Hicksville Tourney LI Greatest; 12,500 Watch Oyster Bay Win

HICKSVILLE — While the number of entries and general attendance for the 21st Annual Firemen's Parade and Tournament was slightly less than last year, the traditional Labor Day event here on Monday retained the distinction as the biggest event of its kind held on Long Island. Competing with the local tourney was a program for Suffolk departments held the same day at Islip.

Officers and members of the Hicksville Fire Dept. tournament committee were unanimous in their opinion today that the rival competition at Islip had little effect upon the local event. The absence of about a dozen Suffolk teams resulted in a smoother running program here. The last contest was concluded at 6:30 Monday evening as compared with a midnight finish last year when there were 17 more departments entered.

Oyster Bay Wins Again

The Rough Riders of Oyster Bay repeated their achievement of last year by winning the tournament. They collected 23 points out of a possible 30 and far out-distanced their closest rival, Westbury, which earned 13 points. Hempstead Yellow Hornets were third with 8.5 points, Great Neck Alerts fourth with 7 and East Meadow fifth with 5.5. Oyster Bay got 13.5 last year for top honors and Hempstead was second with 11.

Westbury came from behind in the last two events to nose out Hempstead. At the end of four out of six contests, Hempstead was in second position.

Police reported a total audience of 12,500 for the big day compared with an estimate of 15,000 last year. There were 58 entries compared with 75 in 1948.

Parade judges headed by Chairman Frank Sutter had a difficult task with competition extremely keen. The judges were forced to base their verdicts on minor differences, making their observations from five points along the parade route. Oceanside took honors for the most men in line, a total of 123, Manhasset-Lakeville had 109 in parade, Freeport 108 and Fort

Washington 104, showing the close count necessary.

Best appearance award for departments of over 50 men went to Freeport, first; and Port Washington, second. Best appearing with less than 50 men were Bethpage, first, and Glenwood Landing, second. Best appearing auxiliary

went to Uniondale, first, and Plainview, second.

St. James Wildcats got the honors for travelling the farthest distance to the tourney and was the sole Suffolk county entrant.

Delegation of Parents Gets Date; May Submit Two Grade Questions With Estimates \$40,000 to \$65,000

HICKSVILLE — A vote of the school district upon the question of providing transportation for students within the district has been tentatively set for Monday night, Oct. 10. The exact form of the proposal has not been announced, pending a special meeting of the Board of Education.

The date for the vote was set by the School Board last Wednesday night when a delegation of about 40 parents appeared at the regular board meeting in support of a recent petition requesting bus service for their children.

Because of the large delegation the School Board opened a classroom in the high school and Henry C. Brengel, president, presided at an informal hearing. Brengel welcomed the group and indicated that a single question on transporting all age groups within the district may be offered.

Differ on Proposal

There was some difference of opinion among those present as to whether all children or only those attending through the sixth grade should be transported. Most of those present appeared to favor transportation for the smaller children especially, although several women spoke for facilities for higher students, "on days when the weather is bad."

Board member Lawrence McCaffrey offered the comment that he believes the service should be arranged for the particular convenience of the smaller children. Brengel said the Board had selected the first week in October for the district vote and asked the opinion of the group as to the exact night. October 10 appeared to win approval.

Brengel also stated that registration days for voters will be set (Continued on Page 2)

prior to the vote and that the qualifications of voters, which he read at the meeting, will be published.

Request Two Questions

A strong plea for the presentation of "two or three" propositions for the voters was voiced by Mrs. Ethel Lauer of Frank Homes, one on transporting children from kindergarten through sixth grade and another for the older children. She felt the submission of the proposition in such fashion, "right at the start, would save time."

Howard Parton of Roger Homes, on the other hand, felt that transportation of all pupils might be more desirable. The conference in Room 101 lasted from 9:15 to 9:50. District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer read the petition for bus service, signed by a couple of hundred people, to show that no mention of a specific age group was made in the original plea.

Bengel told the group, largely women and several with small children, that the "board has decided to transport all children residing in the district" as a proposition. However, later in the evening when the Board returned to its meeting chambers it was tentatively decided to offer a twin proposal if legally possible.

Discussion at the meeting of the board, after the parents had left, included the review of estimates on the cost of bus service made by several operators. The estimates ranged about \$65,000 for transportation of all 2000 pupils and \$40,000 for those up to the sixth grade. It was noted that these figures were possible maximums and that the exact amount would only be known when formal bids have been sought and submitted.

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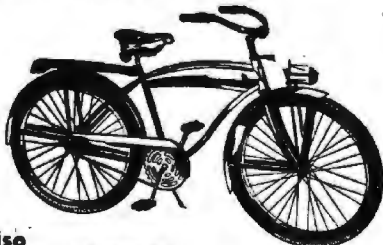
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Postpone Bus Trip Due To Polio In NYC

HICKSVILLE—Because of the continued prevalence of polio in New York City, coupled with the fact that this community is relatively free of the dread disease, has caused the Free Public Library to postpone a scheduled field trip to New York City on Sept. 17 for about 150 children. The decision was made yesterday after consultation with county health authorities.

The same trip, for members of the summer vacation reading clubs, will be made in mid-October. In the meantime, children and parents who would like to go are asked to register any day at the library on Nicholas St. Definite notice of the new date will be sent each registrant by mail, Librarian Marion Cecil stated.

In the mid-island section, one new case of polio was reported in Bethpage, a girl of eight, making the total there five; also a girl of five in Levittown making that total 14. There are two Hicksville cases, none new during past week.

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3 Buses Pickup Island Trees Pupils

ISLAND TREES—Three buses will transport school children of this district to the Island Trees one-room schoolhouse, to Old Bethpage School, to Bethpage School and to Farmingdale H. S., according to L. A. Blodgett, principal. Mrs. Mamie Benkert of Bethpage has been awarded the bus contract.

Kindergarten and 7th and 8th grades will attend Bethpage School. First grade pupils will attend Island Trees School (near the new telephone building). Grades 2 to 6 will go to the Old

Bethpage School (near golf course and State Park).

All kindergarten and first grade pupils will be split into two sessions. Those living north of Hempstead Turnpike and east of Hamlet and Lowland Roads, including those north of the LIRR right-of-way, will attend morning sessions at Old Bethpage School and grades 3, 4 and 5 will attend afternoon sessions. Pupils in the 7th and 8th grades will attend both sessions at Bethpage School.

Sessions at Island Trees and Old Bethpage Schools will be from 8:30 a. m. to 12:15 and 12:30 to 4:15 p. m. Classes at Bethpage School are from 9 to 11 a. m. and 1 to 2 p. m.

School buses will be designated "A," "B" and "C" to facilitate identification. Bus A will take the morning session of first graders to the Island Trees School, starting at Wilford Street at 8 A.M.

Bus Stops
 From there the stops are: Retzler farm and Broadway; Carson Street and Wantagh Avenue; Carol Road; Stokes and Wantagh Avenues; Mallard Road and Wantagh Avenue; Lark Street and Condon Road; Oriole Road and Martin Street, and Oriole Road and Hawk Place. The bus then

proceeds to the school and discharges the pupils.

Stops for Bus B
 Bus B will pick up pupils for the second and fourth grades for transportation to the Old Bethpage School and also seventh and eighth graders for the Bethpage School. It will leave Wilford Street at 7:45 A.M.

Bus A then returns, making all the stops in reverse and picking up morning kindergarten pupils. This bus leaves the Island Trees School at 8:30 and goes to the Bethpage School.

This bus makes the same stops as Bus A, with the following additional stops at the end of the route: Hawk Lane and Wantagh Avenue; Craig Lane and Wantagh Avenue; Rope Lane and Wantagh Avenue; Gingham Lane and Wantagh Avenue; Gingham and Rope Lanes; Forge and Cotton Lanes; Forge and Silver Lanes; Balsam and Silver Lanes; Balsam and Surrey Lanes, and Balsam and Cotton Lanes.

Bus C will cover exactly the same route as Bus B and will pick up pupils for Farmingdale High School and St. Killian's School. It will leave Wilford Street at 7:45 a. m.

Afternoon Schedule
 In the afternoon, Bus A will start at noon over the same route it followed in the morning and pick up first graders for the Island Trees School. At 12:30 P.M. it will reverse the route, as before, and pick up kindergarten pupils for the Bethpage School.

For the afternoon session of third, fifth and sixth graders, Bus B will start at 11:45 A.M. to cover the same route over which it traveled in the morning. The pupils go to the Old Bethpage School.

All pupils will be picked up and transported home.

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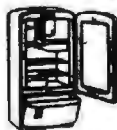
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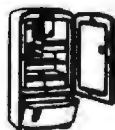

In Our Opinion:

Parking Effort Deserves Support

EVIDENCE that there is deep-seated concern locally about the parking and traffic problems of Hicksville was found this week as the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Parking held a couple of sessions and began mapping a campaign.

The Parking Committee has not met during the summer. The plan for such a committee originated with the Civic and Community Association and was suggested to the town fathers as a means of unifying various local efforts on parking and traffic matters. It was proposed to eliminate duplicating and overlapping efforts by the several local organizations concerned about such things.

Representatives were named by the Civics, the Kiwanis, the Business Men's Association and the Lions. A fifth member was named "a member at large"—The Rev. Howard Rogers was chosen chairman.

The Parking Committee has little to show for a year of existence, but plans a renewed effort on all fronts. Among the specific recommendations now being made to the town fathers, as a starter, are these:

1. Concentrate on efforts to revise the parking arrangement in the Rail Road plaza between Broadway and Jerusalem Ave., along the north side of the station platform. It has been shown on paper that the number of car spaces here could possibly be doubled by a better traffic arrangement.

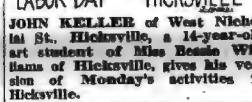
Traffic was controlled by 27 policemen in charge of Inspector Hahn, Captain Jessup and three police sergeants.
