

Recommend Plainview Build School

PLAINVIEW—Recommendations that this school district go ahead with construction of a new school to "satisfy immediate needs for elementary education" and then give consideration to a possible consolidation with the Hicksville School District were voiced at a special district meeting, Wednesday, by District Superintendent John W. Chisholm and Dr. Harry Langworthy of the State Education Dept., Bureau of Rural Administrative Service.

About 60 persons attended the session in Mannetto Hills School. The meeting was opened by John G. Harbes, member of the school board. The group elected Anthony Ocker, Jr., as meeting chairman. Summarizing the conclusion of the meeting at 10:30, Ocker pointed out that what is needed is a "survey of both districts,"

referring to Plainview and Hicksville.

At the start of the session, Ocker explained that such a gathering had been proposed at the meeting in May. The Advisory Committee of the district on grounds and buildings, he continued, has "contacted some land owners" and has looked at the Bergman property in the westerly end of the district (near Oyster Bay Rd.), considered buying more ground to enlarge the present site and inquired about the Leonard property on Washington Avenue.

Superintendent Chisholm carried the major part of the talking. He traced the development of educational systems in this area and expressed his opinion that elementary schools should be kept small and close to the

community they serve. Peak enrollments, he suggested, should not exceed 300 or 400 pupils for K-6 schools (kindergarten thru sixth grade).

Consolidation with Hicksville, he said, should be considered when Plainview and Hicksville rates are more nearly equal. Hicksville must eventually expand, he continued, and may have to build a new high school or expand its present structure. Plainview, consolidated with Hicksville, could handle its secondary school problem most effectively, he stated.

Brief definitions of consolidation and centralization of school districts were given by Dr. Langworthy. Consolidation, he said, is the marriage of two school dis-

Storage Tanks Worry Neighbors

OYSTER BAY—An application of the Gordon-Lacey Chemical Products Co., Inc. for a variance to permit installation of underground tanks in Hicksville to "hold 15,000 gallons of solvents" may be opposed by neighboring residents when the case comes before the Zoning Appeals Board in the Town Hall, here, tomorrow (Thursday) night.

The chemical concern which manufactures synthetic lacquers, coated cloth, coated paper, etc., came before the town board yesterday (Tuesday) morning with an application for a zone change to industrial on the proposed site of its factory. The location of the plant is described as lying between the Glasfloss factory and the LI Rail Road tracks, 100 feet back from New South Road.

There was no opposition heard Tuesday. A spokesman for the company said they plan a \$300,000 building.

Opposition to the variance application is anticipated from property owners in the vicinity who have become alarmed at the proposed storage of 15,000 gallons of solvents, possibly inflammable materials, in their neighborhood.

The Board of Appeals hearing tomorrow night is scheduled to start at 7:30 o'clock.

100 Petition Board For School Busses

BULLETIN—A petition bearing 100 names and requesting a special district meeting to vote on the school bus question is being forwarded to District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer, it was learned last night. Additional petitions are being circulated.

HICKSVILLE—Efforts to obtain school bus service, spearheaded by leaders of the Frank Homes off South Broadway, spread into other new home developments of the district this week. However, it appeared almost certain today that no service could be obtained to coincide with the start of the new fall term early next month.

On the heels of a story appearing last week in the Herald, a group of parents called upon the Board of Education on Wednesday night to inquire about establishing tax-supported bus service.

Notice To New Residents
Martin Lauer of 183 Lee Avenue told the Herald it is hoped "to get an emergency special meeting to vote" upon the question. He is interested in reaching interested parents of the other new developments such as Zelda Park, Roger Homes, Norbrook, Arnold Terrace, Halstone and Ronald Homes who

have small children attending district schools.

Lauer said a petition will be circulated asking the Board of Education to hold a special district meeting. It is expected that at such time an appropriation of money would be sought to pay for school bus transportation. His

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Postal Inspector Answers Rumors on PO Site

JAMAICA—No decision has been made regarding the new location of the Hicksville Post Office, Inspector P. J. McNeil at the General Post Office at 164th St., here, told the Mid-Island Herald this week. "It is too premature to say just where the post office in Hicksville will be established," he stated.

There have been many rumors around the community about the location. It appears very likely that after March 1st (the present building lease expires the end of February), the post office will no longer be located on narrow Herzog Place.

No Written Offers Yet

Inspector McNeil said that he is still receptive to bids from local landlords to provide post office quarters. Up to last Thursday he had received no written offers, although there have been inquiries from "five or six" people, one of them a New York City person, owning Hicksville property.

The rent asked and location of the building is among the major factors which will be considered in locating the new post office. It is hoped by authorities that quarters will be available "adjacent to Broadway and not too far from the Rail Road Station."

The final decision as to where the post office will be located rests with Washington, Inspector McNeil explained. After he has the written proposals and has studied the local accommodations and received the opinion of Postmaster William G. Molitor of Hicksville, he forwards his recommendations to Washington.

It is expected that a five or ten year lease may be accepted and it is possible that some landowner may build a structure to suit the needs of the post office. Construction of a building in about 90 days is possible, it was pointed out. A building with at least 4500 square feet of floor space is required for the post office.

One spokesman for the parents who called upon the School Board last Wednesday night said he felt encouraged by the attitude of the trustees.

A local authority on the education law has since pointed out that a period of at least four weeks must elapse between any decision to hold a special district meeting and the actual vote. If approved, there would be a further delay in advertising for bids and awarding a contract. Since the next regular board meeting is scheduled for the end of August, the likelihood of any special meeting taking place before November 1 is seen remote, even if the necessary petitions are presented at once in proper form.

Lauer would appreciate hearing from residents of other sections of the district interested in the bus proposal and asked the Herald to assist in spreading this request.

Other parents who have spoke about the school bus proposal to this newspaper appear to be most greatly concerned about their small children who must walk for blocks, frequently in the highways where no sidewalks are available. They see particular difficulties in the forthcoming winter months.

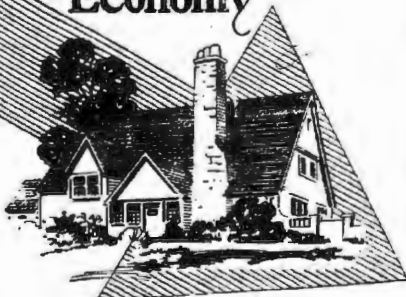

Evening of Recreation

A legislative program under the direction of Mrs. Lucia McIntosh is continuously alert to support any legislature beneficial to ex-servicemen and their families. The committee presented a community program, "Our Town and Its Function," last year, during which members of the Oyster Bay Town Board conducted a question and answer period on Town government.

The auxiliary financed the trip of Miss Sally Homire to Girls State at Skidmore College, Saratoga Springs, in June. Girls State is a mythical state sponsored by the Legion Auxiliary to foster democracy.

Auxiliary members join with other Nassau Auxiliaries and posts on annual trips to visit the veterans' Northport and Kings Park Hospitals. The ladies entertain and serve, ice cream, cigarettes and distribute reading material.

Attend Conventions

Installation of the newly elected officers provides one of the biggest social affairs of the year. Friends and Nassau County officials attend the ceremony, which is followed by a dance and buffet supper. Conventions and luncheons of the county and state provide further social activities. Mrs. William Kerbs of Syosset represented the local auxiliary at the State Convention in Buffalo last week.

Card parties held each month at the clubhouse have been proving more successful in recent months since the clubhouse was remodeled. Sales of home made cakes and spaghetti dinners also prove to be fun and profitable.

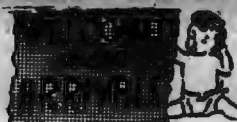

become one district. It is the fast-

HERALD CIVIC PRIMER:

Volunteers Provide Fire Protection

Fire protection in the mid-island area is provided by volunteers who use apparatus and equipment furnished by taxpayers of the various fire districts. Edickville, Jericho and Bethpage operate under regular fire districts, have boards of commissioners elected by qualified resident voters, and submit an annual budget for vote of the taxpayers.

Plainview, on the other hand, is a protection district. In that area the fire company is a corporate body with its board of directors or trustees and an annual contract for fire protection is made between the company and the district, through the Oyster Bay Town Board.

In the regular fire districts, there are five elected commissioners, each serving for five-year terms. There is also an elected district treasurer and a board-appointed district secretary. Quite often the secretary is the same person as the treasurer, although this is not a requirement of law. In this area, fire district budgets are advertised during August and submitted to vote of the taxpayers in early September. Commission-

ers are elected in December.

Some Complications
Hicksville is one of the few fire districts in this section of the Island which has an extensive fire alarm box system. Bethpage has an abbreviated system with boxes in a few locations. However, a large number of the request for fire protection in all areas are received by telephone. This has led to complications in Levittown where Wantagh and East Meadow each cover a section of the sprawling development. When Levittown phone operators get a call for firemen, it is not always clear which department should be alerted. Property owners there are considering formation of their own fire district.

Whereas there are no local paid firemen as such, each district em-

loys one or more persons as custodians of headquarters buildings to answer phones, give the alarm, keep equipment in shape, etc.

There are usually two units within each fire system. Approximately 30 men comprise a fire company and an amalgamation of companies forms the department. Hicksville has five companies, each of which met monthly. Jericho has two, Bethpage two. The departments also have their elected officials, including chiefs, assistants, secretaries, etc. These officers are elected annually by members of the departments.

Volunteer fire fighters usually limit their activities to fire district boundaries. However, they respond to calls for aid from neighboring districts when requested by responsible officials.

In Our Opinion:

We Can Solve Our Own Problems

We thoroughly enjoyed the meeting held in Manetto Hills Schoolhouse last Wednesday night when the problems confronting the Plainview School District were thoroughly discussed. Our enjoyment came particularly from the remarks of John W. Chisholm, district superintendent, because some of the things he said reached receptive ears—ours, at least.

He sounded a warning which every resident of the mid-island area may well heed. "In a free society," he said, "we should never get so large that we can't have a meeting such as this to talk things over." And he warned, that unless the local communities demonstrate that they can solve their own local problems, someone will step into the picture and "take us by the nap of the neck and give us something that no one wants."

He defines this process as "legislation projection" and we don't want no part of it.

But it may happen to us, if we don't buckle down and try to solve our local problems. Some agency will come along — town, county, state, or even federal — and solve it for us, very possibly at the expense of local freedom of expression and decision.

Mr. Chisholm went no further than this, but

we'd like to carry on a little further.

You know there is growing talk all about us, favoring a county wide school system. (This is just one part of the campaign. Franchising powers of town and villages are already slipping into the hands of the county transit commission and planning for unincorporated sections of the mid-island region is now in the control of the county planning commission.)

A county-wide school system would mean the end of local school meetings. It would mean the end of local budget hearings, election of trustees, etc.

Ex-Mayor George Estabrook of Hempstead called for such an educational system when he addressed the installation dinner-dance of the Hicksville Civic and Community Association, a month ago. His reasoning is that boundaries between communities are disappearing — and that is very true around his village of Hempstead, Freeport, Garden City, etc. But is not true in the mid-island region.

A county-wide system would put Hicksville and the mid-island area in the same position as certain localities in the greater City of New York. There are regions of Queens, for example, with deplorable streets and overcrowded schools because the bulk of the city's interest is in Manhattan and Brooklyn.

We are quite willing to agree that some changes must be made, district lines may have to be redrawn to serve today's needs. It would be stupid to insist upon putting a size 10 foot in a size 3 boot.

We would quote dozens of examples where efforts to centralize government is underway. Assemblyman David S. Hill Jr. of Glen Cove, whose views we normally support, made us uncomfortable when he told the Hicksville Exempt Firemen recently "Nassau County has the best fire departments in the whole country. It has the best equipment per \$1 assessment of anywhere in the state," and that was fine talk. But this was the stinger: "Sooner or later you will find the whole of Nassau County will be one big fire department."

Only by keeping alert and interested in local problems and by displaying some interest in meeting such problems can we retain for ourselves the Democratic quality and luxury — if you will — of local decisions such as are now available in our school set-up.
