## Library Must Go

Hicksville Free Public Library is confronted with the problem of finding suitable quarters in the community, right now. The Library is now housed in two rooms on the first floor of Nicholas Street Public School Building west wing. The rooms are needed by the Board of Education for classes starting in September to handle increasing student enrollments.

Library Board President Joseph Helm and Trustee Leon Galloway were told at a Board of Education meeting last week, the Library must move.

## Herald Arranges For Bayville Beach Round Trips For Summer; Depart At Hicksville Courthouse

Three times weekly round-trip bus service from Hicksville to Bayville beaches starts next Monday morning, July 11. Arrangements to provide the beach-bus for youngsters and adults of the community were made by the Mid-Island Herald with the Hendrickson Bus Co. of Bayville.

Trips will be made on Monday, Wednesday and Friday leaving Hicksville Courthouse at Heitz Place and Bay Avenue at 8:30 a. m. The bus returns in the late afternoon, leaving Bayville at 3:30 p. m. sharp. The fares charged are 15 cents for children under 12 years of age (30 cents round trip) and 25 cents a trip (50 cents round trip) for all others. The bus will not pickup passengers at Hicksville courthouse on days when the weather is inclement.

The beach-bus will continue to operate throughout the summer.

### Sprinklers At High School

Youngsters unable to get to the beaches will be interested in the sprinkler shower baths to be given on the multiple play area of the high school grounds on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 2 to 3 p. m. School Superintendent E. H. LeBarron, in announcing the program, says "this should give the younger children that can't journey to the beaches, an opportunity to cool themselves during the summer months."

Local children and adults who have been hitchhiking, bicycling, or riding by auto to the Levittown residents' pool in Island Trees were warned this week that the pools are limited to Levittown people only. All using the pools will be expected to show proof of local residence and children will need notes signed by their parents.

## Claim RR Sets Fields Blazing

Steam locomotives of the LIRR were believed responsible for two fires which destroyed more than two acres of a grain field between Duffy Avenue and the railroad, near Underhill Avenue, Monday and Tuesday. The fields are part of a 10-acre tract planted in grain and owned by William Duffy.

Duffy claims he saw a fireman on a locomotive toss a clinker into the fields Monday afternoon and immediately thereafter 25-foot flames were racing across the tinder-dry grain fields towards the house on the north side of Duffy Avenue occupied by Louis Fox. He credits a sudden drop in the wind and the prompt arrival of the firemen with saving the house and limiting the destruction to about two acres.

Another section of the same field was ignited (yesterday) Tuesday morning, calling out firemen again.

During the current drought local fire chiefs are urging everyone to exercise extreme caution with fires, particularly near open fields and forests.

# Mid-Island Leads Town In Home Building

The Mid-Island area is still leading the entire Town of Oyster Bay in new home construction for the first six months of this year, the Herald learned today. Forty-two percent of the 988 permits issued by the town building department for new homes from January to June

were in the Mid-Island section.

Hicksville, however, has slipped to third position among the communities of the township for permits issued. For the six-month period there were 426 new home permits issued for Massapequa, 196 for Bethpage, 175 for Hicksville and 57 for Plainview.

By combining the Hicksville,

Bethpage, Plainview new home permits, a total of 438 for the Mid-Island region is achieved, topping Massapequa by 12 new houses.

### Record Breaking Month

The Building Department broke all previous records during the month of June with a total of 940 permits issued (including 288 dwellings) representing a construction

value of \$2,129,285. The last previous record was for 258 permits in a single month. The report made public by Building Inspector William S. Tilford seems to conflict with the rumored "slowing down" of home construction.

During the first six months of 1948, construction value was over six million dollars with 732 new dwelling permits. For the first six months of this year, 988 permits were issued with construction value of over eight million dollars.

While Hicksville fell behind Bethpage in the number of new home permits (175 to 196 for Bethpage), Hicksville was second in the township for the number of all kinds issued, 232 to 226 for Bethpage. Massapequa had 503 permits if all kinds and Plainview 68.

Hicksville was first in the township for the 12 months of 1948 with 802 permits and 686 new homes while Massapequa had 632 (Continued on Page 14)

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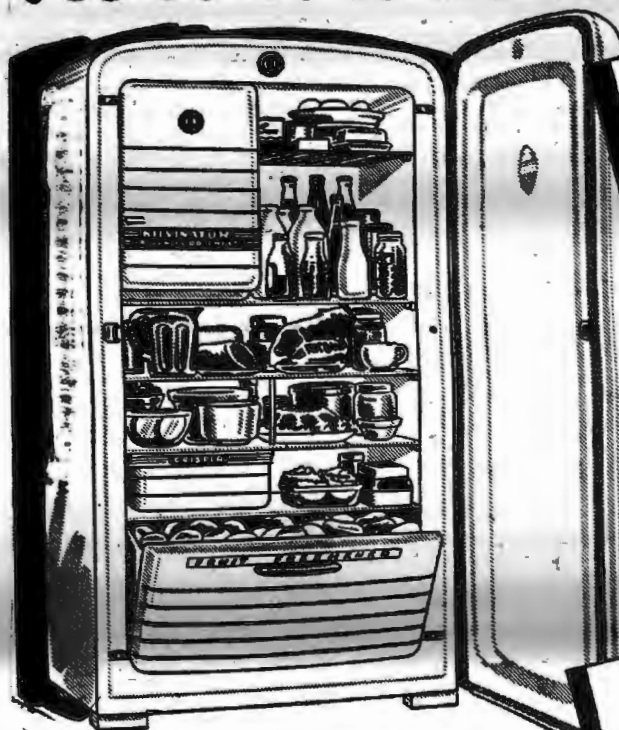
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### Dedicate Bethpage Firehall Saturday

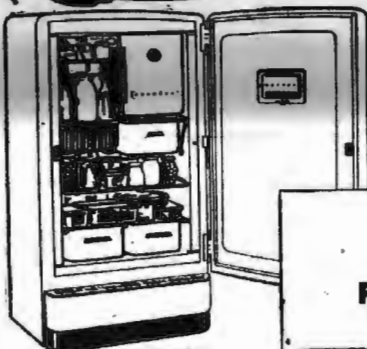

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# Let's Go Fishing

With LeRoy Parr

## FISHING ON LONG ISLAND — WEAKFISH (Cynoscion regalis)

For many years Long Island was noted particularly by sportsmen for weakfishing. Peconic Bay was the most famous. But now the weakfish has decreased, a decided factor in their disappearance is due to the absence of grass at the bottom of the bay. The weakfish favored this grass for spawning beds as it gave them protection. But now to get on the subject of how to catch weakfish.

First find a bay where there are weakfish, this is important for some bays are too polluted and the weaks are not likely to be found there. I would say that a boat is necessary for bay fishing and you will need live shrimp worms and light fishing tackle. You can catch weakfish without live shrimp but live shrimp increases your chances. You probably will fish on top, but if there is another member on the boat have him fish bottom until you see where the weaks are hitting.

Weakfish can be caught off bridges, and some catch them by squidding for them at night. (Casting from shore, using squid for bait). Drifting is another method. On the ocean, weaks are often caught by surf casting. The same baits are used only when they are caught close to the shore beyond the breakers.

Later in the summer you can catch weaks by trolling for them. A fast speed is not needed as the weaks will run up on the boat when they strike. A feathered lure or a bright spoon is usually the best. Often when they strike you will feel the line slacken. That is because they often run with the boat. If you catch your weakfish while the boat is turning, add weight to your line because the weaks are usually at a deeper depth.

The record weight for weakfish is over 17 pounds. In 1929 the total catch of weakfish in United States waters was 33,765,999 pounds valued at \$1,846,000. Several years ago eight and ten pounders were frequent; five and six pounders were common, and two and three pounders were thrown back into the water.

This year and the last few years, two and three pounders were kept and five and six pounders were rare and only a few large ones were caught.

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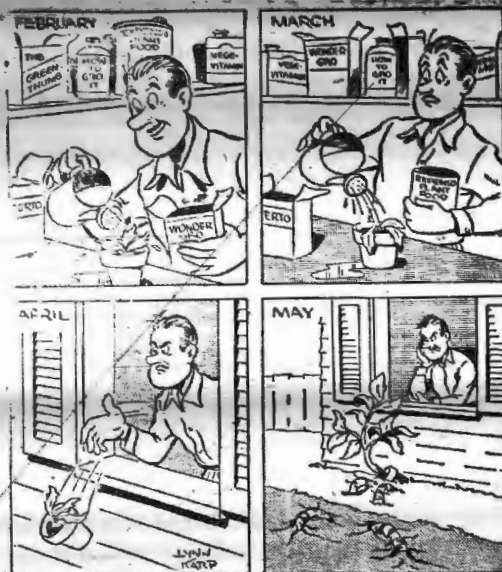

gency until the trustees meet, probably later this week. Meanwhile, it was generally assumed in the community that rental of space — if sufficient floor space can be found — is probably the only alternative.  
Warning that the Library may be forced out of its borrowed space in Nicholas School — where it has been located since it founded — was given last spring when

the Library Trustees offered voters a proposition calling for the expenditure of \$175,000 for a new library site and building. The proposal was rejected by the voters at a special district meeting on March 29 when 252 voted no and 110 yes.  
Complicating a moving job for the Library, aside from over 13,500 volumes in its collection, is the fact that the current fiscal year budget of \$14,650 contains no provision for rental of quarters.
