## CIVICS INVITE PLAINVIEW:

### Hear Chisholm On District Merger

HICKSVILLE—John W. Chisholm, district superintendent of schools, will be guest speaker tomorrow (Thursday) night when the Civic and Community Association holds its first fall meeting in the firehouse auditorium, starting at 8:30. Members of the Plainview Civic Assoc. and all residents of the area have been cordially invited to attend, since it is expected the proposed merger of Hicksville and Plainview School Districts will be a major topic of the evening.

The Hicksville and Plainview School Districts have also been invited to attend the meeting which starts at 8:30 p. m., according to Program Chairman Stephen Smatlak.

President Lawrence A. Roman today issued a special invitation to all new residents, as well as older residents, to attend the meeting. He is expected to announce his committee chairman appointments for the year 1949-50 and report on the activities of the executive committee which has met monthly during the summer recess.

It is anticipated the school transportation question which comes to a vote on Oct. 10 may also be discussed at the meeting tomorrow also, although this is not a scheduled topic. Grade crossing problems and local parking conditions may also be given attention at the session.

## Columbia to Undertake School District Study

HICKSVILLE—A thorough study of school district facilities, as well as immediate and long-range needs, will be started shortly in accordance with the decision of qualified voters made at the annual district meeting last May, it was learned yesterday. The survey will be made by the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers College, Columbia University, and is expected to take about four months.

## Farmer Market Repeats Friday

HICKSVILLE—A new kind of merchandising angle for Long Island was introduced at the Airpark Friday night, and will continue this Friday between 5 and 10 p. m. at the Farmers' Market. Those who attended the opening night were delighted with the bargains and were entertained by the household goods sellers.

George Spohrer of the Airpark told the hundreds of shoppers that 20 farmers had promised to bring in their loads. He expects at least a dozen produce trucks on the scene this Friday and termed the Market plan "a great success."

The Board of Education has decided to engage the services of the Columbia experts at a cost of \$5,000, the amount appropriated for this purpose at the annual meeting. The survey is expected to evaluate present facilities of the district, make recommendations for immediate needs and for long-range needs.

The decision was made after Dr. William S. Elsbree, executive officer of the Institute, and Dr. Felix J. McCormick met with the School Board at a special meeting last week. Dr. Henry H. Linn is also expected to participate in the study, assisted by several survey assistants.

## BMA Circulates Petitions Requesting Town to Acquire Off-Street Areas; Post Office Site Suggestion Made

HICKSVILLE—Petitions addressed to Oyster Bay Town Board requesting that immediate action be taken on the subject of more parking fields for the community are in local stores today. The petitions are being circulated by the Business Men's Association, inviting shoppers to sign them.

The decision to put out the petitions was reached at the BMA meeting held Thursday night at the Rainbow Restaurant. Other action taken at the meeting included:

- 1—Formal request to post office authorities to locate the proposed new office "near the centre of the business district."
- 2—Ask town and police to prohibit by local ordinance U-turns on Broadway.
- 3—Ask police to consistently enforce the 25 miles per hour speed limit on Broadway.
- 4—Assess members and non-members and raise \$1500 for Christmas street lighting of the business section this year.

President Charles Schwartz presided at the well attended general meeting for all retailers. He appointed Jack Eelman, Phil Illman and Fred Eberhardt a nominating committee to present the names of five candidates for three-year directors to be elected at the October meeting.

On the subject of off-street parking, the BMA decided to ask the Town Board to include sufficient funds in the 1950 budget to cover the cost of "acquiring and improving properties" for public parking to take care of present and future needs. "It hardly appears necessary," the BMA wrote, "to point out that the present high rate of development in Hicksville makes it imperative that almost immediate steps be taken to acquire property."

On the new post office location, Mr. Illman presented a sketch of a building which F. N. Taliaferro proposes to erect on the north side of W. Marie St. between Broadway and Jerusalem Ave. Taliaferro has offered to lease this to the post office department. The plans for lighting of the

## Four Decisions Possible on Bus Vote

HICKSVILLE—Qualified voters of the school district will have two questions to answer at the special district meeting on Monday night, Oct. 10, at the high school, a spokesman for the school board said this week. "Yes" or "no" decisions will be made on two separate propositions. The first asks permission to raise not more than \$40,000 for transportation of elementary pupils to district schools and the second asks \$40,000 for high school student transportation. The wording of the proposals is published in the Herald as a legal advertisement on page 8. Four possible decisions may be made: i.e., "yes" on both questions, "yes" on No. 1 and "no" on No. 2, "no" on No. 1 and "yes" on No. 2, and "no" on both questions. Voters must be registered, the school board warns. Qualifications of voters are published in this issue on page 3.

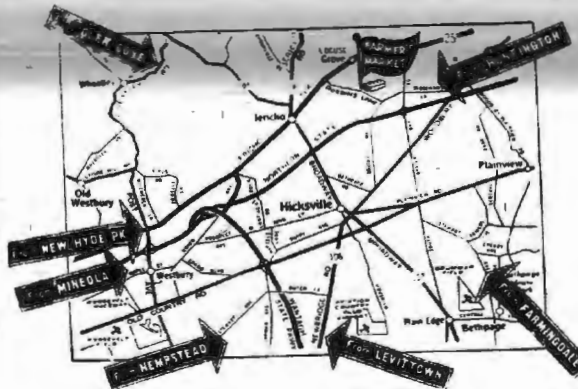

HICKSVILLE—Two registration days for qualified voters of the School District will be held at Nicholai St. School this Saturday, Sept. 24, and Oct. 1 from 3 to 9 p. m. All persons must register to vote at the Oct. 10 meeting on the

proposed school transportation propositions. The voter qualifications are:

**GENERAL FOR ALL:**

- 1—A citizen of the United States.
- 2—Twenty-one years of age.
- 3—A resident within the district (since Aug. 10-editor) for a period of 30 days next preceding the meeting at which he offers to vote and who in addition thereto possesses ONE of the following qualifications:

**SPECIAL (One of These)**

- (a) Owns, leases, hires or is in possession under contract of property liable to taxation (one may vote unless in both names);
- (b) Is the parent of a child of school age, provided such child has attended the district school for at least eight weeks during year preceding such school meeting (both may vote).
- (c) Not being a parent, has a child of school age residing with him who has attended district school eight weeks (only one may vote).

## 4 Women on Town Democratic Ticket; Syosset Vet, Enrolled GOP Heads Slate

EAST NORWICH—The Oyster Bay Town Democratic candidates for election in November include two enrolled Republicans and four of the nine nominees are women.

H. P. Baldwin Terry of Syosset, insurance agent and Army reserve major who served with the Air Corps in the Pacific during World War II, is the Democratic candidate for Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay, opposing incumbent Harry Tappen for the two-year term.

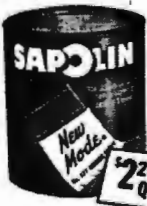

"If the women of our town would only stop in at the church next week on Friday to see the wonderful variety of clothing we collect for charity, they would be more enthusiastic and responsive to our annual appeal," Mrs. Colthurst said.

"To give at least two new garments, always two of the same size, and just once a year, is the only requirement for joining the Needlework Guild," she explained. "There are no dues and no meetings."

She suggested that the problem of class size be considered next in importance to salary and pension. "Education for Peace" proved to be of such importance and length in the discussions, that it was decided to continue it at the conference next year.

United Nations observers at the conference requested that all members of the World Organization of the Teaching Profession teach about the U. N. in their schools. They stressed the importance of knowing the machinery that is available in the UN for keeping peace.

Miss Wessell spent two months in Europe. At the conclusion of the Berne conference, she toured France, Italy, Belgium, Holland and England. A member of the Hicksville High School faculty, she is active in Nassau County English teachers organizations.

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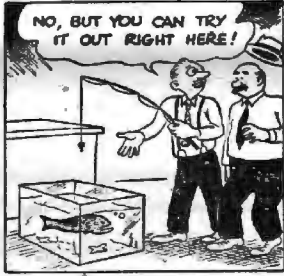
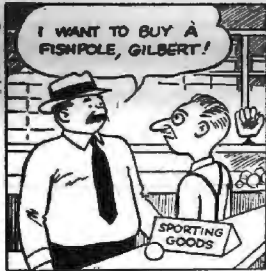

In Our Opinion:

We Need Parks and Open Spaces

WE GET THE FEELING—frequently these days—that things are closing in on us. Here a tract of open land is sought for development, soon to be the site of a couple of hundred tidy homes. There another large tract is sought—very soon (during 1950, in fact)—to be covered by some 2000 (or even 4000?) cellars bedroom-kitchen units.

At the risk of being labeled "reactionary," we deplore the disappearance of every local square inch of open ground. The sale of trees with its rolling plains—the historic Great Plains of Long Island—is all but gone . . . including the name.

Population and home building is closing in on us — from all sides.

What must be done, and done very soon, is obvious: Our township must acquire some of these remaining acres and set them aside for parks. In Hicksville, where we have a Park and Parking District, small tracts could be acquired and planted with trees and grass. In the total mid-Island section, larger tracts could be set aside for township parks.

Many of the people moving into the mid-Island area do so to get "out in the country." But unless some provision is made now, we may soon see the day when there is no more local "country" to enjoy.

It may be argued that we have the wonderful Bethpage State Park in our neighborhood with its many, many acres. And over to the west is the Nassau County Park (formerly Salisbury) with some 900 acres. These are fine, but what we also need are smaller open spaces right in our villages with shaded walks and benches. The kind of a place where the Missus can wheel the baby on sunny afternoons.

We read with interest in last week's Herald that the Oyster Bay town administration plans to spend some of its interest-earning surplus funds on major public works projects. We understand that

Dear Boss:  
 Newsday boasts 100,000 circulation daily, which is a shame, because when that Garden City daily makes a mistake . . . just that many more people are misled and deceived.

For example in Friday's edition (page 27) they reported on tax rates announced by the County Assessment Department:

"The greatest decrease (in school tax rate) is seen in Bethpage," the article stated, "gradually becoming a ghost town since the cancellation of war contracts. The rate dropped from \$1.19 to 88 cents."

Just what war contracts have to do with school tax rates is not very clear to me, but then I'm only a cub on a home town weekly paper.

Rate Up Not Down  
 The school tax rate for Bethpage, as a matter of fact, is going up next year. I just looked over the cold figures released by the County Assessment department. True enough, the rate for "Bethpage" (which is really "Old Bethpage") listed as district 20, drop-
