Chisholm Lauds District Survey

HICKSVILLE — John W. Chisholm, school superintendent in Nassau, compliments the local district and school board upon undertaking a private survey of local needs and problems. This project was reported exclusively in the Herald last week. He praised the project in his remarks before the Civic Association, school authorities and guests from Plainview in the firehouse, Thursday night.

He also admitted he would like to see the survey, to be made by Columbia University, include Plainview. "We must approach our problems objectively," he asserted, "and let the facts speak for themselves."

Out-of-Date Boundaries

While Chisholm failed to come right out and urge the merger of the local district with Plainview, he did point out that for the most part, school district boundaries were set up in 1812 and have been changed but little since then. A high school must have 695 pupils to operate efficiently, according to state experts, and an elementary (continued on page 3)

Heed School Experts, Strauber Recommends

BETHPAGE — John W. Chisholm, school superintendent for this area, has apparently gotten over his "fright and confusion" on the word "consolidation," Henry E. Strauber commented this week.

"I notice with great surprise and some delight the Herald headline about Mr. Chisholm advocating the consolidation of Plainview and Hicksville," Strauber said. "My remarks are not intended to be sarcasm, but merely to point out to the people of this area that when Mr. Charles Schwarz and myself, along with the entire school board, advocated consolidation in Bethpage-Island Trees Districts, Mr. Chisholm thought 'consolidation' was a naughty word and fought against the idea, offering centralization of five districts as his answer. Centralization or nothing — we got nothing."

"I can, from experience of six years as an active school trustee and citizen active in civic affairs, offer these suggestions:

"Due to the tremendous growth in building, increased population and potential growth in school reg-

istration in this area, a great problem presents itself to the educational authorities. It can and will be solved but only by clear thinking and unselfish planning for the future, cooperation between adjacent school districts, district superintendents and authorities in Albany.

"People cannot afford to sit back with a 'do-nothing' attitude and be content with a status quo (continued on page 18)

Call For Bidding On School Project

BETHPAGE — Separate sealed bids for construction, heating, plumbing and electrical work upon the new elementary school for this district will be received by the Board of Education until next Tuesday night at 8 o'clock, according to Mrs. Evelyn Auer of 22 Powell Ave., district clerk.

Information for bidders may be examined at the office of Louis E. Jallade, architect, 597 Fifth Ave., New York. Voters of the district have already given their approval to a \$1,140,000 bond issue to cover the cost of land purchase, construction of a 20-room school and furnishings.

COMMUNITY CONCERT WEEK:

Membership Drive Starts Monday

HICKSVILLE — The second membership drive of the Community Concerts Association gets underway next Monday night with a dinner-meeting for volunteer workers and captains at the Alibi Restaurant. The campaign will continue until Saturday, October 8, with only 800 memberships for adults and students available. First opportunity to renew will be given those who joined last January and enjoyed the three concerts given during the season.

HICKSVILLE — A total of 800 persons are today registered and qualified to vote Oct. 10 at the high school when a special district meeting is held on the question of student transportation within the district, according to Andrew B. Heberer, district clerk. With 699 persons previously registered, another 131 were added to the rolls last Saturday. The final voter registration on the twin school bus questions, each allowing appropriation of \$40,000, will take place this Saturday at Nicholai St. School between 3 and 9 p. m. Peak school voter registration in recent years has exceeded 1,000. Voter qualifications were published in the Herald last week.

Neighbors Again Protest Gun Range

NORTH BETHPAGE — Renewed protests against the operation of the gunners' range on Grumman property near Stewart Ave. and South Oyster Bay Rd. were voiced this week when a bullet crashed through a local resident's cellar window while a housewife was busy there with her laundry. The Civic Association decided to repeat its complaint of a year ago to County Police Commissioner John Beckmann. Circulation of petitions to the town board is being discussed.

The incident of the bullet-shattered window which scattered glass within inches of Mrs. Joseph Hunchick of 1100 Stewart Ave. last week as she was occupied with her washing, recalled for the neighborhood other bullet episodes, including the slug which smashed a front porch window in the Hunchick home, and the bullet which cracked into the living room in another house a block away.

The gun range occupies about 25 acres of thinly wooded property leased from Grumman's by the Gunner's Club of Long Island, Inc. The Town of Oyster Bay granted a permit for the range to V. B. Cleaver, president, of Rockville Center, in 1946. It was previously granted a permit in 1942 as the Grumman Gun Club. The town records state the range is located 500 yards east of Oyster Bay Road and 550 yards south of Stewart Avenue, the Herald found. It was originally established to train Grumman's wartime guard force.

Mr. and Mrs. Hunchick, who occupy the first house on the north side of Stewart Ave., going towards Bethpage, have lived there for 15 years. They told the Herald they are afraid to sit in their front porch because of the gun range, which apparently is in line with their house. They frequently hear bullets "whizzing (continued on page 14)

PLAINVIEW — There will be a fire burning in fire headquarters this Saturday night, set by a fireman, but there will be no cause for alarm.

The department will celebrate the "burning of the mortgage" upon its headquarters with a little private gathering for members and the ladies auxiliary, according to Chief Edmond Ocker. Town Supervisor Harry Tappan who officiated at the firehouse dedication in 1941 has been invited to participate in the ceremony. The fire department here was organized in 1927.

Collecting Gifts For Vet Hospital

HICKSVILLE — The annual trip to Kings Park Veterans Hospital will be made by the Charles Wagner Legion Post and Auxiliary, Sunday, Oct. 16, in conjunction with the Bethpage Legion Post and its Auxiliary.

An appeal for cigarettes, old silk stockings, neckties and magazines has been made by Commander Rudy Bouse of the Wagner Post. Silk stockings and neckties are used for rehabilitation work at the hospital. The Legion supplies ice cream cups and candy for the patients.

"Very few realize that there are 889 World War I and 832 World War II veterans in Kings Park at the present time," Bouse said. "There are also 82 boys and 45 girls there. During the year, various American Legion Posts take turns in visiting the hospitalized veterans."

Contributions for the trip may be left at the Legion clubhouse, East Nicholai St. at any time.

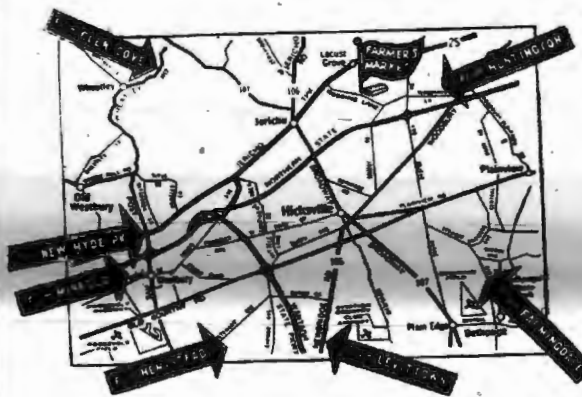

school at least 400 students, he noted.

He stressed the importance of "taking a long-range view and everyone working together to solve educational problems."

Regarding the survey to be made here by Columbia he declared "the money spent will be saved many, many times over."

Members of Plainview and Hicksville School Boards present were invited to comment. John Hartmann of Plainview board said it was planned to leave the matter of consolidation "up to the people to decide." He said a district meeting will be held on the topic "in the very near future." John Harbes also spoke briefly. There were comments by Mrs. Edna Kuhne Sutton and Lawrence McCaffrey, members of the Hicksville Board.

Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent of schools, complimented the civic group "for what you are trying to do" in bringing community problems to the attention of all residents. Several Plainview residents also attended, representing their civic group.

President Lawrence A. Roman welcomed the members back after the summer recess, explaining that the executive committee had held sessions in the interval. Sixteen new applicants for membership were presented by William L. Geyer.

Traffic Discussed

Traffic and safety conditions occupied a major part of the evening after the remarks by Chisholm. Upon the suggestion of Ernest Francke, it was decided to invite County Police Inspector Louis Schneider to speak at a future meeting.

Points which need police protection or traffic signals which were stressed include Lee Ave. and South Broadway, W. Marie St. and Jerusalem Ave., W. Marie St. and Newbridge Rd., East Street and Duffy Ave. at Newbridge Rd.

Elery Bean, education chairman, called attention to the special district meeting on student transportation on Oct. 10. He urged all present to register and vote. He said he would like to see a large vote to provide the district with a fair decision. McCaffrey explained the two propositions to be voted upon, stating that each question stands "on its own" being subject to a "yes" or "no" vote.

William Allmann reported that a fire hydrant on Benjamin Ave. is "practically buried" with the hose connection underground. It was decided to write the fire commissioners about this.

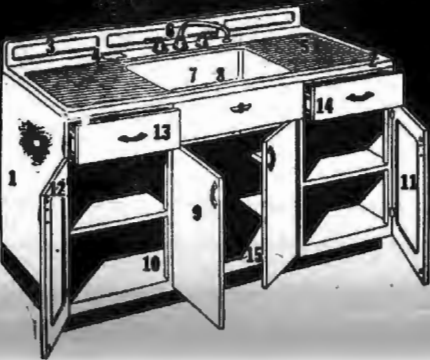

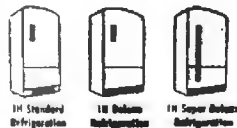

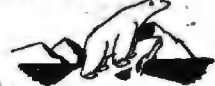

45,000 School Tax Bills Go In Mail

OYSTER BAY — To collect, in round figures, \$244,000 more for school purposes than last year. His department collected 96.58 per cent of the school warrant for 1948-49, which is about a half per cent less than the all-time peak collection of 97.15 per cent for 1947-48.

On the town-country warrant, he collected 96.76 per cent for the past year compared with 97.19 the previous year. The drop of a half per cent is due, Scholl explained, to the fact that the Long Island Rail Road has defaulted on the payment of taxes since it filed bankruptcy.

Last year the tax office of the town collected about five million dollars on the school and town-country warrants. In 1939, when

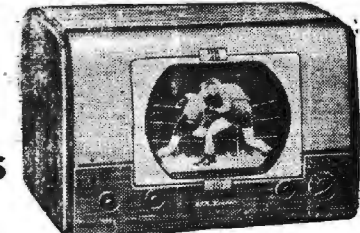
Scholl took office the total collection was three million dollars, reflecting the growth of the township and the increased work for his department.

School District tax rates are set by the taxpayers in each district, who approve local expenditures at the annual district meetings held in May.

In the entire township the school bill to be collected is \$2,076,875.67, an increase of \$244,525.27 or 13.34 per cent.

or be so biased on strictly local or town planning to overlook the advantages to be gained by consolidating or centralizing areas. Three things are offered: better educational facilities, better instructional programs, and eventual savings in taxes for all of us.

"Listen carefully to all discussion on this subject before taking sides," Strauber suggests. "Listen to those people who have shown previous interest and have some educational background—your local school trustees, principals, district superintendents, representatives of the state education department. Pay less attention to half-rocked small-time politicians or local sharpshooters who want to sound off.

"I am interested and have fought for improvements but I don't wish to see our districts saddled with debts that will become a hardship for so many newcomers. We must plan, but plan wisely. We must build, but not overbuild. Above all, we must cooperate and not just be 'agin' everything."

by like bees" and hear slugs strike against their metal flag staff on the front lawn.

A neighbor, four houses down, told the couple she recently swept a bullet off her front stoop and a bullet went into the living room at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Minnick, Jr., on Balsam Place, a street off Stewart Ave., in the early spring of last year. It bored a hole thru a window shade after breaking the glass and then plopped into a chair.

Noise of Firing

At the civic meeting, Wednesday night, when it was decided to again write the county police in protest, members who live several blocks from the Hunchicks reported they can clearly hear the noise of firing "seven days a week."

"The last time we wrote, the police stopped by, and everything was all right for a while," Mrs. Victor C. Ehmgig told the Herald, "and then it started all over again." Mrs. Ehmgig was secretary of the civic group last year.

V. B. Cleaver was most anxious to cooperate when a representative of the Herald visited the range, Friday. He said that the pellet which hit the Hunchick window last week was "spent" and could cause no harm. He pointed out the safety precautions taken on the range.

Strangers Are Barred

The range, he said, is operated by a private club and is open only to its 199 members and their guests. No strangers are permitted to use it and shooting is confined to target marksmanship. "It is considered one of the finest in the East and rates among the

three best in the nation," he added. No trick shooting or "plinking" is tolerated.

About 1200 policemen and law enforcement officers of the Nassau department and incorporated villages practice on the range. The June, 1949, "FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin" published an article about the police training conducted there under the direction of Capt. Charles H. Russell.

The range is attractively maintained with trimmed lawns, neat buildings and shade trees. Shooting is aimed north against an embankment 18 feet high and 110 feet wide. Discarded railroad ties are being heaped on top of this "bump" to increase its height.

The pellet which broke the window at the Hunchick home, Cleaver described as "an accidental discharge" from a revolver during the police training program.

In Our Opinion:

School Children Deserve Protection

WE BEGIN TO SOUND like an old broken record, but we must harp on the theme that local conditions are changing—changing overnight. What was true last year or even last week, is not necessarily true today or tomorrow.

The East St. P-TA of Hicksville has pledged itself to get something done about auto traffic in the vicinity of this school building. We sincerely hope their efforts meet with success.

Before the post-war building program really got going, many of the East St. pupils came from the west. They found it convenient to cross Plainview Road (East Marie Street), if they lived south of this road, at the Park Avenue corner. For a while, in the pre-war period, a policeman was regularly assigned to this corner, even though there was (and is) a traffic signal at the same intersection.

Then came the war and many policemen were withdrawn from crossing duty as the ranks of the county force dwindled.

Since the end of the war, several efforts have been made to get a policeman assigned to Plainview Road. The Civic Association tried over a year ago to get a cop for the Park Avenue corner. The county department made a survey and found no policeman was warranted.

Now dozens of houses have been erected to the east of this school and we find today many small children trying to get across Plainview Road at the East Street corner. Those tots take their lives into their own hands when they try to get across that speed-way today. East St. is four blocks away east of Park Avenue and some motorists — bent upon beating the light at Park Avenue — are inclined to put a heavy foot on the gas pedal as they zoom into Hicksville.

On top of this condition, we find that East Street itself has become a speedway for north and south traffic. Some of the fast boys use East Street so they can skip the entire business section.

The police tell us they do not establish play streets, such designation being up to the town fathers. The town board today has several letters on hand asking that East Street be designated for reduced speed.

And what has been said above about Plainview
