School Days Start Sept. 7th

Registration dates and hours for new pupils of schools in the mid-island area have been announced by the school authorities of the various districts. All local schools will open on Wednesday, Sept. 7, except St. Ignatius Parochial school, which will start classes on Monday, Sept. 12.

In order to enter kindergarten next month, the child must be five years of age on or before Dec. 31. First grade pupils must be six years of age by the same date. Parents are requested to bring the child's birth certificate and certificates of toxoids and diphtheria.

Hicksville High School will be open for registration next Thursday and Friday, Sept. 1 and 2, and also Tuesday, Sept. 6, from 9 to 10:30 a. m. and 1:30 to 2:30 p. m.

East Street School, Nicholas Street School and Junior High School in Hicksville, will be open for registration on Tuesday, September 6, from 9 to 10:30 a. m. and 1:30 to 2:30 p. m.

St. Ignatius Parochial School, Hicksville, will not take registration until further announcement. Mennetto Hill School, Plainview (Continued on Page 3)

Bethpage to Vote On \$7,600 Offer

BETHPAGE—Sale of the old firehouse on Stewart Avenue, for \$7,600 will be submitted to the vote of resident taxpayers of the fire district on Tuesday night, September 6. Two other questions will be voted upon the same evening, one for a district budget of \$90,910 and the other for erection of street signs at a cost of \$1200.

The bid of the Stadin-Fritchard Co. of Bethpage, manufacturers of soda fountain equipment, for the old building on Stewart Avenue was the highest received by the fire commissioners. It was disclosed following a special board meeting last Wednesday. There were five other bids. Some months ago the fire board rejected bids for the building and property which ranged from \$3,000 to \$4,800.

The \$30,910 budget includes \$18,200 for payment of bonds and interest on the new firehouse. A tax rate of \$2.13 per \$1000 of assessed valuation is estimated if the three propositions are approved. The current rate is \$1.60 per \$1000.

Chemical Plant Gets Variance

OYSTER BAY—Despite strong opposition registered by residents of the area, the Zoning Appeals Board this week granted the variance asked by Gordon-Lacey Chemical Products Co. for permission to install underground storage tanks on its proposed factory site in Hicksville. New Home owners in Broadway Terrace section, across New South Road from the plant site, had filed petitions asking rejection of the variance on the grounds that the storage of 15,000 gallons of solvents would create a hazard to adjacent property. The Civic Association had also opposed the application.

'Delay' Bothers Bus Petitioners

HICKSVILLE—Petitioners for transportation of pupils to local schools, particularly from outlying sections of the district, this week expressed impatience with the progress of their request.

Mrs. Martin Lauer of 183 Lee Avenue told the Herald she received 42 phone calls this week from persons in favor of the bus service all curious as to the "delay." The School Board, upon receipt of the petitions, held a special meeting earlier this month and advised those interested that the board is accumulating data about costs and requirements. The school district census, now being completed, is expected to assist the board in determining the possible cost of such service.

Hopes for bus service at the start of the school term are dim. School starts two weeks from today and a special district election on a bus question would, under the law, require four weeks public notice. If approved by voters, the board would then have to obtain bids—a procedure expected to take a few more weeks.

The Herald was advised that several active supporters of the transportation plan expect to attend the Board meeting next week.

Colthurst Seeks Re-election Tuesday

HICKSVILLE—Charles E. Colthurst of Field Avenue today announced that he is a candidate for re-election as a commissioner of the water district to succeed himself for another three year term. The election will take place next Tuesday evening, August 30, at the courthouse, Heitz Place and Bay Avenue, between 7 and 9 p. m. Only resident taxpayers may vote. No other candidates have filed petitions for positions on the ballot and Colthurst is not expected to be opposed. He today asked the Herald to publish his request for the support of the voters next Tuesday.

MANHASSET—Levitt & Sons, Inc., plans to build a "substantial number" of units in the Town of Oyster Bay next year. No homes have been constructed in the Hicksville School District or Oyster Bay Township as yet, the Herald verified yesterday. A spokesman for Levitt also admitted that a considerable amount of acreage across the town line has been acquired.

There have been rumors in the Hicksville area that Levitt plans to build 600 to 2000 units in Hicksville. The spokesman for the biggest home builder in the nation was unprepared to say how many units are planned. Over 3,000 houses have been built at Levittown and a total of over 10,000 will be occupied by the end of 1949.

Invite Plainview To Hear Chisholm On Consolidation

HICKSVILLE—The relative merits of consolidating Hicksville and Plainview School Districts will be among the topics discussed by J. W. Chisholm, District Superintendent of Schools, at the first fall meeting of the Civic and Community Assoc. on Sept. 22. Chisholm has accepted an invitation of the civic group to speak about school district matters at the public meeting in the firehouse auditorium.

Members of the Plainview Civic and Community Association as well as all interested residents of Plainview and Hicksville are being invited to attend the meeting because of the interest in the subject in both areas. A special invitation has been extended by the Civics to president Henry C. Brengel and the Hicksville School Board and the President William Schwarz and the Plainview School Board.

The announcement of the first program for the Civic Association

was made yesterday by Stephen F. Smetak, program chairman.

Chisholm is superintendent of the First Supervisory District of Nassau County and has his office in the County Courthouse at Mineola. He spoke recently at a Plainview School District meeting regarding the proposal that Plainview and Hicksville districts consolidate.

The civic group meets regularly on the fourth Thursday evening of the month at the firehouse. Meetings are open to all residents.

Petitions In Stores For Bus On Broadway

HICKSVILLE—An all-out push to obtain bus transportation along Broadway from the Rail Road station south to the Miller Homes on Wantagh Ave., Island Trees, was underway today with petitions in all stores awaiting signatures. The petitions, sponsored by the Business Men's Association, were distributed Monday and will be collected this Saturday.

It is expected that several hundred names will be obtained by the end of the week, according to BMA President Charles Schwartz. The requests will be forwarded to the Levittown Bus Corp., which is interested in operating the service and wants an expression of local interest to place before the Public Service Commission when it makes application.

Civics Add Support

This week the Hicksville Civic and Community Association went on record in favor of such service, according to President Lawrence A. Roman, joining the BMA and Lions Club, which have already voiced approval. The Kiwanis Club was expected to consider like action today (Wednesday) at its meeting. President Fred Eberhardt told the Herald.

T. C. Richardson, manager of the Levittown Bus Corp., attended the BMA meeting last Thursday and said his company is very much interested in the three-mile route. A preliminary survey has shown there are many residents in new homes along the highway besides the possibility of passengers from Glasfloss Mfg. Co., Grumman's and the proposed Gordon-Lacey Chemical Products Co. on New South Rd. He indicated a 10-cent fare may be charged.

The BMA voted at the meeting to distribute the petition forms in local stores. Business people are asked to deliver the forms to the BMA office at 162 Broadway at the end of the week.

Increase Service Along Jerusalem

HEMPSTEAD—Daily service along Jerusalem Ave. from Wantagh and Levittown to Hicksville RR station will be increased within a few days, the Levittown Bus Corp. told the HERALD yesterday. The new schedule is not complete, but there will be more trips made during the day and additional runs for later commuter trains.

County Rebuilding Two Local Roads

MINEROLA — Reconstruction of two major highways in Hicksville area was scheduled to begin this week, the County Public Works Department told the Herald, Friday. Jerusalem Avenue, south from the Hicksville High School to Hempstead-Farmingdale Turnpike, will be rebuilt with a mall constructed down the center to separate traffic. Old Country Road will be rebuilt from the Rail Road crossing east to South Oyster Bay Road.

Contracts on both projects have been left, according to C. V. Smith of the engineering department, and start of work is dependent upon the contractors. He thought they might start this past Monday. Each project is being handled by a different contractor.

The Jerusalem Avenue project, sought by local groups and town officials, had become an important artery since the development of Island Trees by Levitt and Sons. The road passes the L. I. Aviation Country Club and is the route of the Hicksville-Wantagh bus line of the Levittown Bus Corp. The work is expected to include removal of the hazardous bridge across the bed of the Old Motor Parkway.

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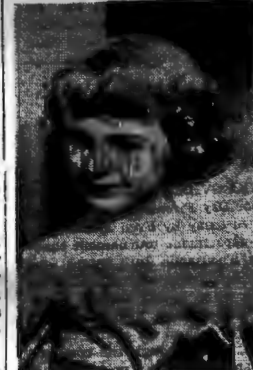

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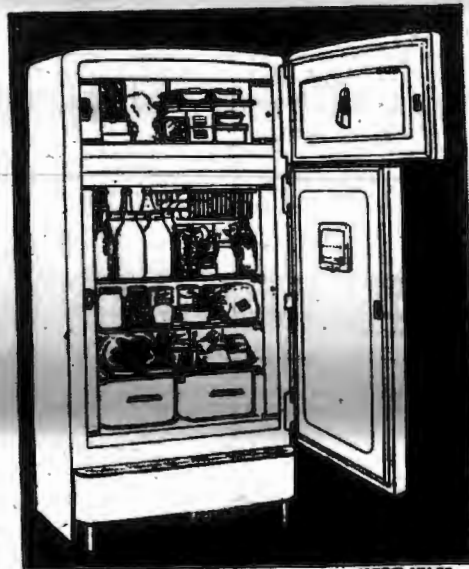
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MEET THE LADIES:

She also studied elocution at the Carnegie Hall studios and piano at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. Mrs. Lumm says that she has no particular hobby but rather takes a general interest in all things. 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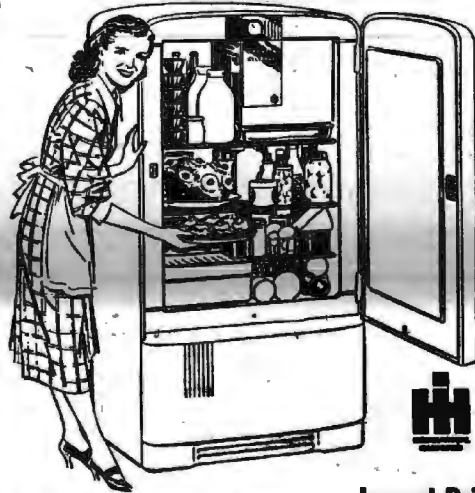
