#### **BMA Collects Petitions to PSC**; Double Daily Jerusalem Avenue Service Through to Levittown

A total of 1,147 persons in the mid-Island area have signed petitions during the past week requesting the Public Service Commission to grant a franchise for regular bus service along South Broadway from Hicksville depot to Miller Homes at Wantagh Avenue and Hempstead Turnpike, Island Troes Island Trees.

At the same time, the Levittown Bus Corp. put into operation a new, revised schedule for service between Levit-town and Hicksville along Jerusalem Avnue which increases the daily runs from eight to 16 round trips. schedule became effective Monday.

The petitions were signed by patrons of Hicksville stores during a five-day period and by residents along the 3-mile proposed route to and including the Miller Homes area. Hicksville now has two cases. the latest a five-year-old boy; and Bethpage has four, the latest a 7month old boy.

Of 173 cases in Nassau County with 16 deaths, 48 are children 5 to 9 years of age; 40 children up to four; 38 children 10 to 14, ten from 15 to 19 years, and 42 victims 20 and over.

The fire district election will be held at the firehouse between 7 and 10 p. m. There is no advance registration of voters; however, only resident taxpayers whose names appear on the last assessment roll are eligible. They must have lived in the district since Aug. 6.

Besides the special proposition of \$16,000, ballots will be cast upon a proposed budget of \$20,-950, which is \$2,100 more than last year, and two other special questions: (1) \$600 for firemen's uniforms and (2) \$1000, for department inspection. The total of the budget and propositions is \$38.560. An additional \$10.000 will collected by tax during the coming year, representing funds authorized for expenditure last year but not collected on tax bills due to an oversight by town of-

## The Fire Alarm System Proposition

RESIDENT HICKSVILLE taxpayers vote next Tuesday evening, Sept. 6, between 7 and 10 p. m. at the firehouse on the budget for operation of the fire district in 1950. The total budget is about the same as last year. However, there are three cial proposals being offered also, and of these No. 2 deserves special consideration.

Proposal No. 2 calls for expenditure of \$16,000 ce obsolete central office equipment, 2 additional sirens and new boxes."

Hicksville has one of the most elaborate and sodern systems for alerting the volunteer firemen in time of emergency. If a call box is pulled, a special series of blasts are sounded on the horn atop the firehome. For example a "15" call (single blast, short pause, five blasts in occasion, long purse and then repeat) means readway and Cherry Street corner. There are 65 arrangements of signals on the current alarm chart, including "2" which is sounded at noontime and "5" which is the firehouse call. ning the vamps should report at the engine

The capacity of a two-number set-up has been now reached, and a complete revision is planned to set up a three-number system. If adopted, signals

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will be given in series of three: ie., 231 or 536, etc. Those long calls (such as 87-E. St. Nicholai St. between RR and B'way) put a terrific strain on the alarm horn and recently it has been heard wheezing on some signals. The three-series system will allow numerical arrangements of shorter

Purpose of the alarm signal sounded is to tell the volunteer firemen the approximate location of the fire. Many residents know their own neighbor-hood call and breathe easier—if away from home when the call is not in their block

The fire commissioners admit that 75 per cent of the fire calls received come in by telephone. person asks the operator for the fire department, states the address of the blaze and the firehouse manually sets up the call signal for that custodian locality. There are some who question the expenditure of money required to maintain this alarm system. Two thousand dollars a year is included the budget for its repair and upkeep. point out that many firemen dash immediately for the firehouse as soon as the first toot is heard and then learn where the fire is located, defeating the need for a public notification of the address.

Others believe that the convenience of an alarm box which stands ready 24 hours a day to receive emergency notices is worth the cost. Not everyone has a telephone in their home either.

The fire board is leaving it up to the community to decide-next Tuesday night.
