## Expect Record Crowd Labor Day For 21st Parade And Tourney

**HICKSVILLE**—This community is ready to play host on Monday for 15,000 visiting firemen and spectators for the 21st annual Labor Day Firemen's Parade and Tournament. A gala block dance on the public parking field opposite the firehouse on E. Marie St. will start off the weekend festivities this Saturday night with more than 1000 expected to join the fun.

About 50 fire departments from Nassau and Suffolk with 80 bands of musicians are expected for the big parade Monday morning, starting at 9:30 o'clock, rain or shine. The nine prominent citizens who have been asked to serve as parade judges have elected Frank Sutter as chairman of their group.

The judges will take up positions along the line of the parade and score the various units upon appearance, numbers-in-line and other factors. The parade is expected to take three hours to pass the grandstands on Bethpage Road. Some of the nearly 30 handsome trophies displayed at Huettner's will be awarded parade winners.

### Special Data About Big Program

The parade starts, rain or shine, on Jerusalem Ave. at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning. The contests start on Bethpage Road (near Zeldi Park) at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. In case of inclement weather, causing a change in the contest arrangements, this fact will be broadcast at noon time over WHLI (1100 kc) and WKBS (1520 kc).

**NO PARKING** of autos along the curbs of Broadway will be asked the cooperation of all so that an uninterrupted view of the permitted Monday morning starting at 8 a.m. Police and firemen march will be available to all.

**LINE OF MARCH:** The parade will take the following route — South on Jerusalem Ave. to Old Country Rd., east of Old Country to Broadway, north on Broadway across the RR to East John St., east on John to Bay Ave., north on Bay to Grove St., east on Grove to Bethpage Road and then north on Bethpage Road past the grandstands and judge's arch and disband. All residents and business places are asked to display their American flags on Monday.

## Hicks Claims Crown As Vamp Champions

**HEMPSTEAD** — The Hicks, racing team of Hicksville Fire Dept., won undisputed honors as the championship team of Long Island for 1949 at the Invitation Tournament here Saturday. The Hicks came from behind to score five telling points in the last event of the day and nosed out the Iron Men of Riverhead with a half-point to win the tourney. The Hicks have brought home 25 trophies in competition this year, including the top honors at the Nassau County Firemen's Association tournament and may tie the previous total of 26 trophies they collected in 1946, according to

Team Captain Lawrence Small.

### Question About Monday

The Hicksville team has its eye upon the trophy for the greatest accumulation of points for the entire season in Nassau. Pending a check of the official records, the Hicks claim 86 points, which gives them a margin of 18 over the Meadowlarks of East Meadow, their nearest competitor. The Hicks do not plan to take part in their own contests on Labor Day, but if there is a possibility of East Meadow or some other team topping the Hicks' point total, the Nematodes will be in there fighting.

Five points are given for a first position in a contest and since six events are scheduled for next (continued on page 12).

**HEMPSTEAD** — Winners of the contests and events during the firemen's tournament at Hicksville on Labor Day will be broadcast throughout the day on Station WHLI (1100 kc). Reports will be made directly from the judge's arch to the studio for broadcast during news periods. WKBS (1520 kc) is planning a direct report between 2 and 3 p.m.

## BMA Collects Petitions to PSC; Double Daily Jerusalem Avenue Service Through to Levittown

A total of 1,147 persons in the mid-Island area have signed petitions during the past week requesting the Public Service Commission to grant a franchise for regular bus service along South Broadway from Hicksville depot to Miller Homes at Wantagh Avenue and Hempstead Turnpike, Island Trees.

At the same time, the Levittown Bus Corp. put into operation a new, revised schedule for service between Levittown and Hicksville along Jerusalem Avenue which increases the daily runs from eight to 16 round trips. The new schedule became effective Monday.

### BMA Gets Names

The petitions were signed by patrons of Hicksville stores during a five-day period and by residents along the 3-mile proposed route to and including the Miller Homes area. The project was undertaken by the Hicksville Business Men's Association, Inc., and President Charles Schwartz today promised speedy delivery of the pile of documents to the Levittown Bus Corp. which is interested in inaugurating the service.

This week the Hicksville Kiwanis Club went on record with the PSC favoring such a bus service, joining the request registered (continued on page 14)

## Three Questions In Jericho Vote

**JERICHO**—Three special propositions, including one for installation of an emergency auxiliary siren system and another for installation of a television set in the firehouse, will be voted upon by qualified voters of this fire district at the annual budget meeting, Monday, Sept. 12, in the firehouse between 7 and 10 p. m.

The 1950 budget calls for an expenditure of \$10,149.24. The budget for 1949 was \$9,267.48.

One proposition is for \$1000 to alter and equip the meeting room and install a television set for the use of department members.

Another proposition is for \$1000 for an emergency auxiliary siren system and the third proposal asks \$1000 to defray expenses of the department in attending tournaments and for educational purposes.

A taxpayer must reside in the fire district 30 days prior to the meeting and have his name on the last assessment roll in order to vote.

## 2 More Local Polio Victims

**MINEOLA**—New cases of polio were reported for Hicksville and Bethpage by the County Health Department this week, making the total 19 for the mid-Island section. In Levittown, where there are 12 cases, the death of a 6-year-old girl at St. Charles Hospital was reported.

Hicksville now has two cases, the latest a five-year-old boy; and Bethpage has four, the latest a 7-month old boy.

Of 173 cases in Nassau County with 16 deaths, 48 are children 5 to 9 years of age; 40 children up to four; 38 children 10 to 14, ten from 15 to 19 years, and 42 victims 20 and over.

**HICKSVILLE** — Funeral services will be held tonight (Wednesday) for Asa Pierce of 123 First St., who died on Monday, Aug. 29, at Meadowbrook Hospital. Services will be conducted by the Rev. Cranston Clayton of the Methodist Church at 8 p. m. in the Dalton Funeral Home on West Marie St. Interment will be held tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon at 1:30 at the L. I. National Cemetery.

A guard of honor from the William M. Gouse Jr. VFW Post will stand watch from 7:30 to 10 tonight. Mr. Pierce was chaplain of the local VFW post for

the past two years. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War and a member of Nassau Post 115 of Spanish Vets. He succumbed to injuries from a recent fall at the age of 67.

Surviving are his wife, Laura; a son, Clarence; a daughter, Mrs. Irene Hartmann; a granddaughter; two brothers, Charles and Dale, and a sister, Effie Moore.

He is the first member of the William M. Gouse Post to die since the end of World War II. Post Commander Al Hanlon will conduct the military services tonight.

During the past couple of months he has been principal of the Hudson Summer High School. Mr. and Mrs. McManus make their home at Claverack, a small community about two miles from Hudson.

**Laborer-Preacher Held In Stabbing**

MINEOLA — Collie Dubose, farm laborer from Alabama who told police he is also a preacher, is being held in the county jail awaiting sentence on September 7, for stabbing his common-in-law wife with a pocket knife Friday morning in Hicksville. He has pleaded guilty to third degree assault.

Elouise Wright, 31, of Woodbury Road, suffered a slight stab wound in the left side of the chest. Taken to Meadowbrook Hospital in a private car she was treated by Dr. Rita Foley of the Hospital staff. She has since been released.

The stabbing took place on Miller Road, 200 feet west of Robins Lane, Hicksville. Friday morning about 10:30 P.M. Police of the second precinct arrested Dubose who gave his local address as Bloomingdale Avenue. His home is in Dothan, Ala. Detectives James Reddy and Sgt. Reginald Ballard investigated the complaint.

Two other farm laborers, William Ross, 42, and Jimmie L. Garner, 77, also of Miller Road, are being held for action of the grand jury. They are accused of attacking James S. Knight with a push-broom on August 20, causing him to suffer the loss of his right eye. Knight, who likewise lives on Miller Road, is in Meadowbrook.

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# Taxpayers Vote Tuesday on Fire District Budget, Special Proposals

HICKSVILLE — Modernization of the local fire alarm system is proposed under a special proposition before resident taxpayers next Tuesday night, Sept. 6. The proposal calls for the expenditure of \$16,000.

The fire district election will be held at the firehouse between 7 and 10 p. m. There is no advance registration of voters; however, only resident taxpayers whose names appear on the last assessment roll are eligible. They must have lived in the district since Aug. 6.

### \$10,000 From Last Year

Besides the special proposition of \$16,000, ballots will be cast upon a proposed budget of \$20,950, which is \$2,100 more than last year, and two other special questions: (1) \$800 for firemen's uniforms and (2) \$1000 for department inspection. The total of the budget and propositions is \$38,550. An additional \$10,000 will be collected by tax during the coming year, representing funds authorized for expenditure last year but not collected on tax bills due to an oversight by town officials.

The current tax rate is \$2.30 per \$1000 of assessment. The proposed budget, with propositions, is expected to bring the rate up to \$4.00 per \$1000, an increase of 173 per cent.

Local interest is focused on proposition No. 2, which calls for expenditure of \$16,000 for the alarm system. Fire Commissioners explained the proposal recently to the Civic Assoc. executive committee.

### Need New Compressor

It was pointed out that the air compressor which operates the signal horn at the firehouse needs replacement. In addition, the wiring on the control board and the panel itself must be increased to accommodate more alarm boxes. This part of the job is expected to cost \$11,000 to \$12,000. A new panel, it was explained, will take care of local needs for "the next 20 years."

The balance of the appropriation is for installation of two sirens in outlying sections. One to be placed on the water district property on Bethpage Rd. near the RR, and the other may go on the school acreage on Newbridge

Rd. A request has been made to the school board for the use of a section of ground for this second siren.

The extra sirens are expected to cost \$500 each. During the war, taxpayers gave approval for installation of four extra sirens at a total cost of \$2,000. However, the lack of priorities made it impossible to fill the order and the proposal was dropped.

Provision is also made under this proposal for installation of extra alarm boxes as the community grows. Cost of installing an additional box is about \$350.

HICKSVILLE — This community is no stranger to volunteer firemen's parades and tournaments. For the past 20 years the local department has sponsored a

competition on Labor Day which has become the biggest in the entire state. And 41 years ago this was the host community for the Southern New York Volunteer

Firemen's Association 3-day convention, parade and contests.

This week R. A. Esslinger of 104 Broadway in sorting some old papers and records came across a copy of the "Official Programme" for the gala event held 41 years ago, come October. He turned the 75-page booklet over to neighbor-butchery Vincent W. Braun who is again this year secretary of the Labor Day Tournament here.

### Duffy Was Chief

William Duffy was chief of the Fire Department that year and Adam L. Dauch was first assistant. The pictures of both men appear in the brochure. The late John Puvogel was grand marshal and chairman of the plate and prize committee.

The firehouse building (today the Firehouse Inn, on the south side of East Marie Street) was a comparatively new structure in 1908 and there were four companies in the department. Apparatus was hand or horse-drawn.

The tournament in those days was run much the same as the contests next September 5, with this difference: there were contests for steamers. "Time to be taken from first appearance of smoke from smoke-stack" and hand operated pump engines and horse hose contest "world's record one minute and one second."

### Hospitality Well Known

The introductory note in the program is of interest: "It will be no fault of the village of Hicksville if the (3-day event) is not a gratifying success. For several weeks arrangements under the management of an able committee has been under consideration and in progress and no effort or expense is being spared to accomplish this desirable result. The

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# the Sportlight

In its 1949 rulebook the Amateur Softball Association of America advises that it is the "sole governing body of amateur softball" in America.

To further enhance its prestige, it announces that it is allied with the AAU and the American Olympic Committee.

These two organizations are well known in American sports. Their leaders are devoted to advancing sportsmanship and are ever alert to keep their athlete-members in the fair, pure light of Amateurism.

Were you to give one of their members a small token of praise in appreciation of an exceptional achievement on the athletic field, their governing officers would loosen a wounded cry to be heard the length of the land.

Their claim is that any reward large or small to an athlete rears the ugly head of professionalism.

In all cases, gifts must be returned by an athlete and if they are not, the athlete is stripped of his awards and banned from subsequent competition.

Thus the standards of both groups are preserved.

In the light of the ASA Metropolitan tournament we wonder what standards were adhered to in that high pressure production and whether the two organizations mentioned prefer to be "allied" with the outcome.

The Met tourney provides the Regional championships in Rochester with the champion from this area and that role was universally conceded to the Grumman Yankees from the start.

And conceded it was. Forced perhaps, but conceded nevertheless.

First indication that the other teams who bothered to enter the tourney were by small, small cogs in a big machine came when both Astoria and Botto Brothers had won-one and one-lost records in the two-defeat-and-out tourney.

Last Wednesday, Astoria and Bottos were pitted against each other in a scheduled first game of a possible triple bill. The winner was to go against Grumman and in order to win the title had to beat the Yankees twice in the same night.

In itself, making a team play three games in one night to win the championship should be enough to make ASA officials blush.

Reason for the rush was that Grumman was leaving the next day for a tour of upstate and wanted to wind up in Rochester for the Regionals.

With Astoria leading 1-0 in the fourth inning, rain deluged the Floral Park field (readers will remember the heavy downpour of a week this date around 8 p. m.) and conditions were such that it was impossible to proceed.

The ASA insisted that both Astoria and Bottos waive their rights to the title and allow Grumman to head north with full blessings as the Met representative.

Actually both Astoria and Bottos have something to gain by their surrender. The ASA is putting up a trophy mountainous inches high for the winner of their game.

What the trophy will represent isn't exactly known, but it is a chance for a prize and in this day and age it isn't how you come about a trophy that counts, but simply that you got one.

Bottos attempted to get a bargain out of the deal. They did not want to resume the game in the fourth inning trailing 1-0 and wanted it played from the start. However, the ASA stuck gloriously to its code—a contest must be resumed from the point where it was interrupted.

Our point is not whether Grumman's had the right to go to Rochester. . . We are as realistic as the rest. . . But the day that titles or even representations are given and not won is the day when sports lose all values.

HICKSVILLE—A protest of its 4-2 loss to Breen's All-Stars lodged by Botto Brothers has delayed the final playoff series for the championship of the Mid-Island Herald Softball League.

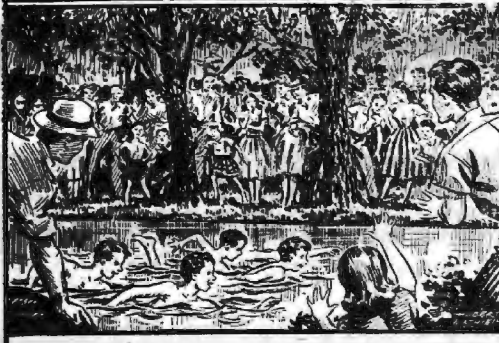
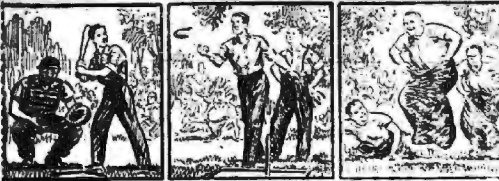

## The Fire Alarm System Proposition

RESIDENT HICKSVILLE taxpayers vote next Tuesday evening, Sept. 6, between 7 and 10 p. m. at the firehouse on the budget for operation of the fire district in 1950. The total budget is about the same as last year. However, there are three special proposals being offered also, and of these No. 2 deserves special consideration.

Proposal No. 2 calls for expenditure of \$16,000 to "replace obsolete central office equipment, 2 additional sirens and new boxes."

Hicksville has one of the most elaborate and modern systems for alerting the volunteer firemen in time of emergency. If a call box is pulled, a special series of blasts are sounded on the horns atop the firehouse. For example a "15" call (single blast, short pause, five blasts in succession, long pause and then repeat) means Broadway and Cherry Street corner. There are 65 arrangements of signals on the current alarm chart, including "2" which is sounded at noontime and "B" which is the firehouse call, meaning the vamps should report at the engine house.

The capacity of a two-number set-up has been now reached, and a complete revision is planned to set up a three-number system. If adopted, signals
