Tentative plans for the formal dedication of the new Charles Wagner American Legion Post Clubhouse on E. Nicholas St., Hicksville, were disclosed last night by Commander Fred Brenge.

## Organize Blood Bank on Monday

Organization of a permanent Hicksville Blood Bank for the free use of all residents of the school district area will take place next Monday night, May 16, in the Public Library on Nicholas St. A preliminary draft of by-laws was prepared at an executive committee meeting this week.

Garrett Korfitzen, chairman of the blood bank, explained today that arrangements for a public blood donor session in the community will probably be the main order of business. Representatives of all local organizations are expected to attend.

A tentative set of regulations governing the withdrawal of blood from the bank after a sufficient credit has been established will be submitted for group action.

The blood bank meeting is at 8 o'clock. Immediately after it, organization representatives will take part in a meeting called by the Tercentennial Committee to discuss creation of a Council to carry forward the annual Founder's Day celebration program.

Ceremonies are scheduled for Friday night, May 27, at 8:30, when all stockholders of the clubhouse, members of the post and honored guests will be invited.

On Saturday, May 28, between 12 noon and 6 p. m., open house will take place and all interested will be invited to inspect the clubhouse.

That night at 8:30 a dedication dance will take place in the remodeled building for local veterans and their wives and guests.

The Post committee making arrangements includes Edward Becker, Walter Schlichting, Rudolf Bouse, Ernest Gundlach, Forrest Mason, Joseph Kayel and Commander Brenge.

A slate of officers for the post will be submitted at the meeting next Monday night. Members of the nominating committee include Commander Brenge, Becker, Schlichting and Fred Davis.

At the regular post meeting held a week ago Monday a contribution to the Northport Hospital Bus fund was voted.

As a direct result, George V. Spohrer, who is owner of the property, levelled a blast at Supervisor Harry Tappen.

## ANNOUNCE FROM THEME

"A Midsummer's Night Dream" will be theme for the decorations of the Junior Prom to be held next Friday night, May 20, in the Hicksville High School gym.

Spohrer was served with papers a week ago Friday as the town, through its attorney, Theodore V. Summers, sought to obtain a temporary and permanent injunction against the Airpark and the destruction of the buildings. The summons was to be answered last Wednesday in Court.

**Put Over One Day**  
An attempt to get an adjournment, Spohrer says, was opposed by the town attorney, Judge Hill put the case over to the next day (Thursday). Spohrer's attorney found Summers' papers "legally inefficient" and the town withdrew its action. New papers were filed and the case comes up this morning (Wednesday) in Mineola.

Meanwhile, the Airpark owner opened up on Tappen, who had signed a supporting affidavit in the town's action. Spohrer asserted that in the early part of 1945, in the company of his brother-in-law, he met Tappen and inquired as to the most suitable spot for an airpark in the township. "He informed me," Spohrer states, "that in the vicinity of the town incinerator was the most logical location."

"I fail to understand the town's action," he added. "There are over 2000 names on file with the township, all expressing support of the Airpark. The Hicksville Civics and Kiwanis Club have gone on record in favor of the Airpark."

**Threatens Suit**  
"Further, the town itself has twice approved variances of local zoning to permit the airpark to operate. I notice that the complaint signed by Tappen refers to a threatened law suit. I have myself spoken of bringing legal action." (continued on page 13)

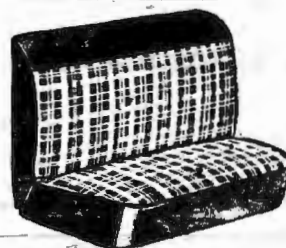

# Health Dept. And Tick Menace

The Nassau County Health Dept. is without any authority to undertake any type of insect or pest eradication. Health Commissioner Earle G. Brown, M. D., advised the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. this week. His comment was in reply to the petition forwarded by the civic group, from residents in the east end of Hicksville who are alarmed by the reported increase of disease-carrying ticks in their neighborhood.

A report of the health department upon Rocky Mountain spotted fever, published by the department in March, 1948, has been submitted to the civics. It includes suggestions concerning prevention of spotted fever:

"Rocky Mountain spotted fever occurs widely in the United States. It was first recognized in the northwest, particularly in Montana and Idaho. In the east, cases are most often found in the Coastal States from Massachusetts to Georgia. During the past nine years, nine cases have been reported among Nassau County residents; the disease has occurred in Suffolk County in greater numbers.

"Spotted fever is spread to man by the bite of an infected tick—in the east it is the dog tick *Dermacentor variabilis*. Adult ticks are flat when unfed, and the females swell up to nearly the size of a kidney bean when they are engorged. As a blood meal seems to make the spotted fever organism increasingly active and virulent, danger of infection is much less if the tick is removed soon after it has attached itself—within two or four hours.

"The best way of preventing spotted fever," the health department recommends, "is to stay away from tick-infested regions during the tick season (spring and summer). If that is not possible, wear protective clothing to keep ticks off the skin and promptly remove all ticks found on the person without crushing them. Ticks should be removed with tweezers or with a bit of cotton or paper held between the fingers. After removal, the tick bite should be painted with an antiseptic, such as iodine, and the tick itself should be burned or flushed down the drain.

"Individuals whose work takes them into areas where infected ticks are common can be protected by a vaccine developed by the officers of the United States Public Health Service. So far spotted fever has not been enough of a menace in New York to justify extensive use of the vaccine."

Since this report was prepared, another case of spotted fever was reported during 1948, making the known total of cases for Nassau, ten. The first case was registered about 1940.

The health department understands that the first case of spotted fever was reported in Suffolk about 1912, and the number reported by years since that time has varied from none to as high as 16 for one year.

Dr. Brown adds that as far as he knows, no other department of the County Government has authority to undertake a tick eradication program either.

The Civics have also communicated the petition and plea for assistance to the Oyster Bay Town Board.

# School Building Needs

When certain you will be as concerned as I am to see that great care is taken in the planning and operation of our schools, to the end that every dollar of school money—whether received from state or local sources—yields the greatest possible return to the education of youth."

What comment is taken from the letter of Francis T. Spaulding, State Commissioner of Education, addressed to school trustees and voters. The letter was circulated state-wide for reading at the annual meetings of Tuesday, May 3. You will note the word "planning." Hicksville did something definite about "planning" when voters wisely appropriated \$5,000 at the annual meeting to undertake a study of existing facilities and future requirements.

The commissioner has something else to say of particular interest in the mid-Island area: "Probably the most critical problem facing many districts is what to do about school building needs. . . In many districts, rapidly increasing enrollments have seriously overtaxed present facilities. Temporary and sub-standard facilities have been brought into use. Overcrowded classes and shortened school days have been resorted to. These practices," he noted, "for whatever reason they may have had to be adopted, cannot be condoned and must be eliminated as quickly as possible. Such conditions seriously reduce educational opportunities for our boys and girls—opportunities never to be regained."

Attendance at the local annual meetings was good, considering the turnouts of previous years, but poor when measured against the numbers who should have attended in the interest of their children's education.

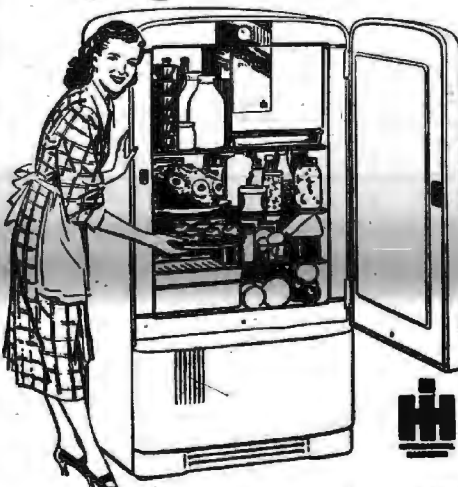

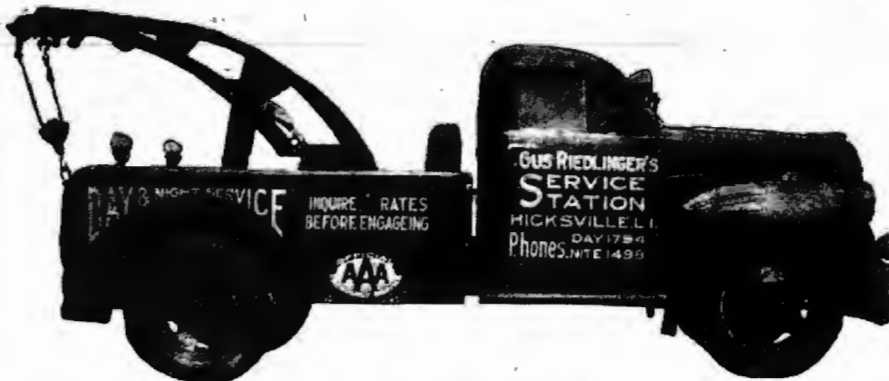

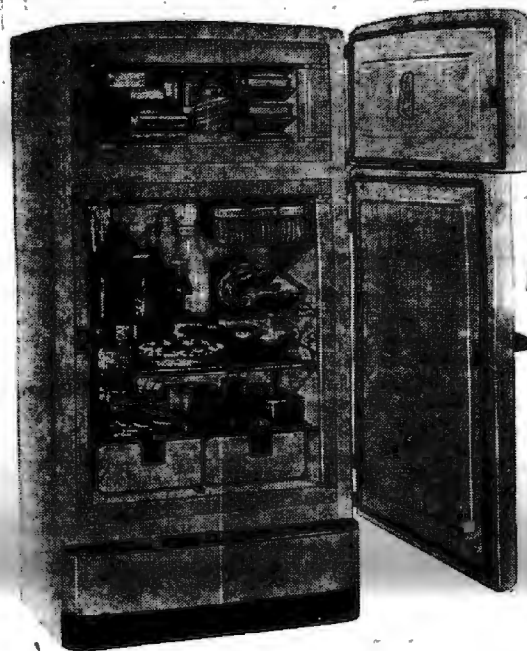

The story of one of organized baseball's strangest odities, in which a product from the sandlots and high school of Hicksville was a pivotal figure, cracked over the wires of the Associated Press in the wee hours of May 7th last.
