in the process of investigationg the complaints in the earlier petition against the operation of the radio transmitter station. It is alleged, in the first petition pre-sented last April, that "certain permits and variances issued are illegal." The variances date back to 1934.

Defense Program is Over

The newest effort attacks specifically the variances granted by the Board of Appeals since 1942, charging that the permits were granted in view of the national defense program, and "that the defense program is now unnecessary and the purpose for has expired."

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
