Flying Pickets Protest Move To Close Airpark

Fifteen ex-servicemen pilots will "picket" Hicksville by air next Monday, Independence Day, in protest against the efforts of Oyster Bay Town Fathers to close down the Airpark. It was disclosed last night by George V. Spohrer. A half-dozen or more planes will circle over Hicksville for a half hour, starting at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Pumping Engine 'Out' Two Days

Water supply continues adequate in the mid-Island area this week, despite the prolonged drought, the Herald learned last night. Hicksville Water District is exceeding two million gallons a day and occasionally tops the three million mark. Central Park Water District in Bethpage is running close to two million gallons a day, compared with winter time demand of four to five hundred thousand.

"The only time we have had to restrict irrigation occurred Friday and Saturday," F. R. Davidson, Hicksville superintendent said. "When a gasoline pumping engine broke down due to the heavy running time." The engine is back in (Continued on Page 3)

Curtis Urge Sprague Stay In Office

Theodore Velsor is chairman of the commissioners on the condemnation. The other members are Edward Crawford and Harold R. Young.

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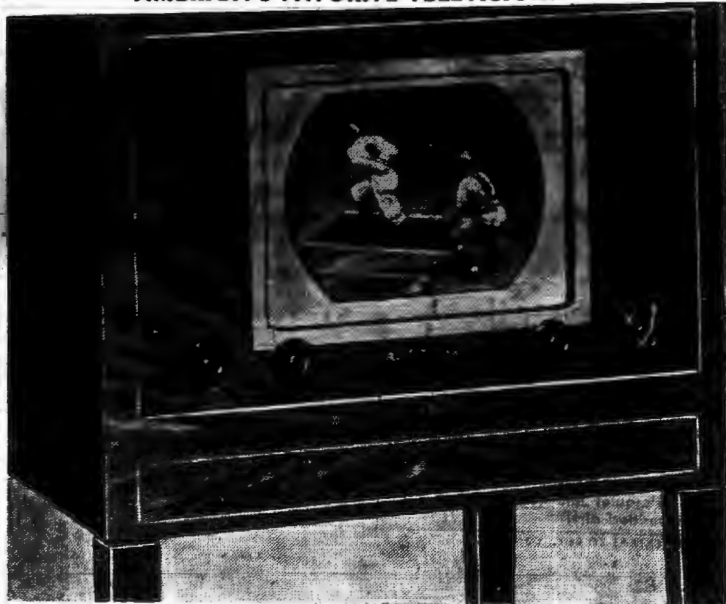

Let's Go Fishing

With LeRoy Parr

FISHING ON LONG ISLAND — BLACKFISH OR TAUTOG
Along the end of Long Island on the sound, you will find some of the best black fishing spots in the United States. These fish run rather large and fight hard. Surf fishing for them gives the greatest thrill and satisfaction because they have the bottom to run on and can snag your line; if you fish from a boat you pull him off the bottom and little skill is needed to land them.

A group of off-shore rocks is an ideal spot to fish or an old wreck and high flood tide is the best to fish as they do not seem to stay in shore when the water becomes shallow. Fiddler crabs are good bait and I often thought it was the best till an old fishing captain, whose knowledge of fishing cannot be disputed, told me that fresh line shrimp is the sure killer for this type of fishing.

This fish has to be horsed in. You do not play this fish delicately. He almost always hooks himself squarely and his jaws are tough so there is little chance of tearing the hook out. But see that your hooks are strong, because they can straighten out a hook with little or no trouble at all. You should have a regular fishing outfit with 18 or 20 pound test line. Be sure that you have plenty of sinkers as they get caught between rocks and are easily lost. You will probably average three or four pounds per fish, five and six pounds are common and eight and ten pounders are often caught.

It is not the authority of this column to decide to what use the high school athletic plant should be put and what regulations should govern those conducting and participating in athletic competition on its various fields.

However, our close association with events in the Hicksville sports world quite possibly gives us an inside on one dangerous situation others less interested in the actual conduct and progress of games might not know about.

The condition considered serious concerns the endless number of bicycles being driven, laid or placed in those areas where competition is staged.

And it is considered dangerous first of all by the athletes and there isn't a time of the year when it is more so. Track and football performers are not subject to the dangers of a bicycle suddenly cropping up where a moment before there was no obstacle, but a softball or baseball fieldler concentrating on a fly ball most certainly is.

The high school grounds are spacious. There is plenty of room for bicycles to be parked without interfering with the games. Owners can easily obtain locks if they were required to park them outside the play grounds. Each field has a gate right handy to it and bikes could be leaned against the fence just outside.

Since the end of the war bicycles are becoming more and more in use again and the high school field is not the place for them. The new high school track was not built for bicycle race.

Everytime a baseball or softball fielder goes after a flyball near a bicycle we fearfully are reminded of a story Tord Beck, Orange and Back athletic director back in 1942, often told. It was not pleasant.

Beck for the most part was easy going and amiable, but he did object to a bicycle on the grounds. His story was that of a first baseman who noticed that the area around his post was free and clear as he took to the field. During the course of play a youngster rode up to see the game and being invited to catch with another youngster on the sidelines, just threw the wheel down about 30 feet from first and skipped off.

A short fly was subsequently hit. To catch it, the first baseman had to make a fast run and keep his eye on the ball all the way. His right leg slammed into the front wheel of the bike just as he twisted to make the catch.

It took a long time for the badly mauled leg to mend and the player was in complete agony while it was being removed from the wrecked wheel.

Those persons who would not like anything of that sort to happen here would like some rule to insure that it won't.

The school does not tolerate anyone driving golf balls or shooting rifles or arrows on the grounds.

It should not tolerate bicycle riding. It is as equally dangerous and brainless.

To Prevent Mildew

Hot, humid weather breeds mildew—and now is the time to take precautions against it. Remember, this mold growth is caused by darkness, warmth and moisture; so try to store your clothes and linens in an airy place where they get some sunlight.

Shower curtains are among the worst mildew offenders—and here's a recipe for making them mildew proof through several washings: Immerse the curtain in a solution of a gallon and a half of hot water and one-half ounce of neutral laundry soap. Heat for 20 minutes. Squeeze out the excess soap and, without rinsing, put the curtain in a gallon and a half of warm water in which you have dissolved three ounces of sodium chloride crystals. Heat for 30 minutes; then hang out to dry, without rinsing, on a rope line. Don't use a metal line because it will discolor the fabric.

You can use this procedure to prevent mildew of boat sails, awning materials and similar fabrics.
