## Airpark Files Counterclaims Against Town For \$400,000

A counterclaim of \$400,000 against the Town of Oyster Bay has been filed by Hicksville Airpark, Inc., and George V. Spohrer in Nassau County Supreme Court, it was learned today. The town is seeking a permanent injunction against the sportsmen's flying centre, including demolition of all build-

s on the property. The countersuit is made in the Airpark's answer to the com-plaint registered by Theodore V. Summers, attorney for the town. Damages amounting to \$250,000 are claimed because the Airpark was forced to close down as the result of certiorari proceedings instituted by the adjacent propinstituted by the adjacent prop-erty ewners, against the Zoning Board of Appeals back in 1945. Fallure of the town's Beard of Appeals "to make a proper Sten-ographic transcript of the pro-ceedings" is cited along with failure of the town to notify the Airpark that the certiorari proceedings were pending.



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

mitted was arbitrary, unreasonable and capricious and operated to de-prive defendants of valuable proprty rights without due proces law," it is charged.

And \$100,000 damages (making the total \$400,000) is asked by the Airpark's attorneys on the grounds that "by means of false and malicious, statements" the town sought a temporary injunction "without authhority" and further caused the airpark further "severe losses in business." Th temporary injunction was denied on May 13.

false and malicious state ments" are charged in the Airpark's answer and counterclaim on the grounds that the township knew, at the time present injunction proceedings were commenced, that section 18-C of the Building Zone Ordinance of 1929 "had been declared by the Supreme Court of this state to be invalid and unconstitutional" and further that the town had already changed the zoning on the property from realdential to industrial.
