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
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

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

WE GET THE FEELING-frequently these days that things are closing in on us. Here a too open land is sought for development, soon to be the site of a couple of hundred tidy homes. There another large tract is hought-very soon (during 1950, in fact)-to be covered by some 2000 (or 4000?) cellarless bedroom-kitchen units.

At the risk of being labeled "reactionary," we deplore the disappearance of every local square inch of open ground. The lale of Trees with its rolling plains—the historic Great Plains of Long is all but gone . . . including the name,

Population and home building is closing in on us — from all sides.

What must be done, and done very soon, is obvious: Our township must acquire some of these remaining acres and set them aside for parks. In Hicksville, where we have a Park and Parking District, small tracts could be acquired and planted with trees and grass. In the to-tal mid-Island section, larger tracts could be set aside for township parks.

Many of the people moving into the mid-Island area do so to get "out in the country." But unless some provision is made now, we may soon see the day when there is no more local "country"

It may be argued that we have the wonderful Bethpage State Park in our neighborhood with its many, many acres. And over to the west is the Nassau County Park (formerly Salisbury) with some 900 acres.
