Island Trees Civic Enthusiastic About Broadway Bus Proposal

ISLAND TREES—Enthusiastic and unanimous endorsement of the plea to the State Public Service Commission for establishment of bus service along Hicksville Road (South Broadway) from Milshire Park north to Hicksville was registered at the Civic Association meeting Monday night. The civic in session at the Five Corners Restaurant went on record supporting the plan of the Levittown Bus Corp.

The project already has the support of four Hicksville organizations and more than 1,500 persons have signed petitions in favor of the service. The petitions are being circulated by the Hicksville Business Men's Association, Inc.

Denounce Cowboy Drivers
The residents of the Miller Homes section near Wantagh Ave. and Hempstead Tpke. at the well-attended session again denounced the cowboy driving tactics of

home-bound Gramman workers who "travel at high speeds thru the development to skip the corner traffic signal." Several members expressed the opinion that only by erecting street blockades and baby carriage brigades would the cowboy riding be curbed before a child or adult suffers serious or fatal injury.

The Association is also circulating petitions, addressed to the Hempstead Town Board, asking for control of dumping in an abandoned sand pit on the east side of Wantagh Ave. Private dumping, it is charged, is causing the rat infestation there to increase. Fencing of the area is also sought.

Formal petitions were presented at the session requesting the installation of street lighting in the Milshire area.

Farmers Market, First of Kind on Island, Opens Friday Night at Airpark Property

HICKSVILLE—The first establishment of its kind on Long Island, the Farmers' Market, opens this Friday night at 5 o'clock on the Hicksville Airpark property, Robbins Lane, and will be open Friday evenings thereafter from 5 to 10 p. m. The announcement was made today by George V. Spohrer, Airpark owner.

The Farmers' Market idea, featuring booths or tables loaded

with low-price foodstuffs, produce and household articles, has swept the nation. The local market will be conducted Friday nights in the main hangar of the Airpark and outdoors. Floodlights have been installed and more than 50 tables have been set up to handle the articles for sale.

Town Starts 2-Year Major Works Projects

EAST NORWICH—Harry Tappen of Glenwood Landing is the Republican candidate for re-election as Town Supervisor and all GOP incumbents have been designated with one exception. It will be Tappen's last two-year term, he publicly announced at a dinner of GOP committeemen and candidates here at Rothmann's Saturday.

Tappen is completing his ninth two-year term as town supervisor. He had previously served the town for ten years as highway superintendent. Accepting the nomination, Tappen gave a fighting talk, lashing out at "unjustified criticism" and once pounding the dinner table to emphasize his points.

Improvement Program
During the next two years the town will embark on a program of major public improvements, he asserted, but the town board is not going to wait until January 1 to prepare plans. Construction of a modern town highway barn, probably at the incinerator property in Locust Grove, is projected to replace the dilapidated, rented structure in Hicksville.

Emphasis on public improvements was also placed by Congressman Leonard W. Hall, who was re-elected town chairman during the meeting of the town committee before the dinner. Other town committee officials re-elected were Mrs. Katherine Sessler of Glenwood Landing, vice-chairman; Mrs. Andrew B. Hebrer of Hicksville, secretary; and Frank G. Scholl of Farmingdale, treasurer.

Write-In Vote Fails By Margin of Nine

BETHPAGE—A last-minute write-in campaign for Louis Slisla narrowly missed ousting a long-time incumbent Republican committeeman in the 25th Election District on Primary Day. Voting was generally light in other sections of the mid-Island area with 26 or 35 votes the average Republican balloting in each district.

In the 28th, however, there were 200 votes cast during the balloting. James "Happy" Norman received 182 votes, Loyd Decker 101 and Slisla was given 92 write-in votes.

Enrollment Up As Term Begins

First day registration at mid-Island area schools showed a marked increase over last year's figures and continued to mount daily this week as pupils return from late vacations and new residents settle in their homes. New teachers and replacement teachers in the schools have been announced.

Hicksville Public Schools registered 1,261 pupils on the first day of the fall term, which was an increase of 202 over last year's first day. The new figure was over 1,400 on Friday afternoon, Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent, announced.

Fire District Vote Light All Propositions Carry

All propositions were carried at Fire District Special Elections in the mid-Island area this week. There were only 88 votes cast in Bethpage and 75 in Hicksville on Tuesday night, Sept. 6.

BETHPAGE—With 88 ballots cast, the vote on proposition 1, approving a budget of \$30,910 including \$18,200 in bond payment and interest, was carried with 68 yes and 20 no. On question 2, providing \$1200 for erection of street signs, 73 said yes and 15 no; and on the question of selling the firehouse and property on Stewart Ave. for \$7,600 was carried with 65 yes and 23 no.

HICKSVILLE—There was one blank ballot all the way thru the voting on the budget and three propositions as 75 votes were cast. Opposition developed on the ques-

tion of spending \$16,000 for revision of the fire alarm system, including \$16,000 for revision of the fire alarm system, including two sirens in outlying sections of the district and extra boxes. There were 22 no votes cast and 66 yes on this question.

JERICHO—Qualified voters approved a \$10,149.24 fire budget and three propositions at a meeting Monday night in the firehouse. Tabulation of votes showed 56 yes for the budget and 6 no.

Proposition 1 allowing an expenditure of \$1,000 to defray expenses in attending tournaments and educational purposes received 46 yes and 15 no.

There were 40 yes votes for a television set for the department members and 22 no. The emergency auxiliary siren system proposal received 44 yes and 18 no votes.

After an absence of 42 years, Mr. DiMattia enjoyed five weeks visiting his sisters and brothers about 15 miles outside of Rome. His relatives were at the Rome airport when they landed, after about 18 hours of flying.

Mrs. DiMattia visited Mrs. Buonsugra, mother of Angelo Buonsugra, who operates a fruit market at 106 Broadway, Hicksville.

"She was a lovely old lady," Mrs. DiMattia said, "and when I told her that I was from America and bringing her greetings from her son, Angelo, she became quite excited and wanted me to spend the day with her. She called in all her neighbors to see the lady from America and we all had a wonderful time."

Mrs. DiMattia made a side trip

to her birthplace in Naples. On the beach, she was pleased to find that she well remembered the beach she had frequently visited, as a child, with her mother.

On the return trip they were delayed at Ireland because of a heavy fog. "The New York City skyline at night was breathtaking," Mrs. DiMattia said. "Those patterns of lights and knowing that we were nearly home, was one of the biggest thrills of the trip."

HICKSVILLE—Two propositions on transportation of pupils within the district to local schools will be submitted to the qualified voters on Monday night, Oct. 10, at a special District Meeting in the High School auditorium starting at 8 o'clock. One question is for elementary student transportation and the other for high

The proposal of transportation for children within the district received the endorsement of the Charles Wagner American Legion Post several weeks ago. Selection of Oct. 10 as the date for the special meeting was reported exclusively in the Herald last week. The complete qualifications for voting will be published for the next two weeks by the Herald as a public service just prior to the actual registration dates.

Andrew B. Heberer, district clerk, in issuing the call for the special meeting, also announced the selection of two prior Saturdays for the registration of persons not previously enrolled. The Board of Registration and Cansass will meet for this purpose at Nicholas St. School on Sept. 24 and Oct. 1 between the hours of 8 and 9 p. m. on each date.

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

Levitt May Build 4000 In Hicksville

OYSTER BAY—Levitt & Sons plans to construct 4,000 houses in the Hicksville School District area during 1950, it was learned here this week from a reliable source. Estimates of 3,500 dwellings were revised upward to 4,000 this week, and acreage said to be held by the building firm now blankets the south end of the Hicksville district, reaching upward nearly to Old Country Road along the Parkway.

The Levitt concern already has been issued a building permit for construction of a single Levitt house, the first in the township. The permit is for one house, a sample, to be erected on Jerusalem Avenue, Hicksville.

The construction of 4,000 houses in Hicksville would almost triple the number of dwellings in the community and add an estimated 12,000 persons to the local population, making it more than 20,000 people.

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
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Community Concerts Seeking Volunteers

Plane Workers Endanger Everyone

THE EVENING RUSH of aircraft workers homeward from Bethpage plants to destinations all over the Island has become quite commonplace for Hicksville. We're used to the comparatively few (considering the thousands of autos on the move), cowboys in the pack who pass their fellow workers in the third traffic lane, slip down Fourth Street, East Street and other back streets to skip traffic lights, but we never will become adjusted to the hazard to life and limb that hovers over the neighborhood during that crucial period.

It is a daily miracle that injured and dying children and adult pedestrians are not found scattered all over the roadsides.

In the postwar period we have seen hundreds of new homes constructed and occupied throughout this region and right on the path of these maniac drivers is the Milshire Park section of Island Trees. Not all the home-bound speed demons go through Hicksville. A good number head south on Wantagh Ave. and west of Hempstead Turnpike. It did not take the craftier ones long to discover the side streets of the Miller homes section provide a second-saving path to avoid the Wantagh Ave.-Turnpike traffic signal.

Protests to police authorities by the Island Trees civics have not helped much. Because some of the streets in the region have not as yet been deeded to the Town of Hempstead, police say they are powerless to impose speed restrictions.

Many of these new home owners have small children. That is a well-established fact. And yet how can this daily menace to these youngsters be removed?

STICK OUT YOUR HAND OR YOU'RE STICKING OUT YOUR NECK. Signal before making a turn.

DON'T BUCK BUSY INTERSECTIONS. Walk your bike across them.

RIDING DOUBLE MEANS DOUBLED TROUBLE. Never carry a passenger, besides obstructing your vision, an extra rider can throw you out of balance.

BREAD BELONGS IN THE BREADBASKET. Keep both hands and arms free for the important business of guiding your bike. Use a basket or rack for parcels.

DON'T TALK BACK TO A RED LIGHT. Obey all traffic signs and rules.

LIGHT UP AT NIGHT. The law requires a headlight and rear reflector for night riding.
