The incident of the bullet-shattered window which scattered glass within inches of Mrs. Jo-seph Hunchick of 1100 Stewart Ave. last week as she was occupied with her washing, recalled for the neighborhood other bullet episodes, including the slug which smashed a front porch window in the Hunchick home, and the bul-let which cracked into the living room in another house a block away.



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
