La Montaigne, his accompanist, was admirably. In his solo group he offered three short numbers of his own composition, besides an Intermezzo by Brahms and a Prelude by Rachmaninoff. His encore was the "Black Key" Etude of Chopin.

Baseball, universally acclaimed as the Great American Pastime, came out of the total eclipse that has hidden it for the past decade in Hicksville when Tony Puccio's A. A. took a 12-5 slugging from the Hempstead PBC Tigers Sunday.

Although the initial efforts to restore the diamond game to the land where it once flourished in unchallenged interest and perfection were unsuccessful, there was nothing in the proceedings to indicate that the A.A. doesn't have staying power.

The complete rebuff in the opening Long Island Baseball League game only denotes that the day of real accomplishment isn't within the foreseeable future.

The A. A. has already made its presentation attractive. The brand new contrasting grey and red uniforms are an eye-appealing sign of organization. A public address system provides recorded music and announces the lineups before the game. The fans have comfortable seating space and are supplied with score cards with which to follow the course of the game.

However, if the setting is ideal, the performance is otherwise. Both the pitching and hitting of the club are in need of a good deal of zip and power.

Hempstead went to work early on the offerings of George Luback and George Kunz and had its 12 runs after four innings. In all, the visitors rapped out 11 hits and were issued 11 free passes.

In fairness to the Hicksville hurlers, the ten errors committed behind them caused considerable damage, and a daring outfield which played at least 325 feet from home plate enabled four pop flies to fall in for hits.

The locals couldn't do much with the stick until the game was well beyond salvaging.

When veteran pitcher Lee Skura went to the hill for Hempstead in the first inning, a voice boomed from the stands, "Come on, boys, he never lasts more than two frames."

The information proved slightly erroneous. In the first six innings Hicksville collected just one hit, a single by Tony Coletta, and two walks.

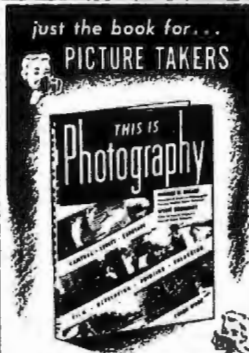
CYO Track Meet Here on May 15
