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Bethpage Gets Express June 13

The popular evening commuter train (No. 244) is being made an express from Jamaica, with its first stop at Bethpage, commencing June 13, to "eliminate standees," it was disclosed this week by David B. Smucker, trustee and chief operating officer of the Long Island Rail Road.

The proposed change is being vigorously opposed by Hicksville commuters, led by Lawrence A. Roman, president of the civic association.

With the new summer timetable, Smucker revealed, train No. 244 will express from Jamaica (5:40

p.m.) to Bethpage, to be followed by a new train from Jamaica at 5:45 p.m., stopping at Mineola, Carle Place, Westbury and Hicksville. The new train will terminate at Hicksville.

LIRR Made Study

"We have conducted a thorough study of traffic using No. 244," he adds, "and developed that this train normally handles 1,060 passengers, including 262 standees, of which 506 are for points east of Hicksville, with a combined total of 646 detraining at Mineola, Westbury and Hicksville."

Roman, in his protest to Smucker, said his Association made a count of passengers on May 11, and found 343 left the train at Hicksville and 125 at Mineola.

"Many of the Hicksville commuters," Roman continued, "now miss train 214 by a matter of a few minutes and have to wait every evening 15 or more minutes for train 244. Under the proposed new schedule, it would mean that they would have to wait about 25 minutes for their train at Penn station."

BMA Protests Move to Close Down Airpark

The Hicksville Business Men's Association believes that the Hicksville Airpark should be permitted to continue operating as a sportsmen's flying centre on Robbins Lane. The Board of Directors this week adopted a resolution requesting that the Oyster Bay Town Board spend no town funds for legal fees in attempts to close down the Airpark.

The resolution was carried by a majority vote at the BMA meeting held Thursday night at the Stockholm Restaurant. The motion was made substantially the same as the petition form published as an advertisement in last week's issue of the Mid-Island Herald.

'Court Entertains Doubt'

Oyster Bay Town Board is seeking a permanent injunction against the Airpark to prevent its operation and to have the structures upon it demolished. Last week Supreme Court Justice L. Barron Hill denied an application for a temporary injunction. In a memorandum, Justice Hill noted: "The court entertains doubt as to the sufficiency of the complaint, by reason of the irrelevant and conclusory matter therein contained."

A trial on the permanent injunction proceedings is not expected to take place until the fall. Spohrer has been circulating petitions this week, asking that the town "spend no town funds for legal services" on this proceeding.

Town Places Signs Limiting Parking

Enforcement of the Hicksville Parking Ordinance, limiting parking on certain local business streets, will begin almost immediately. Signs designating limited parking areas are this week being set in position by the Town Highway Department.

The board approved the request of Henry C. Stoltz for a variance to build a gas and service station at the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Herzog Pl., Hicksville, was held over until the next meeting of the Zoning Board of Appeals; it was learned, following the regular board meeting last Thursday. The request was made by Sam J. Kellner of Field Ave., Hicksville.

The board approved the request of Henry C. Stoltz for a variance to build with less rear and side yards, provided he receives the approval of his neighbors.

Paul Sardello of S. Oyster Bay Rd., Hicksville, was denied his request for a variance to build a farm stand at the south-west corner of South Oyster Bay Rd. and Walters Ave., Hicksville.

Broadway is already marked for one-hour parking.

County to Fix Road

Chlumsky also revealed that the Nassau County Dept. of Public Works will improve Jerusalem Ave. from Fourth St. south to the Hempstead Town line.

Recently Chlumsky, Highway Superintendent John R. Brandt, Town Attorney Theodore V. Summers, as a committee for the town, called upon County Attorney Marcus G. Christ in an effort to solve the question of jurisdiction on Jerusalem Ave. The County has agreed to take over improvement of the street and has already begun a survey.

Post Office Asks Rent Proposals

A strong possibility that the Hicksville Post Office may move from its Herzog Place location within the next few months to another address was seen today.

At the same time it was learned that construction was scheduled to start this week on a building 40x100 to house the Island Trees branch of the Hicksville Post Office. Hempstead Town Board has approved the plans submitted by John A. Seligman, owner and developer of the site, which is on

the north side of Hempstead Tpk. between Jerusalem and Edison Ave.

Branch Ready By Sept.

Curtis Ketcham, Farmingdale contractor, predicts the Island Trees branch office will be completed by "the middle of September, 1949."

The Hicksville main office is nearing the end of its current five-year lease on Herzog Place. Post Office Inspector P. J. McNeil, at Jamaica, will receive proposals to "furnish suitable quarters for post office purposes at Hicksville" for a term of 5 or 10 years, up to and including June 18.

A lease of five or 10 years for Hicksville Post Office quarters is contemplated which, according to some local observers, means that construction of a federal post office building in Hicksville is at least five or more years in the future.

Hicksville and Plainview organizations and residents during the past several months have been petitioning congressional representatives from this area with a plea for a federal building. The latest development on this topic, reported by Congressman W. Kingsland Macy, is that Hicksville is now on the "list" for a \$225,000 structure, if and when federal public works funds are appropriated.

Notice that proposals for leasing post office quarters in Hicksville of about 4500 square feet are sought was made this week by posting in the local office. Gen-

eral building requirements, bid forms and other data is available for property owners interested. Postmaster William G. Molitor or Inspector P. J. McNeil at Room 268, General Post Office Bldg., 88-04 164th St., Jamaica.

The Hicksville office in the past several years has had a tremendous increase in business, largely because all the mail for the Levitt development at Island Trees is handled through this office. Its present location on narrow Herzog Place is regarded as a constant reason for traffic snarls on this block. Besides doubling its floor space on Herzog Place, the Hicksville office also has rented a store on Newbridge Rd. for the handling of parcel post.

Levitt Now Selling To Non-Veterans

Levitt and Sons this week published advertisements in the daily press making 1948 Levittown, Island Trees, houses available to non-veterans as well as veterans. Since its start, the 6,000 home area had been exclusively limited to ex-service men, and most of the houses are rentals.

"A limited amount of the 1948 Levittown homes are available from time to time," the ads state. Vets need no down payments, others need \$1350. The complete purchase price is \$7,990. Carrying charges are \$58 for vets and \$52 monthly for non-vets.

Levitts announced recently, that the community will number 10,000 houses by Christmas of this year. Over 100 of the 1949 Levitt houses have already been occupied.

While there was some local talk that the realty and housing boom was slowing down in this section, sale of the Hohorst farm of 91 acres at Old Country Rd., Hicksville, near the parkway, was disclosed. Max W. Holtz and Jerry Leibowitz, New York investors, said 400 houses will be built in the "medium price range."

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


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
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400 At Spring Dance Given By Republicans

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State Studies Control Of Ticks, Unable To Relieve Local Menace

While the State Department of Health appreciates the concern of Hicksville residents over Rocky Mountain spotted fever, spread by disease carrying ticks, eradication of the tick is not readily accomplished.

"Steps are being made in this direction, however," states Dr. Robert F. Korns, director of the Bureau of Epidemiology and Communicable Disease Control at Albany.

Dr. Korns, in a letter to the Hicksville Civic Community Assoc. disclosed that 87 per cent of the cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever in Nassau, between 1939 and 1948, occurred in the Town of Oyster Bay.

County Can't Help
Acting upon a petition present-

ed by residents of the east end of Hicksville, who are gravely concerned over the tick problem, the civics wrote to the county and state health departments and the Oyster Bay Town Board. The County Department answered that the county government "is without any authority to undertake any type of insect or pest eradication program."

The Town Board, upon receipt of a copy of the petition, forwarded a letter last week to the County Health Department.

The New York State Health Department wrote this week: "Unfortunately eradication of the American dog tick is not readily accomplished.

"One must bear in mind," Dr. Korns continued, "that the reported cases of Rocky Mountain

spotted fever from Nassau County are few indeed, there being 2 in 1939, 1 in 1941, 1 in 1945, 3 in 1947, and 1 in 1948. All except one of these occurred in the Town of Oyster Bay.

"With the development of the powerful antibiotics, aureomycin and chloramphenicol, both very effective in the treatment of Rocky Mountain spotted fever, some of the hazard is removed from this disease. You will be interested to know, however, that a study is in progress at the present time on Shelter Island near the tip of Long Island, directed toward the eradication of ticks on the Island.

"Plans for further control in other areas depend somewhat on the success of this experiment conducted under the auspices of the State Entomologist."

The progress of the anti-tick campaign will be considered at the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. meeting tomorrow (Thursday) night at the Hicksville firehouse.

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
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Bethpage Man Takes Bride at St. Kilian's

Mid-Islanders enjoy going to the beaches in summer. It is probably the most popular seasonal recreation of local residents.

But with all the growth and development on the Island, there has been growing concern in recent years over the condition of the waters and the places where public bathing takes place. Last season, there was a great todo about the fact that township beaches did not receive bathing permits until the season was well underway.

The Nassau County Health Department is responsible for determining whether it is safe to bathe at one location or another in Nassau, except for Jones Beach. It should be remembered that the Health Department issues a "Public Bathing Beach Permit" only when a bathing beach completely qualifies in three ways: (1) satisfactory quality of the bathing water; (2) sufficient number of life guards and adequate and suitable lifesaving equipment; and (3) adequate sanitary facilities.

Since the middle of May, the County public health engineers have been collecting samples at 51 stations. A minimum of 10 samples are collected at every station (or beach) at different conditions of tide and wind during the season. The samples are sent to the laboratory, where bacteriological tests are made to show whether or not intestinal bacteria are present, and if so, the estimated number.

Approved beaches are issued a permit which, the law requires, must be posted conspicuously. Twice during the bathing season, the Herald and other newspapers receive a list of beaches under health department permit.

The public takes two risks and suffers inconvenience in bathing at unapproved places. There is the risk of drowning and of illness from swimming in polluted water, and the inconvenience due to the lack of sanitary facilities. Five deaths from drowning occurred at such areas in Nassau County last year. No one drowned at a beach under health department permit.

Health authorities also offer this advice: Avoid creeks and canals—most of them are highly polluted. Protect your health and life. Swim daily at bathing beaches which operate under health department permit.
