Seek \$25,000 Fund For New Addition To Parochial School

A seven-day campaign to raise \$25,000 in cash and pledges to help finance a four or five-classroom addition to St. Ignatius Parochial School, Hicksville, was announced at Sunday Masses by Father George M. Bitterman, pastor. The goal represents the amount needed, above funds now on hand, to complete the project.

Immediate construction of the addition to the 27-year-old school on E. Nicholas Street is contemplated, Father Bitterman disclosed, and it is hoped to have the job finished by mid-September. "Our school is overcrowded," he stated.

A large committee of parishioners has been paired-off to call upon all parishioners "during this seven day drive" and to pass out pledge cards.

The present school on Nicholas Street was built in 1922. "The parishioners," the Pastor recalls, "themselves dug the foundation. The farmers with 35 teams of horses and dirt scoops went to work on the frozen ground. They gave the first good example. Soon most able-bodied men borrowed picks and shovels and followed suit." The Rev. Bitterman hopes that today's generation will have the spirit of 1922.

New homes will be constructed on about 175 lots on Jerusalem Ave., Hicksville, (across from the high school) by Andrew N. Miller. It was announced this week by brokers Max Graber and Milton Levine. The land was purchased from Anastase Koutensky of Division Ave., Hicksville. manent bronze record of all who served in World War II while Hicksville residents, the committee had the First War stone moved from the Rail Road plaza to the high school grounds. The minute book of the Committee, containing a complete record of its activities, will be available as a public record. It has been placed in the high school vault.

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Mrs. Hoebel Explains Art Theories

An art exhibition by the students of Mrs. Louis Hoebel starts next Wednesday, June 22, at Mrs. Hoebel's studio, 80 Terrace Pl. (formerly Park Pl.), Hicksville, for one week. A reception will be held on the first day from 2 to 5 p. m. and 7 to 8 p. m.

Open daily from 7 to 8 p. m., the work to be shown embraces all phases of fine arts, oils, water-

colors, pastel and black and white. Work eligible for awards will consist of paintings and drawings from life, objects of nature.

"Strong creative work can only be done after a student masters the fundamental laws of art, that is, the laws of perspective, light and shade, design (composition) and color harmony," Mrs. Hoebel said. "In music a student is not expected to perform beautifully

until he has mastered scales. Such precepts also apply to music. With the fundamentals to guide a student, he will be able, if he has any ability and creative imagination, to compose paintings and drawings that are both creative and correct as to basic laws of beauty and harmony.

"Without guidance he flounders hopelessly in a mass of conflicting discordant colors and shapes," Mrs. Hoebel continued. "The art teacher of today is in the enviable position of being able to draw on the old and tried precepts of teaching art as well as to inculcate in the student a liking for the best that modern art has to offer, to show them the difference between true art and so-called decadent, radical art perpetrated by a bunch of press agents and writing hacks."

Mrs. Hoebel believes that the teacher can instruct without the pupil becoming too conservative or too radical. "Too much conservatism stifles creative impulses and too much radicalism gives license without a word of correction."

The P-TA will discontinue meetings for the summer.

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
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94 Hickville Girls Enjoy Scout Play Day

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Let's Go Fishing

WITH LE ROY PARR

To start with I would like to ask you fellow sportsmen to let me know if you make any successful or unusual catches. All you have to do is call Hicks. 3-1208 and give me the type of fish caught, the amount, the bait used and the immediate location; and not only will you see it printed in this column, you will see me personally when I go fishing there the following day.

At this point, I would like to express my contempt of the commercial netters in Peconic Bay. Not only do they catch huge amounts of weakfish but they catch them before they spawn, and the fish that do spawn find their spawning grounds broken up when the nets are dragged over them. This procedure also disturbs the feeding habits of the weaks. Furthermore, the authorities seem to be unconcerned with the matter.

Already surf fishermen are having poor luck with the striped bass which Congress declared was not a game fish, and therefore the commercial fishermen are still netting them. I saw a picture of thousands of striped bass left on the beach to rot because the price dropped on them. That brings to mind the days of market hunters when they dumped carloads of passenger pigeons for the same reason!

Are we neglecting our salt water fish? In all the thousand of inland towns and cities they are hollering about pollution. Well, what about north shore bays and harbors. If

that isn't detrimental to the health of the fish, then why is the fishing so bad in those areas? If you have any questions about fish or fishing on Long Island, I'll be glad to try and answer them.

"One question I was asked several times was: "Where did you get your information?" At the present I am mate aboard a 40-foot cabin cruiser, "Jinnie." On this boat I am usually in the best grounds and in the evenings I see the fish that other boats bring in.

I also fish a lot for blackfish in Long Island Sound, and also for weakfish and sea bass. I am also an ardent trout fisherman and often go up state to fish.

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

A week before the new schedule took effect, Civic President Lawrence A. Roman had another exchange of correspondence with David E. Smucker, trustee and chief operating officer of LIRR.

Arrives Here Later

The new evening train leaves Jamaica at 5:43 p. m., three minutes later than No. 244 did, and arrives at Hicksville at 6:13 p. m., which is five minutes later than it did before June 13. Carle Place has been added as a stop for this train, adding the extra two minutes.

Smucker said he made another

check of passenger traffic on Train 244 and found that the train had dropped from a normal 1150 passengers to 1040, including an average of 152 standees, of which

462 got off at points east of Hicksville.

Roman protested again on June 9, adding that Hicksville commuters have been "reduced to almost completely local service, since more and more trains are being expressed beyond Hicksville in the evening and expressed from the east of Hicksville in the morning. Hicksville is located 26.3 railroad miles from Penn Station. Its train service, during commuter hours, averages at best 50 minutes.

Under the new schedule, Hicksville has commuter service from Penn Station at 4:46, 5:23 and 5:43 p. m. Those commuters who now miss the 4:46 by minutes have a wait of 35 minutes or less.

"We do not feel that these trains during the commuter period are sufficient to serve our station adequately," Roman continued. "We therefore again repeat our request for a Hicksville stop on train 662, which leaves Penn station at 5:06 p. m." And if 662 can't stop because of a PSC directive of long standing, Roman is prepared to go to bat on that score.

Smucker did promise that if the change on train 244 does "not give the desired results, we can eliminate the new train and restore stops on the winter timetable."

Opinion and Comment:

Health Dept. Don't Recognize Us

Regularly, around this time of the month, we get a "mad on" about incorporation. The reason for our agitation lies in the fact that Hicksville does not exist as a community when the Nassau County Health Department releases its monthly communicable disease report.

We have on our desk the report for May. You will look in vain up and down this report for mention of Hicksville. "Places over 10,000" are specified, including Glen Cove, Floral Park, Freeport, Garden City, Hempstead, Lynbrook, Mineola, Rockville Centre and Valley Stream. "Places 4,000-10,000" are also listed: Long Beach, Cedarhurst, East Rockaway, Great Neck, Malverne, New Hyde Park, Sea Cliff, Westbury and Williston Park." And "Places under 4,000" are there (26 of them) from Bayville to Thomaston.

The report states that there were two cases of measles during May in Farmingdale, but not a mention of Hicksville, although we know there were a number of measles cases in Hicksville (Bethpage, Plainview and vicinity also). Hicksville's cases are included under the heading of "Oyster Bay Town, 72 cases of measles." How many of these 72 cases were in Hicksville, we can't tell.

Hicksville today has a population, according to the most reliable estimates, of better than 10,000 persons. BUT IT DOESN'T EXIST, officially. Pick up any federal census record. You'll find the population of Baxter Estates (outside Port Washington) and Saddle Rock, but no record for unincorporated Hicksville.

This is not a plea for immediate incorporation, although we strongly approve such a move for our home community. This is a plea for recognition by federal, state and county agencies of government. And we think the county could set a very fine example for the other divisions of government by revising its monthly morbidity report to include a listing of Hicksville. Everybody suddenly remembers Hicksville as a community, when it comes time to send out those tax bills . . . county, state or federal.

To the south of us, in Levitt Manor, there

is a great whoopee-do about incorporation at the moment, but we don't think much will come of it. The Levitt section is too new and too incomplete to be able to undertake the financing of its own government on the basis of \$3500 home assessments, even if there will be 10,000 of them.

But there is more serious action likely in North Hempstead Town, where a committee in Manhasset area is probing the desirability of incorporating. We look upon those efforts with interest because the folks connected with the Civic Liaison over there are thorough. We know from first-hand experience that the Civic Liaison Committee was a powerful force behind the creation of the North Hempstead Housing Authority to eliminate a local slum condition, no small achievement in itself.

Sunday Is Father's Day

Fathers are specifically honored next Sunday, June 19.

The theme for 1949 Father's Day is "Today's Children are Tomorrow's America. Remember Father, Builder of Our Nation's Future." Father's ten tenets for building a strong America are:

1. He develops in his home a deep and genuine appreciation of our traditions and institutions.
2. He makes his child feel secure.
3. He teaches his child that intolerance and bigotry have no place in American life.
4. He makes every effort to develop in his home an understanding and respect for the character and accomplishments of other peoples of the world.
5. He shares in his child's activities.
6. He makes himself responsible for seeing that he and his family take an active part in the community life.
7. He is always available to help solve youth's problems.
8. He trains his child for leadership.
9. He strives to be the man his child thinks he is.
10. He teaches his child that our great material blessings are meaningless without the development of spiritual values.

Is the Boom Over?

Last week Levitt & Sons put some more houses up for sale, plugged in advance with radio advertising and newspaper publicity. Some folks showed up on Friday to be first in line the following Monday and up to that point it was an old story; but something happened. The line of customers was used up before all the houses were sold. This is the reverse of what has been normal "supply and demand" where Levitt houses are concerned.

The word is around the mid-island area that builders are moving more cautiously. One developer who promises on billboards to put up 300 dwellings has finished five. Another 300-section has about halted with a couple of dozen on the site. A housing inspector tells us that whereas permits were formerly filled for 50 houses at a time, the builders are now asking for 10 or 15 permits. When those are built and sold, they come back for more permits.
