Movies Recall Big Spectacle

An hour and a half program of motion pictures, mostly in natural color, of the Hicksville 300th Birthday celebration highlights of last year will be shown to all interested at the Nicholai Street School auditorium tomorrow (Thursday) night starting at 8:30 sharp.

The films of at least nine residents will be seen during the evening. While the films are largely views of the great parade of floats which concluded the Tercentennial program, there are also shots of other features of the 8-day festival, according to Bernard Braun and Miss Phebe Seaman who are in charge of the showing for the Tercentennial Committee.

The program is expected to have special interest for new residents while those who saw the events last year will want to take advantage of the opportunity to recall the spectacle. The program is free to the public.

Costume Ball On Saturday

Founder's Day for Hicksville will be celebrated this Saturday evening with a costume ball at the high school gymnasium starting at 9 o'clock. Admission will be restricted to those wearing some costume of a period to 1900. The affair is under the auspices of the Hicksville Civic and Community Association.

In response to numerous requests for information about costumes, Civic President Lawrence A. Roman disclosed last night that the HCCA has arranged with J. Wustl's Sons, Costumers, of 662 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, for costume rentals on a reasonable basis. Frank J. Timmons is manager of the concern. Prices range from \$3.50 to \$7 covering all types from Indian, Puritan, Civil War, Colonial, Military, etc. to Shakespearean and comedy.

Those wishing to rent costumes must make arrangements directly with J. Wustl's Sons at Brooklyn. Many residents are preparing their own at home or renting them from other firms.

The Civics will award male and female prizes for the most novel costumes.

Court Refuses Town Board Plea For Temporary Order On Airpark

The Hicksville Airpark won a preliminary skirmish with Oyster Bay Town Fathers this week when a request for a temporary injunction to restrain the field from operating was denied by Judge L. Barron Hill in Supreme Court, Mineola, Friday.

Justice Hill noted in his decision: "The court can perceive no injury or damage to plaintiffs prior to a determination of the uses upon a trial. On the other hand, to grant the plaintiffs the drastic relief which it seeks upon the application would cause irreparable damage to defendants should they

Organize PBC For Hicksville

First enrollment of boys 13 to 15 for membership in the new Hicksville Police Boys Club has been set for June 4 at the high school field before 2 o'clock. The Hicksville PBC was organized this week with Harold Manaski as president. The club is under the supervision of Ptl. Robert Reynolds who also directs the Bethpage and Syosset PBCs. A total enrollment of over 300 is anticipated for the new club.

Propose Council Of Organizations For United Action

The creation of a Hicksville Community Council, consisting of representatives of all Hicksville's 60-odd organizations, was begun this week at the final report meeting of the Tercentennial Committee. Formal organization is not expected to take place until after the summer; however, an interim group will be created at a meeting tentatively set for Monday night, June 20.

The Tercentennial meeting was held with representatives of about 25 groups present Monday night at the Free Public Library. Miss Gertrude Wetterauer presided and after giving a report on finances in connection with last year's celebration, presented the proposed plan for a Council.

After a detailed discussion of the project, those present indicated their individual approval pending presentation of the question to the various societies and organizations they represented. A Council, as proposed, would be designed to "fill a definite need in the community," it was stated. Its aim would be to protect the identity of any group which seeks to initiate a program for general community welfare.

Named by the delegates as a committee to work out a tentative set-up for the Council were Lawrence A. Roman, William Frohnhoefer and Mrs. William I. Magill. Delegates were advised to watch the Herald for announcements of future meetings.

Jericho Votes \$3500 Summer Program

A six-week summer program for the children of Jericho School District was approved at the recessed annual district meeting last week on Tuesday night. The vote was 103 yes and 36 no for appropriation of \$3500 for the five-day-a-week program. The plan was proposed at the May 6 meeting by Henry G. Bruns of Cedar Swamp Road.

The program will be under the supervision of the Principal and four teachers and includes supervised play, handicrafts and special trips to beaches and ball games. The sum of \$1925 is allowed for salaries.

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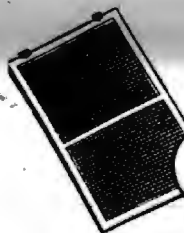


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Catholic Daughters Conduct Election

Arrangements have just been completed for a class in painting for girls and boys, 5 to 14 years of age, to be held at Hicksville Public Library on four Tuesday afternoons, July 5, 12, 19 and 26, at two o'clock. The instructor will be Mrs. Emmy Lichtwitz-Krasso of New York, who directed the children's painting group last summer. Registration for the class may be made now at the Public Library.

Instruction is free, but a registration fee of \$1.00 will be made to cover cost of supplies used by each child.

Mrs. Krasso has developed her own philosophy of child art. "I have found that uninfluenced child art is like every folk art—primitive, truthful and powerful; also that cultural roots often show themselves in the children's work. In an international group children who have never painted before, or even seen any paintings, show in their own work certain characteristics of their natural and racial culture. On the other hand, when uninfluenced by adult ideas and standards, children all over the world use the same pictorial symbols. Their expression is immediately understood by other children whatever language they speak, for children the world over create in the same way and with the same symbols."

This class in painting is to be a part of the public library's summer program of activities for young people.

Carol Gronback received a one rating for twirling in the competition held Saturday at Farmingdale. Carol Baumeister received a two rating for twirling.

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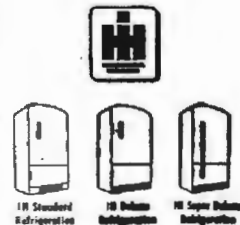
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African Missionary To Speak Tonight

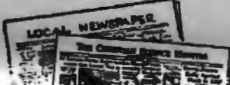

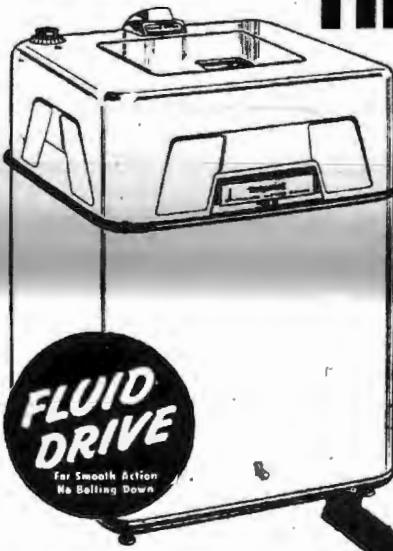

Accidents And Woodlands

The age-old dilemma of too much to do and too little time to do it in necessitates a column turned out on the double-quick this week. Perhaps this would be a good opportunity to treat a brace of items of less than world-shaking significance that have been hanging around waiting to be commented on for some time now. Neither of them alone would be enough to devote a full column to, but perhaps together they might just turn the trick.

One of the really surprising things about several local intersections is that so few accidents take place at them. It is surprising because visibility at those intersections is almost nil, and crossing them is more like dashing across a shooting range. The difficulty arises from the fact that cars are allowed to park almost at the corners, blocking the vision of motorists trying to cross. You'll get a good

idea of the situation by driving up West Marie St. across Jerusalem Ave. sometime. Or, to a slightly less degree, through the Newbridge Ave.-West Marie St. or Nicholas St.-Jerusalem Ave. intersections.

A little white paint, plus a few "No Parking From Here to Corner" signs would take care of the problem very nicely. The fact that cars often dash along Newbridge Rd. and Jerusalem Ave. at a fairly rapid pace should help dramatize the situation a bit, spur officials into taking adequate action. It makes little sense to trust to luck when a few dollars will remove the danger.

Clearance of some of Long Island's most beautiful woodland has been going on at an accelerated pace these past few years, particularly with the post-war need for new land for housing. It is probably all quite necessary, and I suppose there's nothing as unproductive for modern society as wild woodland, but there are still a lot of people who are sorry to see it go. And count me among them.

Workers are busy right now clearing trees from land not far from where local Boy Scouts used to (and possibly still do) camp, a section leading up to May's (or is it Mae's?) hill, near Melville. Bulldozers have been working for several months now clearing the land, uprooting stumps, and preparing the area for more practical and productive use. Somehow the rational, the useful, the intelligent approach seems inadequate to explain away the clearing of this area.

I wonder if perhaps in a few years the most practical thing to have around would be just such wooded area. With housing going up on a mass scale and the population of Long Island growing by leaps-and-bounds, I wonder if the land set aside to date for use as public parks will prove at all adequate. And it would also seem far more intelligent at this point to plan to select and preserve the most beautiful woodlands, rather than wait until parks are needed and then be forced to make use of what remains.

Under any condition, these are just a couple of rudimentary ideas resulting from a drive through that Melville section recently. And they are offered with the warning that they themselves are probably rationalizations for a personal attitude that may be a bit out of keeping with the spirit of the times.

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Wetterauer 2nd In Golf Tourney

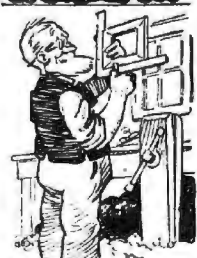
