Airpark Files Counterclaims Against Town For \$400,000

A counterclaim of \$400,000 against the Town of Oyster Bay has been filed by Hicksville Airpark, Inc., and George V. Spohrer in Nassau County Supreme Court, it was learned today. The town is seeking a permanent injunction against the sportsmen's flying centre, including demolition of all buildings on the property.

The countersuit is made in the Airpark's answer to the complaint registered by Theodore V. Summers, attorney for the town. Damages amounting to \$250,000 are claimed because the Airpark was forced to close down as the result of certiorari proceedings instituted by the adjacent property owners against the Zoning Board of Appeals back in 1946. Failure of the town's Board of Appeals "to make a proper stenographic transcript of the proceedings" is cited along with failure of the town to notify the Airpark that the certiorari proceedings were pending.

Dispute on Permits

Another \$50,000 damages is claimed because, the answer alleges, the town declined to act upon an application for permission to use the airpark buildings when made last December after the zoning of the property had been changed from residential to industrial. Refusal to act upon the request for permits "on the grounds that no airport use would be permitted" (continued on page 13)

In substance, the resolution adopted at the meeting declares that since the Oyster Bay Town Board has seen fit to rezoned the Airpark property from residential to industrial, after proper investigation of the site and application, and had given permission to the Airpark to operate, the HCCA wishes to go on record in favor of the Airpark continuing to operate without interference.

Education Dept Ruling Replies To Board Critics

Hicksville School Board this week cracked back at its critics who insisted upon a report of expenditures by the district at the annual meeting last month. The text of a letter from Charles A. Brind, Jr., counsel for the New York State Dept. of Education in Albany was made public.

At the annual meeting held May 3, William Botto had called attention to sections 1610 and 1710 of the education law and insisted that the board is required to furnish a fiscal statement to the voters. The issue was warmly debated, law books were studied and a motion was made.

An adding machine was brought into the auditorium along with the books and records of the district. A vote on the motion by voice and then by show of hands was held too close. Thereupon a poll of those interested was made with 59 demanding the report and 47 opposed.

Michael Sullivan, chairman of the meeting, ruled that the board should give the report if so desired.

Must Publish in July

Henry C. Brengel, president of the Board of Education at the meeting of the School Board last Wednesday night, offered this letter from Brind, dated May 11: "Section 1610 of the Education Law which refers to Common School District. The corresponding section of the Education Law which refers to Union Free School Districts such as yours is Section 1724, which requires the Board to publish the annual report of receipts and expenditures during the month of July."



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



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Levittown Gets Nod

Postmaster William G. Mollitor of Hicksville Post Office confirmed this week the announcement made earlier by Nassau Democratic Leader Rene A. Carrou that the new branch of the Hicksville Office now under construction on Hempstead Turnpike will be designated as "Levittown."

"We confess, the announcement makes us unhappy."

Carrou said he got a letter from Vincent C. Burke, first assistant postmaster general, settling the question. Postmaster Mollitor had previously been advised that the branch would be known as "Island Trees."

Frankly, we are disappointed, because we feel that the name of Levittown has been forced upon the residents of the region. We have no animosity for William Levitt, who performed a modern-day miracle in erecting more dwellings for ex-servicemen in a single year than any other builder in American construction history. His family deserves to be remembered, but—we feel—not at the expense of a historic and pleasant-sounding place name such as "Isle of Trees" or "Island Trees."

Somebody pointed out in print this week that the Island Trees School District is east of Levittown and that the development is within the Jerusalem School District. But they failed to add that the branch post office under construction is NOT on Levitt property and that the site is very likely not in Jerusalem School District but is, in fact, in Island Trees district.

"There is no requirement of law," Brind continued, "that such report be presented to the annual meeting in a union free school district."

The letter was addressed to Dr. E. H. Le Barron, school superintendent, in answer to an inquiry by LeBarron, made of Albany at the direction of President Brengel.

During the four-hour meeting of the Board last Wednesday night, it was decided to hold a special meeting this week with a committee of the Library Board which had been requested by the latter group. The board decided also to advertise bids for coal to heat the schools next winter and to ask for bids on a pickup truck which was authorized at the annual meeting by voters.

Act on Retirements

The Education Board also adopted a resolution which, as of April 1st, puts the school custodians in the State Retirement System. Before the meeting opened, the custodians' retirement plan was one of the topics raised by Walter Zabel in his report to the board.

President Brengel commented that the state is making a survey of the local system and will present a bill for retirement charges which will probably be offered with next year's budget. Dr. Charles Masak indicated that the custodians might have been in the system, "some years ago" if they had not been unwilling to make the necessary payments out of their salary.

A considerable part of the evening was devoted to the topic of a new schedule of class sessions for next term which is covered in another article in this issue of the Herald.

Airpark Files Counterclaim

mitted was arbitrary, unreasonable and capricious and operated to deprive defendants of valuable property rights without due process of law," it is charged.

And \$100,000 damages (making the total \$400,000) is asked by the Airpark's attorneys on the grounds that "by means of false and malicious statements" the town sought a temporary injunction "without authority" and further caused the airpark further "severe losses in business." The temporary injunction was denied on May 13.

The "false and malicious statements" are charged in the Airpark's answer and counterclaim on the grounds that the township knew, at the time present injunction proceedings were commenced, that section 18-C of the Building Zone Ordinance of 1929 "had been declared by the Supreme Court of this state to be invalid and unconstitutional" and further that the town had already changed the zoning on the property from residential to industrial.

Other Allegations

The Airpark's answer to the town's complaint makes these allegations also:

Airports are customarily classified by zoning agencies across the nation as commercial or industrial.

The town board did not order or authorize the present action, did not order or authorize "counsel to be retained," had no power to start the action except under authorization of the board. Up to May 26, the town had not as yet enacted a resolution authorizing the action against the Airpark and Spohrer.

The answer makes seven "separate and distinct" defenses and three counterclaims. The Airpark asks that an injunction be issued requiring the town to grant the Airpark permission to use the hangars and buildings on the

Milton Levitt, the nearest person to a one-man track team Hicksville has had since the golden era of Ed Coleman, soared 21 feet 1 inch to win the Broad Jump title at the twenty-first annual running of the North Shore Track and Field Championships, Saturday.

The Comet star's winning distance was made on his fifth leap, but three of his others were better than his closest competitors.

Levitt now advances to the County Championships this Saturday, where another fine performance could send him on to West Point in June, scene of the New York State Scholastic meet.

In order to qualify for the big West Point affair his mark in the County meet will have to be one of the three best between this one in Nassau and the one in Suffolk, which will be run concurrently.

Just three days before annexing the NSAL title, Levitt did 21 feet 5 1/2 inches in a meet against Roslyn, and the Hicksville athletic office has announced that this mark has been accepted as a new school record.

There was hope that Levitt could wipe the NSAL record of 21 feet 7 inches off the books. However, the 1933 leap of Oyster Bay's Hammond stood up. It was a narrow squeak, though. On his final try Levitt went 20 feet 11 1/2 inches and took off a step in back of the takeoff board.

There has been for a time a good deal of honest intent on the part of a few persons who have wanted to bring night softball to Hicksville. In this hotbed of the ball and bat there is a good chance that such a proposition would go over, and financial backing could be found for it if a suitable site could be discovered.
